



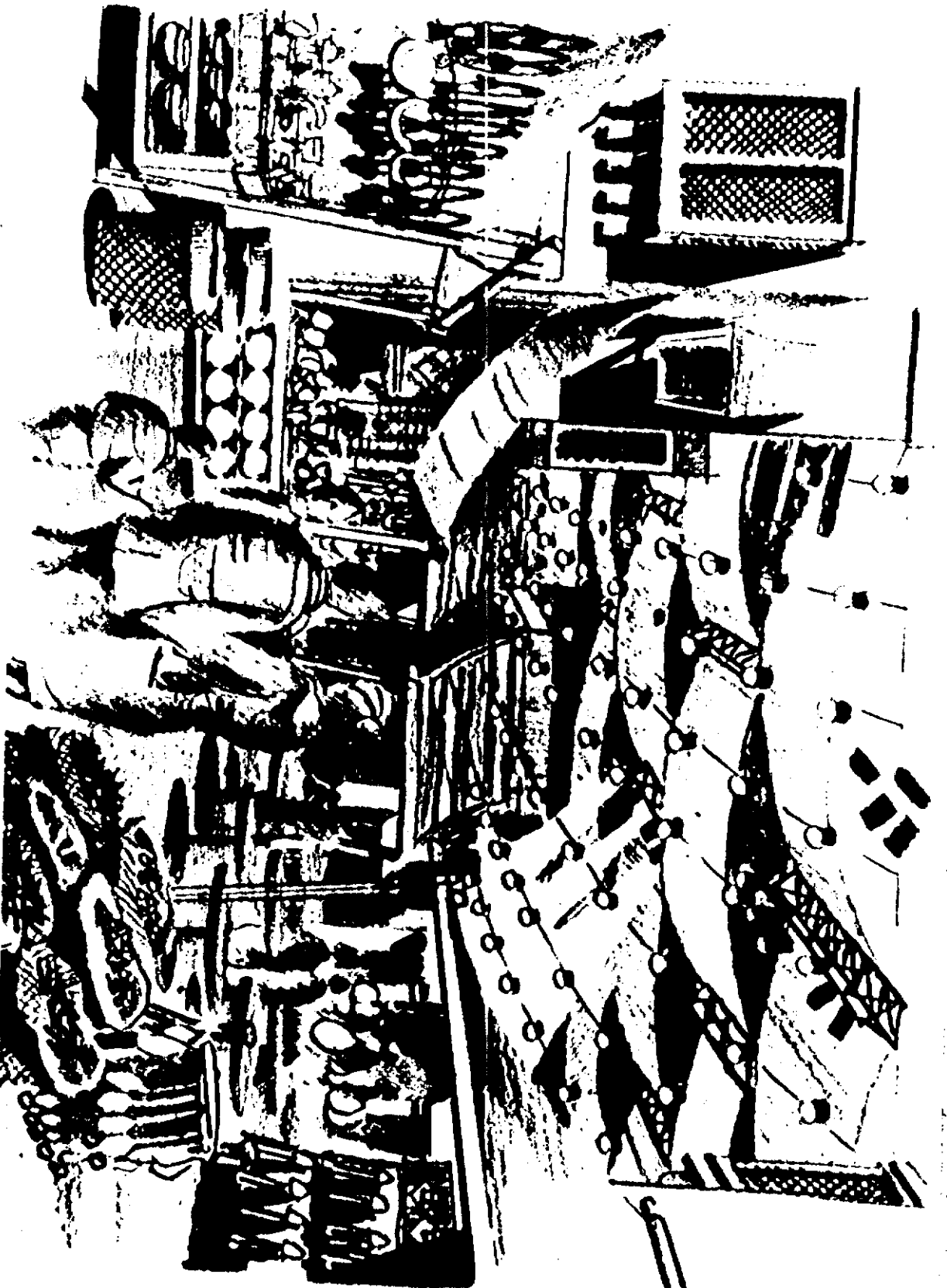

SAUDI ARABIA: YESTERDAY AND TODAY

What it is: A 100,000-square foot cultural exhibition designed to increase understanding of Saudi Arabia, its history, culture, and dramatic economic progress.

Exhibition Overview:

The exhibition will consist of seven major thematic areas: The Land, Pre-Islam, Islam, Society, People, Nation Building and Saudi Arabia and the World Community. Although the emphasis will be on modern Saudi Arabia, a look at the ancient land will provide the historical context in which to examine a modern nation rooted in its traditional values and beliefs. Included in the exhibition is a multi-media presentation shown in a 180-degree theater.

Exhibition Areas:

Introduction and entrance

On the terrace outside the exhibit entrance, visitors will be introduced to images of Saudi people, including portraits of Saudi and U.S. leaders. Back-lit transparencies and vivid photomurals of compelling images will challenge the senses and expand the viewer's understanding of Saudi Arabia. A dark contemporary "tunnel" with large transparencies will lead visitors to the exhibition beyond.

The Land

Visitors will first enter a lush date-palm grove seen at first light. Through the grove they will see dramatic murals depicting the rich variety of Saudi Arabia's geography - The Asir, the mountains north of Taif, the Al Hasa and the coastline of the Eastern Province. The landscapes will open to a Bedouin encampment with a large fully-equipped tent and other smaller exhibits to give visitors a hands-on explanation of the Bedouin and his traditions. Short videotapes will depict traditional desert life, falconry and Arabian horses.

Pre-Islam

Visitors next see a simulation of age-old rock formations surrounded by a photomural of Madain Saleh, once a stronghold of the Nabataeans, a people who dominated the Arabian peninsula trade routes in pre-Islamic times. The focus will be on the peninsula's importance as a center of commercial activity and its archaeological legacy. Life-sized reproductions of cave paintings, road markings and sanctuary statues from key pre-Islamic sites will be displayed.

Islam

As visitors move from the pre-Islamic areas, the desert gives way to a white colonnaded courtyard where the history of Islam and its Five Pillars will be presented. Quotations from the Quran will be used to illustrate the commonalities of Islam and Christianity. A section on pilgrimage will provide historical as well as current information about the "Hajj" or pilgrimage to Makkah. In the "Contributions of Islam," photographs, videotapes and artifacts will be used to illustrate the influence of Islam on world civilization. Ancient Qurans, the doors to the Kaabah, Islam's original house of worship built by the prophet Abraham, and the kiswah cloths (which cover the Kaabah) will be the focal points of the Islam area. "Holy Cities of Islam" will utilize models, photographs and text to describe the historic significance of Makkah and Madinah, the expansion of the holy mosques, and the role of Saudi Arabia as guardian of these holy cities. A final section will look at "Islam in the World Today."

Society

The mystery and beauty of traditional village and city architecture will provide the setting for the story of traditional life. A Najdi courtyard will offer a residential setting with costume and jewelry displays, and a Jeddah street will feature shopfronts with working traditional craftsman. A children's area will replicate the rooftop of an old house in Najran. Here, young visitors will be able to wear Saudi clothes, hear Saudi guides talk about household goods and crafts, see traditional Saudi games, and a videotape on how contemporary Saudi children live.

People

As visitors leave the busy street scene of Society, they will browse through an area featuring dramatic life-sized photomurals of Saudi people - with their families, at home, at play, at school and at work. Video presentations will feature sports and recreational activities. From People, visitors will gather to enter the "experience" theater.

Nation Building

This area will focus on the builders of modern Saudi Arabia, its history as a nation, the achievements of the last 50 years, and Saudi Arabia's commitment to its future. The area centers on a room in the home of King Abdul Aziz furnished with objects actually owned by modern Saudi Arabia's founding king. Thematic areas in this section will include: "The Story of King Abdul Aziz;" "The Nation-builders: Saudi Monarchs and Their Contributions to the Kingdom;" the "History of Saudi Arabia;" and "Achievements," which will be divided into areas describing Saudi Arabia's commitment to harnessing its resources, building for its people and planning for its future.

Saudi Arabia and the World Community

In this final subject area of the exhibition, visitors will examine two important aspects of Saudi Arabia today - its relationship with the United States and its role in the world community. The section on Saudi-U.S. relations will focus on the political, economic and people-to-people aspects of the relationship. Visitors will learn about the Kingdom's contribution to the world food program, international treaties to which Saudi Arabia is a signatory, the Saudi space program, and the international organizations of which Saudi Arabia is a member.

The Souk

A large area simulating an old "souk," or marketplace, will create a dynamic street environment containing a restaurant, "Al Mattam," serving a limited menu of traditional foods, a souvenir shop, a performance area for folkloric and fashion presentations, and accommodations for press conferences, special events and dinners.

The multi-media laser experience

A dramatic three-screen theater will provide the setting for a technological 'leap' from the country's traditional legacy to modern Saudi Arabia. Slides and video will combine with the dynamic use of lasers to tell the story of Islam, the religion which is at the core of Saudi culture and development. A soundtrack and narrative will help place the scenes of a developed Saudi Arabia in the context of the Kingdom's traditions and beliefs.

Special features:

- Officials from Saudi Arabia are expected at each exhibition city for opening galas; business representatives will also attend to meet their counterparts in the U.S.
- Teaching guides on Saudi Arabia will be available for educators in the exhibition cities; buses can be provided for field trips by schools.
- The souk or marketplace will be staffed by a local charity and all profits from the sale of jewelry, books, posters, scarves, cards, shirts, and other items will be donated to them.
- Traditional crafts, dances and music demonstrated by Saudis; special Arabian horse shows scheduled in appropriate cities.
- An extensive information center will be situated near the exit of the exhibit to provide visitors with additional information on various aspects of the show and of Saudi Arabia in general.
- Advertising support for the exhibit will be prominent in each host city.

SAUDI ARABIA: YESTERDAY AND TODAY TO OPEN IN WASHINGTON, D.C. JULY 29

"Saudi Arabia: Yesterday and Today," a cultural exhibition encompassing over 100,000 square feet, opens at the D.C. Convention center on Saturday July 29.

Designed to increase understanding of Saudi Arabia, its history, culture, and dramatic economic progress, the exhibit will be visually exciting with folkloric dancers, Bedouin tents, the re-creation of a Saudi marketplace or "souk", native craftsmen at work, authentic costume and jewelry designs, and foods of the country. Visitors will see a variety of Saudi Arabian landscapes from mountains to deserts, from pre-Islamic ceremonial burials grounds to ancient trade routes. Through panoramic videotapes they will experience camel racing, falconry, and traditional desert life as well as the dynamic contemporary Saudi Arabia with its modern capital of Riyadh.

In a 400-seat, 180 degree theater, a spectacular show will combine multi-media projections and atmospheric lasers to provide a unique view of Saudi Arabia, its people, its geographic diversity, and its extraordinary progress.

"Saudi Arabia: Yesterday and Today" will be on view at the Washington (D.C.) Convention center from July 29-August 20. Hours are 10 a.m. - 9 p.m. daily. Admission is free.

After leaving Washington, the exhibition will travel to the Atlanta Inforum from November 10-November 25; the Dallas Convention center from December 9-December 23; the New York Exposition center from April 7-April 20, 1990 and the Los Angeles Convention center from June 15-June 30, 1990.
