arm up on chilly days with lush, plant-filled spaces. On Capitol Hill, **Volunteer Park Conservatory** (1400 E Galer St; volunteer parkconservatory.org) was built in 1912 for rest and relaxation inside a popular park. Its plants live in five themed rooms so you can prioritize your visit, whether you're feeling

the dramatic tropical flowers of the bromeliad room or craving the dry heat of the cactus room. Check the online calendar for special tours and events, and keep an eye out for sago palm and jade trees more than 75 years old.

The futuristic orbs of the **Seattle Spheres** (2111 Seventh Ave; seattle spheres.com) in South Lake Union house more than 40,000 plants in a highaltitude rainforest environment. The massive greenhouse is primarily a work space for Amazon employees, but you can visit by reservation during open houses held two Saturdays a month. And the bottom-floor Understory is fully open to the public, telling the spheres' tale through interactive exhibits.

No Seattle plant shop embraces the winter quite like **Swansons Nursery** (9701 15th Ave NW; swansonsnursery.com). Starting Nov 9, much of its outdoor space in Ballard transforms for the Reindeer Festival: While locals choose their perfect trees, you can pet reindeer, pose for a photo with Santa, marvel at a model train village, and shop handmade jewelry. You can also warm up with pastry baskets, omelets, and fried chicken sandwiches at **Barn & Field** (9701 15th Ave NW; barnandfield.com), a family-owned restaurant in Swansons's conservatory. It sits beside a koi pond under a lush canopy of palm, banana, and fig trees for full tropical effect. —*Sarah Anne Lloyd*

"At Pike Place Market, visit **Eighth Generation** (93 Pike St, Ste 103; eighthgeneration .com) for blankets and more designed by Native artists. **Ventures Marketplace** (1501 Pike Pl, Ste 521; venturesnonprofit.org) is an eclectic shop with jewelry, housewares, and more crafts by local entrepreneurs. And sample ethically sourced bean-to-bar treats made on-site at **indi chocolate** (*1901 Western Ave, Ste D; indichocolate.com). Find fabulous frocks at Belltown's **Sassafras** (2307 First Ave; sassafras-seattle.com)

and Pioneer Square's **Velouria** (145 S King St; shopvelouria.com), or visit **The Cura Co.** (2407 E Union St, Ste D; thecuraco .com) in the Central District for well-curated "beyond Fair Trade" apparel and accessories. Stop by Asian-influenced hapa shop **Momo** (600 S Jackson St; momoseattle.com) in the International District, then take light rail to Beacon Hill and pick up a good read at social justice-focused bookstore **Estelita's Library** (2533 16th Ave S; estelitaslibrary.com)."
