The Story of Who We Are

One of the first “Christmas presents” I receive each year is a packet of materials from the Annual Conference filled with report forms for our annual Statistical Report. This report asks for all kinds of year end information about First Church. Each year I set that packet somewhere (hidden) on my desk until around mid-January when I get a reminder that those forms must be completed and returned by the end of January.

I “anxiously” await the year-end financial reports from Harriett. Mary keeps our membership lists and weekly attendance reports. I then have the task of finding the right place to put all those figures. I confess that I find this a duty and I am always relieved when the last number has been entered and I have confirmation that the completed report has been received.

The numbers tell a part of the story of who we are.

First UMC is an amazing congregation—that may be a biased opinion, but the numbers don’t lie. During 2017 we had a net gain in membership of 9. That was the second year for membership growth. We shared in the baptism of one infant and one youth. With the births of 7 babies during 2017, we will, no doubt, share in more baptisms. There is a large group of regular attenders and supporters of the congregation who have not yet chosen to place their membership with the congregation. Our average attendance in worship services increased slightly during the past year.

Our Lenten Disciplines *What If?*

We invite you to take time to read and reflect on the information provided and then look at ways you might respond through your Lenten time of Fasting, Prayer, Listening, and Responding.

Observing The Season of Lent

In *A Guide to Prayer for All Who Seek God*, Norman Shawchuck and Rueben Job remind us that the Season of Lent as a rollercoaster ride with emotions that are down and up again and again as the story of our salvation makes plain our sinful ways and the cost of our redemption. We begin with Ash Wednesday where we roughly bump up against our own mortality. Here we know that sin and death are real, and they are real not just for someone else. Sin and death are real for us. This is where we begin the Lenten Season, with our face pressed hard against the reality of our sin and our death. If we did not know how the story ends, this would be a dark and depressing journey. But we do know how the story ends and therefore in the midst of self-denial and fasting we remember our faithful Savior and the Easter declaration that life is always victorious over death, always!

During the forty days of Lent (between

Ash Wednesday and Easter—not counting Sundays) we experience the temptations of Jesus and remember our own. We recognize the rising hopes of the faithful followers as they expect a triumphal entry of their Messiah. They dream of Christ taking political control and restoring the nation of Israel. Like them, we long for the time when the world knows the way of God's Kingdom—the way of peace and love. But Holy Week comes and we see so many of those hopes dashed to their death. It is a somber time, but even in Lent we remember that each Sunday of the year is a little Easter.

Each year the season begins with an invitation to the observance of Lenten Discipline. The pastor offers: I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to observe a holy Lent by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word. We pray and then the ashes (burnt

palm branches from the previous year's palm branches) are pressed upon our foreheads.

Sometimes we focus on the self-denial of Lent. We choose to give up something that we like or something that we don't necessarily need in our lives. That is good, and it can be a very holy sacrifice. But this year, I hope you will take up something new or revive a spiritual activity. Read the Bible more faithfully. Make a conscious effort to speak or post on social media positive words, building up people rather than tearing others down. Make gifts to mission work (time or money) which support the way of sharing Christ with others. Use your God-given talents and abilities in service to others. Prayerfully be aware of opportunities to share the love of Christ especially with those who have never experienced the power of love, grace, and forgiveness that Christ brings to our world.

First Church has children and youth who actively participate in the ministries and programs your giving provides. You have become so accustomed to seeing children and youth around our church that you may not realize that isn't the story for many congregations. We are blessed with children and youth of all ages. We have children in the nurseries each week. We have children learning and singing and listening. Their energy is wonderful! The youth are involved in activities of learning, mission, and recreation. They went on a mission trip to Savannah in June! I hope you are very proud of who we are and what we are doing in ministry with our children and youth.

The story goes on to tell of work that is important to us all. Our weekly worship services are filled with the Spirit of Christ. There is a sense of Christian fellowship and care for one another. It makes my heart sing to watch our congregations move out in care and support of each other. We are blessed by music which lifts our hearts with melodies and words of praise, thanksgiving, and awe. Week by week we join in times of Bible study, fellowship shared around tables with wonderful food that has been prepared for us.

First Church supports a budget of just under \$500,000. Those gifts are used to provide the utilities that keep us comfortable

within our magnificent building; they pay for the programs and ministries that bring us together in worship, study, and fellowship; they provide for our staff who work hard to serve the church well; and they extend our presence and mission in places nearby, around the conference, and throughout the world. We work very hard to be good stewards of your gifts. While we did not pay our Fair Share in full during the past year, we were able to once again pay 80% of that \$101,604 asking. We will need to work even harder this year as we strive to reach 100% of that Fair Share.

Our story tells that we spent some for improvements to our church building and parsonage. First Church is so very blessed to have had men and women of faith who shared of their resources with endowment gifts to the church. We continue to make improvements to our church properties without having to ask you for any additional giving.

I've saved a major chapter in the story of our work until last. First Church is a congregation known for its service through missions. I am so very proud in knowing that many lives are touched by the contributions and service shared. We lead the district in support of the Celebration of Mission Event (with most of those funds coming from our Dinner Theater). We feed children through the distribution of more than 2,000 backpacks at the Central City Elementary School.

Our support of Cridlin is amazing with financial support, food and clothing donations, and volunteers. (Cridlin is a food, clothing, and life essentials program for those in need shared by our downtown congregations.) We move out into the community through programs like Helpington. Christmas gifts and other financial support are shared with our local UM mission at Ebenezer Community Outreach Center. Each year members of the congregation and other friends help to support the Christmas Mission to Nicaragua. Last year two members of the congregation (and other family members) went as missionaries to Sandino and more than \$13,000 was raised to support that work. Additionally, we offered continuing area flood relief work, made 20 cleaning buckets and shared more than 50 health kits. Hundreds (thousands) of lives have been touched with the presence of Christ's love because we choose to be faithful in our work.

You have shared in an amazing and wonderful story of faith and service. Great things were done by our congregation in 2017! Thank you!! I can't wait to hear the stories we will tell in 2018.

May God continue to lead and guide us in our ministries.
