## **Worship In-Person and Live Stream**



We are continuing our Summer Sermon Series into the fall. As people of faith, we seek to know God. We realize, however, that God is not fully knowable. The Bible reflects this mystery of the divine. God is both hidden and revealed. The Bible is the story of God's encounters with us, with human beings. So, we are exploring what we learn from "Encountering God" in these stories, both what we learn about ourselves and about God and God's character.

## **Thoughts from our Lay Leader**

WELCOME TO FALL! I pray everyone had a wonderful summer and that our youth are excited to start a new school year.

As mentioned in Pastor Norman's weekend updates, our Church Council has started exploring for us to become an **Anti-Racist Church**. This has been a mission that our denomination has been working on for some time and our Conference actually has a pledge for individuals/churches to sign; "WE RISE UNITED to Seek Justice, Do the Work, End Racism and Commit for All to Be Free."



We may wonder, "Why is the church talking about racial justice?" Our United Methodist Social Principles and Resolution on Racism, Paragraph 162 A in <u>THE BOOK</u> <u>OF DISCIPLINE</u> states "Rights of Racial and Ethnic Groups--Racism is the combination of the power to dominate by one race over other races and a value system that assumes that the dominant race is innately superior to others...Racism... plagues and hinders our relationship with Christ, inasmuch as it is antithetical to the gospel itself.....Therefore, we recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons....We support affirmative action as one method of addressing the inequalities and discriminatory practices within our Church and society."

Now we may think, "We're not racist, why should we go on this path?" We may be kind to everyone we meet and still be racist (not in the sense of being bigoted, but in other ways of being caught up in systems of social power). People of faith are called to rise, speak out and to take action, as Christ did, to affirm that all people are of sacred value and worth, made equal in the image of God. As we move forward on this journey of justice, it is essential that all people remain at the table together--in prayer, conversation and response. (If we'd like to check on our own implicit biases go to BWCUMC.org and search Race Implicit Association Test. I did and found it pretty accurate to what I thought.)

There are many resources for further information at BWCUMC.org; just search "racial justice." Also, every other Thursday there is a wonderful podcast, "The Unfinished Church" presented by Bishop Easterling and two other bishops. Each podcast features someone's story/insights etc. One of my favorites was the interview with Opal Lee, the "Grandmother of Juneteenth." Another good one is the interview with Brian McLaren where he talks about, possibly, the start of white supremacy way back in 1452. You can find these interviews at theunfinishedchurch.org. If you don't listen to podcasts, there is a full transcript of each interview.

Every moment we have a decision whether to create more inclusion, diversity, equity and antiracism (IDEA) or less. This 8-session course will focus on six actions that you and community partners can take to grow in building beloved community and hence create spaces of belonging and becoming.

Six Modules of content are made available in Assembly, the BWC's electronic learning platform,

every Thursday starting immediately after orientation:

Thursday, Oct 27 | Module 6: Growing in Cultural Humility

Eight Facilitated Zoom Sessions are held every Thursday. The purpose of these sessions is to provide you with the opportunity to apply the material you've been engaging with. At the core of all the lessons, there is one variable that remains constant and that is people. These facilitated sessions give you access to people who are on the journey alongside you so that you can practice, connect, debrief, and go deeper in your learning. We hope you utilize these sessions as a safe and brave space to grow.

Facilitated Zoom Sessions are approximately 75 minutes. Self-directed content is designed to take about 75 minutes of your time. This is inclusive of exercises and 2.5-minute podcasts.



#### **Transitions**

"I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." --Joshua 1:9

Dear Fellow Disciples:

September marks a transitional time in the calendar for many of us. Children may be starting a new grade or a new school, graduates may be starting a new job, school personnel will start a new school-year, empty-nesters may experience their last child starting college and farmers of certain kinds of produce will see the transition from the growing season to the harvest season. There are other transitions we experience in life and through its stages: Obtaining a license, advancing in rank as a Scout or in martial arts, physical growth, graduation, certification in certain fields of study or work, marriage, parenthood, job changes, retirement, loss of certain physical abilities, death of a parent or spouse, etc.

September also marks a transition in the life of our congregation as we enter into our fall ministry-programs and re-launch Sunday School, UM Youth Fellowship, choirs, etc. In the background of all our planning for fall lies the continuing presence of Covid and its related concerns. Transitions often, by their nature, involve some level of anxiety. Anxiety, however, is often the flipside of excitement and anticipation.

The Bible focuses on a number of transitional times or pivot-points in the life of God's people. The verse above is the word of God to Joshua. God had already brought the Hebrews out of slavery in Egypt through Moses (that's a transition!). God had accompanied them as they wandered in the wilderness for forty years. Now, Moses has died, and they are about to enter the Promised Land led by Joshua. Like any transition, it's a fragile time in the life of the people. They likely missed and grieved for Moses. They may have seen Joshua as an untried leader. They were excited but also apprehensive about this next step. For the land of Canaan was peopled with folk who lived in fortified cities! God tells Joshua, and, by extension, the people, to be brave. For God will be with them in this next stage just as God was before.

Interestingly, the Book of Joshua ends as it begins, with a transitional time, a pivot-point. At the end of his life, in Chapter 24, Joshua calls the people together – an apparently mixed multitude after the conquest of the land and, maybe, further immigration -- to renew their Covenant with God. So, once again, they are reminded of God's grace to them before on the journey of national birth and encouraged to go forward in faithfulness.

This fall we are all invited to return to, or start attending, Sunday School, worship and other ministry programs as we can safely. In this way, we can fuel our excitement about God's love and the call to share it with others.

May God give us courage for our next faith-transition whatever shape it takes.

## **Children of Zion Village**

Children of Zion Village recently hired a part time Executive Director – Sonya. Sonya joined us on May 1. She has over 14 years of experience in managing nonprofit organizations and over 18 years supporting children in foster care. Sonya has a Master's in Social Work, Doctorate in Marriage and Family Therapy, and Doctorate in Health Administration. We are very blessed to have someone with so much education and experience to help lead and guide us in the management and care of our vulnerable children in Namibia.



Mount Zion sent a team of 14 volunteers to Namibia on July 12 for three weeks. During their visit they spent time with the children, helping with some of the projects on campus as well as assessing needs. This team raises all their own funds for the trip and brought light, love and fun to the children and staff they've only known from a distance.

The children at COZV have been orphaned and have no family willing to take them in. Very few are ever adopted. Some come as infants; some have been there for as long as 17 years. Many come having never been to school. Thanks to generous sponsors, the children

leave the village with a Christian foundation in pursuit of higher education, internships or jobs.

COZV doesn't just house these vulnerable children but creates a home for each child. Each house (8 of them), is organized to provide a family atmosphere where each child is nurtured and loved. During the school year, the children rise as early as 5:30 a.m. to prepare for school, leave the campus at 6:15 a.m. and return at 4 p.m. They change their clothes and spend an hour or so doing chores, tending the small



livestock/gardens, playing at the playground or pursuing some relaxing activities. They then have dinner and assist with packing lunches for the next school day. Then they do homework under the watchful eye of Uncle Austin, the Education Officer. They begin and end their day with prayers with their house mothers.

## God is good all the time. All the time, God is good.

Namibia is an independent country on the southwest coast of Africa. It is one of the driest and most sparsely populated countries on earth. The climate is mostly hot and dry except for the rainy season. There have been rainy seasons when the children have had to be evacuated from the village since it is located on the shore of the Zambezi River.

On behalf of the COZV Board of Directors, thank you for your prayers and financial support. Without God's power and your help, COZV would not be the transforming influence it has been for almost 20 years.

In September a Mission Moment will be presented about Children of Zion Village and we hope to be able to welcome more sponsors to help with the support of these children. Just \$30 a month (\$360 a year) can support one of 59 orphans at the Village. Please pray for the children and consider becoming a sponsor. 
