RE: Status of FY-1991 NASA Appropriations

Last week the Senate VA-HUD Independent Agencies Subcommittee met to mark-up the FY-1991 spending bill that includes funds for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The space agency took a massive hit, suffering a \$1.7 billion cut. Significant results of the committee's actions are as follows:

SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE ON VA-HUD INDEPENDENT AGENCIES

Total approved for NASA in FY-1991 - **\$13.5 BILLION**

- This is a 10% increase over the current year's budget;
- \$850 million less than the House provided;
- \$2 billion less than the President's budget request.

Total approved for the Space Station in FY-1991 - **\$1.6 BILLION**

- This is \$162 million less than was provided in FY-1990;
- \$656 million less than the House provided;
- \$863 million less than the President's budget request.

Senator Barbara Mikulski (D-MD), Chairman of the panel, took an eleventh hour phone call from Vice-President Dan Quayle, who was calling to plead for funds for space station, Moon-Mars, etc. However, Mikulski said at the hearing that due to a "massive shortfall" in the subcommittee's overall 302 (b) budget allocation there were simply not enough funds to go around.

Needless to say, the space station is in considerable jeopardy at this point. While the VA-HUD INdependent Agencies subcommittee approved by voice vote the spending levels discussed above, the full Appropriations Committee has yet to meet on this bill.

As we view the situation, and based on our conversations and attendance at the subcommittee mark-up, Senator Mikulski is hopeful that a resolution of the Budget Summit, still underway, will provide some restoration of the NASA deductions before the bill reaches conference with the House. This is an especially unusual turn of events, considering that a few months ago it was the conventional wisdom that the budget summit could be the death knell of the U.S. space program.

A final appropriation of \$1.6 billion for space station would cause a major slippage in the program, probably a major redesign and possibly cancellation. Congressional staff are very concerned, as is NASA. On Capitol Hill the \$1.6 billion is viewed as tantamount to discontinuing the space station program and, as a result, station supporters in Congress will use every argument possible to increase funding. The international argument (i.e. U.S. fulfilling commitments to international partners) could play a significant role in saving station if ESA, Japan and Canada voice their increasing concerns to the Bush Administration and Congress.

We have learned, through private conversations with Stephan Kohashi of the VA-HUD subcommittee, that Senator Garn (R-UT), absent from the subcommittee mark due to a death in the family, plans to offer a proposal on the Senate floor which will essentially *waive* the budget spending level for VA-HUD and increase funds available for NASA. Stephan tells us that this little used legislative procedure will probably turn into a "thumbs-up or a thumbs-down" on the space station if the budget summit doesn't exempt NASA from major cutbacks. The Garn waiver proposal could be voted on within two weeks.

We believe all is not lost, however. The possibility of the budget summit or the budget waiver succeeding is NASA's best hope at the moment. The Conference between the House and Senate could also provide some increased funding for space station. The Bush Administration remains committed to funds for the space station and Moon-Mars exploration. One source at the White House was quoted as saying, "anything that causes the space station to be jeopardized or canceled is unacceptable."

Budget Summiteers have only a few more weeks to reach agreement before the Gramm-Rudman automatic spending cuts kick in. We will be following the summit closely and will inform you of any developments affecting the space program.

June 12th, the House HUD-Independent Agencies Subcommittee, chaired by Congressman Robert Traxler, marked-up the Subcommittee's 302 (b) allocation. The allocation for HUD-Independent agencies in FY-1991 is ***\$59.175 billion***.

Amidst a background of uncertainty the appropriators are attempting to go ahead with writing the spending bills with neither a budget summit agreement between Congress and the administration or a congressional budget resolution to guide them. Congressional leaders and the White House continue to meet this week to try and work out some kind of budget agreement. Hoping that the budget summit would produce an agreement by mid June appropriators had put off work on the spending bills. However, with no agreement in sight congressional bill writers have forged ahead agreeing to keep their total spending within the bounds of President Bush's budget.

Action in the HUD Subcommittee last Tuesday, produced the following:

NASA - \$14.3 billion; a \$825 million cut from the Bush budget of \$15.1 billion
- This is a 17.5 percent increase from the FY-1990 level

Space Station - \$2.3 billion; \$195 million less than Bush request, but a boost from the \$1.7 billion provided in FY-1990.

Moon-Mars Initiative - \$15 million; a \$314 million cut to Bush exploration-related request of \$188 million.

NASA appears not to have fared too badly, however, money that appears available now could be gobbled up once a budget summit agreement is reached and plans for attacking the federal deficit are finalized. Obviously, Moon-Mars has been dealt a forceful blow. However, there has been relatively little outcry against the huge cut so far. Ardent space advocate, Congressman Robert Walker, decried the fact that space supporters were not more upset at the cut-back. On the other hand, the White House continues to press for special treatment for NASA funds, therefore preventing those funds from being raided. (Moon-Mars has been singled out by President Bush as crucial to the future of the U.S. space program). This idea of

IMMEDIATE ACTION REQUIRED - FY-1991 SUSV MONEY IN DEEP TROUBLE

As we reported to you, the Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) zeroed out (terminated) the \$27 million for SUSV's in the FY-1991 Budget. The reason was simple - they couldn't find any REAL Army or Army Reserve support for the \$27 million.

Prior to making their decision last week, the SASC staff (Dan Sakura) tried to help us. Dan reported to us that he tried to help by doing the following:

1. Requested documented requirements from the Army and Army Reserves. The Army documented requirements showed that all of the requirements for the SUSV had been met without the \$27 million. Dan then asked for Army reserve requirements but no one could produce any documents.
2. Dan then made calls to Senators offices to determine if any Army Reserve units had lobbied for SUSV's. He determined that no calls had been made. He also searched the Committee files and he found no letters of support from the Army Reserve people in the Pentagon or from any Army Reserve units.

Given the fact that the SASC had just approved \$29 million for us in April (the National Guard money) Dan said they had no choice but to zero us when no one in the Pentagon or in the reserves would fight for the money.

Joe Papapietro (Army Congressional Affairs) also tried to help. He made repeated calls to the Army Reserves in order to get documented requirements but never received any support. Both Sakura and Papapietro said they are supporters of the SUSV but they couldn't do anything without documented support from the customer.

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As you know, the SASC has zeroed us out in the past and we have still managed to win in the end. However, the total lack of support from the Pentagon is of grave concern to us. We need support from the customer!

The next decision in the budget process will be made next Thursday, July 26th. The House Armed Services Committee will "mark-up" the FY-1991 DOD budget on that date. We have been told that this committee will also zero out the SUSV money unless the customer pushes for the SUSV.

Joe Papapietro told us that Shawn Hickey is not senior enough to help out. (By the way, Hickey is on travel until Monday). In addition we called the 187th Army Reserve in Massachusetts. Mr. Warren Liljegren reported that he was familiar with the SUSV but didn't know of any requirements for the SUSV. Warren is in charge of force development at the 187th.
