

ALL-DECADE TEAM - 1970s

Ron Wilson, Providence, D (1973-77): This defensive stalwart was named the ECAC Player of the Year in 1975 and earned consecutive All-American honors in 1975 and 1976.

Rick Meagher, Boston Univ., F (1973-77): Meagher led the Terriers to the ECAC Tournament championship all four years. In the process, he was named an All-American three times and the ECAC Tournament MOP twice.

Bill Blackwood, Clarkson, D (1974-78): Blackwood was a two-time All-American for the Golden Knights, and was named to three consecutive ECAC Second-Teams. He helped lead Clarkson to a 26-wins season in 1976-77.

Joe Cavanagh, Harvard, F (1968-71): Cavanagh splashed on to the scene his freshman year, winning ECAC Rookie of the Year while earning the first of three All-American honors. He twice led the Crimson to the NCAA Semifinals.

Lance Nethery, Cornell, F (1975-79): Named the ECAC Player of the Year in 1978 after leading the league in scoring. Named to consecutive All-American and ECAC First Teams.

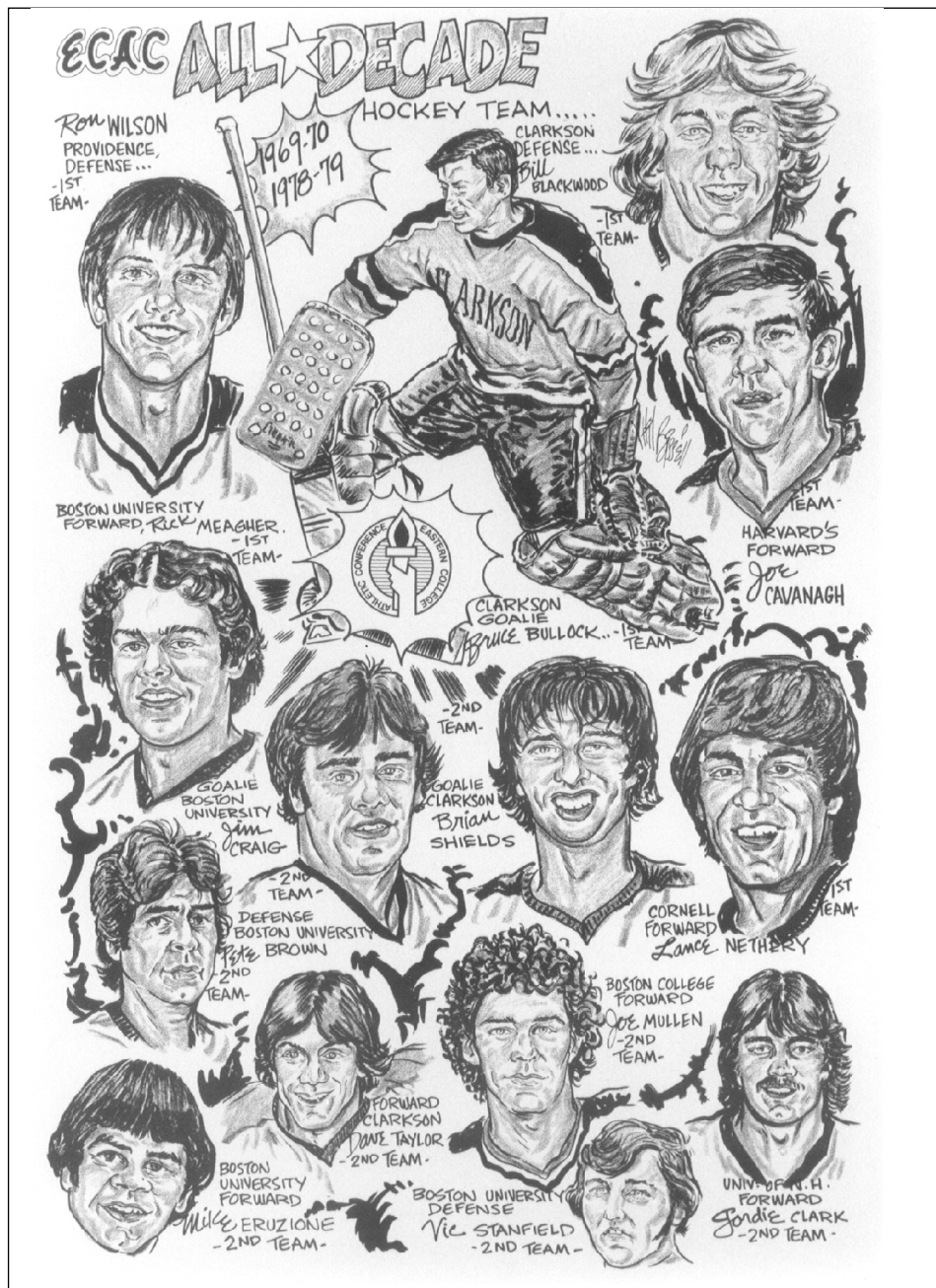
Bruce Bullock, Clarkson, G (1967-71): Led the Golden Knights to the 1970 NCAA title game, and was named the ECAC Tournament MOP. Won the 1971 ECAC Player of the Year award.

Jim Craig, Boston Univ., G (1975-79): Guided the Terriers to a 30-wins season and the 1978 NCAA Championship. Named to ECAC First Team and All-American in 1979.

Brian Shields, Clarkson, G (1973-77): Shields was named to the All-American team and earned First-Team All-Conference honors in 1976 and 1977.

Peter Brown, Boston Univ., D (1972-76): The 1976 ECAC Player of the Year, Brown led the Terriers to three straight ECAC Tournament championships and National Semifinal appearances.

Dave Taylor, Clarkson, F (1973-77): Taylor earned the 1977 ECAC Player of the Year by scoring 108 points, the high-



est season total in ECAC history. He is still Clarkson's all-time leading scorer with 251 points.

Mike Eruzione, Boston Univ., F (1973-77): Famous for his game-winning goal against Russia in the 1980 Olympics, Eruzione also was named to three ECAC All-Conference teams.

Vic Stanfield, Boston Univ., D (1971-75): Stanfield was named to the All-American team in 1974 and 1975, and was named to the ECAC First Team three straight years.

Joe Mullen, Boston College, F (1975-79): A two-time All-American, leading the Eagles to the 1978 NCAA Championship game. He was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team that year.

Gordie Clark, New Hampshire, F (1970-74): A two-time All-American and three-time First-Team All-Conference, Clark led the Wildcats to three 20-wins seasons.

ALL-DECADE TEAM - 1980s



Lane MacDonald, Harvard, F (1985-89):

This two-time First Team All-American capped off a magnificent career in 1989, winning the Hobey Baker Award and being named ECAC Player of the Year. The Crimson finished as the ECAC regular-season champion in all four years he played.

Mark Fusco, Harvard, D (1979-83):

The 1980 ECAC Rookie of the Year became the first ECAC athlete to win the Hobey Baker Award in 1983. Was named to the

Team All-Conference twice and the Second Team once.

Scott Fusco, Harvard, F (1982-86):

A two-time First Team All-American and winner of the 1986 Hobey Baker Award. Named to three All-Conference First Teams as well as the NCAA All-Tournament team his freshman season.

Dave Fretz, Clarkson, D (1981-85):

This 1985 First Team All-Conference selection earned consecutive All-American honors

in 1984 and 1985. He led the Golden Knights to 87 wins in his four-year career.

Don Sylvestri, Clarkson, G (1981-85):

One of just four players in ECAC history to be named conference Rookie of the Year and First Team All-American in the same year. Guided the Golden Knights to the 1981 ECAC regular-season title and the NCAA quarterfinals.

Ed Small, Clarkson, D (1977-81):

Anchored Clarkson's airtight defense that allowed the fewest goals in the regular season in 1981. His ECAC Player of the Year award in 1981 helped earn him All-American status.

Steve Cruickshank, Clarkson, F (1978-82):

Gave Clarkson consecutive Players of the Year in 1982, leading the Golden Knights to the NCAA quarterfinals, where they lost to eventual champion North Dakota. Named to three All-Conference teams in his career.

Joe Nieuwendyk, Cornell, F (1984-87):

One of the NHL's elite centers, Nieuwendyk was named to consecutive All-American teams in 1986 and 1987. Was the 1987 ECAC Player of the Year and the 1985 Rookie of the Year.

Pete Lappin, St. Lawrence, F (1984-88):

Had a remarkable year in 1988, winning the ECAC Player of the Year, and Tournament MOP, earning All-American status for the second straight season, and leading the Saints to the national championship game.

Adam Oates, Rensselaer, F (1981-85):

One of the top passers in NHL history, Oates led the Engineers to a remarkable 35-2-1 record in 1984-85 and the national championship. Named to consecutive All-ECAC and All-American teams.

Cleon Daskalakis, Boston Univ., G (1980-84):

The 1984 ECAC Player of the Year, this netminder led the Terriers to the ECAC Tournament championship game and the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals.

Randy Velischek, Providence, D (1979-83):

Guided the Friars to the ECAC regular-season title and a third-place nation-

ALL-DECADE TEAM - 1990s

FIRST TEAM

Martin St. Louis, Vermont, F (1993-97): The three-time All-American, Hobey Baker finalist, and ECAC First-Team selection remains Vermont's most prolific scorer (267 career points). St. Louis was the 1995 ECAC Player of the Year.

Todd White, Clarkson, F (1993-97): White captured the 1997 conference scoring title (47 points), was a league first-team honoree and a Hobey Baker finalist during his final campaign as a member of the Golden Knights.

Joe Juneau, Rensselaer, F (1987-91): The two-time All-American and Hobey Baker finalist led the Engineers in scoring in each of his four seasons. Juneau also captured the ECAC scoring title and was named a first-team all star in 1990.

Ray Giroux, Yale, D (1994-98): Finished his collegiate career in 1998 as ECAC Player of the Year. Giroux's senior accolades also included All-American status, ECAC First Team, and Best Defensive Defenseman.

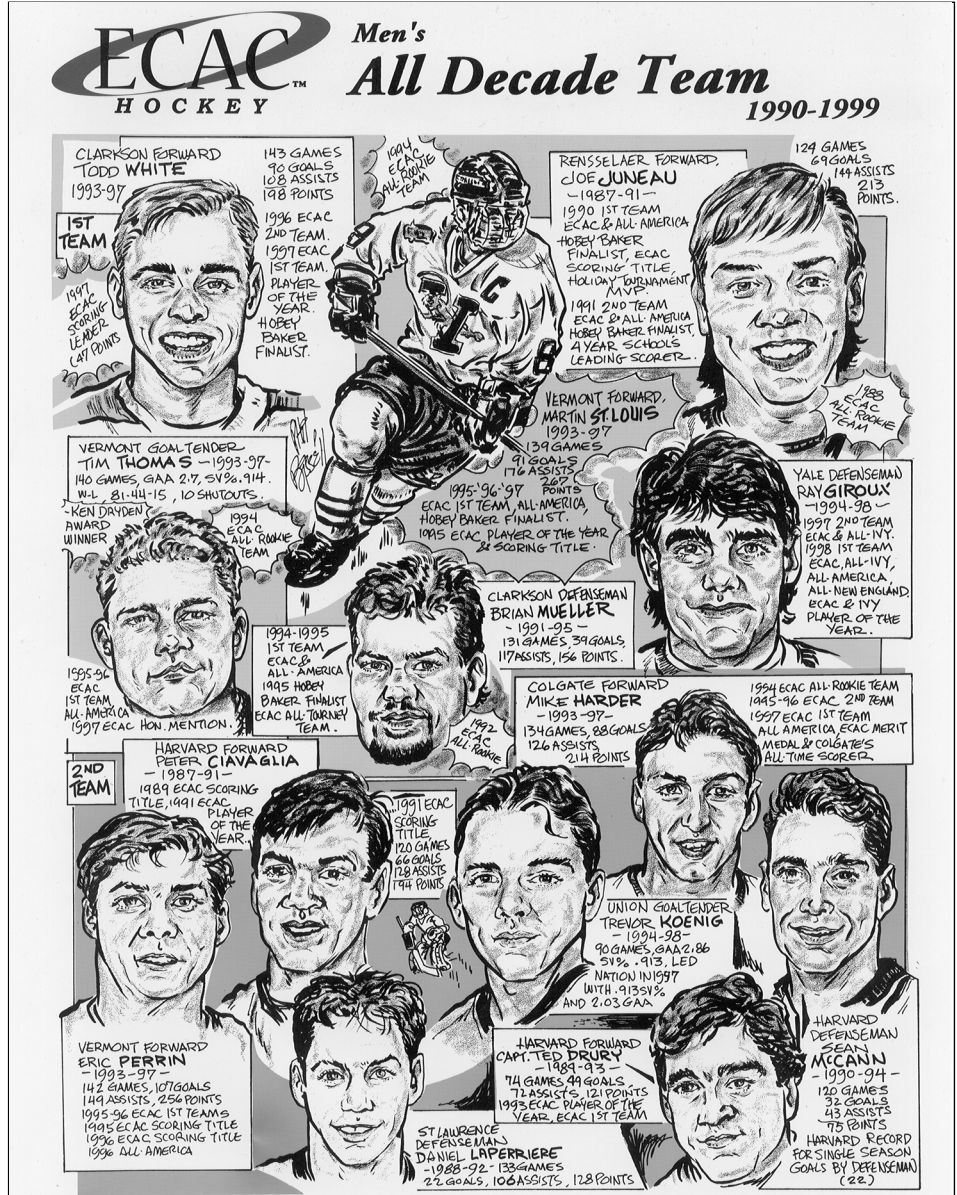
Brian Mueller, Clarkson, D (1991-95): Mueller was an All-Rookie selection in 1992. He went on to become an All-American and ECAC First-Team selection during his junior and senior seasons, and a Hobey Baker finalist (1995).

Tim Thomas, Vermont, G (1993-97): Was a two-time All-American and ECAC First-Team selection. Thomas was named to the ECAC All-Rookie team, and as a junior received the Ken Dryden Award, presented to the league's top goaltender.

SECOND TEAM

Eric Perrin, Vermont, F (1993-97): Perrin ended his career as the school's all-time leader in goals (107), while earning All-American status in 1996 and back-to-back ECAC First-Team honors (1995-1996). He won the 1995 league scoring title.

Peter Ciavaglia, Harvard, F (1987-91): Led the league in scoring in 1989 and 1991. Ciavaglia won the ECAC Player of the Year award his senior campaign, and helped lead Harvard to the NCAA Championship as a sophomore.



Ted Drury, Harvard, F (1989-93): As a senior, Drury led Harvard to the regular-season title and a berth in the NCAA tournament. He won ECAC Player of the Year and was a First-Team All-American and All-Conference pick.

Mike Harder, Colgate, F (1993-97): The leading scorer in Raiders history (214 points), Harder was a Second-Team All-American as a senior, as well as a First-Team All-Conference pick. He earned All-Rookie honors in 1994.

Dan Laperriere, St. Lawrence, D (1988-92): The 1992 ECAC Player of the Year

and first-team All-American, Laperriere led the Saints to the ECAC Championship his senior year, while being named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

Sean McCann, Harvard, D (1990-94): McCann holds the school season-record for goals by a defenseman (22). He helped Harvard to regular-season titles in 1992, 1993 and 1994, and the ECAC Championship his final year.

Trevor Koenig, Union, G (1994-98): In 1997, Koenig led the nation with a .913 save percentage and a 2.03 goals-against average. He became Union's first All-American, and guided the team to a Division I school-record 18 wins.

ALL-DECADE TEAM - 2000s

FIRST TEAM

Jeff Hamilton, Yale, F (1996-2001): The all-time Bulldogs scoring leader netted 80 goals and added 93 assists for 173 points in 127 games for the Elis. He was a two-time Hobey Baker Finalist and a three-time ECAC Hockey first-team selection.

Lee Stempniak, Dartmouth, F (2001-05): He was the Big Green's scoring leader for three consecutive seasons racking-up over 35 points each year. The former team captain was also the squad's MVP for three years in a row and was the league's top scorer in 2004-05.

T.J. Trevelyan, St. Lawrence, F (2002-06): Known as a prolific scorer during his time in Canton, the former Hockey Baker Finalist scored 78 goals and added 76 for 154 career points.

Doug Murray, Cornell, D (1999-2003): Murray was a two-time first-team All-America and two-time ECAC Hockey first team selection. The 2002 Hobey Baker Finalist played in 127 career games recorded 24 goals and adding 60 helpers.

Noah Welch, Harvard, D (2001-05): The former Crimson Captain played on two ECAC Hockey title-winning teams (2002 & 2004) and two ECAC Hockey runner-up squads (2003 & 2005). He registered 76 points on 23 goals and 53 assists in 129 career games.

Yann Danis, Brown, G (1999-2004): Danis was named 2004 ECAC Hockey Player of the Year. He set a single-season save percentage record (.948) during the 2003-04 season and established a career shutout mark for netminder with 13. He would go on to tie the Bears goaltender career win record (43).

SECOND TEAM

Andy McDonald, Colgate, F (1996-2000): A former league Player of the Year, McDonald accumulated 155 points on 67 goals and 88 assists in 137 games for the Raiders. He was also a 2000 All-American.

Dominic Moore, Harvard, F (1999-2003): Moore, a former Crimson captain, was selected as a first-team All-American in 2002-03 and ranks 11th all-time on Harvard's career point In 1999-2000, Dominic joined both older brothers on the Harvard Crimson ice hockey team, marking the first-ever brother trio in school history to play at the same time. list with 147.

Matt Moulson, Cornell, F (2002-06): Finished his career for the Big Red with 138 points on 71 goals and 67 assists. He was twice named to the NCAA Regional Tournament Team (2004 & 2005).

Drew Bagnall, St. Lawrence, D (2003-07): Bagnall was the league Player of the Year and named as the lone defensive finalist for the Hobey Baker Award in 2007. He finished his career in Canton with 72 points.

Reid Cashman, Quinnipiac, D (2003-07): Cashman was a three-time All-American for the Bobcats. He went on to set the program's career assist mark with 125. He finished in the top four in scoring in each of his four seasons for Quinnipiac.

Kent Huskins, Clarkson, D (1997-2001): A former Green and Gold stand-out, enjoyed a stellar 2001 campaign where he won the league's Best Defensive Defenseman Award along with being named an All-American and Hobey Baker Finalist.

David LeNeveu, Cornell, G (2001-03): Guided the Big Red to the Frozen Four in 2003 after topping the national polls all season. He set a Cornell record for shutouts in a season that year surpassing a mark set by legendary Ken Dryden.
