### About EMPath

Economic Mobility Pathways (EMPath) is a national nonprofit that dramatically improves the lives of people living in poverty. For nearly 200 years, we have helped families with low incomes in the Boston community and across the country reach and maintain economic independence.

Because creating economic opportunity is multifaceted, our approach is too. We offer a unique combination of:


- Providing direct services in several housing-based and other economic mobility programs in the Greater Boston area. At the core of our work is supporting families with our research-backed coaching approach Mobility Mentoring® to support families to climb the economic ladder.
- Convening a learning network of human services organizations called the Economic Mobility ExchangeTM that adapt our model in their own work. We help member organizations reach stronger outcomes for families and re-envision the systems that serve people experiencing poverty.
- Conducting research to inform and evolve our approach as well as advocacy for what we've seen
  to be effective.

This "virtuous circle" allows each part of our work to inform what we know, do, and share with others to seed systemic change.



- Seven Exchange members were interviewed for and helped to edit the What Works: Guaranteed Income paper presenting a scan of programming and early learnings within the network





### FY24 EXCHANGE HIGHLIGHTS & LEARNINGS

At EMPath, we are always working to provide our Exchange members with the very best support and strive to produce new usable knowledge for the field. Here is a recap of what we learned with members over the past year.

### REFLECTIONS FROM MEMBERS

### Challenges

In our member survey, members shared they experienced the most challenges in the following areas when implementing a Mobility Mentoring-informed approach:

- Data collection and analysis

### Successes

In the survey, members shared they experienced successes in the following areas when implementing a Mobility Mentoring-informed approach:

### Updates from our cohorts

We wrapped up our Youth & Young Parent cohort funded by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, a qualitative research project completed with seven Exchange members specifically designed to explore and highlight best practices in Mobility Mentoring coaching programs in the following areas: recruitment, engagement, and retention.

- Four areas of interest were explored:
  - The unique strengths of, and challenges faced by, young people experiencing poverty;
  - Important differences between parenting and non-parenting youth:
  - Recruitment and engagement strategies for young participants;
  - Implementation/adaption of EMPath's economic mobility coaching tools (the Bridge to Self-Sufficiency™ and Goal Action Plans)

### FY24 EXCHANGE HIGHLIGHTS & LEARNINGS

### ■ In-Person Collaboration

We were thrilled to have two opportunities to convene Exchange members this fiscal year at our Regional Learning Summit in Knoxville, TN and our Member Convening in Boston.

### Regional Learning Summit, "Transforming Together"

EMPath co-hosted a regional summit with <u>United Way of Greater Knoxville</u> last fall in Knoxville, TN. Attendees came together to learn how member organizations within the region are utilizing Mobility Mentoring to impact their communities through collective impact and strategic partnerships approaches. Sessions featured members' work, including:

- <u>United Way of Bartholomew County's</u> collective impact system focuses on capacity building amongst social services agencies who support families gaining self-sufficiency.
- <u>The Restoration House's</u> strategic partnerships and creative methods to help individuals and families tackle goals and find holistic health and healing.
- The United Way of Greater Knoxville's early learnings from their East Tennessee Collaborative via panel discussion with a program director, Mobility Mentor, participant, and evaluator.

EMPath's President and CEO, Kim Janey was the keynote speaker and former Mobility Mentoring participant and now Director of Social Services at <a href="YWCA of Knoxville">YWCA of Knoxville</a>, Amy Moden shared her experiences.

### Exchange Member Convening, "Disrupting Poverty"

We celebrated The Exchange's 10th anniversary at our recent Exchange Member Convening, right here in Boston!

In the two days leading up to our public Disrupting Poverty Conference, Exchange members from around the globe gathered to reflect on the progress and learnings from their work supporting families' economic mobility over the past decade. Our members responded to a call for workshop proposals and our inaugural Member Advisory Council served as the selection committee for approved workshops.

Over 250 members came from around the globe and engaged in two days of workshops and panel discussions. The Member Convening provided a dynamic learning and networking experience, and members left the convening energized, equipped with new insights and connections, and ready to tackle the challenges ahead with renewed vigor.

### DEEPER COLLABORATION WITH MEMBERS

As a member-based learning network, the Exchange greatly values and relies on feedback from member organizations to help EMPath create new products and offerings within the network, and to further evolve the Mobility Mentoring model. We are truly stronger as a result of our work together. To that end, we'd like to highlight the following two new initiatives that have contributed to deeper collaboration and learnings with member organizations.

### Member Advisory Council

Our inaugural Member Advisory Council (MAC) has completed its first term. The 10 MAC members represent a diverse cross section of our membership related to size, region, sectors and populations served, membership levels, and length of membership/implementation of the Mobility Mentoring® model.

10 members with representation from 8+ sectors and 9 states.






















MAC members contributed to the Exchange in a variety of ways, including:

- Serving as the selection committee for the Member Convening workshop proposals
- Providing recommendations for FY24 goals
- Prioritizing topics for monthly webinars
- Brainstorming strategies for increased member networking



The new MAC launched at the start of FY25 with eight new members and two returning members. They will explore how the MAC can invest and contribute to the future of the Exchange network.

### ■ NEW INITIATIVES

### Guaranteed Income (GI)

We saw a theme emerging amongst Exchange membership and around the country of guaranteed income initiatives, that is, initiatives that provide unrestricted direct recurring cash payments to a targeted group of individuals, typically based on need and equity. We wanted to explore existing program structures found within Exchange member programming and whether other program add-ons—such as Mobility Mentoring®—could accelerate and/or improve economic mobility for participants.

### Here's what we learned:

- Programs should always be designed with comprehensive input from the impacted communities.
  - As we found in our interviews with organizations implementing blended guaranteed income/coaching programs, people often requested individual coaching support to help strategize toward their goals.
- Be mindful of how cash disbursements may impact benefit eligibility; seek waivers prior to program launch if possible and counsel people on impact and strategies to mitigate cliff.
- Evaluation results of Exchange member GI programs indicate gains beyond income and financial outcomes to also include positive outcomes in stress reduction and increased quality time with family.

### Beyond the Cliff Coalition

EMPath is an advisor on the recently launched Beyond the Cliff Coalition. This Coalition, hosted by the Martha O'Bryan Center with financial support from the Kresge Foundation, is a first-of-its-kind national collaborative of nonprofits, state and local governments, and collaborative stakeholders focused on helping families achieve economic prosperity and specifically eliminating the benefits cliff. The benefits cliff describes the experience that millions of low-income families face when they increase earnings only to face an abrupt loss in public assistance which leaves them worse off financially.

- Exchange members that are part of the Coalition include: Episcopal Community Services of Philadelphia, Workforce Development Council of Seattle King County, and Onondaga County Department of Social Services
- Opportunities to engage, learnings, strategies, and best practices emerging from the Coalition will be shared back with the Exchange.

### ■ NEW INITIATIVES

### Subgroups

In response to member requests for additional networking opportunities, we have created sectorspecific subgroups as a nexus for collaboration, enabling practitioners to connect, share insights, and foster innovations.

Here are some highlights:

- The <u>Workforce Development subgroup</u> shared that collecting data about income and employment can make participants uncomfortable.
  - The group suggested reframing questions, such as, "Can you share how you are making ends meet and how we can support you in that?" instead of, "Tell me about your income."
- The <u>Residential Programs subgroup</u> discussed how people can request to have their rental history added to a credit score to help long-term renters with consistent payments and little credit history build up their scores
- The <u>Affordable Housing subgroup</u> reviewed lessons learned in building staff capacity at their respective agencies.
  - One challenge shared was around staff needing additional support with onboarding and training, especially with limited funds. A successful strategy to address this was by creating opportunities for peer support among staff with short activities to allow for reflection, like these subgroup calls!
- The <u>Higher Education subgroup</u> shared observations of how adult education is trending towards being more careercentered pathways and how their organizations are adapting to address this.

### LOOKING AHEAD TO FY25

EMPath has completed the update for the new Economic Mobility Bridge™! The process included revisiting research, reviewing Exchange members' adapted Bridges and feedback received over the years, piloting within EMPath programs, and gathering feedback from the Exchange's Member Advisory Council (MAC).

We provided a sneak peek of an early draft of the new Economic Mobility Bridge at the Exchange Member Convening in March 2024. We will unveil the Bridge during the October 2024 monthly webinar for the Exchange Network, and in early 2025 to the public. The Exchange will provide resources to support Exchange members to transition including a FAQ and an updated Bridge Conversation Guide


