AM1 Fundamentals of Reading the 12-Lead EKG

Suzy Meader, MN, ARNP, ACNP, CCRN-CSC

This workshop presents the fundamentals of dissecting the 12-lead EKG. Focus is on changes in various waves and segments that identify axis, atrial and ventricular hypertrophy, bundle branch blocks and ventricular ectopy. Content includes patterns of ischemia, injury and infarction, strips of WPW, pericarditis, hyperkalemia and a systematic approach to analyzing a 12lead EKG with practice strips.
