July 31


Exodus 3: 1-14: 4: 1-17

Thoughts from our Lay Leader

First, I would like to again welcome our newest members into the life of Havre de Grace UMC; **Charlotte, Ella, Kate, Nolan, Sarah and Zachary**. I pray we will soon welcome **Cameron and Isabella**, also, as they were unable to attend worship on June 5.

Annual Conference was held, virtually, June 1-3. The theme of this year's session was "Persevere: In Hope, Faith and Joy." The Scripture passage that

guided the conference was Hebrews 12:1-3. "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such hostility against himself from sinners, so that you may not grow weary or lose heart."

Here is the summary of events by Melissa Lauber, Director of Communications for our Conference. Before I share her comments, I would like to say that I learned that our Baltimore-Washington Conference is the most diverse Conference in our connection! My favorite parts of Annual Conference are the worship services, especially the Service of Ordination--it is just beautiful with the Orders of the Elders and Deacons processing in their white robes/red stoles followed by the Candidates and Ordinands. Seeing each being ordained with her/his sponsors at their side then turning to face the congregation with such a smile on his/her face is so very heartwarming. AND one of our nearby pastors was ordained with Pastor Norman and our D.S., Rev. Dr. Ann at her side, The Rev. Lynne of the Susquehanna Charge (Wesleyan Chapel and Hopewell UMC).

Now, on to Melissa's synopsis. (Comments in parenthesis are mine.) Among the highlights of the 238th Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference:

IN HOPE:

- During an interactive presentation, The Discipleship Ministries team outlined the pillars of vitality, designed to help fulfill the conference's vision of 100 percent of its churches becoming 100 percent vital.
- In anticipation of the Nov. 2-5 Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference, BWC members endorsed the Rev. Joseph of Emory UMC in Washington, D.C., as a candidate for the episcopacy. (I'm excited to have one of our own BWC elders up for episcopal candidacy! Should he be elected, he will not remain in our Conference. He WOULD remain in our NE Jurisdiction.)
- Online offerings were taken and \$2,460 was collected to assist those in war-torn Ukraine, \$1,170 was given to support Africa University on its 30th anniversary, and \$1,110 was contributed to assist with resources for clergy wellbeing.
- The Laity Session focused on youth ministries and creating disciples with a presentation from Chris, director of the denomination's Young People's Ministries, and members heard inspirational messages from high school student Cayleigh of Cokesbury UMC and Jamal, a leader of the University of Maryland's Terp HUB. (Chris stressed that a separate Intentional Discipleship Program should be developed for our youth, because they have different levels of maturity.)
- Bonnie of the New England Conference delivered the laity address, speaking about the power of choice and the possibilities that come with being a United Methodist.
- Camps Manidokan, West River and Harmison announced plans to open fully this summer and encouraged volunteers to participate as leaders.

• Richard, of the Committee on Native American Ministries, joined Bishop Easterling in a litany to honor the land and our heritage.

IN FAITH:

- Members passed a \$18.2 million budget and set the collection rate at 90 percent and the benevolence factor at 17.55 percent.
- In brave conversation, members shared ideas on creating an inclusive, diverse, equitable and anti-racist church and world.
- The Board of Ordained Ministry reported on an on-going study of gender, race and ministry; and shared revisions to the continuing education policy for clergy and the BWC's sexual misconduct policies.
- Members passed five resolutions that give the Black United Methodists for Church Renewal caucus intentional input into decisions about the proceeds from the sale of Black churches in the BWC; endorsed the Christmas Covenant (see a short summary below); made Salem Hispanic UMC in Baltimore a mission of the Conference; created a new position on the Action and Advocacy Team to work in the area of ensuring housing for all; and called for increased and nuanced discussions about climate change. Members approved closing Cherry Run UMC in Hedgesville; while also approving Mountain View UMC in Damascus and New Beginnings Fellowship in Jarrettsville disaffiliating from the denomination. (They are disaffiliating because they do not like the direction the Conference is taking. Paragraph 1553 in the Book of Discipline.) A report was presented by the BWC Trustees that clarified the disaffiliation process for churches wishing to leave The United Methodist Church.
- The equitable compensation rate for clergy was increased three percent, bringing the base salary to \$47,990 and the recommended housing allowance to \$21,394.
- A request was made for a report to be presented at next year's session about possibly setting a minimum reimbursement rate for pastors' continuing education, travel and other expenses.
- Members affirmed the work of the Nominations Committee, which reported 73 changes in people serving on conference committees and agencies.

IN JOY:

- Bishop Easterling ordained nine Elders and three Deacons, and she commissioned nine Elders and three Deacons as provisional members at a worship service, where the Rev. Antoine Love, preached on life, faith and the redeeming gift of relationship in a sermon called, "Say My Name, Say My Name."
- The lives and ministries of clergy, clergy spouses and lay members were celebrated at a Service of Remembrance, where the Rev. Frankie of LaVale UMC lifted up a message about sorrow, loss and the need to be patient and gentle with oneself and loving and forgiving of your neighbor, as Jesus stands always by our side.
- Rehoboth UMC was given the BWC's Advocacy and Action Award; Oak Chapel UMC in Silver Spring was honored with the Wellness and Mission Award; and Emily of Community UMC in Crofton was named the BWC's Youth Worker of the Year.
- Six Certified Lay Ministers were recognized for completing their training.
- Two new EarthKeepers the Rev. Stacey and Thea (our district Lay Leader) were welcomed into the fold of the BWC's 15 other EarthKeepers.
- District superintendents paid tribute to 22 clergy retirees at a Service of Celebration.
- Pisgah UMC in La Plata and Hughes UMC in Wheaton were presented with \$1,000 and the One Matters Award for their discipleship.
- The Conference celebrated Lovely Lane UMC in Baltimore, the oldest church in the Conference, which celebrates its 250th anniversary this year, along with Dumbarton UMC in Georgetown and Melville Chapel UMC in Elkridge.

A short summary of what the **Christmas Covenant** proposes follows:

- "Establish five new episcopal areas in Africa as decided upon by the 2016 General Conference. This is a proposal from the Standing Committee on Central Conference Matters.
- Establish a United States Regional Conference as proposed by the Connectional Table (our Christmas Covenant legislation embraces and incorporates this proposal)

We propose the following actions, constitutional amendments, and legislative changes to our Book of Discipline:

- Establish a vibrant and equal regional conference structure for The United Methodist Church which transforms existing central conferences into regional conferences, and the formation of a regional conference for the church in the United States.
- Upon ratification of a new regional conference structure, General Conference shall authorize a study to update and perfect the new regional conference structure to realize full equity between regions. The study is to be conducted by the Connectional Table and the Standing Committees on Regional Conferences in the United States and around the globe. A report, including any recommendations, will be presented to the 2024 General Conference for action.

Christ or King?



"Is it lawful for us to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" But (Jesus) perceived their craftiness and said to them, "Show me a denarius. Whose head and whole title does it bear?" They said, "The emperor's." He said to them, "Then give to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's."

--Luke 20: 22-25

Dear Fellow Disciples:

Looking across the news landscape this summer we see items about Covid, race relations, government, democracy, mass shootings, immigration, war, etc. These are big issues! What would Jesus say about these things? What would Jesus do? (WWJD bracelets were quite popular a while ago).

Jesus was challenged about paying taxes by some folk hoping to trap him. It was a fraught question because he lived in a Jewish nation occupied by a pagan imperial power. The denarius was imperial propaganda. It had an image of the emperor on it and an inscription that made clear the emperor was divine, or close to it. This coin represented Rome's power.

Opposing paying taxes would be swiftly and severely punished. Supporting paying taxes would inflame the religious zealots, the freedom fighters and the disgruntled – who hoped for a messiah to liberate them from Rome. After all, these taxes would support pagan Roman armies – including the one occupying the very land of the Jews.

What we do with our money is still a moral issue. So is our allegiance to the state. Where does our loyalty to God call into question our loyalty to our nation? WWJD? Or, maybe more importantly – especially given recent stories in the news -- WWJHUD? What would Jesus have us do? These big news items invite us to ask ourselves how Jesus wants us to address them as his disciples.

Jesus' answer in the passage above stumps the authorities questioning him, but he is really posing a question to us as his followers: What belongs to Caesar and what belongs to God? What belongs to king and what belongs to Christ?

May we faithfully wrestle with this question always.

As one of our "around the world" missions, we provide financial support, through Christar, to Jeff and Sharon. As you recall, they spoke to us three or four years ago about their missionary work with Farsi speakers living in Asia Minor.

CHRISTAR is based in Texas. Its vision is "...to cultivate Christ-honoring transformation in communities where He is yet to be worshipped." Its core values are:

- GODLINESS, growing love for God, a humble dependence upon His Word and a serious commitment to prayer
- THE BODY OF CHRIST, the importance of Church in its diverse expressions
- PEOPLE as individuals, families and teams
- EFFECTIVENESS, equipping workers to minister fruitfully.

Jeff and Sharon have had a busy and exciting year. They have worked through COVID-19 using ZOOM like many of us. They just returned to Asia Minor in early June praying to receive a one-year visa instead of short-term visas as they've had this past year. Presently they are excited to have taken a new team with them to establish a ministry for the deaf, and they ask for prayers that this ministry is accepted and successful.

Other happenings this past year:

- Started a ZOOM couples, face-to-face group with 16 couples in the first group.
- Use of the Clubhouse app on ZOOM which is similar to talk radio and is interactive. Through this they made contact with souls in Europe, the Middle East and Central Asia. One-half of all the salvations that Jeff and Sharon have participated in were online!
- Since September, they have been helping folk from Afghanistan, with the help of "the Follower," a Tajik pastor, find shelter and food.
- During the last hours of 2021, their son, Darius, wrote his testimony on how the Lord had intervened in his life. Darius had been caught up in this world's temptations. He feels his addictions have been removed by God's grace. Darius was "dunked" (aka baptized) in February! PTL
- In March, Sharon and Jeff became grandparents of a little girl, Ava. Her parents are their daughter, Lydia and her husband Josh. Sharon and Jeff were in the U.S. during this time. Sharon helped care for the baby while Lydia completed her studies and graduated college.
- They are presently helping to build the "Ya Church," a Mozaik Center which will house four faith groups. It will include a worship center, Sunday School rooms and offices.
- This Spring, Jeff released his book <u>Searching Below the Surface: A Deeper look and Covenant and Contract.</u>" He talks about "the whys in how God of the Bible functions by covenant while the Allah of Islam demands a contractual expectation." It is available on Amazon.

Election Information



As Christian citizens we have an obligation to participate in the electoral process since, in a democracy, we ARE the government! Below is some information about upcoming elections.

NEW THIS YEAR: The primary date has been moved from June 28 to **July 19**. A new redistricting plan has changed certain boundaries of state legislative and U.S. congressional districts and may affect which candidates appear on your ballot. Redistricting also may affect polling place locations for some voters.

Maryland's July 19 Primary will determine which candidates appear on November's general election ballot for Governor, U.S. House and Senate, and state legislature, among other races. Go to VOTE411.org to explore your Voter Guide (Personalized Ballot and Candidate Information). This site is committed to ensuring voters have the information they need to successfully participate in every election. Whether it's local, state or federal, every election is important to ensuring our laws and policies reflect the values and beliefs of our communities. The last day to request a mail-in ballot for the primary is **Tuesday**, **July 12**. (https://elections.maryland.gov/elections/2022/index.html#mail_in_ballot)

Primary Election:

Early Voting – 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **Thursday**, **July 7 -- Thursday**, **July 14** Election Day – 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **Tuesday**, **July 19**

General Election:

Early Voting – 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **Thursday, October 27 -- Thursday, November 3** Election Day – 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **Tuesday, November 8**

All voters who are in line at 8 p.m. are allowed to check-in and vote even though the polls are officially closed at 8 p.m. Use the State's voter portal (https://voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/PollingPlaceSearch) to find a polling place near you. Ballots include races for: governor, one U.S. Senate seat, all eight House seats, all 47 State Senate seats, all 141 State House seats and Maryland Court of Appeals.

Does my party affiliation matter when I vote in the primary?

Yes. Only those registered with a particular party may vote in their party's respective primary. Unaffiliated voters cannot participate, EXCEPT they can vote for candidates for nonpartisan offices like school board races.

How can I get a mail-in ballot?

Any registered voter can request a no-excuse mail-in ballot and vote from home in July's primary and in November's election. Apply for a mail-in ballot online, by mail or in person. Voters are now permitted to take their mail-in ballots to an early voting center or polling place. Voted mail-in ballots will have their own secure "Mail-In Ballot Bag." Individuals who are not registered to vote may now register at their assigned polling place on election day.

Voters with disabilities have the same rights as all other voters.

Polling locations have special equipment to assist the visually or physically impaired. The state board of elections (https://elections.maryland.gov/voting/accessibility.html) has more information about resources available to voters with disabilities.

By action of the State Legislature at the 2022 term the following will appear on the General Election ballot: Marijuana: A referendum for voters to decide whether to legalize recreational marijuana use is headed to the November ballot. A companion bill set to become law would legalize possession of up to 1.5 ounces of marijuana, remove criminal penalties on possessing up to 2.5 ounces and create a system to expunge past criminal records for those convicted of possessing marijuana.



Monkeypox: Get the Facts

We've been hearing a lot recently about Monkeypox. I thought a little information might make things a little clearer to us. I pray that this information from the CDC might help us. Note, as of June 8, there have been no reported cases of Monkeypox in Maryland. May you be blessed with safety from Monkeypox and COVID-19.

- Monkeypox is a rare disease caused by the monkeypox virus
- Monkeypox can make you sick including a rash or sores (pox), often with an earlier flu like illness.
- Monkeypox can spread to anyone through close, personal, often skin-to-skin contact including:
 - o Direct contact with monkeypox rash, sores or scabs
 - Contact with objects, fabrics (clothing, bedding, or towels), and surfaces that have been used by someone with monkeypox
 - o Through respiratory droplets or oral fluids from a person with monkeypox
- This contact can happen during intimate sexual contact including:
 - Oral, anal or vaginal sex or touching the genitals or anus of a person with monkeypox
 - o Hugging, massage, or kissing and talking closely
 - O Touching fabrics and objects during sex that were used by a person with monkeypox, such as bedding, towels and sex toys
- We know the virus can be spread in fluid or pus from monkeypox sores, and are trying to better understand if the virus could be present in semen, vaginal fluids or other body fluids

What are the symptoms?

- Early flu-like symptoms of monkeypox can include:
 - o Fever
 - o Headache
 - Muscle aches and backache
 - o Swollen lymph nodes
 - o Chills
 - Exhaustion











- A rash or sores, sometimes located on or near the genitals or anus, but sometimes in other areas like the hands, feet, chest or face—sores go through several stages before healing
- Sores may be inside the body, including the mouth, vagina or anus
- Some people experience a rash or sores first, followed by other symptoms and some only experience a rash or sores
- Monkeypox can be spread from the time symptoms start until all sores are healed and a fresh layer of skin has formed—this can take several weeks

If you have a new or unexplained rash, sores or other symptoms...

- See your healthcare provider—if you don't have a provider or health insurance, visit a public health clinic near you
- When you see a healthcare provider for possible monkeypox, remind them that this is a virus circulating in the community
- Avoid sex or being intimate with anyone until you have been checked out

If you or your partner have monkeypox...

- Follow the treatment and prevention recommendations of your healthcare provider
- Avoid sex or being intimate with anyone until all your sores have healed and you have a fresh layer of skin formed
