Major Designer Moves

Some of the world's biggest fashion houses played musical chairs with their designers in 2012. The house of Dior finally found a successor to John Galliano—who was fired after being caught making uncouth comments in a Paris cafe—in Raf Simons. Jil Sander herself, who came out of retirement to reclaim the role, then filled the opening at Jil Sander. Both designers' debuts were warmly greeted while Hedi Slimane's takeover of Yves Saint Laurent from Stefano Pilati—including a retro-branding of the ready-to-wear line as Saint Laurent Paris—has been more controversial. Pilati has unsurprisingly landed on his feet as head designer at Zegna.

Claire Distenfeld opens FiveStory

New York has finally found its answer to Paris's Colette courtesy of 26-year-old Claire Distenfeld. The daughter of exotic skins importer Fred Distenfeld opened a concept store in April at 18 East 68th Street that brings together impeccably curated and unexpected selections of womenswear, menswear, kids, jewelry, shoes, accessories, art and home goods in a multi-story space designed by Ryan Korbon. The opening was attended by fashion world heavyweights including Natalie Joos, Miroslava Duma, Annabelle Dexter-Jones, Stephanie LaCava and Lisa Perry boding well for the growth of a chic clientele.



Aerin Lauder launches Aerin LLC

Beauty heiress Aerin Lauder once again proves she's far more than just a pretty face by launching a her own global luxury line in addition to her role as style and image director for the family business Estee Lauder. The Aerin Essentials beauty line hit store in August, and tabletop and home objects will be available in time for the holidays while a slew of offerings will roll out in Spring 2013 including footwear, furniture, fabric and area rugs.

Lauren Santo Domingo and Aslaug Magnúsdóttir's Moda Operandi Raises S36 million

These two fashion moguls raised a hefty \$36 million Series C round of financing for their online retail site, Moda Operandi, which offers shoppers the ability to pre-order clothes and accessories long before they are available in stores and often straight from the runway. RRE Ventures led the round this past June along with several strategic investors such as IMG and LVMH along with the participation of previous investors New Enterprise Associates, New Atlantic Ventures and Condé Nast. The influx of cash has been used to make a number of high profile hires including Marie Claire's Taylor Tomasi Hill as Artistic Director, Neiman Marcus's Roopal Patel as Fashion Director and Net-a-Porter's Ashley Morgan as Chief Marketing Officer—who happens to be sister to Lucky Magazine's Alexis Bryan Morgan and daughter of longtime Anna Wintour beau Shelby Morgan.

The renowned designer created 16 costume designs for a ballet set to selections from Tchaikovsky's "Eugene Onegin" and for pieces set to music by Duke Ellington, Fred Astaire, Max Richter and Dinah Washington, The designer's star power drew a diverse group of bold-faced names to the ballet's fall opening from fashion, society and Hollywood including: Barry Diller, Barbara Walters, Dianne von Furstenberg, Tory Burch, Eugenie Niarchos, Chado Ralph Rucci, Martha Stewart, Sarah Jessica Parker, Zani Gugelmann, David & Julia Koch, Elettra Wiedemann, Jamie Tisch and many more.
