On November 1, 1936, World-Wide Communion Sunday was born. In the winter of 1935, a group of ministers met to study the spiritual needs and possibilities of the church during the dark days of the Great Depression. In the Lord's Supper they saw a great opportunity to unite Christians in dedication to Christ.

In 1937, is the date World-Wide Communion Sunday was changed to the first Sunday in October, where it has remained. The word "wide" has since been dropped from the name, giving us the present observation of World Communion Sunday.

The day remains a it began: "A great opportunity to unite the membership in dedication to the Lord Jesus Christ."

People from the four corners of the world gather together to answer Christ's invitation, "This do in remembrance of me."



Worship Update

After years of language use and study (Spanish, a little German, French major, singing a lot in Latin, and appreciation of anyone who speaks and writes English well), I'm kind of a word "geek". My children will tell you I also enjoy grammar, of all things!

Churches, schools, and all other areas of society have been deeply affected over the centuries – and certainly in recent years - by words that have been misused and misunderstood. This is not new. Why can't we figure out the power words have to affect people deeply, for good and for bad, sometimes with terrible misunderstandings and even more terrible consequences as a result? How can we take more care in our use of words and our responses to them?

I looked up "listen" in my Bible concordance for some Scriptural context regarding our response to words. Imagine my surprise to find only one reference: Isaiah 49:1: "Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away." I then looked up "hear" and found hundreds of verses. Hmmm ... I checked the English dictionary definition and learned that "listen" derives from a very old term that means "give ear to" or "hear with understanding". Aha! Word geek excitement! The second part of the Isaiah verse said "pay attention", i.e., "hear with understanding". Hearing words is one thing; listening to them is something else. "Can you hear me now" means a sound is clear, while "I hear you" in a conversation implies that "I understand what you mean." "Listen to me!" seeks an understanding response, but "I was listening to the radio" indicates a passive absorption of information.

We process so many words from so many sources these days, that we don't realize how often we hear and react negatively. Words are essential to positive communication and action. My prayer is that we will be able to hone our listening and speaking skills to uphold God's purposes, and, as people of faith, to follow the advice found in James 1:19-25:

"... let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger, for your anger does not produce God's righteousness. Therefore, rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls. But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act, they will be blessed in their doing."

"A conversion to Christianly is also incorporation in the in the body of Christ, the church."

That's a fitting reminder as we observe World Communion Sunday in October. Christians don't take Holy Communion alone; the very name of this sacrament refers to unity with God and others. We don't baptize ourselves. We don't learn Scripture or Christian theology and history alone. We can't have Christian fellowship by ourselves.

The New Testament is clear that one cannot be a solitary Christian. We are members of Christ's body (Ephesians 5:30) "belong to the family of believers" (Galatians 6:10). As we gather for worship and receive Holy Communion, thank God for 'our common salvation" (Jude 3) granted to all followers of Jesus.

Holocaust survivor and devout Christian Corrie ten Boom recounts how her sister Betsie thanked God for the fleas infesting their packed barracks. When Corrie resisted the idea, Betsie pointed out that 1 Thessalonians 5: 18 says to "give thanks in all circumstances."

Still Corrie wasn't convinced – until the sisters realized the infestation kept the guards away, giving prisoners in those quarters freedom to worship and pray. The biting pests, which seemed like added misery, became a blessing.

Anger and bitterness sometimes cloud our vision, causing us to forget to thank God in all situations, though not necessarily for them. Other times we don't wait long enough for blessings to be revealed. But faith is like waiting through a storm, knowing a rainbow is coming eventually. Meanwhile, the Lord holds an umbrella for us, and the closer with him we walk, the less wet we'll get.
