

An Unsolved Mystery - The Voynich Manuscript

To begin with this article, let me give you a brief account of what the Voynich Manuscript is. The Voynich Manuscript is said to be written in the 15th century and is composed of drawings, illustrations and handwritten text in an unknown language. It is named by Wilfrid Voynich, a Polish book dealer who purchased it in 1912. The reason why the Voynich Manuscript is so known is that no one can solve it.
