Monitored and analyzed bills and resolutions in the U.S. Congress pertaining to relations between the U.S. and the Republic of South Africa; advised Ambassador and Embassy on same.

Monitored articles in newspapers, magazines and other printed matter, and programs on television and radio pertaining to South Africa; advised on relevant rebuttal or clarification of same when it was thought needed.

Monitored Congressional hearings on South Africa as well as Congressional committee meetings where bills or amendments dealing with relations with South Africa were considered.

Developed and provided liaison with non-governmental groups and organizations interested in U.S. foreign policy.

Provided liaison with Congressional staff groups concerned with U.S. foreign policy.

Provided information to Congressional offices on events in South Africa; such information included copies of articles from newspapers and magazines and speeches; also research on the ANC.

Assisted with visit of Deputy Minister of Information Louis Nel to Washington, D.C.

Assisted Embassy with visit of Professor Gerrit Olivier, Visiting Scholar at Harvard University and Professor of Political Science at the University of Pretoria, to Washington, D.C.

Provided information on South Africa to opinion leaders including organizations and media; such information included copies of magazine and newspaper articles and speeches.

Consulted with Ambassador and Embassy personnel on relations with American media, particularly in regard to how to increase attention for reforms taking place in South Africa in such areas as the government's commitment to political participation by all parts of South African society, the government's program of negotiation with all groups that seek change through peaceful means, and the government's

commitment to a system of equal rights with no political domination by any one group.

Discussed potential Congressional Committee actions that would harm relations between the U.S. and South Africa and would harm the cause of reform in South Africa with Members of Congress and their staffs.

Arranged meetings between Congressional staff and Embassy personnel.

Consulted with other consultants and law firms that serve as registered foreign agents for the Republic of South Africa.

For the Republic of South Africa:

Developed and provided liaison with non-governmental groups and organizations interested in U.S. foreign policy.

Provided liaison with Congressional staff groups concerned with U.S. foreign policy.

Provided information to Congressional offices, civic organizations, groups, media, and educational organizations, with information on events in South Africa, including:

- 1) Speech by Louis Nel, Deputy Minister of Information of South Africa made on October 16, 1985, in which he stressed South Africa's ongoing advance to a full democracy, citing the government's pledge that there will be no political domination of one group over another, and the removal of any racial discrimination and encroachment upon human dignity, equal opportunity and one collective South African citizenship.
- 2) Article by Karen Elliott House, "Don't Push South Africa to the Wall," from October 30, 1985 Wall Street Journal, in which House points out that enlightened self-interest should lead the government to continue and accelerate reforms. House also stresses that the more the U.S. insists on negotiations with the ANC, the more it strengthens the violent extreme and undermines the moderate middle.
- 3) Compilation of articles dealing with southern Africa, including an undated article, "Mugabe Risks the Big Drop From Sanctions," from the South African newspaper Business Day that points out the fact that South Africa's trade with black Africa increased by 94.8% in the first six months of 1985. Other newspaper articles included "Sanctions Against South Africa Will Hurt America the Most," from the Nov. 5, 1985 Manchester Union Leader; "A No-Growth Future for Zimbabwe," Sept. 26, 1985 and "Understanding Afrikaners is Key to Further Reforms," Nov. 18, 1985, both from the Wall Street Journal. "Who Speaks for South Africa's Blacks?" by Mangosuthu Buthelezi, from Nov. 27, 1985, The Washington Post which questions American support of the ANC. Buthelezi criticizes the ANC's use of violent tactics to bring about change even though the government has made "one turnabout about another on many of the policy perceptions that were the cornerstones of apartheid." He also points out that the U.S. must give serious thought as to what forces in South Africa need to be assisted; assistance should go to those who seek peaceful change and measure up to American values. "Why South Africa Clamped

Down on Foreign Media," Human Events Nov. 23, 1985; a July 1985 Reader's Digest article, entitled "Africa's Hidden Terror," which is a compilation of quotes from leading journals and newspapers throughout the world concerning fratricidal conditions in such African nations as Uganda, Nigeria, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Ethiopia, and Guinea and how those conditions are important to keep in context when considering events on the African continent. Excerpts from "The Famine Workers," by Clifford D. May, Dec. 1, 1985 The New York Times Magazine.

4) Statements from Oliver Tambo, President of the African National Congress (ANC) concerning his views and the ANC's views on such topics as Communism, terrorism, violence, and nationalization. Included are the following statements: "Long live the Communist Party of the Soviet Union," "We are saying South Africa must bleed and die... Let the whole country experience this," and "The solution we see is one of nationalization."

5) Second compilation of newspaper and magazine articles concerning southern Africa, including "Progress in South Africa," Feb. 4, 1986, The Washington Times; "Apartheid's Death Warrant?" Feb. 6, 1986, The Washington Times which discusses the latest reforms of the Botha government such as the declaration that apartheid is an outdated concept that South Africa has outgrown. The article also stresses that the situation in South Africa is enormously complex, and that power sharing is an important step for South Africa. The article urges critics to be patient in awaiting further reforms. The compilation also includes an article entitled "South Africa: Will White Rule End?" February 1986 Reader's Digest which reviews the position of South African blacks before the Botha government, and the improvements that government has made. It also points out South Africa's strategic value to the Soviet Union and the Soviet Union's financial and military support of the ANC. Also, "Debt Mediator Signals He Won't Press Pretoria for Political Changes," Jan. 13, 1986 Wall Street Journal; an excerpt from the Jan. 13, 1986 Washington Post concerning Swiss debt mediator Franz Leutwiler's statements on President Botha's "very strong commitment to reform." "ANC's Terrorist Year," The Sunday London Times, Jan. 5, 1986; Excerpt from a speech by Mangosuthu Buthelezi appearing in the Jan. 28, 1986 Wall Street Journal; "West's Live Aid Digs Graves In Ethiopia," Jan. 24, 1986, The Wall Street Journal; "Ethiopian Resettlement: Vomit and Death," Jan. 27, 1986, The Wall Street Journal; "'Apartheid Chic' at South African Embassy," Feb 1, 1986 Human Events; "Uganda's New House, Already Divided Against Itself," The Economist Feb. 1, 1986.
