aybe it was the call. The one that changed Vicki's life came as she nursed her three month-old baby boy. For Shannon, the phone rang at 3:30 p.m. as she worked at home. For Bonnie, hearing her brother's voice on the line – "I have cancer" – jolted her.

Or maybe it was other lifechanging moments — of hearing your doctor say "I really can't believe it myself, you have breast cancer," of telling your preschoolers "mommy has to go see the doctor," of scheduling gym time at 6 a.m., so you can make it to radiation at 7 – but mere seconds are crystal clear to them now.
