

THE MOTORING TOURIST IN ITALY - 1966

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED: for the driver: Your U.S. Driver's License is sufficient authorization for operating a non-commercial vehicle in Italy. If you rent a vehicle bearing Italian license plates, you need a translation of the license which must be verified by a local consular office in the United States.

for the automobile: The "Tessera Turistica", or tourist card, and a red triangular sticker, to be attached to the windshield, are issued free-of-charge to the motorist upon entry into Italy, at frontier crossings, at posts of entry, or at local offices of the Italian Automobile Club (A.C.I.) upon delivery of a purchased car to its owner. This Tessera Turistica identified the vehicle as a tourist's automobile. It entitles the operator to certain privileges and eliminates the necessity of the International Carnet or triptych formerly required in Italy. The red triangular sticker must be turned over at the border when leaving the country.

GASOLINE COUPONS: One of the advantages offered to the foreign motorists visiting Italy in a foreign-licensed car, is a reduced rate on the price of gasoline, available through the purchase of gasoline coupons. These provide a discount of approximately 30%, bringing the price of gasoline per U.S. gallon to about 46¢ for regular and 52¢ for super. The coupons are obtainable at A.C.I. offices throughout the country, upon presentation of the Tessera Turistica, and may be purchased at ENIT delegations or those banks and organizations so authorized to sell them in other European countries. Refund of unused coupons is made by ENIT and/or ACI offices at places or ports of exit from Italy. NOTE: Gasoline is not rationed in Italy and these coupons are designed primarily as a benefit to the tourist. Only tourists driving a foreign-registered vehicle are entitled to the purchase of these coupons; therefore, the discount is not available to those driving a car which is circulating on an Italian license, or, in other words, a rented automobile.

ROADS: There are good, major roads between most principal cities and resorts in Italy, maintained in excellent repair, but except for the Autostrade (toll highways), they are mostly 2 or 3 lane roads, rather unsuited for large, American type cars. In the North, the Simplon Pass (into Switzerland), the Brenner Pass (into Austria), and the Maloja Pass (through the Lake District into Switzerland) and the Mendola Pass are open the year round. It is advisable to consult a local authority as to the condition of other mountain passes before continuing a trip, particularly in the months of November through March.

GENERAL INFORMATION: Throughout Italy there are motels similar to the American variety as well as hotels and pensions where the tourist may stop without making reservations in advance. Along the way, accommodations may be reserved with the assistance of any authorized travel agency. Confirmed reservations are strongly advised in the principal cities and in specific areas at the time of fairs, festivals or other special events.

Motoring information is available at all offices of the A.C.I. and also the Touring Club Italiano (T.C.I.) which offers a special membership to foreign motorists at a small fee. Useful motoring maps and guide books are published by the T.C.I. and are available for purchase through the European Publishers Representative, 132 West 43rd Street, New York, New York. Assistance and information is readily available at all ENIT offices and at the local tourist department offices (EPT) throughout Italy.

## Passport Regulations

U.S. and Canadian citizens holding a valid passport do not require a visa, provided they do not expect to stay in Italy more than 90 days and do not expect to work there. In all other cases, a visa can be obtained free from Italian Consulates in the United States. Those who, after entering Italy, find that they would like to stay over 90 days, can apply for a permit for an additional stay of 90 days which as a rule is granted immediately.

## Registration by Tourists

Registration with the police is required within three days of entering Italy. For those staying at a hotel, the management will attend to the formality. If the visitor stays with friends or in a private home, he must register in person at the nearest police station within the three-day period.

## Customs Regulations

Luggage is examined on leaving and entering Italy. Free entry is allowed for personal effects. This category includes clothing (new and used), books, camping and household equipment, fishing tackle, sporting gun and 200 cartridges, a pair of skis, two tennis rackets, portable typewriter, record player with ten records, a tape recorder or dictaphone, baby carriage, one ordinary hand camera with 2 rolls of film, 1 movie camera with 2 rolls of film, binoculars, personal jewelry, portable radio set (subject to a small license fee), 400 cigarettes (two cartons) or a quantity of cigars or pipe tobacco not exceeding 500 grams (1.1 pounds) are allowed for personal use of traveler.

A maximum of two bottles of alcoholic beverages per person can be brought in duty-free. The bottles must be opened. A maximum of 4.4 pounds of coffee, 6.6 pounds of sugar and 2.2 pounds of cocoa are allowed duty-free. Specifically, overseas tourists arriving in Italy, after having visited other countries, will be allowed to carry with them, without any special formality except a verbal declaration, travel souvenirs purchased in said countries up to a total lire value equivalent to \$500, including fine perfumes up to half a liter.

## Baggage in Transit

Baggage in transit through Italy, even if not in bond, can be exempted from customs examinations. The owner must prove, however, that he is a bona fide transit passenger.

## Exports from Italy

No restrictions for gifts purchased in Italy except for antiques and works of art. These cannot be exported without the authority of the Italian Government Fine Arts Commission (*Belle Arti*).

## U.S. Regulations on Merchandise Purchased Abroad

Tourists can bring back to the U.S. duty free up to \$100 worth of goods purchased abroad.

Parcels containing gifts may be sent from abroad to the U.S. without duty, providing the total value of such parcels received by one person on one day does not exceed \$10. The package should be marked "Gift Enclosed."

## Pets

A veterinarian's certificate of good health is required for dogs and cats and should be obtained by owners in advance of entering Italy. Dogs must be on leash or muzzled all the time.

Other animals must undergo examination at the border or port of entry. Certificates for parrots or other birds subject to psitticosis must state that the country of origin is free of the disease.

## Currency

Italy has no restrictions on the amount of foreign currency imported, but anyone entering Italy intending to reexport any of the foreign currency in his possession should declare on entry into Italy the amount he is carrying. This establishes for the Italian Customs Office of Exit that the currency came from abroad and therefore that the same amount or less may be re-exported. Importation of Italian currency is also unrestricted but export may not exceed 50,000 lire.

Tourists reaching Italy without Italian currency will now be able to obtain a limited amount of lire from the conductors of the international trains and at certain stations in the interior of the country. For the time being, only dollars, sterling, Belgian and French francs, Swedish, Danish and Norwegian Crowns, Guilders, Pesetas, and Escudos will be accepted. Conductors are authorized to exchange foreign currencies up to the equivalent of 15,000 lire (about \$24.00). Travelers are advised to consult the official exchange rate table with which every conductor is supplied and to obtain a regular exchange voucher.

Foreign notes, travelers checks and other negotiable letters of credit are purchased by Italian banks at the current lire rate of exchange (at present about 625 lire to the U.S. dollar) less a small commission.

Foreigners who visit Italy and have blocked lire accounts can use them up to 500,000 lire per month. For larger amounts a license is needed from the Italian Exchange Office and can be applied for through any Italian Bank. Monetary unit is the Lira. Paper denominations are issued for Lire 500, 1000, 5000 and 10,000. Coins are of 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, and 500 Lire.

## Language

English is understood at most hotels and shops. Letters to hotels or to local Information Offices should, if possible, be typewritten.

## Hotels

Hotels in Italy are classed in five categories: De Luxe, First, Second, Third and Fourth. Pensions are also classified as First, Second and Third Class. Every hotel or pension has its fixed charges, minimum and maximum, which vary according to location and class, and type of room. In addition to the room rates, there are additional service charges (from 15 to 20 percent) and taxes (revenue tax of 1-3 percent, and a small sojourn tax based on the class) which will be added to the guest's bill. According to recent instructions from the Ministry of Tourism, Italian hotels are now beginning to quote inclusive prices—but for those which do not, the tourist should calculate that the total price will be about 20 percent above that quoted.

The table below gives *approximate* inclusive prices for the different classes.

*Note:* Hotels charge extra for heating during winter months and/or for air conditioning during summer months.

The differences between minimum and maximum are due to season, position of room and locality.

## Hotel Directories

A list of De Luxe, First and Second Class hotels for all main cities and resorts is obtainable free of charge from the Italian State Tourist Offices upon request.

## Holidays

Offices and shops in Italy are closed on the following dates: January 1st and 6th; St. Joseph (March 19th); Easter Monday; Liberation Day (April 25th); Labor Day (May 1st); Ascension of Christ (sixth Thursday after Easter); Corpus Christi (ninth Thursday after Easter); Proclamation of the Republic (June 2nd); Saints Peter and Paul (June 29th); Assumption of the Virgin (August 15th); All Saints' Day (November 1st); Victory Day 1918 (November 4th); Day of the Immaculate Conception (December 8th); December 25th and 26th.

Local Feast Days are held in honor of the towns' Patron Saints, such as April 25th (St. Mark) in Venice; June 24th (St. John the Baptist) in Florence, Genoa and Turin; September 19th (St. Gennaro) in Naples; October 4th (St. Petronio) in Bologna; December 7th (St. Ambrose) in Milan.

Travel agents only may obtain the Yearbook on Italian Hotels from the Italian State Tourist Offices. The Yearbook includes all hotels, pensions and motels in the country, giving details such as number of rooms and services offered. It is normally available at the beginning of each year and is supplied free.

## Hotel Reservations

*No hotel reservation can be made through ENIT Offices.* Hotel reservations in any part of Italy can be made in the U.S. and Canada through Travel Agents or hotel representatives. If made directly, mention of this office will prove helpful in obtaining a prompt reply. In case of delay, help can be received by addressing a complaint directly to the Provincial or local Tourist Office in the locality concerned. (See page 7)

## Day Hotels

Day Hotels (Alberghi Diurni) are establishments offering bathrooms, hairdressers, cleaning services, rest and reading rooms and other services, but no sleeping accommodation. They can be found in most Italian towns in or near the main railway station, and are usually open from 6 A.M. to midnight.

## Laundry and Dry Cleaners

All De Luxe, First and Second Class hotels have laundry and dry cleaning facilities. Prices are moderate and a small service charge is added to the actual cost.

If a hotel does not provide these services, the desk clerk can direct you to the nearest shop (tintoria), or you can look in the Classified Telephone Directory under "Tintorie" (Cleaning and Pressing) and "Lavanderie" (Laundry).

## Restaurants-Eating Places

In the De Luxe, First and Second Class hotels there is always a restaurant where international as well as local cuisine may be found. Restaurants are also often to be found in Third and Fourth Class hotels and in the pensions.

You will find restaurants of international renown throughout Italy and an infinite number of "trattorie" and "rosticcerie," where excellent meals may be obtained at very moderate prices. The main meals are served between noon and 3 P.M. and between 8 and 11 P.M., but may be obtained at other hours.

The prices of meals in Italy can generally be calculated from \$5.00 to \$8.00 for lunch or dinner in a luxury restaurant; from \$3.00 to \$4.50 in an average restaurant and from \$1.50 to \$2.50 in an economical restaurant. Continental breakfast taken as a separate item in a hotel or restaurant can be had from \$.50. Taxes and service charges vary from 10 to 15%.

## Opera and Music Festivals

The Grand Opera Season in Italy usually begins in December and continues through to April or May. The principal Opera Houses in Italy are La Scala in Milan, Teatro dell'Opera in Rome, San Carlo in Naples and the Fenice in Venice. Operas are also performed in many other Italian towns during this period, such as in Florence at the Teatro Comunale, in Genoa at the Teatro Comunale dell'Opera, in Parma at the Teatro Regio and in Palermo at the Teatro Massimo, to mention but a few. During the summer opera is performed in the open-air, the principal locations being those at the Arena of Verona (mid-July to mid-August), the Terme di Caracalla in Rome (July-August) and the Arena Flegrea in Naples (July-August). The two chief Music Festivals take place in Florence (Maggio Musicale Fiorentino) during May and June and the International Music Festival at Venice. Amongst other annual musical events are one in Siena during September, the "Sagra Musicale Umbria" at Perugia and "The Festival of Two Worlds" (June-July) at Spoleto.

## Tickets for Opera, Concerts, Theater

At present there are no agencies in the U.S. authorized to sell these tickets. Your Travel Agent may obtain them through his representatives in Italy. Generally speaking, hotel managements will assist their clients in obtaining tickets for any given performance in their city.

## University Courses for Foreigners

Courses are available at several centers covering not only the Italian language and literature, but also subjects such as Italian history, geography and Fine Arts. In general, provision is made for a separate curriculum at various stages: elementary, intermediate and advanced. The Educational Boards of the various Universities will assist in obtaining inclusive accommodation at hostels for as little as 25,000 lire (\$40.46) per month for individuals or from 1,000 (\$1.60) daily for families.

## The Italian Cultural Institute

The Italian Cultural Institute in New York, 686 Park Avenue, New York, N.Y. (TR 9-4242) is the Italian government's cultural agency in the United States. It has a library, record, slide, documentary film and newspaper-clipping collections; organizes or sponsors lectures, concerts, exhibitions, dramatic and cinematic productions; facilitates the exchange of university students and professors and provides information on cultural subjects.

Many Art Courses are available. For detailed information apply directly to the Italian Cultural Institute, 686 Park Avenue, New York 21, N.Y.

The Italian Ministry of Education has established a department to assist parties and individuals of any country desiring economical accommodation on educational visits to Italy. This department, known as C.I.V.I.S. (Centro Italiano Viaggi Istruzioni) can arrange accommodation in nearly all of the principal cities and towns at a cost of about \$2.50 a day full board in dormitories or from about \$3.00 to \$3.80 a day in single or double bedrooms. Individuals must obtain and forward, together with the application, a letter of recommendation from the Italian Cultural Institute in New York, which will be issued on presentation of a letter of reference or certificate proving that the applicant is either a student or a teacher. All inquiries about travel in Italy, either in groups or singly, organized by the Center should be made directly to: C.I.V.I.S., Via Caetani 32, Rome.

Special tours and programs are prepared for American students by C.R.U.E.I. (Italian Center for Foreign Relations) which is the Travel Bureau of the National Union of Italian Students, recognized by the Ministry of Public Education. Exchanges with students of foreign countries are part of the work of this organization which aims at a better development of educational, social and cultural exchanges between students of foreign countries. Information may be obtained by writing directly to C.R.U.E.I., Palazzo Pitti, Rondeau di Bacco, Florence.

## Student Hostels

Student Hostels exist in many Italian towns and are available not only to students taking courses but, when available, also to students visiting the country for holiday purposes. Application should be made to "Casa dello Studente" in the following towns: Bari, Bologna, Camerino, Catania, Ferrara, Firenze, Genova, Messina, Macerata, Modena, Milano, Napoli, Parma, Pavia, Perugia, Pisa, Roma, Salerno, Sassari, Siena, Urbino; and Casa Fusinato, Via Marzolo, Padova; Casa del Goliardo, Palermo; Foresteria dell'Istituto di Ca' Foscari, Venezia.

The average cost of a night's accommodation is about 5.35 and meals taken at the university canteens are from 5.35 to 5.50 per meal. The "Guide for Foreign Students" giving detailed information on student hostels, and other student facilities, can be obtained by applying to: The Italian Ministry of Education, Viale Trastevere, Roma (price: 5.80).

## Museums and Art Galleries

Museums and Art Galleries are found in almost every Italian town. For your convenience we list some of the outstanding ones dedicated to different Art periods:

The most ancient archaeological finds of Etruscan civilization date back to the 9th Century B.C. This mysterious people, probably of oriental origin, whose language is still almost unknown, has left fascinating testimony of its presence at Tarquinia, Volterra, Cerveteri and Veio. A great deal of Etruscan Art is in the Florence Archaeological Museum, and Etruscan Museum in Rome, the Bologna Municipal Museum and that of Volterra.

Everywhere one turns there is the imprint of the Roman Empire: in the roads, bridges, aqueducts, triumphal arches and theaters, perhaps more than in other places in Turin, Susa, Aosta, Milan, Perugia, Rimini, Brescia, Verona, Ravenna, Spoleto, Assisi, Naples, Benevento, Capua, Capri, Campi Flegrei. The most important excavations, of course, have been carried out at Rome, Pompeii, Herculaneum, and Ostia. The Naples National Museum is the most important in the world for the study of the life and customs of ancient Rome and ancient Italic painting. The Roman Art Museums in Rome itself are the Terme, Vatican, and Capitoline. The archaeological collections in the museums of Venice, Turin, Vercelli, Arezzo, Perugia and Aquileia should not be overlooked.

Sculpture, painting and minor arts of the Middle Ages can be seen in any number of galleries. Among the most outstanding are: The Uffizi Gallery and the Gallery of Ancient and Modern Art in Florence, the Vatican Picture Gallery, the Municipal Museum in Siena, the Municipal Museum of Perugia, and the Sforza Castle Museum in Milan.

The most important museums of Renaissance art are: the Uffizi Gallery and Pitti Palace in Florence, the Vatican and Borghese Galleries in Rome, the Academy Gallery in Venice and the Brera in Milan, the Capodimonte Museum in Naples, and the Turin and Bologna Picture Galleries.

The most important Modern Art Museums are: Rome, Florence, Venice, Turin, Milan, Naples and Genoa Modern Art Galleries, and the Canova Museum at Possagno.

## Sightseeing Tours

City sightseeing is available by motorcoach with official guide in all important tourist centers. The visitor with limited time at his disposal will find these services very convenient. Private guide services are available for half or full day tours. Information from Travel Agents or local Tourist Offices.

## Papal Audiences

General audiences with His Holiness are usually held once a week (Wednesday) in Vatican City, and in summer at Castel Gandolfo. To participate in a general audience, one must apply to the office of the "Maestro di Camera di Sua Santita'" at the Vatican. Americans should apply to the North American College, Via Dell'Umilta' 30. Catholics are requested to have a letter of introduction from their parish priest.

For this audience women should dress modestly. It is customary for a woman to have her arms and head covered. Dark or subdued colors are requested; please avoid flamboyant dress. Men are asked to wear a tie and jacket. A dark suit and conservative tie would be entirely suitable.

## Youth Hostels

The Italian Youth Hostels Association (Associazione Italiana Alberghi per La Gioventu' Via Guidubaldo del Monte 24, Roma) has over seventy Hostels throughout Italy. Reservation can be made by writing directly to the individual Hostel, and the cost is about \$5.50 per night. An extra \$.08 is charged for the use of the kitchen. Meals can be obtained at main Hostels (average price \$5.60 lunch or supper; \$.16 breakfast). Full details and location of the Italian Youth Hostels can be obtained by applying to the above address or from the American Youth Hostels Inc., 14 West 8th Street, New York City, or by writing to the Italian State Tourist Offices

## Camping

Camping is becoming very popular in Italy and it is usually sufficient to ask permission of the owner or occupier of the land. The information bureau of the nearest town will give information on the most suitable sites. Full details on over 500 official camping sites in Italy can be obtained in the publication "Campeggi in Italia" published by the Touring Club Italiano. An abridged list of sites with location map is issued free by the Federazione Italiana del Campeggio, and copies can be had by writing to the Italian State Tourist Offices or to Centro Nazionale Campeggiatori Stranieri, Via Mameli 2, Firenze. The tariffs in Italian Camp Sites with facilities are: \$.35/\$.45 per person daily; \$.25 daily for each car and \$.08 daily for each motorcycle. Children under 10 years of age, bicycles, tent and trailer space, carry no charge.

## Yachting

The Italian coastline with its many natural harbors is ideal for yachting. Permission to anchor must be obtained from the Capitaneria di Porto (Harbor Master) concerned. Information can be obtained from the Italian Yacht Club: Unione Societa' Veliche, Porticciolo Duca degli Abruzzi 409, Genoa. Yachts can be hired in the larger resort towns and detailed information can be obtained from the local Tourist Office

# Fishing

Fishing can be enjoyed all over Italy thanks to the many rivers, lakes and mountain streams. Temporary importation of fishing tackle is permitted free. A fishing license is required, detailed information can be obtained from the local tourist office concerned.

The following are the periods during which fishing is forbidden in inland waters: river and lake trout (from 15th October to 15th January); carp (from 1st December to 31st January and from 1st to 31st July); coregone (from 15th December to 15th January); temolo (from 1st March to 31st May); perch (from 1st to 31st May); tench (from 1st to 30th June); small carp (from 1st to 30th June). Other lake fish including lake shad from 15th May to 15th June; cray-fish (from 1st April to 30th June).

Under-water fishing can be practiced along most of the Italian coastline. Equipment can be purchased or hired at most resorts.

# Hunting

There is excellent hunting in the Alpine and Apennine areas as well as in Sardinia, Calabria and Sicily. There is fox hunting in the countryside outside Rome and Milan; the wild boar is hunted in the Tuscan, Maremma and Viterbo Province, in Basilicata, in Calabria, and in Sardinia. The hunting season varies from region to region.

Temporary importation of a gun with 200 cartridges is free. A permit valid for 30 days is required, and can be obtained through the Italian Consulate.

Information about hunting seasons, etc., can be obtained by applying to: Federazione Italiana della Caccia, Foro Italico, Rome.

# Water Skiing

Water skiing can be enjoyed in most Italian seaside and lake resorts. Motorboats and water skis can be hired locally.

# Casinos

There are five casinos in Italy:

*San Remo* (Italian Riviera): open all year round.

*Campione* (Lake Lugano): open all year round.

*Venice*: open from October 1st to March 31st at "Ca' Vendramin" (Venice)

and from April 1st to September 30th at Venice—Lido.

*St. Vincent* (Aosta Valley): open all year round.

No person under 21 years of age may be admitted to the casinos and entry is permitted only upon presentation of passport.

# Shopping

English is understood in most shops in large towns and tourist centers.

Chain stores such as La Rinascente, Upim, Standa, etc., are to be found in almost every town.

Shops are open in the morning from 8:30/9:00 to 1 P.M.; in the afternoon from 3:30/4:00 to 7:30/8:00 P.M. with some variation in Northern Italy (Milan, Turin), where the lunch break is shorter and shops close earlier.

# Electrical Appliances

Electric current in Italy varies considerably. The current is usually AC, the cycle varies from 42-50 and the voltage can be from 115 to 220. It is recommended that any tourist carrying electrical appliances obtain a transformer either before leaving the United States or Canada or in any electrical appliance shop in Italy. Check the exact local current with the hotel where you are staying.

# Taxi and Chauffeur Driven Cars

Taxi hire varies according to locality but the average rate is 180 lire (\$.30) for the first 500 meters or fraction thereof, and approximately 25 lire (\$.04) for each additional 200 meters. An extra charge of 150 lire (\$.24) is made after 9 P.M. Luggage is from 10 to 100 lire according to quantity.

Chauffeur driven cars are available in Italy at an average cost of about 90 lire per kilometer (approx. \$.15) plus cost of meals and overnight accommodation for the driver when necessary.

## Packing Your Bag

Do not take too many bags or suitcases along. A suitcase and an overnight bag should be sufficient. When taking one-day or two-day side trips in Italy, pack what you need during the trip in an overnight bag and check the rest of the baggage at the hotel or at the railway station. Avoid taking trunks, and remember that traveling light helps you to save on taxicabs and tips. Remember to include: facial tissues and a cake of soap; at least one pair of comfortable walking shoes; a very light raincoat and a pair of low rubber shoes.

### For the Ladies:

1. Nylon stockings in sufficient quantity for the trip.
2. Only a small amount of favorite cosmetics, as more can be found in Italy.
3. Have a basic color scheme so that shoes, hats, gloves, purses and coats go well together.
4. A large shoulder strap bag can be very convenient.
5. Hats are not absolutely necessary except for visits to churches and, of course, for a visit to His Holiness the Pope.
6. Italians frown on slacks and shorts for city wear.
7. A suit, a cocktail dress and one- or two-piece dress can be used on practically any occasion. Great variety can be achieved with blouses and skirts.
8. A cardigan should be with you no matter what season you choose for your trip.

### For the Gentlemen:

1. Wash-and-wear shirts, underwear and socks reduce the size of your baggage.
2. Not more than two or three neckties and one hat are sufficient; more can be bought in Italy.
3. If you are bringing in your electric razor make sure to have an electric transformer.

### What to Wear:

Generally speaking, the clothes used in New York can be used in the same seasons in Italy. It is particularly suggested that: **IN SUMMER:** Cotton and other lightweight suits and dresses are appropriate. **IN SPRING AND AUTUMN:** Lightweight wool suits for ladies and gentlemen are practical. A light topcoat should be taken along for evenings. **IN WINTER:** Medium-weight woolen suits for ladies and men; warm topcoat is recommended.

## Suggestions on How to Tip (625 lire = \$1.00)

**HOTELS:** Service charge already added to bill. In addition it is customary to tip:

Chambermaid: 100 lire per day.

Head Porter, Concierge: 50 lire per day, 100 lire per service.

Bellhop or Porter: 100 lire per bag, 150 lire for two.

Doorman (for calling cab): 100 lire.

**RESTAURANTS:** 15% added to your bill covers most charges. A small tip for good service is expected. For example:

Waiter: 100-300 lire.

Checkroom or Washroom attendant: 50-100 lire.

**CAFE AND BARS:** 15% of the bill.

**THEATRE USHERS:** 50 lire.

**STATION PORTERS:** Fee plus 100 lire per bag, 200 lire per trunk.

**TAXI DRIVERS:** 15%—a minimum of 100 lire.

**ON BOARD SHIP:** 10% of fare, divided among those who give you service.

## Telephone

A public telephone is always near at hand in Italy.

Local calls from public telephones require the use of a token which can be purchased at all newsstands, tobacco shops and bars.

Long distance calls between the major cities can be dialed directly by using the area code numbers.

## Time

In terms of standard time zones, Italy is six hours ahead of Eastern Standard Time in the U.S.

### Bay of Naples

RULES FOR THE TEMPORARY IMPORTATION INTO ITALY  
OF PHOTOGRAPHIC AND FILMING EQUIPMENT

The following set of rules has been recently established by the Italian Ministry of Foreign Trade for the temporary importation of photographic and filming equipment into Italy:

1. Upon arrival in Italy, tourists are allowed by the Customs Authorities to bring into the territory of their jurisdiction, the objects listed below free of duty. Said objects are restricted only to personal use and thus cannot be sold or given away.

- 2 cameras with 24 plates and 10 rolls of film
- 1 average size movie camera and 10 rolls of film
- 1 portable recording machine (dictaphone) and a small supply of new and used equipment, such as tapes, ribbons, etc.

2. As for the production of commercial films to be shot in Italy, according to the law that recently went into effect, any foreign producer must:

A. Submit to the Ministry of Tourism and Entertainment the Italian Text of the movie and of the scenes that are to be completed in Italy prior to the filming in order to obtain approval.

B. Address a formal request to the Ministry of Foreign Trade for the temporary importation of filming equipment, including a complete list of the material involved.

The authorization to import goods temporarily will be granted to firms with branches in Italy; therefore, it is helpful for foreign companies to have the support of an Italian correspondent or of a shipping company operating in Italy.
