

A gift of 1000 cherry trees from Japan, along with a granite monument commemorating the American Bicentennial, and three, six-foot-tall carved granite lanterns will be formally presented to the city on Saturday, May 8, in Seward Park. The gifts are part of a Cherry Blossom Bicentennial Celebration that will include kite flying displays, Japanese festival dances, music by several drum and bugle corps, and the introduction of Greater Seattle's cherry blossom queen. Seattle Mayor Wes Uhlman and David Towne of the parks and recreation department will be on hand to accept the gifts on behalf of the city. Consul General of Japan, Sono Uchida, will present the cherry trees. The granite monument and lanterns will be presented by representatives of the Seattle Japanese Community Service, Shunjukai, and Japan-America Society. A special recognition of the Bicentennial will be made by Robb Weller of the Seattle/King County Bicentennial Commission. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies and entertainment planned for 2 pm in the park at Lake Washington Boulevard and Orcas Street.

Consul General of Japan

We contacted several sources today to determine the candidates in the Montana State presidential election on June 1, and indications of leading issues and candidates. The information we developed follows:

Republican--Party headquarters reports that Ford and Reagan will be on the ballot. Reagan visited in Montana last July, but Ford has not visited at all. Headquarters believes the party will not go solid for Reagan, but will split the delegates for each candidate. Bill Hanson of United Press International in Montana agrees, and believes Reagan is the leading candidate. Judy Rolfe of Reagan headquarters says Stan Burger, U.S. Senate candidate is supporting Reagan. Burger is with the Montana Farm Bureau and has lobbied quite a bit. Indications are that since there are so few delegates from Montana, citizens and candidates are not taking an active interest in the election, and that the election is very low key. Part of the reason is that the election is non-binding to delegates.

Democratic--Party headquarters reports that those candidates on the ballot will be Carter, Udall, Jackson, Church and Wallace. Church appears to be the leading candidate, according to Gladys Makela at the Democratic state headquarters. She indicates that Church has been the most active candidate; that he has visited the state on several occasions and has had dinners and lunches to campaign and raise funds.

Bill Hanson of the UPI agrees that Church is leading candidate. He says that Church's family has been helping campaign, and that he has spent money campaigning, and is a westerner himself.

Major Issues--Consensus of opinion is that the leading issues are farm prices and agriculture; unemployment; inflation, anti-Washington sentiment and anti-big government. Gun control does not seem to be a significant issue.

Summary--Montana is a conservative state. It is believed that the more conservative candidates will win. Reagan tends to be conservative, though Church could not really be labeled a conservative. There have been no public or private surveys or samplings of election results or trends that we have been able to determine. One reason is that interest is not very high; another is that newspapers are smaller and generally do not have enough money allotted for that purpose.

The Japan Training Squadron of the Maritime Self Defense Force will arrive in Seattle on Friday, June 4, for a four-day stay. This is the first visit to the city by the squadron since 1964.

A 21-gun salute by the visiting training ship Katori, accompanied by the destroyer Nagatsuki, will be returned by the U. S. Navy shortly after 8 a.m. when the squadron enters the Port of Seattle.

Both ships, with approximately 700 officers, cadets and crew members aboard, are scheduled to tie up at the Coast Guard Support Center (Pier 36) at 9 a.m. Also tied up there will be the USCGC Boutwell, host ship. The public is invited to greet the Japanese ships upon arrival, and will be welcomed aboard on Saturday and Sunday, June 4 and 5, between 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Prompted by invitations to visit from Governor Dan Evans and Seattle Mayor Wes Uhlman, members of the 420-foot Katori and 446-foot Nagatsuki will participate in several programs in honor of the American Bicentennial. The ships are under command of Rear Admiral Naotoshi Sakonju.

Upon arrival, the commander and staff will exchange courtesy calls with state and city dignitaries and officials, as well as with the Commandant of the 13th U.S. Naval District and the Commander of the 13th U.S. Coast Guard District.

Highlighting the programs on Friday will be a public welcoming ceremony by the Washington State Bicentennial Commission at the Flag Plaza in the Seattle Center at 2:30 p.m. Events including raising flags and playing national anthems

of both nations, with official exchanges of greetings and entertainment.

In addition to the squadron's Navy band, approximately 400 members of the two ships will attend the ceremonies. A dance party that night for 50 cadets will be held by the Seattle Hospitality Committee at the Navy Commissioned Officers Club on Pier 91.

On Saturday June 5 at 2 in the afternoon, the squadron commander, staff and band will visit the War Veteran's Memorial Plaza at the Public Safety Building, and the Lakeview Nisei Veteran Cemetery to lay wreaths. Also planned are city tours of Tacoma and Seattle for most of the ship's members. Later that evening a reception on board the Katori is planned for 200 invited guests.

Plans for Sunday, June 6 will include a tour of Mt. Rainier for 190 cadets and a tour of Seattle for the ship's remaining 280 officers and crew. At 6 p.m. the Seattle Japanese Community Service will host a public welcoming party at the Seattle Center Flag Plaza for 520 members of the squadron, including the commander, staff, officers and cadets.

Following visits by cadets to Boeing in Everett on Monday, June 7, Commander Sakonju and staff will pay a courtesy call on Lt. Governor John Cherberg in Olympia. The Seattle Department of Parks and Recreation board members today approved the location and placement of three Japanese lanterns, each six feet tall, as proposed, around the commemorative granite monument on the shore of Lake Washington.

Interest in the number of lanterns was expressed. Board members asked if "three" was symbolic, or helped tell a story, or had some other significance, and if an odd or even number of lanterns was important in any way. The question was unanswered.

Some board members expressed concern about continuous expansion of the area in the future. We stated that there were no plans for any additions or expansion to the proposed setting at this time, and that if any plans for additions were developed in the future, those plans would be submitted to the park board for approval.

Another concern was possible theft of parts of the lanterns. Mr. Uyeda said that the parts would be cemented together.

After a number of questions and answers involving details, the board voted unanimously to accept the proposal as presented.



5. PASCOE, STARLING & POLLOCK, INC. shall provide the CONSULATE GENERAL OF JAPAN a report of its activities every 3 months.

6. The CONSULATE GENERAL OF JAPAN shall compensate PASCOE, STARLING & POLLOCK, INC. by means of a monthly retainer of \$300.00 during the term of this Agreement.

A cherry blossom bicentennial celebration for the City of Seattle is planned for Saturday, May 8, in Seward Park.

Highlight of the colorful event will be the formal presentation of 1000 kwanzan cherry trees by the Consul General of Japan, Sono Uchida, as a gift from Japan to Seattle.

The new Ambassador of Japan to the United States, Fumihiko Togo, is scheduled to arrive at Sea-Tac airport, on Wednesday afternoon, May 12, from Portland. Madame Togo will accompany her husband during their two-day stay in Seattle. This is his first visit to the city as ambassador.

Togo, who was sworn in as ambassador on February 24, 1976, in Washington, D. C., has a long and impressive record of diplomatic service to his country in a wide range of capacities. Most recently, he served as Adviser to the Japanese Minister for Foreign Affairs.

The ambassador and Madame Togo will be greeted at the airport by the Consul General of Japan for this territory, Sono Uchida, and Mrs. Uchida. Also in attendance will be John S. Larsen, Director of Dept. of Commerce and Economic Development, representing the governor's office; and Wayne B. Gentry, Executive Director, Trade Development Div., Dept. of Commerce and Economic Development.

From the airport, Ambassador and Mme. Togo plan a courtesy visit to Governor Dan Evans and Mrs. Evans for tea at the executive mansion in Olympia. Consul General and Mrs. Uchida will join the group.

Upon their return to Seattle, the Ambassador and his wife will visit the Japanese garden in the arboretum. At Seward Park, they will view Japan's gift of cherry trees planted there, and a stone monument soon to be completed, dedicating the event and the American Bicentennial. The tour includes a stop at the Seattle Center to view the Kobe Bell, and possibly the Horiuchi mural and one of the Tsutakawa fountain sculptures in the city.

That evening, the Ambassador will be guest speaker at a banquet in his honor, hosted by the Japan-America Society at The Washington Plaza.

AMBASSADOR TOGO WELCOMED AS JAPAN'S NEW ENVOY TO U.S.

One of Japan's most distinguished diplomats, H. E. Fumihiko Togo, has just presented his credentials as Ambassador to the United States. The Ambassador and Mme. Togo can be certain of a warm greeting in Washington, and particularly by the Japan-America Society.

Ambassador Togo's personal relationship with the United States began in 1939, when he studied at Harvard University. Since that time he has participated in many major events relating to the United States. He was in charge of the U.S.-Japan Security Treaty negotiations conducted in 1960 and, from 1963 to 1967, was Consul General in New York. From 1967-1972, in his capacity as Director General of the Bureau of American Affairs he was engaged in negotiations for the return of Okinawa. Subsequently, as Vice Minister for Foreign Affairs, he was particularly active in preparing for the U.S. visit of Their Majesties.

His Role as Vice-Minister

Many important international events occurred during the period when Ambassador Togo served as Vice Minister . . . negotiations on the treaty of air navigation with China, increased tension between Japan and Korea as a result of the murder of Madame Park, reopening of the air route between Japan and Taiwan and the visit by Foreign Minister Miyazawa to Korea. Problems concerning the Middle East and petroleum also occupied many of his working hours. This was also the period when Japanese diplomacy was becoming increasingly diversified and for that very reason, fundamental importance of strengthened relations between Japan and the United States was reconfirmed by many on both sides of the Pacific.

Many people describe Ambassador Togo as a very real patriot and professional diplomat. He is extremely serious and very conscientious on matters relating to his work.

He enjoys personal contact with people of diversified backgrounds, remains friends with the many people he has met throughout his long diplomatic career.

While serving as Consul General in Calcutta, India, Ambassador and Madame Togo became well acquainted with members of the Imperial Family of the Kingdom of Bhutan and also with its Prime Minister. Upon the death of the King, Ambassador and Madame Togo were invited to the coronation ceremony of the new King in 1974, being among the few foreign guests. He has kept up a continuing exchange of letters with members of the Imperial Family and has written articles concerning Bhutan.

Has Wide Acquaintances in U.S.

His many acquaintances in the United States include actors, cartoonists and others in various endeavors. During his previous assignment to the United States, Ambassador and Madame Togo visited Portsmouth, New Hampshire and toured the building where the negotiations of the Treaty of Portsmouth were conducted.

In reply to questions about his moments of relaxation, Ambassador Togo always says that he has very few hobbies. In fact, he makes his own greeting cards using Japanese calligraphy and practices utai (Japanese traditional music and poetry). The Ambassador is also very fond of Kabuki. It was he who laid out the original plan for the plays that Utaemon, the famed Kabuki actor, would perform before Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, when she visited the Kabuki theatre. Ambassador Togo is also an avid baseball fan. When the New Giants came to Japan, he attended virtually all of the games they played in Tokyo.

Mme. Togo Fond of Animals

The Ambassador and especially Madame Togo, who has served on the Board of the Japanese Animal Protection Society, have a deep affection for animals. During the Togo's stay in New York where he served as his country's Consul General, Madame Togo visited the sea lion exhibit at the Central Park Zoo with great regularity, because she found she liked sea lions. Soon after their departure for Japan, one of the sea lions died; some say it died of a broken heart.

After their four grandchildren, their dachshund receives most of their affection. On his official desk, the Ambassador has many glass paperweights in the form of a dachshund. One of her favorite blouses also depicts a dachshund.

Madame Togo is known as a very gracious hostess and is a happy and active participant in the many functions associated with her husband's positions throughout the years.

The Ambassador and Madame Togo are both avid travellers and she was one of the first wives of a Japanese official to accompany her husband in a helicopter when the Ambassador was inspecting the front line situation in Vietnam.

Ambassador Togo and his wife have two sons. One has followed in his father's footsteps and is presently a diplomat in Tokyo. The other is a journalist.

KZAM Radio -- Personal taped interview with our agency representative, most likely broadcast during morning hours, but not monitored. Announcements by at least some other local radio stations were probably broadcast, but not monitored.

Heading for Seattle under full sail is the four-masted Japanese training bark, Kaiwo Maru, scheduled to berth at Pier 70 for a week-long stay during Fourth of July bicentennial celebrations.

Provided good weather, the white, 318-foot sailing ship will arrive at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, June 29. The public is invited to see her into port and tie up. It is expected that she will be open to the public for a few days before departing on the following Tuesday, July 6.

Invitations by the Port of Seattle and Seattle Hospitality Committee prompted the visit. Last time the Kaiwo Maru came to Seattle was July, 1968. Her sister ship, the Nippon Maru, visited in June, 1965, and is now on her way to New York to take part in the Bicentennial International Naval Review on July 4. Both ships, built in 1930, are owned by the Japanese Ministry of Transportation.

Under command of Captain Yoshio Chihara, the Kaiwo Maru has 20 officers, 47 crew members, and 85 cadets aboard. Plans are being made for courtesy calls on city, county and state officials, the Consulate-General of Japan, and various organization representatives. A schedule of social parties, tours and other events is also being arranged.

The Kaiwo Maru, with 150-foot masts (above the waterline) and a 1,200 horsepower engine, set sail from Kobe, Japan on May 22 on a non-stop voyage. On return, the ship will stop at Hilo and Honolulu, Hawaii before terminating her trip in Tokyo on September 9.
