Fall is my favorite time of year. I come alive on crisp mornings as the trees are putting on their brilliant yellow and red coats. Fall is the season of my most wonderful memories.

I remember going pheasant hunting with Dad each fall. Looking back, it isn't the hunt that I remember. The memory I cherish is that of walking through a cornfield on a cool fall morning with my dad.

Some of my best memories of fall are of playing football. I don't have fond recollections of the hot, humid, two-a-day practices of August. But when those days were over and the season began I felt a change come over me.

In high school we won more than we lost, not so in college. After high school I became a North Central College Cardinal. My college playing career was cut short by injury. Had I not gotten injured, my playing career would have likely been cut short by lack of talent!

I am a diehard fan of the Detroit Lions. Along with you I lived through the dark days of the Lions but each fall I am convinced that things are going to be better. I am an eternal optimist, but there is good reason for optimism.

The Lions have a strong team of talented players and coaches. They worked together last year learning new systems and approaches to a game that they have played since they were very young. They tasted some success but there is a sense that 2015 could be even better.

As I think about Good Shepherd I see similarities to the Lions. We also need to learn new systems and new approaches to how we do what we do as church, but the greatest similarity is that our future is bright. When the Lions score a touchdown or field goal, Theo Spight belts out the Lions' fight song "Gridiron Heroes." The lyrics include the phrase "Forward down the field, a charging team that will not yield."

That's who we are! A charging team that will not yield! We are winners here at Good Shepherd! Jesus is our coach and that gives us the edge. The new season starts now. Let's get out there and show them who we are and whose we are! Forward down the field!

A Meaningful Prayer Vigil for Lexys Lamp

Late in the afternoon of July 29th after a brief rain, a rainbow appeared as people gathered to join Pastor Doug

and the Good Shepherd community in a prayer vigil for Lexys Lamp--our little neighbor who has an inoperable brain tumor. We responded to the call for a vigil by the president of the DuVall PTA to fulfill a community need. Sandie Post helped coordinate efforts at Good Shepherd. Irene Addison did a great job publicizing the prayer vigil and that week's spaghetti dinner fundraiser on behalf of the Lamp family, resulting in a front page article in that Wednesday's edition of the Press & Guide.

The 40-50 participants, including the Lamp family, friends, neighbors, DuVall School supporters and the community at large, were led by Pastor Doug in a beautiful, personal service of prayers, scripture and a liturgy of healing. The prayer vigil closed with silent meditation, personal prayer and a candle-lighting ceremony to remind us that no matter whatever darkness we may face, an always-faithful God will guide us with His light.



A Press & Guide photographer captured the event which was featured in a full-page spread in the August 5th paper. Afterwards the participants didn't disperse immediately but lingered and surrounded the Lamp family with love and support.

A Spaghetti Dinner in July A Night to Remember



Sometimes the simplest ideas are the best ways to show God's presence, and sometimes those ideas are right in front of us. During the first week of July when Pastor Doug visited the Lamp family and asked what we could do besides keeping them in prayer, their answer was simple: put on one of your spaghetti dinners to help us raise funds for Lexys.

We know how to do that. We do that eight times a year. We thought there might be some challenges given the time of year, though. It could be very hot, the usual

dinner volunteers might be on vacation, and we had slightly over 3 weeks to pull it together, but nobody who heard what was being considered suggested we drop it. A very quick response was given to the family: We'll do it!

We could recount the decisions that made the fundraiser a success but more importantly, let some of the numbers speak for themselves: almost 300 dinners served, over **\$5,650** was raised (plus **\$760** previously donated through the Good Shepherd Family Emergency Fund), and more than 50 volunteers worked. When word spread, others with no association with Good Shepherd wanted to be part of this effort. Co-workers signed on, friends and Good Shepherd family members we haven't seen in awhile or hadn't met before, came in.

Some decisions reaped unexpected blessings. The usual menu item of garlic bread wouldn't work as well for this event. A contact with **Panera Cares**, resulted in a donation of 24 loaves of bread. When **Dearborn Farm Market's** owner heard about the benefit, the 50 pounds of ground chuck, the 36 pints of grape tomatoes, the 20 pounds of sliced mushrooms and 20 packages of shredded carrots, became a gift. **Park Place Catering** donated bags of ice thanks to a long-time member. **DuVall Elementary School** loaned us tables and chairs. The addition of a **DJ** was an inspired decision. He had worked at the birthday party DuVall had given for Lexys on July 15th, so Good Shepherd folks attending asked him about our fundraiser in a couple of weeks just a few short blocks away. He graciously offered his services at no cost. In return, he simply asked us to provide positive reviews on a couple of internet sites where he advertises. (Tim "Stymie" Snyder, djsdiscjockeyservice.com, 313-414-0171) Likewise, we can repay the generosity of Panera Cares, Dearborn Farm Market and Park Place Catering by patronizing their businesses ... and thanking them. We will continue to nurture our relationship with other Dearborn neighbors including DuVall Elementary School and the Dearborn Press and Guide. The newspaper's coverage of Good Shepherd activities that last week in July on behalf of the Lamp family was invaluable.

We had been concerned about staffing given the timing of the dinner during prime vacation season, but so many of you stepped up. You might not have felt we made the most of your presence--we weren't sure how much help we would need given the self-serve nature of this particular dinner-- but the fact that you gave of your time and donned a blue t-shirt for Lexys spoke volumes. Time, talent and energy made it all possible. We were inspired to "serve with joy!"

That night, we saw people stopping by specifically to make a donation. People came in with little gifts and cards for Lexys. The District Superintendent of the



UMC's Detroit Renaissance District visited to witness for himself what was happening. The kitchen crew looked out the window to see children playing and dancing to the music outside. People remained long after dinner to enjoy the evening and each other.

Donations for the Lamp family continue to come in and we are hearing encouraging reports on Lexys' condition. We can't capture the feeling of joy and sharing in mere words, but this is what doing God's work looks like. It was more than a spaghetti dinner in July. Bless you all, and thank you.



September Mission Focus**

We are excited to be supporting Red Bird as our September mission focus.

Good Shepherd continues its long relationship with Red Bird Mission by focusing on this ministry during June.

Red Bird Mission sits in an isolated area of Appalachia in Kentucky. Its first mission efforts, in 1921, provided a school, but the mission has become a broad-spectrum agency, serving in five areas of ministry (Education, Health and Wellness, Community Outreach, Economic Opportunity, and Community Housing Improvement). Today the need remains critical in this isolated, rural distressed area. Chronic poverty, lack of jobs, poor housing, and rugged mountainous terrain provide obstacles to a fuller life for the residents of this area.

The general goal of Red Bird Mission is to help improve the lives of those who live in our area, through compassionate, Christ-centered service. The staff and volunteers who serve at Red Bird Mission seek to empower individuals and advocate for justice and will be focusing on the following objectives in the coming year:

1) Enhance and strengthen academic and Christian education curriculum of Red Bird Mission School (K-12 school and an early childhood

development program for 3 and 4 year-old children) and increase the number of students through re-opening of the high school dorm program and bus routes that were closed during the financial crisis of 2010.

2) Improve the health of people through extension of health and dental programs for women, children, and the elderly.

3) Continue support for the expansion of family food production.

4) Advocate and assist with adult education, job training, job development, and skills development to improve family earning capacity.

5) Continue the home improvement ministry until unsafe and unhealthy housing no longer exists.

Financial assistance through the Advance will help to continue its services to those in need in the Red Bird area.

Meet Our District Superintendent Rev. Dr. Charles S. G. Boayue, Jr.



I was born at the George Way Harley Memorial Methodist Mission Hospital in Ganta, Nimba County, Liberia. GBGM missionaries built the hospital and mission station in the 1920s.

My mother and father, Fannia and Charles Boayue, Sr., are still alive for which I give thanks. She lives in Cumberland, Maryland with my sister and he lives in Farmington Hills with us.

When I became old enough to understand some things, my mother told me a story about the events surrounding my birth and first week of life that has changed and shaped me significantly.

She said that about three days after my birth at the Ganta Mission Hospital, the attending physician, Dr. Hyla Waters, released us to go home. As we traveled from Ganta to our farm house in a pickup truck used for public transportation, the truck hit a bump and tumbled off the road, rolling downhill several times and landing in a ditch below.

During the tumble, she held me firmly in her bosom until the truck settled at the bottom of the ditch. Fortunately, no one was fatally wounded, but my mother suffered a deep cut on her forehead and kept bleeding. She and I were returned to the hospital and again, Dr. Waters, a missionary from the General Board of Global Ministries, attended to her wounds and released us the next day. We made it home safely this time.

The details of this story of my first week in this world have reminded and haunted me all my life. That a white American woman missionary doctor (who originally wanted to serve in China but had to be reassigned to Liberia when China's Cultural Revolution expelled her) would be the one to deliver me and save my mother's life in Ganta, Liberia in 1959, is an affirmation of how God works in mysterious ways!

That my mother would love me so much that she would risk her life to secure mine at a moment's notice has constantly pushed me to a deeper understanding of what God's love can do in and through people like us.

I come as one example of what Christian love and witness has done for a young man, way out in the tropics of Western Africa, and how that witness can make a difference for others. I want that same kind of missionary zeal that propelled Hyla Waters to China and Liberia and into my life to be the kind of zeal that propels us to reach out in the Detroit Renaissance District to our young people whose mothers cry out for life-giving and life-saving help!

Installation of Dr. Boayue

On September 20, 2015 at 3 PM, Bishop Deb Kiesey will be installing Rev. Dr. Charles Boayue as the Detroit Renaissance District Superintendent at Southfield Hope UMC, 26275 Northwestern Hwy.

All are welcome to attend. Refreshments and international cuisine will be served immediately afterward.

People are looking for identity and meaningful relationships. They seek satisfaction and fulfillment. They desire to belong to something good. They want the world around them to be more loving, more caring, and more just. And they are looking for partners to make this happen. Their thirst for righteousness and their hunger for justice remind me of Jesus' prayer that God's "will be done on earth as it is in heaven."
