Louis "Louie HaHa" Attanasio Jr.


Ciro "The Artichoke King" Terranova

Luigi "Baby Shacks" Manocchio




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Rhode Island's Providence Journal referred to this New England crime boss as "Baby Shanks" for years, having misunderstood "Baby


Joseph "Joe Bananas" Bonanno


John "The Teflon Don" Gotti



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Known for his flashy style and charisma, Gotti had that "catch me if you can" personality the working class loved - he became a bit of a hero as head of the Gambino family. He earned his nickname for winning three back-to-back trials in the 1980s, but finally went to the slammer for good in 1992.

Venero "Benny Eggs" Mangano




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He served as a decorated tail gunner in WWII, but later fell in with the Genovese crime family and served 13 years for extortion and conspiracy. But his nickname was ever so innocent: his mother ran a shop selling eggs years before.


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Philip "Chicken Man" Testa

Vincent "The Oddfather" Gigante



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This boss of the Genovese family for about 25 years was also called "The Chin" for fairly obvious reasons. But he earned his other nickname because he'd wander the streets of Greenwich Village, disheveled in a bathrobe, often with a caretaker. Later he admitted it was a ruse to deter prosecution.

Jake "Greasy Thumb" Guzik
