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

MISSIONS



January Mission – The Division of Indian Work

Our mission for the month of January is The Division of Indian Work (DIW) located in South Minneapolis. This organization has been serving the urban American Indian community in Minneapolis since 1952. They were affiliated with the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches (GMCC), for 65 years before becoming independent in 2018. Today they are an

American Indian led organization serving the Urban American Indian community. Services are provided free-of-charge to over 3,000 people annually.

The strength of the Division of Indian Work's (DIW) Mission is that programming focuses on culturally based education, traditional healing approaches, and youth leadership development.

Offering a wide range of programs, staff work to foster healthy families; end family violence and address hunger issues, all with a focus on culture.

Louis Flammond, a (DIW) youth worker shared that young people

are in survival mode if their families are hungry. But if they're fed with nutritional foods, rather than commodities as they were in the past, our youth can take advantage of the programs we offer. Donations are used to purchase food for Horizons Unlimited, a culturally sensitive food shelf. The food shelf has always served a population in great need and that need continues to grow. It makes such a difference to obtain foods from a resource which is local and run by an American Indian staff. Families feel comfortable and understood. To tell people we don't have food is horrible. We shouldn't have to do that.

DIW staff use a curriculum called "The Family Spirit," developed by American Indians for American Indian families. The Family Spirit Program lines up well with DIW's mission to empower American Indian families through culturally based education.

The program uses a home visiting service model with up to 52 (hour long) visits beginning for new parents as early as 2-3 months before the birth of a child. The use of individual and group culturally sensitive communication has been shown to reduce instances of abuse and neglect as well as addressing behavioral and mental health issues for parents and their children. Children who participate in the program have been shown to have greater social and emotional development, which ultimately lead to greater success rates throughout their lifespan.

By strengthening American Indian Family Circles, the Division of Family Work provides support through home visits, support group meetings, anger management groups, supportive housing and family violence prevention services to teens, adult American Indian mothers, fathers, and expectant parents.

Finally, Division of Indian Work offers a Youth Leadership Development Program which encourages well-rounded success by providing youth with a wide variety of learning opportunities through academic support via after-school tutoring, cultural enrichment, and recreational, environmental, and artistic activities.
