## **COLORADO**

**Hotel Jerome, Auberge Resorts** Collection, has a custom Lexus LX, with bike racks and fishing-rod carriers, for sporting excursions to the Elk Mountains or the banks of the Roaring Fork River. Doubles from \$1,250; driving from \$675 per person.



Not far from the hairpin bends of Furka Passmade famous in the James Bond film Goldfingerthe Chedi Andermatt lends guests an iconic Morgan 4/4 roadster for pulse-quickening drives. Doubles from \$1,200; driving \$520.



### **ROME**

Adrenaline seekers staying at the **Hotel** Eden can arrange for a day in the Lazio countryside, driving a Ferrari F8 Spider through switchbacks on Mount Terminillo before tucking in to a picnic of foccacia and porchetta packed by the hotel's chefs. Doubles from \$1,783; driving from \$5,159.

## **ORLANDO**

**TUSCANY** A 16th-century stone farmhouse turned eight-bedroom estate, Villa Ardore has a vintage Fiat 500 on hand for

picturesque forays to area markets and

wineries. Villa from

Guests who book Club-level accommodations at the Ritz-Carlton, **Grande Lakes** get free access to a fleet of supercars managed by the high-end rental agency Corsa HQ. Among the options are coupes from Lamborghini and McLaren and sedans from Rolls-Royce. Club doubles from \$1,299.



## **BEVERLY** HILLS

As the home of the Golden Globes, the **Beverly Hilton** leans in to cinematic nostalgia with access to a wide selection of 'intage rides—including a 1969 Ford Torino GT convertible and a 1958 Austin-Healey 100-6. Doubles from \$495; driving from \$1,000.

#### **ATLANTA**

The Porsche Icon Suite at the Nobu Hotel is filled with automotive décor, and the property can arrange visits to the city's Porsche Experience Center, where guests can rent a 911 Carrera S. Doubles from \$230; driving \$720 per person.



#### OR LEAVE THE DRIVING TO THE EXPERTS

Classic cars are a passion point for the Aonzo family, which runs the Hotel Poseidon Positano, on Italy's Amalfi Coast. Many guests inquire about the owners' mint-condition 1971 Volkswagen Beetle convertible, but beg off driving when they learn it's a stick shift. "Even I can't drive it!" says Liliana Mascolo, a thirdgeneration hotelier. Enter her sister, Margherita, who happily takes guests on half-day driving tours down the twisty seaside lanes to her favorite shops, gelaterie, and limoncello makers.
