## Generous gestures from Japan

**A** STRIKING example of trans-pacific goodwill occurred last week when the Japanese government announced a gift of 5 million chum-salmon eggs to help revive Washington State's badly depleted salmon stocks.

Don Moos, state fisheries director, had told Sono Uchida, Japanese consul general in Seattle, about the state's problems with chum salmon, hard hit by recent floods that destroyed most spawning grounds.

The result was a decision in Tokyo to fly the 5 million eggs here as a goodwill gesture.

Only last month, Japanese Prime Minister Takeo Miki announced a Bicentennial gift of 1,000 cherry trees to be planted along Lake Washington Boulevard from the Arboretum to Seward Park. Uchida had a hand in that generous gesture, as well.

Both gifts reflect the close ties between Washington State and Japan — ties that were renewed very early in the postwar era.

## Japanese give state 5 million salmon eggs

Japan gave a helping hand — and 5 million salmon eggs — to American commercial fishermen today.

Five million chum-salmon eggs arrived at the Seattle-Tacoma Airport aboard a flight from Kyoto.

The State Fisheries Department immediately transported them to its Minter Creek Hatchery in Pierce County. After the eggs are hatched, the chum salmon will be released in rivers and streams yet to be designated.

STATE FISHERIES Director Don Moos described the salmon-egg gift from Japan as an important shot in the arm for the chum fishery. It was hit hard this year by low returns, egg kills from flooding and egg loss because of a zinc spill near the George Adams Hatchery in Mason County.

Some 10 million chum eggs were transferred from the George Adams

Hatchery because of the zinc spill from an overturned truck. It was estimated about 25 per cent would be lost from the shock of the transfer.

The eggs transferred from the George Adams Hatchery represented about half the 20 million chum eggs the state was hatching.

Japan has had a highly successful chum-rearing program for some time.

THE STATE Fisheries Department has cooperated with Japan by lending technical assistance.

Moos, trying to find a way to beef up the depleted chum stocks, originally sought 30 million eggs. The Japanese only had a 5 million surplus to spare.

With a value of \$10 per thousand fertilized eggs, the Japanese gift to the State Fisheries Department represented \$50,000 to \$75,000.

JAPAN - U.S. FRIENDSHIP DAYS -- A PROCLAMATION

Their Majesties the Emperor and Empress of Japan will officially begin their State visit to the United States of America on October 2, 1975. This visit which extends through October 13, 1975, will be the first State visit to the United States of America by a reigning Emperor of Japan.

The State visit of the Emperor and Empress of Japan openly symbolizes the close ties of friendship, goodwill and common goals to which the Japanese and American people are dedicated. Their visit will contribute immeasurably to mutual understanding and respect between the United States of America and Japan. We warmly welcome Their Majesties to our country.

"Now, therefore, I, Gerald R. Ford, President of the United States of America do hereby designate the period beginning October 2, 1975, through October 13, 1975, as Japan - United States Friendship Days. I call upon the people of the United States and interested groups and organizations to observe this period with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 2nd day of October in the Year of our Lord 1975 and of the independence of the United States of America the 200th."

WHEREAS, the City of Seattle, as "Gateway to the Orient," has long enjoyed a unique position in international trade between Japan and the United States; and


WHEREAS, this on-going activity, combined with the large number of people in our community of Japanese descent, has brought a spirit of cooperation and friendship between our nations; and

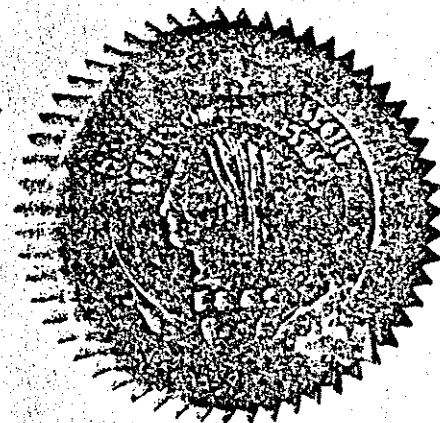
WHEREAS, Emperor and Mrs. Hirohito are visiting the United States, October 2-13, in order to strengthen the bonds which unite our two peoples; and
