## THE 52 CALIFORNIA WINERIES YOU NEED TO VISIT IN 2018

"We're the most famous winery you've never heard of," Larkmead winemaker Dan Petroski likes to say. First established in 1895, this Calistoga winery has a long and rich history. Its wines were the first from Napa Valley to reach the East Coast post-Prohibition, thanks to famed wine importer Frank Schoonmaker and to the fact that the Larkmead property was on a railroad stop.

Now, more than 120 years into its existence, Larkmead is undergoing something of a transformation. "We've made a commitment to luxury," Petroski explains. A recently completed renovation of the facilities includes a brand-new winery whose tanks are fitted precisely to different vineyard blocks, and a gorgeous new building for seated tastings, with a semi-outdoor patio and an indoor, cellar-temperature chamber lined with Georgia O'Keefe-esque paintings by Larkmead owner Kate Solari-Baker.

Part of this transformation has meant an upward tick in price: Larkmead's highest-tier wine, The Lark, now exceeds \$350. That makes it inaccessible to most people, to be sure, though it's worth noting that the Larkmead wines provide a welcome departure, style-wise, from most other similarly priced bottles from Napa Valley. Collectors, take note.

WHATTOTRY: The Larkmead Cabernets are rustic, frequently herbal, not exactly polished or smooth; their power can feel aggressive. Each corresponds to different parcels from the vineyard: the Dr. Olmo is high-toned, intense, linear; the Solari is marked by cinnamon and sweet spice, with rough tannins; the Lark showing denser, darker fruit, met eventually by dried herb. Don't miss the Lillie either, a blend of Sauvignons blanc and musque that's floral and crisp, tasting of lemongrass.
