Emergency Winter Shelter

The Emergency Winter Shelter began operating in January and will run through March and into early April. This year half the hotel rooms will be reserved for families with children. Churches are asked to help provide meals and other things. So far, all the needs for meals have been met.

Online Worship Service

In consultation with our Re-Uniting Safely Task Force, we are temporarily suspending in-person worship, Sunday School and meetings in our buildings. With our local hospitals using Crisis Standards of Care, the high transmission rate and some vaccine resistance of the Omicron variant, we need to take a break in order to prevent adding to the spread of Covid and for safety.

This temporary policy does not mean leaders cannot access needed items in the building in order to do ministry virtually or remotely.

Worship will be online via Facebook Live at 11 a.m. Sundays and posted to YouTube later that day.

The Church Office is closed to the public. The mail slot may be used for small deliveries and the red cupboard for larger items. It is checked regularly. If you need to visit the office, please call ahead and wear a mask.

On January 10, our Prayer Circle members made and took 20 dinners to our guests at the Emergency Winter Shelter at the Days Inn in Aberdeen.

In addition to February including Valentine's Day it is also Black History Month. Are you aware that our Conference has a Racial Justice initiative that speaks to "systemic fair treatment of people of all races, resulting in equitable opportunities and outcomes for all"? To achieve this the Conference has Racial/Ethnic Ministries and a Racial Justice Team. As we learned during our Reconciling Discernment time, "The UMC proclaims the value of each person as a unique child of God and commits itself to the healing and wholeness of all persons. The UMC recognizes that the sin of racism has been destructive to its unity throughout its history and continues to cause painful division and marginalization." Due to the long history of racism, white supremacy and killing of unarmed Black people, "the UMC cries out for racial justice now." The BWC has developed a commitment, "We Rise United For All to Be Free" where individuals and/or congregations can sign that they will work towards this goal. Give Up That Candy Bar for Lent and Buy Some Work Gloves Submitted by Tom and the Missions Team




Lent is the season when we honor the 40 days following Jesus' baptism, when he went into the wilderness without food and water. There he was tempted by Satan and Jesus wrestled with temptation, much as we do, but remained true to God's mission for him. After rejecting Satan's temptations, Jesus left the wilderness to begin his ministry in Galilee.

We often give up something we like for Lent, but this is often a means of fulfilling one of our own resolutions such as to lose weight, or to give up a bad habit and these are

inwardly focused. We have an opportunity this year to focus more on the Grace of God that was shared with us by Jesus. Jesus' ministry focused on helping others in need. During Lent this year, the Missions Team is offering a way we can reach out in a Christ-like manner to help others in need. Beginning **March 2**, we will be collecting items for UMCOR's cleaning buckets that are provided to those recovering and cleaning up from disasters. In the Night of Winter



--Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? – Isaiah 43: 18-19a

Dear Fellow Disciples:

There is beauty in winter. There is the stark clarity of bare trees against blue sky. There is the possibility of quiet snowfall at night and glistening ice in the sunlight. If I'm honest, however, winter brings a lot more cold, wet darkness than anything else. February is a month of winter with bits of spring in it. As a kid, we would go out on those warmer days in February to prune grape vines and fruit trees, to prepare for the summer to come. Most of the month, though, it was just muddy and cold.

Sometimes in life we are in seasons of wintry gray bleakness. The present Covid surge has sent us scurrying for safe cover and overwhelmed our health care providers. It is the continuation of a pandemic that has been with us for almost two years. We are tired of it and the concern it brings and the restrictions it has placed on our lives. I am reminded of the comment of a despondent Phil Connors in the movie "Groundhog Day" when he says, "This winter will never end."

In the passage above God, through the prophet, is trying to inspire hope in a despondent people living in exile. The Hebrews are about to be liberated to return to their homeland. So, God tells the people not to look back to the good times before the Exile but to look forward, to look up. For God is going to do a *new* thing. "It springs forth; don't you see it?" The truth is sometimes we *can't* see ahead, or at least not very well. Sometimes we see only dimly as through fog or at night. To be fair to the Hebrews, at this point they have been in exile for about 70 years! That's a long winter! That's a long time to wait for freedom!

Faith persists, however, in the absence of sight. Faith is having hope when we cannot see ahead. "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Hebrews 11: 1). And as the poet and man-of-faith, Wendell Berry, has written in his novel "Hannah Coulter," "You think winter will never end, and then, when you don't expect it, when you have almost forgotten it, warmth comes and a different light."



Today, as I was out walking, it wasn't any warmer but the days are growing longer and I found a patch of earth in someone's front lawn that had the smallest green shoots sprouting in it. They will likely soon be covered in ice and snow but they will still be there, even if unseen – a promise of spring to come.

So, God is doing a new thing in our lives, too. Do we perceive it? We cannot go back to the way things were in the days before Covid, but there is a spring yet to be. It "springs forth." Let us look for it with hope!

May God bless you, keep you safe and give you hope to carry on.

Susquehanna Ministerium We are More Together

One of the missions we regularly support is the Susquehanna Ministerium. This a cooperative effort of the congregations in the Havre de Grace area (including Level, Darlington and parts of Aberdeen). Not only does the Ministerium allow for fellowship and networking with other faith leaders, it also serves our community.

This past year many of our usual programs were canceled due to the Covid pandemic but some continued in modified form:

- The Annual Thanksgiving Dinner was provided by pick-up or delivery only (we help underwrite this).
- Support was provided for Extreme Family Outreach (an after-school program focusing on residential neighborhoods in special need) which supplied families with masks and food during this pandemic.
- Support was provided for Grace Place which continues providing lunches despite being unable to cook and serve on-site for Covid health and safety reasons. They have ramped up their gifts of groceries and items for baby-care as they see the need. In fact, the Ministerium was originally created to launch Grace Place.
- Support was provided for Blessings in a Backpack, a weekend meal program for students of Have de Grace Elementary School, as the need renewed and increased when school re-opened for in-person instruction in September.
- An interfaith on-line Memorial Service (using ZOOM and YouTube) for all those families who had lost loved ones to Covid-19 in Harford County was provided the community to give a time of honoring, healing and partial closure, especially for those who had been prevented from celebrating their loved ones' lives by health restrictions.
- Networking support was provided Harford County Hope for the Homeless Alliance's Emergency Winter Shelter and is being repeated for the 2022 winter season.
- A large grant was made to Susquehanna Habitat for Humanity as they have faced increased costs of materials and the need to use paid contractors rather than volunteer builders due to Covid risks, and as their clients have struggled to make mortgage payments in the face of reduced employment due to Covid.
- Support for our local health care providers was given via networking to our members to make cards or posters or send food, and focusing our gratitude for them at our annual Ecumenical Community Thanksgiving Celebration.

In future years we hope to restart some programs we simply had to discontinue during the pandemic: Baccalaureate for the graduates of Havre de Grace High School (including providing free Bibles), support for the NAACP Freedom Fund Banquet, sponsorship of the Good Friday Cross Walk and leadership for the Blessing by the Bay celebration.

Thanks to the blessing of your generous support of Missions we have able to be "blessed to be a blessing" to our community.

It began as a way to remember important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It is celebrated each February in the United States and Canada, and in October in the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and the Republic of Ireland.

ANSWER: B., 1970

Black educators and members of Black United Students at Kent State University organized the first month-long event. In 1976, President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month during the U.S. Bicentennial celebration. He urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."


