Juneteenth Celebration

Juneteenth, short for June 19th, is the day set aside each year to commemorate the emancipation of enslaved people in the U.S. It marks the day in 1865 when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas, to ensure that all enslaved people in the U.S. were freed, a full two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed. It is one of the oldest African American holidays and officially became a federal holiday last year on June 17, 2021.

This year, the Harford County NAACP Branch will serve as a volunteer partner organization for the Upper Bay Juneteenth Festival hosted by the Historic Hosanna School Museum. This is the longest-running Juneteenth celebration in our area. This family-friendly event will include music, food, vendors, performances, history and more. As a partner with us, please not only come out to enjoy the festivities, but also to volunteer to support it in some way. There will be plenty of opportunities to serve! In the meantime, please mark your calendars for a day of family fun and celebration!

Breaking news: The United Methodist Women has been rebranded as The United Women in Faith. The United Methodist Men is keeping it same name but is now offering The United Men's Ministry platform as a collection of resources to assist churches, ministry leaders, organizers, or anyone seeking to lead men's ministries to go deeper.

The Council of Bishops had their Spring Meeting at the end of April. Bishop Cynthia of the Louisiana Annual Conference and the first Hispanic woman to be President of the Council of Bishops, passed the gavel to Bishop Thomas of the New York Annual Conference. He will be President for the next two years. Bishop Tracy of the East Ohio Conference was elected President-Elect. She will become President of the Council of Bishops in 2024. She is the first African-American woman to hold this position.

The Global Methodist Church (GMC) kicked off on May 1. It will be the more traditional version of the UMC. For more information visit: globalmethodist.org.

Support Migrants Seeking Asylum

The Baltimore-Washington area is receiving a new influx of migrants from the Southern Border. Conference leaders are noting a significant need for basic items and temporary shelter. They are also calling on United Methodists to call on congressional leaders to end Title 42.

What does the Church say?

As United Methodists we believe that, "the center of Christian faithfulness to Scripture is the call we have been given to love and welcome the sojourner. We call upon all United Methodist churches to welcome newly

arriving migrants in their communities, to love them as we do ourselves, to treat them as one of our native-born, to see in them the presence of the incarnated Jesus, and to show hospitality to the migrants in our midst, believing that through their presence we are receiving the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ." Welcoming the Migrant to the US 2016 Book of Resolutions, #3281.

How can the Church respond?

The United Methodist Church is called by Christ to offer love and welcome to the sojourner and now is the moment to proclaim this love in action.

- Pray for the journey and strength of the migrants seeking safety and security, for the health and vitality of volunteers, for the political will of our government leaders, and for you and your commitment to God's ongoing call to justice and to care for God's beloved community.
- Provide **short-term** and **long-term housing support** (1 overnight to 2 month stays). If you or your congregation have room, a house or a building for our migrant neighbors. For questions contact: Dr. Emma or Rev. Neal.
- **Donate:** online to the co-op feeding our new neighbors.
- **In-kind donations:** Drop off supplies at the Baltimore-Washington Conference Center at 11711 E Market Place Fulton, MD 20759. With note "Solidarity with Migrants from Texas." Adult clothing of all types and sizes are needed, so are shoes, and toys and comfort items for children.
- Voice your support to members of Congress and call for an End Title 42.

The United Methodist view on Abortion



Below is the statement on Abortion from our Social Principles in the 2016 The United Methodist Book of Discipline. The Social Principles are a thoughtful effort to speak to human issues in our contemporary world from a sound Biblical and theological foundation. They are a call for us as Christians to prayerfully connect faith and practice. This statement comes from the part of the Social Principles entitled "The Nurturing Community." There are additional statements in our Book of Resolutions also coming from General Conference.

The beginning of life and the ending of life are the God-given boundaries of human existence. While individuals have always had some degree of control over when they would die, they now have the awesome power to determine when and even whether new individuals will be born. Our belief in the sanctity of unborn human life makes us reluctant to approve abortion.

But we are equally bound to respect the sacredness of the life and well-being of the mother and the unborn child.

We recognize tragic conflicts of life with life that may justify abortion, and in such cases we support the legal option of abortion under proper medical procedures by certified medical providers. We support parental, guardian, or other responsible adult notification and consent before abortions can be performed on girls who have not yet reached the age of legal adulthood. We cannot affirm abortion as an acceptable means of birth control, and we unconditionally reject it as a means of gender selection or eugenics (see Resolution 3184).

We oppose the use of late-term abortion known as dilation and extraction (partial-birth abortion) and call for the end of this practice except when the physical life of the mother is in danger and no other medical procedure is available, or in the case of severe fetal anomalies incompatible with life. This procedure shall be performed only by certified medical providers. Before providing their services, abortion providers should be required to offer women the option of anesthesia.

We call all Christians to a searching and prayerful inquiry into the sorts of conditions that may cause them to consider abortion. We entrust God to provide guidance, wisdom, and discernment to those facing an unintended pregnancy.


The Church shall offer ministries to reduce unintended pregnancies. We commit our Church to continue to provide nurturing ministries to those who terminate a pregnancy, to those in the midst of a crisis pregnancy, and to those who give birth.

We mourn and are committed to promoting the diminishment of high abortion rates. The Church shall encourage ministries to reduce unintended pregnancies such as comprehensive, age-appropriate sexuality education, advocacy in regard to contraception, and support of initiatives that enhance the quality of life for all women and girls around the globe.

Young adult women disproportionately face situations in which they feel that they have no choice due to financial, educational, relational, or other circumstances beyond their control. The Church and its local congregations and campus ministries should be in the forefront of supporting existing ministries and developing new ministries that help such women in their communities. They should also support those crisis pregnancy centers and pregnancy resource centers that compassionately help women explore all options related to unplanned pregnancy. We particularly encourage the Church, the government, and social service agencies to support and facilitate the option of adoption. (See ¶ 161M.) We affirm and encourage the Church to assist the ministry of crisis pregnancy centers and pregnancy resource centers that compassionately help women find feasible alternatives to abortion.

Governmental laws and regulations do not provide all the guidance required by the informed Christian conscience. Therefore, a decision concerning abortion should be made only after thoughtful and prayerful consideration by the parties involved, with medical, family, pastoral, and other appropriate counsel.

Exploring Who We Are



--The Lord God made garments of skins for the man and for his wife, and clothed them. Then...the Lord God sent him forth from the garden of Eden, to till the ground from which he was taken. — Genesis 3: 21, 23

Dear Fellow Disciples:

With June, the summer months begin and a somewhat slower pace. It can be a time to reassess where we are and who we are. We are people in relationship with God. So, part of exploring who we are is exploring who God is. The Bible is the story of God's encounter with human beings like us. So, this summer we will engage in a sermon series about "Encountering God" as we explore various stories in which God meets people in life-changing ways.

Human infants learn and grow a great deal as they explore their world. They learn where the boundaries are between their body and the wider world. They learn how the fingers and toes they see are attached to themselves. They also develop an identity, a sense of self. Part of that is learning they are separate from other people, including their parents.

The origin-story of Adam and Eve, of humanity in the garden of Eden, is very much like this. They are created to be in relationship with God and put in the garden to keep it. Sin, however, enters the picture spoiling things and they are separated from God and, in ways that become clearer later when the first murder occurs, from each other.

The story of Eden ends with humanity needing to leave the garden. God, however, cares for them by making clothes for them. God still seeks to be in relationship with them by providing protective care. The separation of children from their parents and of us from God is a poignant reality of human existence.

The rest of the Bible is the story of the relationship between God and us. It is the story of our seeking after God or often seeking to avoid God. It is, more importantly, the story of God seeking us! This is what our summer sermon series will seek to explore.

The summer months are also a time when we are often reminded of our nation's history. Memorial Day, Flag Day, Juneteenth, Independence Day and Labor Day all call to mind events in our nation's past and the beliefs we hold about our country. In a similar way, this upcoming sermon series, during the flow of time over the next three months, will also help us call to mind our "salvation history." For, from Creation to Christ, God has been seeking to save us.

May you have a blessed summer, seek after God and remember, and rejoice in, God's salvation.

UMCOR Cleaning Kits for Lent

Traditionally we celebrate the season of Lent by giving up something we like. We do this to honor the 40 days following Jesus' baptism, when He went into the wilderness without food or water. This year we had the opportunity to help others in need during this season by providing supplies for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) cleaning kits. UMCOR collects cleaning kits, school kits and hygiene kits through United Methodist volunteers for distribution after disasters in the United States and its territories. These kits are stored in depots across the country, and when a request is received, they are shipped to those in need.

Using UMCOR's detailed list, you provided enough items for 8 kits plus lots of left-over supplies! These will be a blessing to victims of natural disasters who are faced with cleaning up their homes and attempting to salvage personal property.

In addition to shipping kits to areas of need, UMCOR also has trained disaster teams that provide on-site case management to guide folks through the process of getting professional help for repairs, as well as hands-on help in mitigating the effects of natural or human-caused disasters. When events overwhelm a community's ability to recover on their own, UMCOR can provide essential relief supplies, response, and support for long-term recovery. UMCOR is not a first response organization but is there to support communities through the long haul to recovery. You can find out more about UMCOR by exploring their website at umcor.org.

We Held Canning Parties

Remembering the past, I found a clipping from *The Aegis* of fifty years ago: "The Presbyterian Women of Harford County held a workshop on hunger..." We learned that our county had pockets of hunger because people who had limited money were given donated food only. The county had chosen not to provide food stamps for those who were poor. This meant no fruit or vegetables were available – only cheese, milk, rice, dried beans, and the like. After some discussion the women decided to use the resources we had in our churches to meet some of the nutritional needs of our neighbors. Our assets were:



- 1) We had kitchens.
- 2) We did not work outside the home
- 3) We had time available during the day
- 4) We had youth group teens who could babysit
- 5) We knew farmers who might have extra crops to share.

Our church governing boards gave approval and added extra funds if we needed to buy some produce.

Through the Department of Social Services, we obtained lists of families who would like to participate in "canning parties" at our churches on specific days. The first goal was to reach out to families and arrange to get them to the church. No one had cell phones in those days, and few had landlines. So, on Monday designated moms would drive to the homes of our potential cooks and make sure they could come. We counted the number of children knowing that moms could not leave the kids at home: "I'll pick you all up at 9 tomorrow – kids and all. Lunch is provided." Meanwhile women at the kitchens were counting jars, scalding them, picking up donated produce and planning how much more we would need to buy. Others were buying supplies for lunches – bread, bologna, cookies, chips and drinks. Two women who had transportation checked with a farm near them and were able to glean the fields for string beans after the farmer was done picking! How Biblical is that?! The youth group teens were planning things to do with the kids. Our own kids would be there as well.

At 9 the next day we all gathered: children in the Sunday School rooms for stories or outdoors for kickball. We all washed our hands, put on aprons and began to prepare the food. Apples had to be cored and cooked for apple sauce, tomatoes scalded to remove the skins and cut into chunks, and green beans snapped and washed. One time we had an 87-pound pumpkin donated – wow! We had several pressure cookers going, as well as hot water bath cookers. Those of us experienced in canning explained how to do each step of the preparation and why. When the cookers were going strong, we all stopped for lunch, relaxed, ate together and enjoyed our success. We applauded the 99-year-old great-grandma who was so skilled at cutting up windfall apples. We had been working together and sharing time and talent.

The jars were too hot to be moved (but we had planned for this), so we got everyone home and then took the jars to them the next day. All the hard work may have only netted each family eight or nine quart jars but no one was unhappy, and we reminded all our recipients to "save your jars for next year!"

After four canning parties "410 quarts of food have been prepared.... In those four parties 18 families (85 people) have been served." Our churches canned with Social Service recipients for four seasons, and people did save their jars. Finally, the County Council approved the use of food stamps and folks were able to buy fruit and vegetables.

Thinking back on those days, we might have decided to buy cans of vegetables and fruit in bulk to be given out. Thank God that did not occur to us. Instead, I remember how much fun we had! My kids had new friends with whom to play. We met folk we never would have gotten to know and the concept of Mission was changed for me forever: WE WORK TOGETHER!
