

One of the wonderful things about the journey of faith is that it's never the same for two different people—it's not even the same at two different times in one person's life! Sometimes, we need to rely on the strength and steadfastness of God, and other times we need to be reminded of the joy and playfulness of child-like faith.

At Lebanon UMC, our worship themes this summer will draw on this diversity of experience. In July, we will seek the protection and surety of God who is "our rock and our redeemer," and imagine ways to be more steadfast in our own life of faith. Easter Egg "Hunt for Change" Donated Over \$245 to Local Organizations

This year, our Easter Egg Hunt took on a new look: an opportunity to encourage kids and others to give back to the community! Every participant got a treat for playing, but inside the eggs, the real treat were pennies that were than translated into donations. Thanks to The United Methodist Women and the Mission Team of LUMC, we donated \$100 to charities, and people added to these donations on Easter morning.

Each Egg Hunt participant got to choose where they placed their pennies, selecting from three different organizations. It was so beautiful to hear the kids talk about why they chose to support CH@D, the Human Society, and the Haiti Lunch Program. Grown-ups got in on the fun, too, giving donations to the organizations directly.

Banner History

Creators of this historic banner – left to right: Dianne Shattuck, Gwen Polhemus, Grace Headstrom, Betsey Headstrom Peale, Nat Berry, Adele Patch, Sally Patch Cole, Phoebe Walker. Adele made the angel square and put together the other squares that the rest of the group made to make the original banner in 1990.

This banner has special historical significance. In August 1873, during Rev. Culver's guest sermon, a dove flew into the church and rested on the open Bible until the close of the service. Reverend Culver's parting words were, "Welcome, sweet messenger, and may you prove a true emblem of the heavenly dove which we trust is now conferring its holy benediction on us all."

The original banner had represented our church at the N.H. United Methodist Annual Conference in Laconia in 1990, and was then hanging in the vestry when the burned in February 1992. It was found melted and frozen into a lump on the floor after the fire. Adele took it home and thawed it—and discovered that the dove portion of the banner had folded over and protected the Bible from destruction. Only the Bible Portion could be salvaged; it was professionally cleaned and is incorporated into the new banner, recreated by the original group of women. Clearly a message once again of the importance of the Holy Bible.

Book Recommendation: *Discovering the Other*, by Cameron Harder

For my current course toward my Doctoral degree, I've been learning about appreciative inquiry and asset mapping, and have stumbled upon the book *Discovering the Other: Asset-Based Approaches for Building Community Together* by Cameron Harder. While many have written about or described appreciative inquiry and asset mapping, I found this book to be the most helpful resource.


What are appreciative inquiry and asset mapping, you ask? Appreciative inquiry is a perspective on communities (including congregations) that teaches us to ask positive questions. This approach assumes that how we see ourselves is determined in part by what questions we ask, and that "people, like plants, grow toward the light." Appreciative inquiry teaches us to shift our focus from "what is going wrong and how do we fix it?" to questions like "when are we at our best, and how do we do more of that?"


Asset mapping is a tool of appreciative inquiry, which helps us look at all aspects of our lives—even our weaknesses—as resources that God can use. By starting with a positive, appreciative perspective, and then examining our networks, talents, connections, and even our challenges all as assets, we become better positioned to use the resources God has given us to help transform the world.

As always, I invite you to pick up or borrow this book, and share in conversation with me and with

one another about what we're learning. And don't be surprised the next time someone asks, "what's not working?"— I might just flip the question around to exclaim: "what's working really well?"
