

KEYNOTE SPEAKER: JARED ULMER, MPH, AICP

Hot & Stormy: Climate Change in VT: Health Impacts and Opportunities



Climate change is already affecting Vermonters' health. Vermonters are experiencing more dangerously hot days, storms and flooding, cyanobacteria blooms, tick-borne diseases, and other impacts; however, adaptation strategies can help reduce the consequences of these emerging threats. The good news is that acting now to reduce greenhouse gas emissions can help avoid the worst impacts of climate change and provide immediate health and equity benefits for Vermonters. Jared Ulmer has managed the Climate & Health Program at the Vermont Department of Health since 2015. In this role, he collaborates with state, local, and non-governmental partners to increase preparedness for climate-related health impacts in Vermont. He also works to promote health improvement through appropriate climate-change mitigation strategies. Prior to working at the Health Department, he worked for 10+ years in the private and academic sectors to support healthy community design through transportation and land use planning, tool development, and other guidance. He received education in engineering and urban planning at the University of Virginia, and in epidemiology at the University of Washington.

PLENARY SESSION: TIMOTHY WHITMAN, DO

Lord Have MRSA! Clinical Pearls for Antibiotic Selection for Your Sick Patient



In the era of increasing antibiotic resistance and newly emerging antimicrobials, clinicians need a primer on antibiotic selection. This session will review common infectious disease syndromes encountered in the outpatient setting, provide updates in antimicrobial resistance patterns in bacterial pathogens, and look at what is new in antibiotic drug development.

Dr. Whitman is originally from Dalton, Massachusetts. After graduating from Siena College, he attended New York College of Osteopathic Medicine on a Navy scholarship. He served 21 years in the Navy as an infectious disease physician until he recently accepted a position in the Infectious Disease division at the University of Vermont. His research interests include HIV, tropical medicine, and skin and soft tissue infection prevention. He is married, has three children, and enjoys spending time with his family in addition to fishing, hunting, and working in the garden.

Workshop A: Limps and Gimps: Examination of the hip and knee *Carol Blattspieler, NP (2.0/0.0)*

Want to increase your comfort with evaluating hips and knees? This session will review the basic anatomy of the hips and knees, discuss the basic exam of these joints as well as special tests for diagnosis, and provide time for hands on practice of these skills.

Workshop B: Chest Radiographs: From Anatomy to Pathology *Jill Esquivel, NP (2.0/0.0)*

During this session, participants will learn to identify anatomical landmarks, develop a consistent and thorough approach, and describe pathological findings found on chest x-ray. After content review, participants will be provided with chest x-rays to practice and refine their chest x-ray interpretation skills. Content will include concepts related to silhouette sign, atelectasis, pneumonia, COPD, heart failure, pneumothorax, and pleural effusion.

Workshop C: To ER or not to ER, that is the question: Common Complaints; When do you need a higher level of care? *Doug Fish, PA-C (2.0/0.5)*

This session will focus on the assessment and management of common acute complaints, from sore throats to chest and abdominal pain. The focus will be on what can be managed clinically in an office or urgent care and what needs to be transferred to a higher level of care.

Workshop D: Opioid Therapy and Other Pharmacologic Options for Chronic Pain *Mindy Wallace, CRNA (2.0/1.5)*

This presentation will cover pharmacologic therapy for chronic pain. Non-opioid therapies and evidence for opioid therapy will be reviewed. Different approaches to opioid therapy as well as available opioid formulations will be discussed. Finally, evaluation of patient response, ongoing monitoring, and therapy adjustment will be examined.

BREAKOUT SESSION A: 11AM-NOON

Breakout A1 - Before the Crash and Burn: Preoperative evaluations for best outcomes - *Kati Sloop, CRNA (1.0/0.0)*

Your patient is headed to the OR, learn how to complete an evidence based preoperative evaluation that will help prevent surgeries from being cancelled and lead to best outcomes.

Breakout A2 - Connection for Prevention: Assessing youth strengths and risk - *Michelle Shepard*, *MD* (1.0/0.0)

The annual adolescent well care visit (AWCV) is a critical time for clinicians to connect with youth to promote active involvement in their own healthcare. The AWCV is not just a "physical" or visit for sports participation clearance, it's an opportunity to screen for medical, emotional, and social risks and strengths and provide non-judgemental accurate information to adolescents about their health.

Breakout A3 - "Hot Flash": Perimenopause in 2019

Culturally, we think nothing of sitting our youth down to have 'the talk' on puberty and sex, but who is sitting down midlife women to have their version of 'the talk'? This presentation will promote healthy clinical environments for the midlife woman by exploring perimenopausal and menopausal transition patient education, as well as address treatment for the most common symptoms of perimenopause.

Breakout B1- Abdominal Pain: Evaluating for a Surgical Abdomen

The goal of this presentation is to give a methodical description of how to work up abdominal pain which can be very broad. The lecture aims to provide guidance on who to refer to a Gastroenterologist, General Surgeon or to the Emergency Department.

Breakout B2 - Life will never be the same: Mood, anxiety, and fostering well-being through pregnancy into post partum - Sandy Wood, CNM, PMHNP

Perinatal Mood and Anxiety Disorders are under-diagnosed and under- treated. These disorders are one of the leading complications related to childbearing and can have profound and lasting impact on the woman, the child, and the family. Front line providers of all types have a pivotal role in detection and treatment.

Breakout B3 - Shots now, Shots Later: The Immunization Update 2020 - Christine Finley, APRN, VDOH (1.0/0.50)

This session will address recent changes in immunization recommendations, describe vaccine preventable disease outbreaks and review current literature on addressing vaccine hesitancy.

BREAKOUT SESSION C: 2:30-3:30PM

Breakout C1 - The radically changing landscape of HIV: PrEPportunities - Dan Daltry, VT DOH, Callan Janowiec, APRN (1.0/0.67)

Through 2017-18 Vermont experienced multiple new HIV infections that were ultimately connected as a cluster. Through bio- medical interventions such as "treatment as prevention" and PrEP, the number of individuals impacted by HIV was minimized. Together we will explore the merits and applications of PrEP for high risk consumers.

Breakout C2 - Is it pink? Is it red? Or is it all in their head? Ocular conditions defined – *Dr. Laura Werner* (1.0/0.17)

You have a patient who comes in with eye symptoms. Is it conjunctivitis? A retinal detachment? Maybe even a concussion? Come learn how to deal with all these conditions and more!

Breakout C3 - Coming up for air: Integrating tried and true best practices for asthma management with innovative population health strategies

– Dr. Keith Robinson, Libby McDonald APRN (1.0/0.25)

This session will utilize case studies to review best practices for diagnosis and management of asthma. We will explore the genetic, environmental, and social risk factors associated with difficult to control asthma and poor outcomes. Participants will learn

about innovative population health and quality improvement initiatives and how to integrate these into the practice setting.

BREAKOUT SESSION D: 3:50-4:50PM

Breakout D1 - The Tell Tale Heart: Cardiac Testing for the PCP: A casebased approach - *Melissa Beaudry, NP* (1.0/0.25)

Cardiac Testing for the Primary Care Provider: A case-based approach will help primary care providers and other non-cardiology providers understand the wide range of emergent and non-emergent cardiac testing available as well as gaining an understanding of the current medication management for atrial fibrillation, heart failure and coronary artery disease. Utilizing a case based approach, providers will understand how to tailor cardiac testing based on individual patient characteristics in an effort to provide well coordinated care.

Breakout D2 - The Costs of Connection: Social Media and Teen Mental Health - Peter Jackson, MD (1.0/0.0)

Communication norms and social interconnection have changed more in the past two decades than ever before in history. This change has brought both profound opportunities for connectedness & community as well as challenges for the wellbeing of families and youth, including platforms for comparison & bullying, & some associations between types of use and mental health symptoms. Participants will improve their clinical efficacy in screening for & preventing emotionally detrimental use of social media.

Breakout D3 - Help, my patient is discharging!: Navigating the transition of respiratory care - *Kristin Wilson, RT, Rosalind Klezos, RRT (1.0/0.0)*

Making a smooth transition from the hospital to rehab & from rehab to home helps patients be successful and safe and it helps prevent readmission. Understanding the respiratory care they require is one of the many transitional challenges, in particular clarity regarding type of support & the plan of care for that support. This session will review the indications for various therapies, the qualifications for home use, & the appropriate settings to help your patients be successful at home.
