## VII. The Church

*Our churches also teach that one holy Church is to continue forever. The Church is the assembly of Saints in which the Gospel is taught purely and the Sacraments are administered rightly. For the true Unity of the Church, it is enough to agree concerning the teaching of the Gospel and the administration*

*of the Sacraments. It is not necessary that human traditions or rites and ceremonies, instituted by men, should be alike, everywhere. It is as Paul says, "One faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all..."*

## VIII. What is the Church?

*Properly speaking, the Church is the assembly of Saints and true believers. However, since in this life many hypocrites and evil people are mingled with believers, it is allowable to use the Sacraments even when they are administered by evil men, according to the saying of Christ, "The Scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat." (Mt. 23:2) Both the Sacraments and the Word are effectual by reason of the institution and Commandment of Christ, even if they are administered by evil men....*

*--The Augsburg Confession*

In the words of the Nicene Creed, we confess that we believe in "...*The one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church...*" And yet, throughout history, this one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church has been bedeviled by schism (visible breaks in fellowship) and rent by heresy (erroneous teaching). In fact, there are moments in which, while confessing the Nicene Creed, I wonder how seriously "I" actually "believe" the claim of this Church, which is "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic." One response to these words is **reductionistic** and **sectarian** in nature; to reduce "the Church" to its smallest and most isolated unit—a single congregation or fellowship perhaps—that seeks to preserve the "holy, catholic, and apostolic" teaching and characteristics of "The Church" most purely over-and-against every other body. But another response is **aspirational** and **catholic**; to see the "one-ness" of the Church existing even when it appears to the naked eye to be broken. This catholic (universal) aspiration sees the True Church as persisting beyond divisions in time, geography, and even tradition and denomination—not "over-and-against" other believers, but **IN-AND-THROUGH** other believers. This is not "diversity" for diversity's sake, but rather a vision of the Church that directs us to the Transcendence of Christ Jesus.

A concrete example of this catholic conviction is that we belong to a national church—**The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA)**. The ELCA was formed in 1986—1987 by a merger process between the **Lutheran Church in America (LCA)**, the **American Lutheran Church**

(**ALC**), and the **American Evangelical Lutheran Church (AELC)**. The “merger” (the official language at the time was “*A New Lutheran Church*”) was the culmination of other mergers over the years that saw smaller Lutheran churches—often organized around ethnic identities—coming together to form larger bodies. These churches saw a catholic imperative pulling them together; they had striven to use common worship forms (ultimately the ***Lutheran Book of Worship***), they had striven to coordinate mission starts (which had culminated in the ***Lutheran Council of the United States (LCUSA)***), and they had striven ultimately to “be one church.” In the heady ecumenical days of the 1970’s and 80’s, “one Lutheran Church” seemed to be within grasp; there were even hopes to see a “Reconciled Church of the West” within our lifetime. Sadly, the old tormentors of schism and heresy continue to bedevil and rend us asunder.

The ELCA is composed of 9,163 congregations, across 65 Synods, in the territories of the United States of America. It is a “National” church; the decision not to be “International” in scope was intentional, allowing the ***Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC)***, for instance, their own sovereignty. Reflective of the structure of its constitutive Synods, the ELCA is governed by a *Presiding Bishop*—who is a Pastor of the Church, a *Vice President* who is a lay-person, and a *Churchwide Council* who are elected from across the Synods. Every three (3) years (it used to be every 2 years), a *Churchwide Assembly (CWA)* is called to debate issues of policy and direction and elect officers. (This summer, the CWA will be held in Milwaukee, WI, August 5—10... If you would like to attend as a Visitor or as a Volunteer, you can contact Bishop Riegel or the Synod Office.) Currently, the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA is The Rev. Elizabeth Eaton; she is the fourth person to hold the Office since 1987. (The others were The Rev. Herbert Chilstrom, The Rev. Dr. H. George Anderson, and The Rev. Mark Hanson.) One of the tasks of this Churchwide Assembly will be the election of a Presiding Bishop.

The Churchwide Assembly also debates and approves “Social Statements” which are “teaching documents” on issues facing Lutherans. This CWA will be deliberating a Social Statement on “Women and Justice.” Other Social Statements include “Abortion” (1991), “The Church and Society” (1991), “Capital Punishment,” (1991) “Caring for Creation” (1993), “Race, Ethnicity, and Culture” (1993), “Peace” (1995), “Economic Life” (1999), “Health and Health Care” (2003), “Education” (2007), “Human Sexuality” (2009), “Genetics” (2011), and “The Church and Criminal Justice” (2013). These Social Statements are intended to educate the Faithful, guide the ELCA’s policies and advocacy, and spur discussion and moral deliberation among Lutherans. (A later article will delve into more detail on this unit.)

The ELCA also supports activities that local congregations and Synods may not be able to. Historically global (international) Mission was a place that a “National church” could more effectively fund and coordinate, and so Global Missions remain an emphasis for the ELCA. Coordinating events like National Youth Gatherings are massive and trans-Synodical in nature and also are important for the ELCA. And finally, as part of the catholic vision, the ELCA is in conversation with other Lutherans world-wide (through the ***Lutheran World Federation***) and with other Christians through various ecumenical ventures. In the months to come, we’ll look at these in more detail.

We continue to highlight the ways in which St. Paul Lutheran Church serves the larger community. This month, we look at the Piece Makers.

In 2003, Marcia Groce (who now lives in Erie, PA) was doing some sewing at the church one day a week. Churchwide Assembly was coming up in the summer of 2003. The assembly hall was large and had many hard surfaces. Congregations

were asked to donate quilts to be hung on the walls to lessen the noise. Art quilts were to be auctioned off to raise money for LWR, and utility quilts were to be donated to LWR. Roberta Dean, Scottie Sneckenberger, and Marcia together created a quilt for the Assembly. In 2005, quilts were again requested for Churchwide Assembly. Joined by Renate Strakal and Helen Goryance, the group was able to complete two quilts. Helen was a veteran of two groups in Minnesota churches that had made mission quilts for Lutheran World Relief, and she suggested that St. Paul do this. Renate researched the internet and learned information on starting a mission quilting group. They called themselves the Peacemakers (at some point it was changed to Piecemakers).

Renate also made announcements to the congregation asking for workers and material. They were starting with almost nothing, not even a sewing needle, let alone fabric, batting, thread, or a sewing machine. Someone offered to buy a sewing machine, and Renate tried one out at a local shop. The Piecemakers still have this wonderful machine, which Linda Ross uses every week to hem the thick quilts. Donations and gifts of money started to come in, and donations continue to this day, appearing whenever we have a need. Women (and men) began to volunteer their time.

Renate says, “The Lord has blessed our mission from day one and continues to do so.” Lots of prayers continue, asking the Lord to always be with us and make us cheerful workers for his kingdom. Although some workers have come and gone, the mission grew and continues to grow. We were particularly blessed when Mrs. Joann Failinger of Wisconsin worshiped as a visitor one Sunday. Since then she has made and sent us many quilt tops, ready for quilting. In the last twelve years we have sent over a thousand quilts to Lutheran World Relief. We are fortunate to have a few experienced quilters in our group, but some helpers come without any experience and learn and find that there is work for all abilities. We continue to seek and welcome new members. Most of the quilts we make go to LWR, but quilts have gone to West Virginia Children’s Hospital, the Veteran’s Hospital, and to local people of need. Lap quilts are given to those who are hospitalized or homebound, and it is our pleasure to give quilts to newly baptized members as a welcome and remembrance of the need to serve others.

St. Paul Church community members have continually supported our mission. We know you will keep us in your prayers and are ever thankful for your help. For health reasons Renate has turned over most leadership responsibilities to Mary Haas, but every one of our ladies is a leader. We also welcome gentlemen to our mission!



“Second Sunday” Sunday School – Summary of March 10, 2019 Session  
 We say it every Sunday but what does it really mean?  
 Discussion Group Notes – Topic – “To love others”

When we say the mission statement, we say  
 “Sent by the Holy Spirit to love others”

1. What is/are the message(s) we are told to take to people? Love one another and to preach the gospel. Also, forgiveness, inclusion, being kind, respectful and appropriate. How we approach life matters. We have a “how to” guide about loving others. Jesus met people where they were. He met the adulteress where she was. He met Mary and Martha where they were in their grief when Lazarus had died. One was strong and the other was weepy. A few scripture passages: John 13:34-35; Romans 12:9-21; Mark 16:15; John 3:16


2. Who are “others”? Everyone. Family, friends, neighbors, strangers, people in our town, state, in Government, other political views, other religions.

Being self-aware can help us be the best we can be to know how to approach a situation. What does the person need? Be the listener and not a taker. The “other” person may not know what they need. Individually, we do not possess the qualities in the verses above, but together we do have these qualities and abilities.

3. Our mission statement includes the words “sent by the Holy Spirit to love others”. If we preach the gospel to everyone we meet, how do you think people would respond? Why is the message not “good news” to some people? We are in different places in life. Different upbringing, different life circumstances, different history with Christians/God. Quoting scripture may be over the head of someone with no prior knowledge or it may sound haughty. It can come across as a lecture to some. Conversation can be intimidating for us and for others. The message may be “out there” to someone with no prior knowledge of scripture. We need to learn how to approach situations to help a person not shut down to the message.

4. How might this be different if we live the message “love others” instead of saying the words? People may be drawn in to hear the message of the gospel by our acts of love towards others. Practice the Fruit of the Spirit: Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness and self-control; praying, and recognizing the Spiritual gifts we can use in our church and world. Exhibit a calm life, show kindness, pray that the Holy Spirit works upon them to help them understand the seeds that are planted. We have to be patient. While we may feel fear of screwing it up and think “don’t send me”, we are all called to love others and each of us has something to contribute. Be the example. Plant seeds of hope and God’s Grace.


