- Sec. 3. Opioid antagonist rescue kit for law enforcement officers.
- (a) The Metropolitan Police Department ("Department") shall provide opioid antagonist rescue kits to sworn personnel, as defined in D.C. Code § 5-101.04(d)(2)(A) and require that sworn personnel carry the opioid antagonist rescue kits in accordance with agency policies and procedures so as to optimize sworn personnel's capacity to timely assist in the prevention of opioid overdoses.
 - (b) Sworn personnel who administer or provide an opioid antagonist in accordance with this section shall be immune from civil or criminal liability for the subsequent use of the opioid antagonist, unless the sworn personnel's actions or the actions with regard to the administration or provision of the opioid antagonist constitute recklessness, gross negligence, or intentional misconduct.

Sec. 4. Training of MPD officers

The Department shall provide training to officers in the administration of opioid agonists, including training to limit exposure to opioid antagonists.

Sec. 5. Voluntary surrender of opioids and drug paraphernalia

- (a) Section 5 (D.C. Official Code § 7–2507.05(a)) is amended by striking the phrase "abandons to the Chief any firearm, destructive device or ammunition" and inserting the phrase "abandons to the Chief any firearm, destructive device, ammunition, opiate, or drug paraphernalia" in its place.
 - (b) A new subsection (a-1) is added to read as follows:

"Any person or organization within the District that voluntarily and peaceably delivers and abandons to the Chief any opiate or drug paraphernalia, shall deliver and abandon the opiate or drug paraphernalia at a district station or district substation in a designated receptacle.
