ATTACHMENT A

Asociacion Nacional de la Empresa Privada de El Salvador (ANEP)

On behalf of this foreign principal, the registrant monitored legislation which could affect the principal and introduced the principal to members of Congress and the Administration to report on economic conditions in El Salvador.

China External Trade Development Council (CETDC)

During the reporting period, the registrant has contacted staff members in both the House of Representatives and the Senate for the purpose of reporting on the status of legislation involving Congressional resolutions of interest to the CETDC.


