Monitored and analyzed bills and resolutions in the U.S Congress pertaining to relations between the U.S. and the Republic of South Africa; advised the Ambassador and Embassy on same; such monitoring includes scheduling of committee and subcommittee hearings and other meetings.

Monitored articles in newspapers, magazines and other printed matter, and programs on television and radio pertaining to South Africa; advised on relevant rebuttal or clarification of same when it was thought needed.

Monitored Congressional hearings on South Africa, as well as Congressional committee meetings where bills and amendments dealing with relations with South Africa were considered.

Monitored and analyzed actions in each House of Congress that pertain to relations with Republic of South Africa and advised Ambassador and Embassy on same; including research on positions of Members of Congress and background on new Members of Congress.

Developed and provided liaison with non-governmental groups and organizations interested in U.S. foreign policy.

Provided liaison with Congressional staff groups concerned with U.S. foreign policy.

Provided information to Congressional offices on events in South Africa; such information included copies of articles from newspapers and magazines; also research on statements made by Oliver Tambo in various publications; cited terrorist acts by the ANC and their connection with other terrorist groups around the world through quotes from various sources; compiled excerpts from human rights reports on the following countries: Angola, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe; compiled quotes from former

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supporters of sanctions against South Africa who now question or oppose sanctions.

Provided information to civic organizations, groups, media, and educational organizations on events in South Africa; such information included copies of magazine and newspaper articles.

Consulted with Ambassador and Embassy personnel on relations with American media, particularly in regard to how to increase attention for reforms taking place in South Africa in such areas as the government's commitment to political participation by all parts of South African society, the government's program of negotiation with all groups that seek change through peaceful means, the government's commitment to a system of equal rights with no political domination by any one group that seek change through peaceful means, and the negative impact of sanctions by the United States for peaceful change.

Included are the following statements: "Long live the Communist Party of the Soviet Union," "We are saying South Africa must bleed and die Let the whole country experience this," and "The solution we see is one of nationalization" in regard to the economic policies of the ANC.

2) An article from the January 28, 1987 issue of The Washington Post "Church Report Declares Sanctions Unproductive" in which the South African Catholic Bishops states the economic sanctions against South Africa are having opposite effect than what was intended.
