"You shall not make wrongful use of the Name of the Lord, your God.' What does this mean? We are to fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, practice magic, lie, or deceive using God's name, but instead we are to call upon God in every time of need, pray to him, praise him, and give him thanks." (Martin Luther, The Second Commandment, The Small Catechism.)

At the (calendar) start of the year, I began writing a series of articles on Prayer. I began by encouraging you not to regard Prayer as fruitless or empty. Indeed, one of the unique things a Christian can do in response to human need or tragedy is to **PRAY**. There are numerous charities that can provide for the bodily needs and comfort, but only the Church can pray for those who are in need. But even beyond this special Christian privilege, prayer is commanded of us. In the Second Commandment, we are commanded to not make "wrongful use of the Name of the Lord, your God," which begs the question, "How then might we make RIGHT use of God's Holy Name?" We are not forbidden from using God's Name at all, as if it were some sort of forbidden word, but instead we are forbidden from using that Name *wrongly*. How do we use that Name rightly? Luther (along with the whole of the Church) reminds us that we use God's Name properly when we "**Call upon God's Name in every time of need**," "**Pray** (using God's Name)," "**Praise God**," and "**Give Thanks to God**."

Often we hear the word "command," in a negative light. We see it as an imposition, a limit to our freedom, an obligation that we didn't ask for. We might be tempted to approach Prayer sulkily and unwillingly. But it important to remember the context in which the Commandments were given to God's people. God had just delivered his people from bondage and slavery to the Egyptians and gives the Commandments to the Israelites as how they now will live as his people. The Commandments are the sign of the People's fidelity. And how will God's people live out their faithfulness? They will have no other gods (the First Commandment) and they will Pray to God (the Second Commandment). And why does Prayer rank just below the great sin of Idolatry but before all the other Commandments? Going out on a limb, I would say it's because God *WANTS* us to know him and likewise God *WANTS* to know us.

Think about that for just a moment. God is not content to sit "in his heaven and all's right with the world." Our God—the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—is not "unknowable," unapproachable, and immovable. Our God, who bids us to Pray as a mark of our Faithfulness, *WANTS* us to know him. He tells Moses his own Name. God the Son takes on human flesh and dwells among us. All of Christian Scripture discloses God's Truth, Wisdom, and Will. God's Commandment to Pray then fits into this context. Prayer becomes yet another avenue for God to know us, and we to know God. When we pray, we open ourselves to God and, much to our surprise and delight find that God has opened himself to us!

Our discussion of Prayer, then, brings us full circle. We began with establishing the need for Prayer and the efficacy of Prayer. We moved into a discussion of some techniques and methods of Prayer. But we can NEVER approach Prayer just as a matter of mechanics. There is no

"simple method" I can impart to you; there is no simple formula, or incantation that I can teach you by which we are to pray. (Such an incantation would run afoul of the Second Commandment's prohibition of "practicing magic" using God's Name...) Even "The Lord's Prayer" should not be used in such a fashion! Treating Prayer as a "method" or as a mechanical process defeats the purpose of Prayer, because the goal of Prayer is not the "method" but relationship with God.

The fact that God "Commands" Prayer of us does not "limit our freedom," but rather frees us from any fear that we might not be "doing it right." Perfection of "how" we Pray is not the goal, but rather our simple desire to know God and to be known by God. God delights in knowing us and that should lead us to delight in knowing God. Far from being a deity that "sits on high," unapproachable and immovable, our God delights in us calling upon his name in every time of need and in prayer. God rejoices in our Prayer and when we keep the Commandment. Far from being an unwanted and unwelcome imposition, Prayer then is to enter God's joy.

News from Council

Council met Thursday, November 15th. Here is a summary of recent Council and Church activities and actions:

- Council discussed the recent annual Planning/Budget meeting. The Congregation was informed that our 2018 offering would be about \$15,000 less than the year before. This, in large part, is because we lost, thru death or moving out of the area, 11 families from the Congregation. To compensate for this, the 2019 budget will have frozen salaries and we will give less to our Synod and the WVU Lutheran Student Center.
- Our Treasurer, Debby Borrelli, reported that our offerings for 2018 are at present more than \$26,000 less than our actual expenses.
- The Property Committee announced that the new Sexton is in place and seems to be working out well. Pastor mentioned that the chairlift going up to the Choir loft is not working and that it will be a couple of weeks before we can get someone to repair it.
- We have received a thank you note from Lutheran World Relief for our recent gifts of quilts (made by our Piecemakers) and kits. Council would like to thank the Piecemakers and all of you who helped to put the kits together.
- We will start in January to charge for daily parking in the Church lot, and Council discussed activities needed to do that. This does not apply to Congregational members parking for Church-related activities.
- Our Congregation's annual Audit was accepted by Council, with thanks to members of the Audit Committee. There were no great issues from the Audit, but the Committee made suggestions for possible changes in the future. Council discussed these and will do so again in future meetings.
- The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held after the Sunday Service on January 27, 2018. If any of you have issues you'd like to bring to that meeting, please see any Council member by early January.

Finances:

During and after the November 11th Spending Plan Meeting, there were discussions about the 2018 shortfall of income over expenses. As of Oct. 31st, expenses have out-paced offerings by over \$26,000 for the year to date.

Comparing the giving for 2017 and 2018, there are 11 fewer giving units (individuals or families) in 2018. The reduction in the number of giving units is due to deaths, moves to other towns and moves to other churches. These 11 giving units accounted for about \$23,200 in offerings in 2017.

PLEASE prayer-fully consider if you have matured in your giving to the church. Are you giving out of what remains after everything else is paid? Do you only make an offering on the Sundays when you are in church? How faithful is your attendance? Can you make your offering a "first fruit", not a "leftover"?

Part of maturing is being responsible. Are you a mature, responsible member of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Morgantown?
