Among the first cities in the world to embrace the outdoor cinema trend over a century ago, Athens is the proud home of *Cine Paris*. Built at the heart of the city's most picturesque neighborhood, Plaka, right at the foot of the Acropolis, this is a jewel of a cinema

Watching a movie on Cine Paris' open-air terrace is an unforgettable experience. From the building's roof garden, you are in the perfect spot to watch the sun set over the Acropolis.

Then sit back and spend the next couple of hours in the company of your favorite movie stars.

Little is known about Cine Paris' glorious past, as historical traces seem to have been lost in the mists of time.

According to legend, the cinema started as a plain, gravel-covered yard back in

the 1920s. Bought by a Greek

hairdresser who spent years

living in Paris, it was named Paris after the owner's adopted city. Other sources, however, place the cinema's official opening in 1938 and cite the businessman K. Joannides as its

first real owner. **A GREAT** It wasn't before the **MANY PUBS** 1960s, the golden era of cinemas, that **ARE RIGHT AT** the second floor YOUR FEET, was built. This was a WAITING significant addition to **TO TAKE** the initial construction **YOU INTO** and gave Cine Paris THE SMALL a new identity. When **HOURS** cinemas in Greece

Panos Family and has been operating as an open-air cinema again ever since.

Cine Paris projects films solely in English and subtitled in Greek. No wonder that 80 percent of its visitors are foreigners. From early May until mid-October, cinema goers are in for a treat, as the variety of films projected here can range from old classics right to the latest American blockbuster movie. If the bar with its rich choice of whiskies is not excuse enough to sip a drink in the shadow of the Parthenon, then there are a great many pubs and restaurants right at your feet, waiting to take you into the small hours.

Cine Paris hosts a quality poster shop with an interesting

variety of photo stills, providing a nostalgic trip down memory lane for true cinephiles. Right among the laminated posters and the vintage photo stills, you will also find a little piece of cinema history; a coalfired Cinemeccanica movie projector from the 1940s. However, perhaps Cine Paris' real heart and soul is its young projectionist. A local from the Plaka district, the now 18-year old Giorgos Pastris is the Greek version of Cinema Paradiso's Toto. Trained by the current owner to project films at the tender age of 11, this young man seems to have jumped straight out of a Tornatore movie. BO
