Sunday School

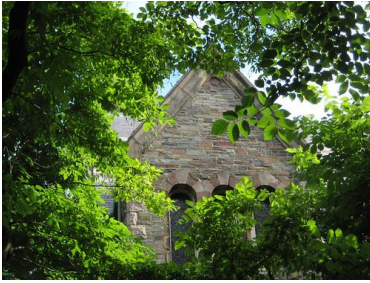

Did You Know?

This is not actually a quiz. As your Health and Safety Advocate, I have come to learn of some health-related items at church that I did not know existed. I am guessing that a few of my fellow church family members may not know of them, either.



Did you know that we have an AED (automatic external defibrillator)? This lifesaving easy-to-use device is located just outside the sanctuary door that leads to Congress Avenue and the Social Hall. If anyone becomes unconscious and the AED is brought to the person and opened, instructions are given aloud to direct its use. You cannot actually harm the person because the device will determine if the AED is needed. Just think! You might save a life by knowing the location of the AED.

Did you know that the church maintains a dose of Narcan that can reverse symptoms of an overdose? This medicine is also located in the small AED cabinet.

Did you know we have seven first aid kits located in our buildings that are filled with age-appropriate first aid items and checked regularly? I invite you to roam around on your own scavenger hunt to locate them:

- Off of the Narthex in the NW stairwell under the stairs by the lift
- Choir Room
- Kitchen
- Mentzer Parlor Kitchenette
- 2nd Floor Education Building Hallway
- Second Grade Classroom in the Education Building
- 1st Floor Nursery Restroom

Did you know there are Emergency Procedures printed on the inside cover of each hymnal? This information can be very useful in case of any in-worship health emergency. Go ahead, look for these procedures.

Finally, **did you know** that one of my roles is to visit church family members in their home, nursing home, or hospital? This role augments the visits made by Pastor Norman to connect with those who are unable to attend church. These are meant as friendship visits, along with prayer time if requested. You can find introductory letters and my information cards located in the display rack in the Narthex and in the church office.

There you have it. Let's all stay healthy at church and be prepared to offer first aid to anyone in need.

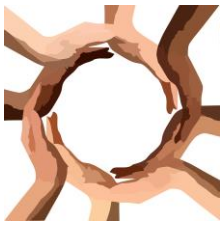

What is Systemic Racism

As we continue our learning and discernment towards racial justice, please read this article on "What is Systemic Racism" then ponder upon the questions presented at the end of the article.



Definition: Racial biases, discrimination, principles, assumptions, policies (written or implied), practices, and beliefs that favor white people over Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC), and support unfair and inequitable treatment of BIPOC. Often, systemic racism is more difficult to perceive and address because it is so embedded and normative, “less overt, far more subtle” (1967, Stokely Carmichael and Charles V. Hamilton, *Black Power: The Politics of Liberation*)

Example: Beginning in the 1930’s the U.S. government “redlined” certain neighborhoods relegating Black Americans—and, in some regions of the nation, other BIPOC people—to live only in certain places and deemed those areas “sketchy” and Black homebuyers and their properties as risky investments.

Therefore, property values in Black communities were valued much lower than in comparable white communities, so that federal and state governments refused to insure mortgages in and near African-American neighborhoods. Meanwhile, the Federal Housing Authority subsidized builders and homebuyers in communities for white people and added provisos that forbade realtors from selling those homes to African Americans. Because homeownership was, and still is, a primary path to personal and generational wealth, this systemic racism rendered whole communities of African Americans without a fundamental pathway to wealth.

These decades’ old practices have long-term effects that still impact Black people, families, and communities to the present day. Redlining gave white homeowners the opportunity to move upward financially because their houses increased in value, while it held back Black owners because their houses did not increase in value.

Another example: A large, wealthy white church in a mostly white Christian denomination needs a new pastor and the church has always had white pastors. When a white bishop and mostly white Cabinet consider the best candidates for the appointment, they only consider white pastors. Black, Indigenous and People of Color are not even in the pool for serious consideration.

Framing or References:

BIBLICAL/SPIRITUAL/THEOLOGICAL FRAMING OR REFERENCES: Numbers 27: The father of daughters died and because they were female, they were not going to inherit the assets - only males could inherit. The daughters felt the inheritance system was unjust and went to the leaders to get their share of the inheritance. Moses brought the case before the Lord who did not disregard it outright. Moses listened to what God told him - even though it was unpopular and went against the system of the time. The daughters did inherit their father’s property.

Those who hold power are the people who can and should do the most to make the changes to systems that privilege them over others. Those who are victims of the system can share how they have experienced the system but cannot make changes alone.

Reflection:

Question #1

In the story mentioned above from Numbers 27, think of a time when you were:

- the daughter who spoke passionately about being treated unjustly within a system,
- other sisters who supported her cause and were there to stand with the sister while making the case to the leaders,
- Moses who had the power to change a system to help the daughters.

Question #2

Picture the following roles. What racial group/gender/class comes to mind?

- CEO of a Fortune 500 company (86% are white men)
- U.S. governor of a state (94% are white)
- U.S. airline pilot (92% white)
- Lawyers and judges (89% white)

Question #3

Why do you think you picture the race/ethnicity of the person you do? Which systems (i.e., education, political, professional, legal, etc.) might hinder BIPOC persons from holding these roles?

Question #4

Think of a time when you were meeting someone for the first time, and they were not the race/ethnicity you assumed they would be. What factors led to that assumption? What systemic biases affected your preconceived ideas? What did you say to yourself? And did that experience change your thinking about the future?

God's Answers to Prayers

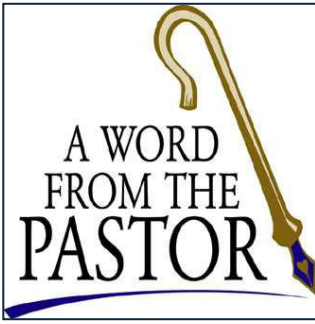


Our little prayer group meets every week in our apartment building. We are all women, older, looking for answers. We are from many backgrounds: Baptist, Methodist, Seventh-day Adventist, Holiness and Roman Catholic. We came together as friends with needs and have learned so much about God and each other over the years. There are six of us, sometimes less. People die or move into nursing homes from here. We have learned to trust each other, to share our biggest fears, disappointments, joys.

We ask questions and consider the words of scripture. How does prayer make a difference? What is in the future? Each week the *Upper Room* lesson gives us words to ponder.

We pray for each other and for our families--for health, and jobs and safety. We pray for our town and our nation and this world so beautifully created. Sometimes we are very specific--to make sure God knows exactly what we need. "May the pain in my knee go away." "May he find a job that's close to here that pays enough." And we recognize that God knows exactly what we need, and loves us more than we can ever imagine. We believe that God hears our prayers and considers them.

But we are also finding that our gathering and sharing brings us the best answer of all: God is with us, each of us, as we pray. God stays with us afterward, keeping us safe and loved and healed. We feel the presence of the Holy Spirit and are thankful. May others see in us the face of Jesus and be blessed.



Summer Time

I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time – he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords.

–I Timothy 6: 13c-15

Dear Fellow Disciples:

With June, summer begins. As a child, summer vacation from school also began in June. How long summer seemed in those days – just as the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas seemed much longer than it does now. That leads me to reflect on Time.

In the Greek thought-forms of our New Testament there were two kinds of time: “chronos” (from which we get the words “chronology” and “chronometer”) and “kairos.” Chronos was time as measured in seconds, minutes and hours. Kairos was more like experienced time. The chronological time of summer vacation was the same for us kids as for our parents but the kairos was much different. What we experienced as long and slow they may well have experienced as short and fast. I recall one of my brothers, now an engineer, who calculated the exact number of weeks in summer vacation. Since school, then, did not begin till after Labor Day this was usually 10 weeks but sometimes 11 (joy!), but one year due to a shift in the school calendar it was only 9 weeks (ack!). That’s chronos time, rather than kairos time.

Kairos is also God’s Time – the time which God creates and rules. The Hebrew scriptures reflect the truth that God acts within the stream of our time or history. Many ancient cultures saw time and religion as cyclical (involving repeated life and death) or timeless (encouraging our escape from time). The Hebrew faith we claim, though, is linear, pointing in a forward direction toward God’s ultimate goal. The Bible lays out a sort of “Salvation History” as God works to redeem humanity.

So, it is said that God is never late but shows up at the just the right time. We read that the Advent of Christ, the birth of Jesus happened “in the fullness of time.” This is the pinnacle of God’s stepping into our human chronos time according to God’s kairos time.

All of this means that while God controls the “times and seasons” for divine action in the cosmos and in our lives, we are called to use our chronos time wisely in the meantime. That is what we see in the verse above – which tradition says is the Apostle Paul’s admonition to his young friend, and fellow missionary, Timothy. While it is up to God, the Ruler of the universe when to decisively act (“at the right time”), Timothy is to faithfully “keep the commandment” till that happens.

We, no less than Timothy, are disciples of Christ. We, too, are called to leave the big things to God’s timing but to use wisely the time we have, to work for good in the world – which may include taking time to relax, rest and refuel in the summer as time slows a bit.

May you have a blessed summer time in the summertime!

Extreme Family Outreach

Extreme Family Outreach is a 501.c.3 non-profit, faith-based humanitarian organization that conducts community impact programs for elementary and middle school aged youth in underserved communities along the Rt. 40 corridor in Harford County. They have programs in Edgewood, Aberdeen and Havre de Grace. A separate program also targets areas of need in Bel Air.

Their headquarters is at 1918 Pulaski Highway in Edgewood. EFO has been in business for twenty years, relying on the contributions of local businesses, churches, agencies and friends.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS at specified sites meet one hour each week with a Christ-centered curriculum and a focus on positive life skills. One special focus is on avoiding the use of drugs and cigarettes. These programs reach 400 children each week.

BRIDGE OF HOPE Family Outreach is just that: a phone call or personal visit is made to the family of every child enrolled in the program every year. Opportunities to connect family members with needed services may be identified, and the child is seen as a part of a family unit.

BACK TO SCHOOL: Anticipating the need many families may be having as the school year begins, Extreme Family Outreach has donated 600 bags of school supplies at nine locations. Children who have the resources necessary to learn are more likely to succeed.

THANKSGIVING sees Outreach making and delivering 200 complete dinners to needy families. CHRISTMAS parties for the children in the program make sure all 500 kids receive a gift. From January through March hats, gloves and scarves are available for all who need them.

Children and youth that have benefitted from these outreach programs may have an opportunity for training in youth leadership. Family members also may learn new skills. When we visited EFO, we met a mom of students in the early years of the program who is now a full-time employee in the office and a teen who graduated from the EFO program now reaching out to other students.

The businesses, restaurants, churches, agencies and friends who partner with EFO are interested in making the futures of these young people the best they can be, "We offer a message of hope, speak truth through the love of Christ, build relationships and meet physical needs."

God is good all the time. All the time, God is good.
