A Conversation with

Fran and Bob Shigeno by Carol Tuntland

This verse was part of my daily devotion in the days prior to my conversation with Fran and Bob Shigeno, and I thought it appropriate to their story, especially early in their lives.



¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see — I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

~Luke 2:10-12

Bob and Fran both spent Christmas in 1942 and 1943 in internment camps. Neither of them remembers how their family celebrated. Neither family ever discussed their experiences in the camps. Bob and Fran haven't explained this period of their lives to their sons, who haven't asked about the camps. But they want people to know that the incarceration happened.

The United States wasn't involved in World War II until immediately after December 7, 1941. Two months after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, President Roosevelt authorized Executive Order 9066, and thus began the creation of concentration camps for people of Japanese descent. Called "War Relocation Centers," "Detention Centers," or "internment facilities," the United States government forced 120,000 Japanese Americans to relocate into one of ten concentration camps set up in the western interior of the United States. Bob's family and Fran's family were among those Japanese Americans. This is their story of that time...

Bob was born in 1940 in Seattle, Washington. Both his mother and father were born in the United States and were citizens. Fran was born in 1941 in the Watsonville area of California, and her mother was also a United States citizen, having been born in Sebastopol, California; but Fran's father was born in Hiroshima and had immigrated to the United States while a teenager.

Most Japanese Americans were relocated in 1942. People were first moved to "holding areas," such as racetracks and fairgrounds, until the camps were established. Santa Anita Racetrack was one of those holding areas. However, both Bob and Fran were too young to remember anything about the time they spent in the "holding areas." But Fran's mother


told her that "the FBI came to their home and ransacked it. They weren't neat about it—they threw things around and left a mess." And Bob knows that when his family was sent to their "holding area," his father was not with them. Bob was held in Puyallup, Washington, where the county fair was held.

When Bob was born, his father was a storekeeper, and his family were farmers. His mother was homemaker and took care of Bob and his younger brother. Since Bob's father did not go when they were sent to the camp, Bob's "family" consisted of grandparents, aunts, uncles, as well as his mother, brother, and Bob.

Bob does have memories of the final camp in Minidoka because he was about 5 years old then. The camp had "blocks," which consisted of 20-30 barracks. Each "barrack" housed between six and eight families. These barracks had a central eating area and a couple of restrooms and shower areas. The families lived in one room, where they all slept. Each family also had a porch and a garden area, where they were permitted to grow food items to supplement the diet provided by the government. To keep themselves busy, some people volunteered to cook, clean, educate, and take care of the camp population. Others also sang, danced, and made crafts and artwork to entertain themselves.

The United States government permitted Bob's father to continue farming, but not on his own land. The government designated specific land where the Japanese American farmers were allowed to grow potatoes, onions, and berries. Some Japanese Americans worked in Cincinnati and Colorado as laborers.

Right after the war, Bob's father died of tuberculosis. Upon release from the internment camp, Bob, his mother, brother, and grandparents went back to Seattle. His grandmother was a strong woman who worked in hospitals. Bob's mother remarried and later had a daughter; his stepfather had two children, so there were five children in the family. Fran's family came from Aromas, California; they were sent to a camp in Poston, Arizona for internment. Her family consisted of Fran, her mother and father, and Fran's older brother, who died in the camp. A younger brother was born in the camp, and two sisters were born after World War II. Fran's father had been married previously and after his first wife died in childbirth, the five children from that marriage were sent back to Japan and raised by her father's older sister in Hiroshima.

Fran's father owned a fruit-drying plant prior to the war, and when the family was interred, he asked a neighbor to look after the plant. The neighbor did not take care of the plant and the machinery was rusted and inoperable when they returned. Fran's father then decided to share-crop strawberries in Watsonville, California.

Fran shared a story about the milk that was provided by the United States government. Since the family was lactose-intolerant, Fran's mother used the milk to water the spinach in her garden. Her spinach crop was really good! Fran also said the men would sneak out at night to go fishing; the camp guards turned a "blind eye" to their escape into the desert. But the men always came back, bringing trout to eat!

The Japanese weren't all released from camp at the same time. The government had to find transportation and places for the Japanese to live.

Fran's father was very active in the Presbyterian church in Watsonville. Fran's family celebrated Christmas with a little tree. Because they lived on the farm and church was in town and Fran's father didn't get a day off when the berries were producing, the pastor picked up Fran and drove her to church. (Remember Watsonville strawberries? Those strawberries still have a very fine reputation!) Fran attended Sunday School from the time she was five or six, when the pastor could drive the family to church.

Bob's mother was Christian and the family celebrated Christmas with a Christmas tree every year. There were church services every year. He had a Catholic friend who invited him to Mass—it hurt Bob's knees! (Those Christmas services go on forever!)

Fran's and Bob's parents didn't talk about their experiences after they were released. They resumed their lives to the best of their abilities, often moving and starting over. Information about life in the internment camps tends to come out at family reunions when relatives get together and talk. And as children and future generations begin to learn about United States history, some light is shed on the relocation and incarceration of Japanese Americans. Bob and Fran have had few conversations with their sons about the camp experiences. (Continued on p. 8)



Bob attended the University of Washington, majoring in aeronautical engineering. He later moved to Los Angeles to work at Douglas Aircraft. Fran went to Cal State Los Angeles and specialized in education of young children. But Fran discovered that she didn't really like teaching young children, so she went to work for Academic Press and TRW in the library.

The couple met when Fran was working at TRW and one of her friends married a friend of Bob's from Seattle. Bob and Fran married in 1965 and were blessed with two sons, Eric and Reid. Bob worked at Douglas, McDonnell Douglas, and Boeing; he retired in the late 1980s. Fran worked for a few more years before joining Bob in retirement. Their son Eric was a doctor, practicing in Palm Springs and Corona. He died of a massive stroke during the early stages of COVID-19. His memorial service was held at Our Redeemer in October 2021. Reid works in environmental science and is married to Yvonne and they have three daughters (6, ,5 and 2). The granddaughters keep them busy! Fran and Bob have many friends and enjoy a full life of hobbies (have you seen Bob's orchids?), travel, church, choir for Fran, and babysitting and other activities with their family.


