Our posture in apologetics



Prepared

Know the truth so you can give a reason for your hope.



Gentle

Respond with kindness, not arrogance.



Respectful

Listen well and honor others, even when we disagree.



Christ-centered

Keep the gospel at the heart of every conversation.



**We are not trying to win arguments.
We are trying to point people to Christ.**

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THREE GOOD QUESTIONS

Start here in the conversation



1.

What do you mean by that?



2.

What makes you think that?



3.

How does that account for the evidence?



A good question often opens more doors than a quick answer.



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COMPETING CLAIMS NEED REASONS TOO

Understanding the burden of proof



When someone says...	Ask...
The Bible has been changed.	What makes you think that?
Jesus never rose.	What evidence leads you to that?
All truth is relative.	Is that absolutely true?
God cannot exist because evil exists.	How are you defining evil?



A possible explanation is not automatically a probable explanation.

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SCENARIO 1: TRUTH AND WORLDVIEW

That's true for you

“ I’m glad Christianity works for you,
but you should not act like it is true
for everybody. ”



Clarify the claim

What exactly are they saying?



Distinguish preference from reality

Preferences are valid.
Truth is about reality.



Move toward Jesus' resurrection as a reality claim

It is not just inspiring—
it is historically grounded.



*Do you mean people should be free to believe differently,
or that contradictory claims can both actually be true?*



Christianity is not merely a preference. It makes claims about reality.



John 14:6 • John 18:37–38

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SCENARIO 2: EVIL AND SUFFERING

How could God allow this?



“I cannot believe in a
God who allows suffering like this.”



Start with
compassion



Do not answer
grief like a debate



Listen before
explaining



Point to the cross
and final restoration

SUGGESTED FIRST RESPONSE



I'm sorry. Would you be willing to tell me more about what happened?



KEY TRUTH: Christianity does not explain suffering away. It meets it at the cross and answers it with hope.



Romans 8:18–25 • Revelation 21:1–5

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SCENARIO 3: THE RESURRECTION

The disciples made it up



“ The resurrection is just a story the disciples came up with after Jesus died. ”



Ask for evidence



Use the Five T's



Keep it brief



Trial • Tree • Tomb • Third Day • Testimony



What explanation accounts for all five better than the resurrection?

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1 Corinthians 15:3–8 • Acts 2:32

Do not chase every issue at once. Find the real barrier.

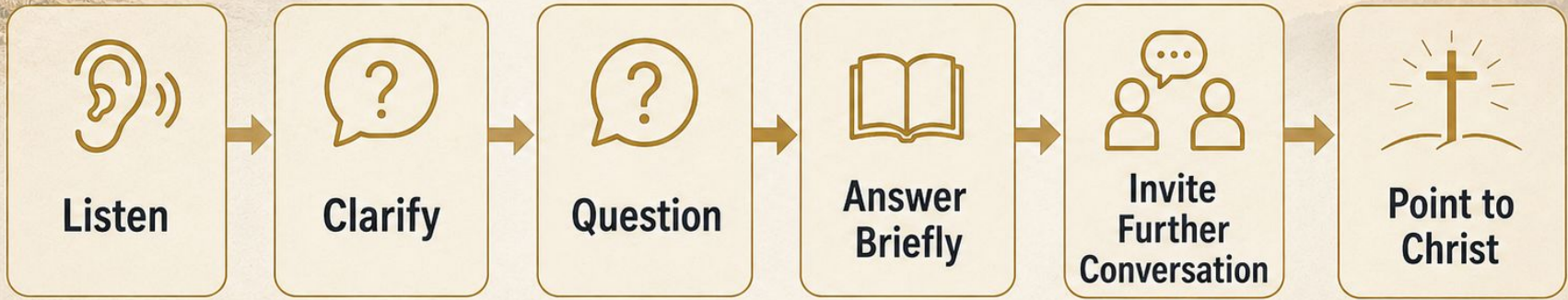
