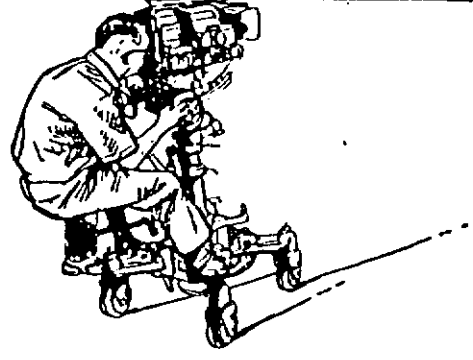

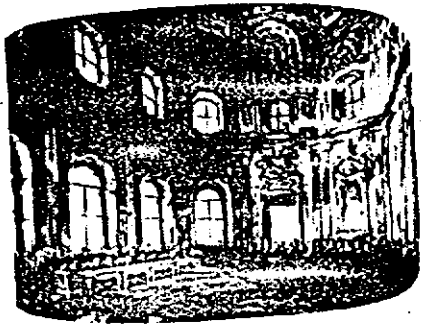

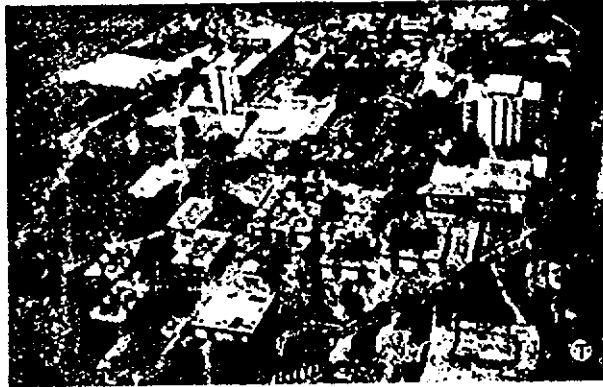

Many U.S. Doctors Take Pride In A Mexican University

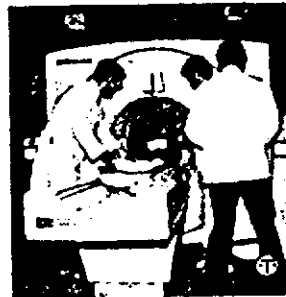


The Autonomous University of Guadalajara went from absolutely nothing to a large, efficient institution respected throughout international educational circles in just 50 years.

Not only are its graduates taking pride in their achievements at the oldest private university in Mexico, but that institution is expressing pride in them. To date, more than 5,500 U.S. alumni, most of them medical doctors, have graduated from the Autonomous University of Guadalajara. The story of this university, which celebrates its 50th anniversary this year, is an amazing one.

The Universidad Autónoma de Guadalajara—UAG—was founded on March 3, 1935, by students and professors concerned with mounting pressure to suppress academic freedom in Mexico. Its founding principles—honored, observed, and protected since the beginning—are based upon autonomy (responsible independence) and academic freedom.

The university guards its independence but it still fully supports any programs and goals which truly aim to benefit Mexico. The university has always been a patriotic Mexican institution, seeing itself as a complement to and support of the public system of education. Each student at the Autonomous University

of Guadalajara—regardless of race, sex, religion, nationality or beliefs—has an equal opportunity to become everything his or her potential will allow. 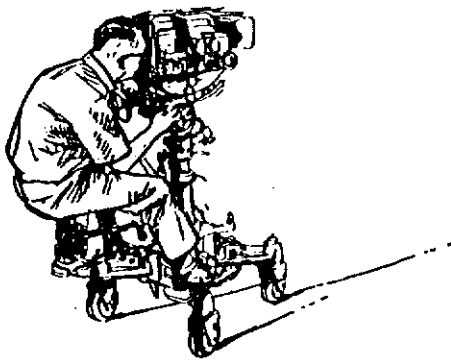

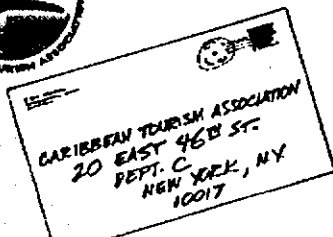

Delicate teapots, vividly colored vases, elegant, elaborate *objets d'art* make up the world's largest collection of Chinese art objects. They embody a civilization that spans more than 4,000 years and can be seen at the National Palace Museum on Taiwan.

Located on the northern outskirts of Taipei, The National Palace Museum houses Chinese art treasures, formerly in the collection of the Palace Museum in Peking, and the National Central Museum in Nanking. The museum was opened on November 12, 1965,

on the 100th anniversary of the birth of Dr. Sun Yatsen, founding father of the Republic of China.

The treasures on view include calligraphy, the earliest pieces which date from the Chin and Tang dynasties; paintings of the Tang and Sung dynasties; bronzes and jades as early as the Shang and Yuan dynasties; and porcelains of the Sung and Yuan dynasties. Also preserved are rare books, official documents, carvings, enamelware, carved lacquer, tapestry, embroidery, miniature

crafts and miscellaneous objects.

Only a small fraction of the museum collection of 400,000 items is on display at any time in the permanent and rotating exhibitions.

Free guided tours for English speaking visitors are available.

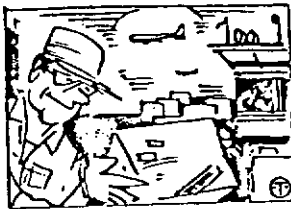

FRENCH PROCESS MAKES PERFECT



French processed cheeses, called *fromages fondus*, are perfect for so many occasions. Some, mild and smooth, are just the thing for a quick lunch—either melted in a sandwich or munched with a crisp apple. Yet others—subtly flavored with herbs, enhanced by fruits or syrups, or decorated with nuts or seeds—make attractive additions to any hors d'oeuvre tray or dessert table.

Some are soft, others hard; some are sliceable, others spreadable. Almost all are blends made with a fine French *gruyère* as the base.

Processed cheeses offer many advantages. They are well-priced, convenient and, because of the processing, have exceptional keeping qualities.

On an *apéritif* tray, serve a selection of *fromages fondus* with classic French pre-dinner drinks. *Lillet*, a smooth and fragrant French vermouth, or *Pineau des Charentes*, a tasty, spicy blend of Cognac and new wine are per-

fect examples of these. And *Kir* is always a favorite—just a few drops of *crème de cassis* (black currant liqueur) added to a chilled white Burgundy wine.

If you prefer a fancier presentation instead of serving the cheeses on their own, try a cube of one of the herb-flavored varieties skewered on a toothpick with your favorite raw vegetable—broccoli florets, cubes of zucchini, whole cherry tomatoes—and top off the spear with a *Nicoise* olive.

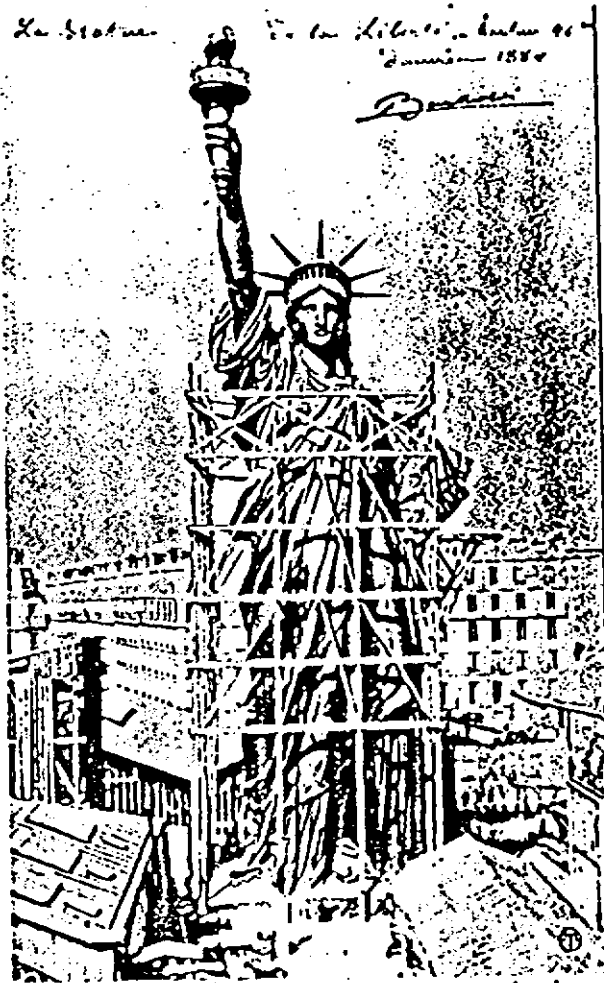
Sweeter *fromages fondus* can be cubed, rolled in crushed nuts or cookie crumbs and skewered with fresh berries.

For something more elaborate still, make a classic French omelet and fill it with your favorite cheese; sweet—with a tablespoon of French preserves—or savory—with lightly sautéed shallots or leeks and red peppers.

No matter what time of day or what occasion, it's always the perfect time for processed cheeses from France.

SYMBOL OF FRENCH-AMERICAN FRIENDSHIP



Completion of the Statue of Liberty's renovation is expected in 1986 on the lady's 100th birthday.

America's strong friendship with France was forged with the help of a very special lady: The Statue of Liberty.

Shipped to America aboard the frigate *Iserc* in 1884, the Statue of Liberty arrived here on June 16, 1885. It was formally dedicated by President Grover Cleveland on October 28, 1886.

The sculptor of the Statue of Liberty was August Bartholdi, born in Colmar, Alsace, France. His hometown maintains the Bartholdi Museum year round. The statue's framework was designed by Gustave Eiffel, who later designed the Eiffel Tower.

In 1986—the Statue of Liberty's 100th birthday year—a mammoth celebration will fill much of it. A spectacular "Operation Sail" will cruise into New York harbor. Throughout the summer of 1986, each of the 50 states will stage a two day celebration of its own history—making up another 100 day festival.

President Reagan and the nation's leading public officials will attend the Statue of Liberty's official re-dedication day ceremonies, October 28, 1986, along with thousands of vessels and millions of visitors. A colorful fireworks display will conclude the celebration.

NEWS

Sports fans who also like to travel may be glad to learn Korea is making an olympian effort to complete its \$243.7 million Olympic Town in time for the 1986 Asian games, well before the 1988 Summer Olympics, to be held in Seoul.

Designed as the largest sports complex in Korea, the town will house several gymnasiums for acrobatics, weightlifting and fencing along with a velodrome and Olympic-sized indoor swimming pool. It will be spread out on 412 acres of land in southeast Seoul.

The athletes' village will contain 2,200 medium-sized apartments capable of accommodating 12,000 foreign athletes and officials. The press village nearby will provide housing for up to 11,000 journalists in 17,000 apartments.

The project is being partially financed by \$129.2 million from an Olympic fund and \$27 million in government subsidies. The remaining \$87.5 million is to come from the sale of the athletes' village apartments after the games.

Hotel construction is also actively pursued. The Korean Ministry of Transportation has approved the construction of eight hotels in Korea, in addition to the 51 now being built, following the steady growth of tourist traffic.

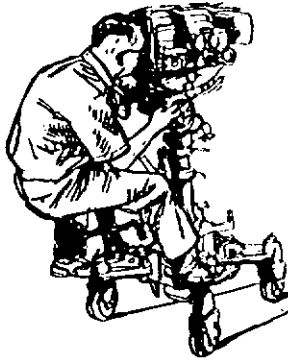


Aerial view of the massive Seoul Sports Complex in Korea currently under construction for the 1986 Asian Games and the 1988 Summer Olympics.

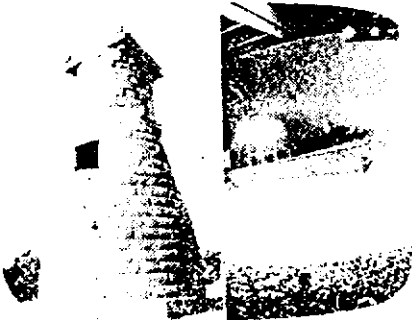

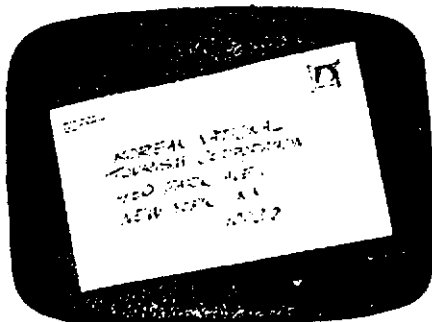

Travelers can get a hand when it comes to saving money on handicrafts. Korea recently opened a discount handicraft center in Seoul.

Prices depend on the merchandise, but in most cases, the cost is well below comparable items at shops located elsewhere in the capital.

For example, most of the jewelry on display is discounted at 30 percent, and souvenir items are available at 20 to 50 percent below their retail value.

High priced items, such as a five-foot-high wooden chest inlaid with mother of pearl, sells for about 20 percent less than its equivalent at a downtown furniture store.

A one-of-a-kind ebony folding screen, with four panels,

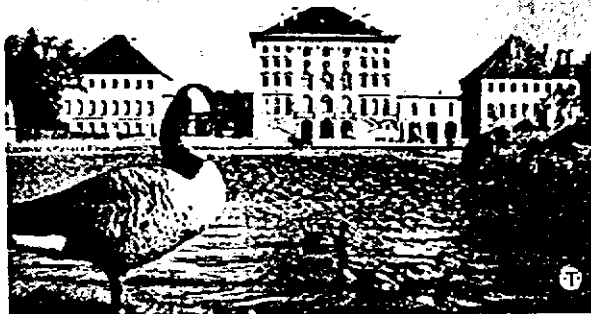
can be ordered for \$3,790, about 25 percent less than the cost of a similar piece in other shops. Less costly Korean-style cabinets and tables are available for under \$200, and a set of brass tableware for \$179.

The center, located in Pango, a residential part of town, was established by Korea's National Agricultural Cooperatives Federation, to encourage farmers skilled in Korean folkcrafts to turn out more quality merchandise to meet the demands of foreign tourists.

SHARPSHOOTING AND HUNTING:
Facts From Revenue Canada Customs and Excise

If you're an American sharpshooter and/or hunter, you'll enjoy your sport in Canada...!

But when you pack for your trip to this beautiful country, leave your handguns behind—otherwise they will be detained once you're on Canadian soil.

Sporting rifles and shotguns for hunting purposes pose little problem, as long as they meet minimum length standard. Hunters may bring in 200 shells duty-free. Five-shot pump or semi-automatic shotguns used for hunting must be "plugged" so that there can be no more than one shell in the breech and two in the chamber.

Your shotguns and rifles (both standard and auto-loading) may be allowed free temporary entry.

A Temporary Admission permit and a deposit may, on occasion, be required for more valuable weapons to guarantee their exportation. The deposit is, of course, refunded when the weapons are exported at the conclusion of your visit.

Each Canadian province or territory makes its own regulations for hunting game and non-migratory birds and fishing. In the interest of conservation, seasons and bag limits are strictly controlled. Closed seasons for certain game birds are sometimes called on short notice, so it is best to check with provincial or ter-



ritorial authorities before setting out. Also, in Canada, there are clearly-marked protected areas where no hunting is allowed such as game sanctuaries, and some private lands which have been posted to prohibit hunting.

For certain competitive shooting events, rifles, shotguns, even handguns pose no problem. Competitors in marksmanship events registered with the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, the Shooting Federation of Canada, or any of the clubs and associations affiliated with them, may bring in 1,000 shells duty-free. Five-shot pump or semi-automatic shotguns used for skeet or trap events need not be "plugged".

If you are competing in a pistol or revolver event sponsored by those organizations, you will need a permit to transport restricted weapons. These may be arranged for through the host organization by contacting in advance, the Registrar of Firearms (usually the police station) in the city nearest the site of the event.

VISITORS TO CANADA
Facts From Revenue Canada Customs and Excise

Visitors may bring into Canada certain goods as personal baggage, duty and tax free, provided all such items are declared to Canada Customs on arrival, and are not subject to restriction. Personal baggage may include such items as: fishing tackle, boats and motors, snowmobiles, etc.; equipment for camping, golf, tennis, scuba diving; radios, television sets, musical instruments, typewriters, cameras and other items of a personal nature to be used in Canada during the visit. Consumable goods may also be included in the quantities listed below.

Alcoholic beverages

If visitors meet the minimum age requirements of the province or territory of entry (19 years in British Columbia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Northwest Territories, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Yukon; 18 years in Alberta, Manitoba, Prince Edward Island and Quebec) they may bring into Canada, duty-free, either:

- a) 1.1 litres (40 ounces) of liquor or wine; or
- b) 24 x 336 ml (12 ounce) cans or bottles of beer or ale, or their equivalent of 8.2 litres (288 fl. ounces).

Additional quantities of alcoholic beverages—up to a maximum of 9 litres (two gallons)—may be imported into Canada (except to Prince Edward Island and the Northwest Territories) on payment of duty and taxes, plus charges for a provincial permit at the port-of-entry.

Tobacco products

Persons 16 years of age or over may bring into Canada, duty-free, 50 cigars, 200 cigarettes and 0.9 kg (two pounds) of manufactured to-



bacco. Federal duty and taxes apply to additional quantities.

Food

Subject to certain restrictions, up to two days' supply of food products per person may be imported without assessment. Quantities in excess of two days' supply may be imported on payment of duty at a rate of 17.5% calculated on the value as expressed in Canadian dollars. (Information on these restrictions are available from any Canadian customs office.)

Gasoline and oil

Gasoline and oil imported for consumption are dutiable. However, reasonable quantities for the tourist's use, for example gas and oil up to the normal capacity of the vehicle, are granted free entry.

Gifts

Bona fide gifts may be sent to friends or relatives residing in Canada, or may be imported by visitors, duty- and tax-free, provided the value of each gift does not exceed \$25 (Canadian funds), and the gifts do not consist of tobacco products, alcoholic beverages or advertising material. Gift packages sent by mail should be plainly marked "UNSOLICITED GIFT" and the value should be indicated.

Gifts valued at more than \$25 (Canadian funds) will be subject to regular duty and taxes on the excess amount.

Note: Applicable rates for duty and taxes are available only from Canada Customs.
