In yet another unanticipated short week, both the House and Senate accomplished very little this week as both chambers spent very little time on the floor and cut the week short due to weather and to allow members to attend celebrations for the Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs. Most activity that occurred this week was done in committees as the calendars to bring bills to the floor begin to fill up with numerous Republican caucus priorities. We expect to see some long days and nights ahead to make up for the short weeks thus far.

In the limited time that the House spent on the floor this week, they sent only one bill to the Senate (HB 1467 dealing with the public school pension system) and debated another four. Bills debated this week in the lower chamber included HB 1296 – a bill dealing with two-way communications in jails, HB 1521 – a bill to establish a police board for Capitol Police, HB 1934 – a bill modifying the pension system for public school teachers, and HB 1963 – a bill to enable the "Hyper Loop" high speed rail system that the governor has lauded for a couple of years.

On the Senate side, the bill that was filibustered by Democrats last week to put the legislative redistricting issue back on the ballot for voters was passed after about 3 hours of debate this week. This measure was the only bill to see floor time in the Senate with the exception of SB 528 (a bill to transfer excess foundation formula funds to the school transportation fund ) and SB 599 (a bill increasing limits to linked deposits). Both SB 528 and SB 599 weren't debated but were instead brought up for the last vote to send it to the House.

The bulk of the legislating this week was accomplished in House and Senate committees on Monday afternoon and Tuesday. Budget committees continue to hear

presentations from departments and most standing committees are actively hearing a full slate of bills for their respective issues. From a health care perspective in committee, very little was done this week. The Health and Mental Health Policy committee passed HB 1486 out of committee 16-0. This bill exempts health care entities registered with the Department of Health from a crime for distributing hypodermic needles. It is part of Rep. Holly Rehder's efforts to help combat the spread of disease from intravenous drug use in addition to her continued efforts to establish a PDMP.

In Senate committees this week, the Senate Veterans & Military Affairs committee passed SB 673 sponsored by Sen. Justin Brown which establishes license reciprocity for military spouses much like a number of other House and Senate bills that have been moving this year do. The measure is designed to increase workforce opportunities for skilled professions as well as encourage settlement in Missouri.

The big news of the week specific to APRN's was the filing of SB 965, the Access Improvement for Missourians bill. The bill, filed by Sen. Cindy O'Laughlin, is a product of months of collaborative work between NP leaders throughout Missouri representing a variety of different backgrounds, educational disciplines, and organizations. It is an extraordinarily comprehensive piece of legislation that encompasses a wide range of issues including independent practice after the first six months post-graduation with a APRN or physician, a complete removal of all existing barriers, and the ability for APRN's to practice to their level of education and training. Specifically, the provisions contained within SB 965 are as follows:

- Creates a path to independent practice after a 6-month collaboration period with an APRN or physician
- Expands the range of prescriptive authority to schedules 2 5
- Adds APRN services to the list of covered services under MO HealthNet
- Removes requirement for APRN's to be under a collaborative practice arrangement to prescribe buprenorphine
- Removes the requirement for unnecessary information to be included in the collaborative practice arrangement
- Removes the requirement to practice within 75 miles of the collaborating physician
- Removes the requirement for chart reviews
- Nullifies any previously adopted joint rules between the Board of Healing Arts and the Board of Nursing
- Requires the Board of Healing Arts to make the collaborative practice arrangements that they are engaged in public
- Removes the cap on number of NP's/PA's/AP's a physician may collaborate with
- Establishes a license for APRN's
- Defines the scope of practice for APRN's
- Defines the Board of Nursing's rulemaking authority
- Permits renewing RN/APRN license at the same time
- Adds APRN into the pharmacy laws
- Permits APRN's to order restraints for mental health issues

This bill is the highest legislative priority for AMNP and we will be actively seeking adoption of the measure. In addition to our lobbying team, we will be asking our members to engage and help move the bill. Additionally, we will be seeking written and oral testimony when the bill is slated for a hearing. Please consider drafting your thoughts as to why this bill is critical for Missourians.

In other APRN news, Rep Dean Plocher filed HB 2382 this week that restricts the ability of APRN's and other doctorally prepared individuals from utilizing their academic title. More importantly, the bill currently includes prohibitions to certain types of "surgical" procedures that are routinely performed by NP's such as biopsies, excisions, and other routine office practices. This bill is nearly identical to SB 942 that was filed in the Senate a couple of weeks ago. We will be actively opposing these bills.
