Nearly 2.7 million New Yorkers under 65 years old are uninsured according to Washington, DC-based Urban Institute (UI). As part of President Obama's comprehensive health reform (The Affordable Care Act), New Yorkers have been enrolling for health insurance through the Marketplace since October 1, 2013, and UI anticipates that over 1 million New Yorkers will get health insurance through the exchange. In 2014 individuals with pre-existing conditions can no longer be denied coverage. There is a lot of work to do for us as NPs.

Two NPs Share 1st Nurse Practitioner of Distinction Award

In 1980, when Helen Ruddy graduated from the Pace University FNP program, Nurse Practitioners (NPs) in New York had no official recognition or prescriptive privileges. "We were providing care without statutory/legal authority," says Helen, "like "skating on thin ice."

At that time NPs began to organize and lobby the State Legislature to revise the Nurse Practice Act to recognize the NP role. Helen attended early meetings in the Bellevue Hospital basement where Elaine Gelman—whom Helen calls "her hero and mentor"—spearheaded the NYC movement.

Finally in 1988 the Nurse Practice Act in NY was amended, making NPs legal with prescriptive privileges for all classes of drugs. However, the job was far from done. As Helen puts it, "If you're not at the table, you may be on the menu." NPs still needed a place at the table.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR YOUNG NPS

From 1980 until 2000, as a member of the NYS Coalition of Nurse Practitioners (NYSCONP), Helen served on the legislative committee at the local and state level. Continuing her involve-

s a new NP, Irene Van Slyke participated in the founding of NPNY. She was attracted by the organization's "dedication to affordable quality health care for all, democratic structure and commitment to diversity"—the same mind set that inspired nurses during the 1960s to work together with MDs to provide primary care in underserved areas in school and community based clinics. This stimulus, she adds, is what spurred the development of the NP profession.

KNOWLEDGEABLE ABOUT THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS

Even before **NPNY** came into being, Irene helped organize a lobby trip to Albany in 1997. Knowledgeable about the legislative process after working 12 years as an aide to State Senator Velmanette Montgomery (a staunch supporter of NPs), Irene believes "educating legislators in Albany and Washington to what NPs do is an integral part of being a professional." In 2014, **NPNY** will be celebrating its 14th annual lobby trip to Albany, and Irene will be there.

Since **NPNY**'s inception Irene has been part of the legislative committee charged with researching issues and pending bills.

Helen Ruddy, continues from page 1 ment in legislative and policy issues, Helen helped initiate and organize NPNY's annual Lobby Day, which serves as a forum to promote our Nurse Practitioner agenda in Albany, while providing opportunity for students and NPs to learn about the legislative process.

A FUTURE INVESTMENT

Helen served on the Board of Physicians for a National Health Program the decade prior to passage of the Affordable Care Act. She provided scholarships for young NPs to attend the American College of Nurse Practitioners Annual Policy Summit in Washington, DC.

Helen has consistently precepted NP students. She provides both a clinical and political experience. In recent years, Helen has been giving all her students an **NPNY** membership, calling it "a very good investment in the future."

Some of the **NPNY** legislative successes that she feels deserve recognition include the organization's key support (r) for reforming the Rockefeller Drug Laws (to treat drug addiction as a disease rather than a crime); (2) for "opting out" of consent for HIV testing (the paperwork was a deterrent to getting tested); and (3) for allowing NPs to sign death certificates.

Over the years, Irene has served as president and treasurer of **NPNY**. Her wish now is "to see legislators drop the mandate that NPs must engage a collaborating physician!"
