

irsten Dunst doesn't usually do breakfast. That's not to say she isn't a fan, just that setting the alarm for an early-morning date isn't the most appealing prospect, "I don't want to

be confronted by people before I've taken a shower or gone to the loo," she explains, altogether reasonably over a cranberry juice at the Aeirloom Bakery, a quiet upmarket cafe in Toluca Lake, LA, where she lives. We're thankful then that today, Dunst has broken her routine to meet Stylist for breakfast in a favourite low-key spot. "I come here for brunch with my boyfriend They don't have mimosas, though! at Notre Dame to playing one in Bring It On, a teen classic which celebrated its 15th anniversary two days before our meeting. Kirsten is excited about the milestone. "I can't believe I was in a movie that's organising a reunion photoshoot!"

From starring as Mary Jane opposite Tobey Maguire's Peter Parker in director Sam Raimi's Spider-Man franchise ("a huge deal") to her proudest moment in Danish film-maker Lars von Trier's Melancholia, Dunst has always carved out a diverse on-screen career. Her partnership with Sofia Coppola on The Virgin Suicides and period piece Marie Antoinette proved that the two women made a successful Hollywood pairing. Dunst confirms she and Coppola have discussed working together again. "Of course!" she says. "Sofia feels like home."

"I choose movies like a kid would: what's fun?" she says. "Also I say 'no' a lot." She baulks when asked to recall some examples. "I hate when actors do that in interviews." She adopts a mocking 'jock' voice. "'Dude, I totally turned this down...' OK, no-one cares! You sound like a [mouths the word 'dick'] Ha! I made mistakes, put it that way. Sometimes you read a script and it's a pile of s\*\*\*, it's bad." Her care with the way she words things leaves me wondering why Dunst is so intensely polite. She rarely swears. It's probably a remnant of child actor training, or perhaps she's conscious of her mother so nearby, though she insists her upbringing never left GIRL NEXT DOOR: DUNS her pressurised to act like America's sweetheart. She SHE SAYS SHE'S JUST was just "a good girl".

"I just love them, especially Dakota, she's so cool."

#### **SWITCHING ROLES**

After Fargo, Dunst will be seen in a small sci-fi film called Midnight Special, which co-stars Adam Driver and Joel Edgerton, She can't say anything about her next project, Woodshock, directed by the Rodarte sisters. Kate and Laura Mulleavy. But she has just started directing a feature-length film of her own, "It might happen next year," she says of her mysterious literary adaptation, which for now is staying under wraps. "It's hard, it's such a famous book for women. I can't say what it is. If I heard it was being made, I'd say, 'That should never be made into a movie!" Did the On The Road project spark this? "Why would you think it's period? Wahaha! We'll see."

She quickly changes the subject. "I like coming to work and not being the one in hair and make-up. I wanna do the other side of it I need to. I've been acting for so long now and sometimes you get frustrated. I'm giving all this to someone else who gets to decide what to do with it. It's my turn. But I'm also scared because it's hard to make a good movie, and I'm very hard on myself."

Yet it's not work that keeps Dunst awake at night. "I think about having children. I hope that's easy for me. That's the stuff I worry about. Health. Am I dying?! I'm like a Jewish mother." In 2008. Dunst checked herself into rehab in Utah to deal with depression. Mental health issues in Hollywood remain taboo. I ask her if it's hard to maintain privacy in her life but also whether she feels able to voice concerns relevant to her own experience? "I know what you mean. I feel like I can be open without giving away everything. I do have a boundary – limitations just to

protect myself because people do really inconsiderate things with information."

She brings up the recent Amy Winehouse documentary, Amy. "That poor girl. It's scary what that level of fame can do. I feel like I can live a very under-the-radar life here in the Valley."

Unsurprisingly, Kirsten has no interest in ever leaving low-key Toluca Lake. It's a rare part of LA, far removed from the red-carpet world of nearby Hollywood. And it's so chilled that it even draws the reluctant Dunst out to brekkie. "We're not

in West Hollywood where everyone is on their frickin' cellphone taking pictures," she says. IS ONE OF THE FEW STARS "Everyone in the Valley is normal style. It's not super-cool here. I got dressed up for you, but I usually wear my pyjamas and no-one cares."
