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Weather Cancellations

In the case of inclement weather during weekdays, we will close and cancel meetings and events if Harford County Public Schools close or close early. In the case of poor weather on the weekends, we will try to put a cancellation announcement out via WXCY 103.7 or SMASH Hits WHGM 104.7. We will also put a notice on the church answering machine.

Worship Services

Worship is 8:15 a.m. and 11 a.m. with entrance via the front doors on Union Avenue only. Livestream worship is at 11 a.m.

Masks are required for all folk (vaccinated or not) when in the buildings as we work to keep the most vulnerable among us safe. We have a supply of masks if you forget to bring yours. Attendance records are maintained for contact tracing, and we are asked to maintain physical distancing.

For individuals not wishing to appear in the Livestream service at 11 a.m. seats behind the projector and in the rear gallery are not in the view of the camera.

To help keep us safe, the air in the sanctuary is filtered through our air-handling equipment in our continuing effort to privilege life and health in the face of Covid-19.

Nursery care will not be available, but we welcome children of all ages in worship.

Thoughts from our Lay Leader

First, I'd like to thank all those who came to my rescue after my not so dainty exit from the pulpit on December 12. You all are much appreciated!

During the first week of November our Council of Bishops met for their Fall meeting. Items the bishops prayed for and felt most important are below.

- The ministry and witness of the church in the world during the pandemic.
- Care for God's Creation because of climate change.
- The call and work to end the sin of racism in the church and the world.
- The healing and renewal of former scouts who were sexually abused, including through United Methodist troops and packs, and a settlement with the survivor claimants.
- Advocating for the health and safety of all people around the world through vaccinations.
- Update on the next General Conference. Due to the pandemic, the Commission on General Conference will decide by the end of March 2022 if there will be a General Conference. Key considerations are our progress toward stamping out COVID-19 and its variants, vaccination rates of our delegates around the world, visas for delegates from outside the U.S. (almost 50 percent of the delegates are from outside the U.S.) and the health and safety of all General Conference participants.
- Separation and disaffiliation of congregations due to full inclusion of LGBTQ persons. Below is a statement from the Council of Bishops about the future United Methodist Church. You will see that it parallels BWC's aspiration to be a diverse conference. While we may experience some congregations leaving The United Methodist Church, the bishops and leadership of BWC are prepared to continue to make a way forward for a diverse church and a church that continues to preach the Good News of Jesus Christ and to provide for local and global mission and ministry with the people in our communities.

A Narrative for the Continuing United Methodist Church

United Methodists all over the globe are liturgical, contemporary, charismatic, social activists, urban, suburban, small town, rural and much more. We are children, youth, young adults, senior adults, new Christians, and mature Christians. We are present on four continents, in more than 45 countries, and we comprise an unknown number of cultures and languages. We are a holy communion of different races, ethnicities, cultures, and perspectives united by the Holy Spirit, driven by the mission of Christ, and bearing the good news of an unmerited grace that changes lives and transforms communities.

Christ's prayer for our unity and command to gather all to the table, to make space for one another, appreciate one another, and look for Christ in each other, prohibit us from creating individual tables only for those who think, act, look, and perceive the world like we do. We cannot be a church that fractures its identity and commitment to Christ by aligning itself with political parties. We cannot be a traditional church or a progressive church or a centrist church. We cannot be a gay or straight church. Our churches must be more than echo chambers made in our own image arguing with each other while neglecting our central purpose. This is the way of the world.

Instead, we must be one people, rooted in scripture, centered in Christ, serving in love and united in the essentials. It is hard work. It is sacred work. It is the ministry of reconciliation that Christ gave to each of us. Our best witness is

to love each other as Christ loves us, to show the world the supernatural power of the Holy Spirit to bind us together despite our differences. This is living out the gospel.

We are a church:

- Confident in what God has done in Christ Jesus for all humankind
- Committed to personal and social salvation/transformation
- Courageous in dismantling the powers of racism, tribalism, and colonialism

All of our members, clergy, local churches, and annual conferences will continue to have a home in the "Future United Methodist Church," whether they consider themselves liberal, evangelical, progressive, traditionalist, middle of the road, conservative, centrist, or something else. We hold on to our Wesleyan heritage that "the living core of the Christian faith is revealed in Scripture, illuminated by tradition, vivified in personal experience, and confirmed by reason."

We are longing for a United Methodist Church that will move towards new forms of being a connectional church, a General Conference focused on global essentials, and an empowerment of regions for contextually relevant forms of living our common mission mandate. Deeply rooted in the Doctrinal Standards of the UMC, we pledge to exercise our episcopal role in ways that enable as many United Methodists, lay and clergy, as are willing to remain in the UMC and – together – to continue in making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. And, because we are part of the Church Universal, we seek to be united visibly and in ministries with other parts of the Body of Christ in God's mission for the human family and creation.

We are committed to strengthening every local church, where the word is preached and Christ is offered, and where the table is set before all who hunger and thirst for righteousness, confident in the prayer we have learned to say and share:

Langston Hughes Youth Oratorical Contest



The Havre de Grace Colored School Museum and Cultural Center (HCSMCC) will be holding its annual Langston Hughes Youth Oratorical Contest. The event will take place on **Saturday**, **February 5** from 1 to 3 p.m. at The Cultural Center at the Opera House, 121 N. Union Avenue in Havre de Grace.

This year's theme is "I, Too, Am America." All participants are required to give a four-to-five-minute speech.

The event is open to middle and high school students in Harford County. It is divided into two categories: grades 6 to 8 and grades 9 to 12.

First place winners in each category receive \$500, second place winners in each category receive \$300 and third place winners in each category receive \$200. The first 10 runners-up will each receive \$100.

Online applications are due by **Saturday**, **January 8**.

The HCSMCC is excited to continue this tradition which highlights our local connection to Langston Hughes and honors the legacy of those that advocated for equitable access to education for African American students in Harford County. One of the leaders of HCSMCC is our own Brittany.


Sacramental Fund Helped Families Remain in their Homes

In the fall, we made a grant of \$10,000 to Harford Community Action Agency from our Sacramental Fund (a fund for the purpose of helping those in need). HCAA is the portal in Harford County for accessing all kinds of help but especially housing. Its Executive Director is our own Pam. We stipulated that this grant be used for housing needs, anticipating a wave of evictions as the pandemic has impacted families' ability to work and landlord restrictions are being lifted. We helped pay rent for 14 families that allowed them to avoid eviction and kept them intact and in their homes. Here's some information about the 14 households we helped:

- *All of them are legal citizens of the US
- *Eight are single parent families with children
- *Four of them are folk over age 60
- *Two of them are veterans
- *Three of them are disabled
- *Five of them are working full-time; one is working part-time; two are seeking work; and three are retired
- *All of them earn under \$40,000/year
- *Six of them make under \$10,000/year
- *Nine of them have a high school diploma or GED; one has neither
- *All of them were assisted through HCAA's Homeless Prevention Program.

Does the Light Still Shine?

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

Dear Fellow Disciples:

After the tree is taken down, after the decorations are put away, after the wrapping paper is discarded, after the boxes are stored, after the lights are unplugged, does the Light still shine?

After the winter grows stronger, after the nights seem deeper, after the temperatures grow colder, after the grass turns browner, after the garden gets deader, after the skies become grayer, does the Light still shine?

After unemployment has impoverished us, after the fear of infection has isolated us, after the strain of child-rearing has exhausted us, after joblessness has killed our sense of self-worth, after aging has taken its toll on our abilities, after family has hurt us or friends have deserted us, after care-giving has worn us down, after worry has broken us, after business or professional failures have emptied life of its usual meaning, after illness has ravaged our bodies, after the weight of grief has crushed us, after loneliness has eroded our mental health, does the Light still shine?

After the daily news has disheartened us, after the scale of natural disasters has overwhelmed us, after the polarization of national politics has frustrated us, after the injustices of the world have discouraged us, after the inability of leaders to act wisely and effectively has made us apathetic, after the actions and attitudes of people have disappointed us, after the danger of climate change has frightened us, after the fear of Covid has numbed us, does the Light still shine?

After the Star stopped shining, after the Magi returned to the East, after Mary and Joseph fled with Jesus to Egypt, after they came back to Nazareth, did the Light still shine?

After teaching to disciples who were obtuse for three years, after healing so many, after preaching to crowds that barely heard him, after signs that many mistook for mere wonders, did the Light still shine?

After being betrayed by one follower, after being unfairly accused by his own people, after being denied by another follower, after being convicted by the rulers of a foreign power, after being whipped and abused by soldiers acting like thugs, after being reviled by the crowd, after being publicly humiliated, after being tortured to death, did the Light still shine?

Yes, it DID! And yes, it DOES! The Light still shines! As the opening of the Gospel of John, quoted above, reminds us: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not, has not, and will not ever, overcome it. For after everything else, there is a resurrection yet to come. Thanks be to God!

May the Light of Christmas shine in and through us this winter. May the Light of the Star of Bethlehem shine through January and the across the year to come. May it guide our footsteps, give us hope and show us the Way in which God will have us walk.

2021 Missions Team Summary

We've experienced another year with COVID increasing the need of many. Once again, our Missions Team was blessed this past year with a commitment from our Church family to fund missions "Here, Across the Street, and Around the World" by a monthly amount of our weekly Offerings for this purpose. There have been so many in need of food and housing everywhere this year. The Missions Team really strived to meet the needs of the Missions that have depended on our funding. Below is an outline of where Mission funds were spent from January through December 2021 (a total of \$26,550 - \$3,550.00 less than 2020).

HERE:

Alpha's Glory (\$500) - a non-profit ministry providing services for pregnancy, pregnancy loss and parenting; supporting moms, dads, and infants; and compassionately presenting Biblical truth resulting in changed lives. Unfortunately, we were not able to receive the baby bottle donations, but some individuals also designated special gifts to support this mission.

Anna's House (\$500) - provides transitional and permanent housing for homeless women and children in Harford County and helps them on the road to self-sufficiency.

FCCAU/Welcome One (\$800) – Welcome One was again unable to provide services on-site due to COVID and had to use grants to house folk in hotel rooms. However, as the rate of infections eased, Welcome One was able to reopen the shelter site in July with our church family volunteering to prepare meals on the 16th of each month. Welcome One is operated by Faith Communities and Civic Agencies United (FCCAU), a charitable organization supported by churches, faith-based groups, local businesses, foundations and government agencies. It provides a continuum of services designed to reduce homelessness in Harford County. The Emergency Winter Shelter (EWS) will begin sheltering January 3 to mid-April with housing in hotels and churches volunteering to assist with meals. We expect more families will be in need this year.

Grace Place (\$500) – hosted by St. John's Episcopal Church in the parish hall, Grace Place offers a free carry-out meal for those who need it as well as a bag of groceries to take home for the week. Volunteers from many Christian congregations in Havre de Grace support this worthy program. The number of needy people has continued to grow at Grace Place this year. HDGUMC supports Grace Place once a month with food and volunteers as well as non-perishable items. This year, food was also donated by members placing non-perishable items in the red cupboard outside the church office on a weekly basis.

Habitat for Humanity – Susquehanna (\$1,000) - part of a global, non-profit housing organization operated on Christian principles that seeks to put God's love and hope into action by constructing, rehabilitating and preserving homes, advocating for fair and just housing policies, and providing training and access to resources to help families improve their shelter conditions. We have also periodically assisted with dedications and hands-on help in the building of homes. A team of women from our Missions Team participated in a Women's Build where we had to decorate a stud. We chose the name of "Hope Builders", using our Waves of Grace logo. There was a contest for the best stud. Our theme was "Havre de Grace" and various photos of Havre de Grace were used. We did not win the contest, but we raised \$2,300 for Habitat for Humanity. It was a fun project.

God is good all the time. All the time, God is good.

Harford Family House (\$500) - the largest provider of transitional housing in Harford County, is the only organization in our county capable of housing a whole family together, including a father, during the crisis of homelessness. They not only provide housing but assist with financial education and help to obtain employment.

Harford Hope for the Homeless Alliance (\$800) – a coalition of the Harford County Government, businesses, and the faith community working together to help the homeless to wholeness. Each component of the Alliance brings a part of the solution. Together, we can make an impact on the gaps of care! HHHA is the umbrella organization for the Emergency Winter Shelter (EWS). Last year, The Emergency Winter Shelter was housed in hotels with meals provided by Meals on Wheels and snacks by churches, including our congregation. This year, the EWS will begin sheltering January 3, to mid-April with housing in hotels and churches volunteering to assist with meals. We expect more families will be in need this year. Our Knitting Ministry is working on providing 100 warm winter scarves for the homeless.

HDG UMC Christmas Project (\$250) – Each year our staff at HDG UMC works with the local schools in Havre de Grace to find families to support so they, too, will have a Merry Christmas. Through the donations of many church members and the Mission Team, we have been able to support eight families as well as provide Christmas stockings for many others. Many from our congregation selected "ornaments" (tags) with gift requests to help provide some special smiles on Christmas morning.

Helping Up Mission – Baltimore (\$800) – helps folk fighting addiction and homelessness get their lives back. The comprehensive recovery programs address root issues of substance abuse and poverty. As one person is healed, Greater Baltimore is raised up. This year, 40 percent of the people helped were women. HUM has an excellent success rate. This January, they will be opening a new building dedicated to women and will use the same program for them as the men – a program which has been very successful.

Homecoming Project-Bel Air (\$500) – an eight bed, state certified half-way house for women recovering from alcohol and substance abuse. The program offers services for recovery, life skills, group and individual counseling, support for the impacts on the entire family, education sessions, recreation, the 12-step program and case management. Homecoming Project has a great success rate.

Kairos (\$500) - Kairos Prison Ministry has two segments: Inside for the inmates and Outside for the families impacted by incarceration. It is a Christian faith-based ministry that addresses the spiritual needs of the incarcerated men, women, youth and their families. This year due to COVID, we could not go inside to be with the inmates, but we were able to provide support for a Kairos Outside Retreat to support those affected by a loved one's incarceration.

Manna House, Baltimore (\$500) - "It starts with breakfast"-- provides the homeless and poor of Baltimore City with the assistance and support to move towards independence and stability by helping to transform people's lives by feeding them first.

NAACP Harford County Branch (\$750) - To ensure the political, educational, social and economic equality of citizens and work to achieve equality of rights and eliminate racial prejudice.

Susquehanna Ministerium (\$1,000) - a group of many denominations joined together to provide ministry and mutual support for each other and those in need of help.

Summer Mission Trip (\$1,000) - A team from our church went to Pennsylvania where they helped to rehab homes and porches for those in need, including elderly people.

Thanksgiving Community Dinner (\$200) - provides a free Thanksgiving Dinner to those in Havre de Grace, Aberdeen, and Perryville.

ACROSS THE STREET:

Society of St. Andrew (\$750) - an ecumenical, non-profit, charitable organization dedicated to leading others into lives of Christian community and service and introducing people to God's grace in Jesus Christ by meeting their hunger needs. They do gleaning of fields after a harvest to feed the hungry, thereby also reducing food waste.

Red Bird Mission (\$500) - provides education, health care and Christian evangelism ministries to people in Appalachian Kentucky.

Tree of Life (\$700) - a ministry of service and presence raising awareness of Lakota culture and connecting with the Lakota Nation on Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota by serving body, mind, and soul.

AROUND THE WORLD:

BMTS Student Support (\$1,500) - The primary mission of the Baltic Methodist Theological School (BMTS), located in Tallin, Estonia, is to promote spiritual formation and provide applied higher theological education and in-service training tied to the needs of church and society in accordance with international requirements. The BMTS, located in the Baltic Mission Center, prepares Christian workers and leaders for positions of service in churches and Christian organizations. Graduates serve all over Eastern Europe and even indigenous communities above the Arctic Circle!

Children of Zion Village (\$500) - a Christian home for 57 orphans in the southern African nation of Namibia. We also contributed (\$3,000) to assist with the salary of the two directors. In August, a team from Mt. Zion UMC went to Namibia to visit the orphanage, build a playground and share some meals from our culture. The team brought back photos that were shared with our congregation. Some from our congregation are supporting an adopted orphan or cottage for \$30 a month.

China Outreach (\$1,000) - shares Christ's love with Chinese students and scholars on North American campuses, reaching them with the Good News and helping them become Christian leaders who share their faith with others. COM also supports these Christian leaders after their return to China. With COVID many students were not able to return home, and by staying in the US, their faith only became stronger with their peers.

Christar (\$1,000) – Jeff and Sharon use their God-given gifts and skills to share the Good News with refugees in Asia Minor; their passion is to go to those not yet counted in the eternal roll call of nations. They encountered problems with their visas and have been able to return and visit supporting churches in the USA. They expect to return to Asia Minor in early spring.

Ganta Hospital, UM Mission (\$1,500) - a mission with the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church Global Health Initiative where the hospital serves many needy families and villages in the area.

Sillamae Pastor's Salary (\$6,000) - provides the salary for Pastor Vladimir of Grace United Methodist Church in Sillamae, Estonia, a Russian-speaking congregation planted by a neighboring congregation.

We would love to have you join our Mission Team. Come help us make decisions about where donations are best needed to support the Missions of our church. We meet on the third Wednesday of every month (except July and sometimes December) at 5 p.m. in the Nursery.

We serve an awesome God and are blessed with a very generous congregation!

Baltic Methodist Theological Seminary 1994 – 2021 From a Dream to Reality: 27 Years of Theological Education

In the beginning there was a vision ...

Serving God on the other side of the Iron Curtain where theological studies were restricted, Olav Pärnamets and others did not have an opportunity to study theology. Eager to do everything possible to ensure the Estonian UMC had its own seminary to assure its future, Olav Pärnamets' vision was born.

By God's provision, Dr. H. Eddie Fox and World Evangelism sent Wes and Joy Griffin, Asbury Theological Seminary graduates, to help establish the seminary along with a handful of Methodists from Estonia. Inspired by God's grace, the initiative and passion necessary for such an undertaking soon became the basic tenets of building the seminary. Many supporters from around the world made this vision a reality in September 1994.



27 years of Methodist theological education in Estonia:

In 1994, the seminary opened doors in the Tallinn Old Town on Apteegi Street. Facilities were tiny, but fellowship and



the desire to learn was strong. The first students were mostly pastors who served during the Soviet time when theological education was not possible. At last, there was a school for them to get training.

In the beginning, there was no tuition. All funds were raised by international supporters including food, transportation, and student housing. A small tuition was first charged in 1997. Tuition has been raised as the overall economy has improved. Today, the seminary

receives one third of the income needed for its operations from Estonia. The seminary applies for grants and fundraises at home and abroad to resource its growing mission. The BMTS continues to offer scholarships to support missional students from the Baltics.





The seminary has had state accreditation since 1998. The BMTS has passed the periodic reviews by the international evaluators who have found that the BMTS meets the European standard of higher education.

In 1999, the seminary moved into the newly completed Baltic Mission

Center at Narva Street. The spacious classrooms, library, builtin translation booths as well as on site dormitory and cafeteria, provided great study conditions.




From its founding, the BMTS has operated in 3 languages, Estonian, Russian, and English, using simultaneous translation, which creates a Pentecost-like learning environment. We are a multi-ethnic, multi-generational, and

inter-denominational body of Christ able to study and work together in harmony. Students develop valuable relationships for local ministry context.

At first the BMTS relied mostly on partners sending guest faculty. While we always welcome guest teachers, now most of our faculty is from Estonia and five current teachers are BMTS graduates.

Our core curriculum has not changed much, but we have focused more on mission. Since 2002 the BMTS has sent





The BMTS' mission is growing, and we grow with it. Research is an important part of what we do. We are renewing the BMTS library. Thanks to book donations our collection is improving, and our faculty write and publish indigenous textbooks. In their diploma papers our students collect important information about local ministries.

In fall 2021 we set up a hybrid classroom. All our classes can be attended online or in person. We have fitted classrooms with video link capability. This avoids gaps in learning due to the pandemic and opens the way for new learners.

Since the first graduating class in 1998, 256 students from Estonia, Ukraine, Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Finland, Sweden, Romania, Ghana, and USA have graduated. Today, 78% of our graduates are actively in ministry serving as pastors, social workers, missionaries, youth leaders, chaplains in prisons and military, work in Christian media and numerous other fields. Most of Estonian Methodist pastors are our graduates. Our alumni serve as leaders in many denominations in Estonia and in many countries around the world.





We will always be grateful for the founder's vision and praise God for their courage to set out to build a seminary in Estonia!

At some point in this 27-year journey, you have partnered with us in ministry through your prayers and gifts. Some of you have journeyed alongside us for many years. We would like to thank you for the difference that you have made and continue to make through your commitment!



Centuries of Church History and Records

We have copies of the incorporation of our church as it was originally listed in the historical records of Harford County. I have found records as far back as 1840. Yes, 1840! One of the records from way back in 1857 made it known we were the 'Methodist Episcopal Church of Havre de Grace.' Our church building was not built until 60-plus years later (1902) but the congregation was legally incorporated about one hundred eighty years ago. Talk about long lasting

We also have other documents dealing with our name change(s) through bills recorded in state and county records. Some are even in the original written format (not even type written)! And the written word in those



days would have made English teachers proud of the script. The following document is from paper that is so old it had been taped and then when the tape aged enough the paper simply fell apart (the dark portions are from the tape residue). The date in the paper is November 1857 and lists Stephen J. Seneca as the secretary of the governing board at that time.

As I have said before, the history room is chockful of pictures and church records and architectural drawings and awards and so forth all of which are related to our church. To me they are a wonderful way to learn about our church's history. We are still and will continue to be digitizing the records so they can be more accessible to us and to preserve them by being able to handle them less once they are digitized.

If you just want to check out the history room without looking into files, and just to see all the fun things in Memorial Hall and the History Room, you can visit after church one Sunday. The room has many boxes of records and documents remaining to document and record, but some of the awards, pictures and history of our church are in plain sight if you want to look.

Trivia Answers

Answer: C. The Christmas Season starts at sunset on Christmas Eve and runs through Epiphany on January 6. Christmas is not just one day, but a season of thirteen days from sunset Christmas Eve (December 24) through Epiphany (January 6). The thirteenth day of Christmas, Epiphany, an even more ancient Christian celebration than Christmas, originally focused on the nativity, God's incarnation (God made flesh) in the birth of Jesus Christ and Christ's baptism. Today, it commemorates the visiting of the Christ Child by the Magi (Wise Men) with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Gift giving in some cultures extends throughout the 13 days of Christmas; elsewhere, gift giving is limited to Christmas Eve or Christmas Day or January 5 or 6.
