Item 11, Section III

The activities of Messrs. Chettle, Visser and Montgomery from June 1, 1983 - November 21, 1983 were designed to serve the purpose of the South Africa Foundation. This purpose is, in the words of the Foundation's constitution, "to promote international understanding of South Africa -- her achievements, her problems, and her potential, and by so doing to advance the welfare of all her peoples."

The South Africa Foundation granted one travel fellowship to Americans during this six-month reporting period:

(1) Mr. Bob Carter. Meetings were arranged with selected academics, political and business leaders.

The Johannesburg office of the South Africa Foundation was provided during this reporting period, by the Washington office or by other sources, the names of a number of Americans who were visiting South Africa on business or private holiday. The Johannesburg office was able to assist a number of these people by making appointments for them to meet South Africans in their particular areas of interest.

The contacts made in the United States by Mr. Chettle, Dr. Visser and Mr. Montgomery in this six-month reporting period were, in the great majority of instances, with individuals in private life. These contacts included:

- (a) Representatives of American business and industry, and their trade and management associates and consultants;
- (b) Members of the professions, such as lawyers, doctors, bankers, and economists;
- (c) Academics, university officials, and representatives of scholarly study and research groups, as well as representatives of religious organizations and private foundations;
- (d) Representatives of the publishing, broadcasting, and public relations communities, reporters, authors, and producers; and
- (e) Other prominent American citizens, including former Ambassadors, military officers, and members of the Executive Branch.

Additionally, Messrs. Chettle, Visser and Montgomery had contacts with officials at various international organizations, in the diplomatic community, in Canada, in South Africa, and with visitors to the United States from South Africa.

During this reporting period, the Washington office of the South Africa Foundation hosted the visits of a trustee of the Foundation, Justice Jan H. Steyn and Mr. Llewellyn Mehlomakulu.

Justice Jan H. Steyn's program covered a two-day period. Among those with whom he met were Dr. Chester Crocker, Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs; Dr. Elliott Abrams, Assistant Secretary of State for Human Rights; Ambassador Frank Wisner, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs; Mr. Beldon Bell, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Congressional Relations; and various media contacts.

Mr. Llewellyn Mehlomakulu met with Congressman Stephen Neal (D-North Carolina); Congressman Buddy Roemer (D-Louisiana); Messrs. Doug Siglin and Marsu Cartmill, Legislative Assistants to Congressman Jim Leach (R-Iowa); Mr. Harold Luks, Legislative Assistant to Congressman Toby Roth (R-Wisconsin); and various representatives of the media.

Mr. Chettle had a number of speaking appearances during this reporting period. These were as follows:

(1) Briefed a working session of officers of U.S. corporations who have subsidiaries doing business in South Africa on the current disinvestment movement. (No prepared text)

(2) Briefed a meeting of IBM executives on the situation regarding disinvestment. (No prepared text)

(4) Addressed a session held by the International trade Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, which was designed to encourage trade with South Africa. (No prepared text)

(5) Spoke to the Annual General Meeting of the Machinery and Allied Products Institute on "South African Disinvestment: Some Legal and Policy Considerations." (No prepared text)

(6) Participated in a panel discussion on South Africa at Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts. (No prepared text)
