The memories of all we have shared are overwhelming. Eight years is long time.

Monday when I walked several laps in the sanctuary, I pictured each of you in your regular spot. And I prayed as I walked, for you and your family. I know some of you reading this have not been here for some time. Still, I have a general idea where you usually sit. I also remembered and celebrated our recent saints, those whose lives we celebrated as they transitioned to life eternal. Those memories included, Winnie Smith, Robert Shandy, Sarah Clemmons, Kenneth Cochran, John Reber, Rex Ford, Lester Zimmerman, Hal Cordry, Bill Samuelson, Lila Zimmerman, Bob Badenoch, Sharon Huffman and Al Camblin. There were others. Several of your family members and friends who were not members here were also part of the work I did, especially during the pandemic as we celebrated their lives at gravesides and in two cases funeral homes. It is such an intimate time with so many shared stories. What a privilege it was.

There was also much joy that was celebratory in a lighter way. Certainly the wedding of Brenda Price and Bob Clelland was one such event. Also, the wedding of Christi and Jon Hardesty's daughter Collene to Alex which was at a KC venue. I cannot forget the joy of the renewal of vows for Kem and Sharla Cooper as they celebrated their 40^{th} wedding anniversary. We talked about it together just last week. Perhaps the greatest joy for me is that of officiating a baptism. It feels especially joyful in a deeply spiritual way. I say, "May the Holy Spirit work within you, that being born of water and Spirit you will grow to be a disciple." And, each of you present that day, promises to help them...often tiny little ones, grow in their faith.

This has been quite a journey. God was profoundly present with us through it all. How I wish the Covid-19 pandemic had not separated us for what was a little more than a year. How I wish it had not lingered. How I wish so many had not lost their lives. I am grateful that for the most part, we continued on. And although several of you were very ill with the virus, you and we together survived.

use this change in pastoral leadership as an opportunity to grow closer to God and one another. This can be an opportunity to embrace the change and reinvigorate the way we do ministry. What an opportunity SHUMC and Berryton UMC have to work in shared ministry with Pastor Annie's leadership.

You will remain in my prayers. We have accomplished much. Yet, I know God is not finished with any of us yet. May we grow more curious and more interested in reaching out to those without a church home, those who are convinced the church is irrelevant, and those who have been harmed by the church and people who claim to be Christians. May we remember the church does not exist for us, but for those who have not yet risked connecting or taking the bold step to walk through our doors. We are to be God's love for everyone.
