Monitored and analyzed bills and resolutions in the U.S. Congress pertaining to relations between the U.S. and the Republic of South Africa; advised the Ambassador and Embassy on same; such monitoring includes scheduling of committee and subcommittee hearings and other meetings.

Monitored Congressional hearings on South Africa, as well as Congressional committee meetings where bills and amendments dealing with relations with South Africa were considered.

Monitored and analyzed actions in each House of Congress that pertain to relations with Republic of South Africa and advised Ambassador and Embassy on same; including research on positions of Members of Congress.

Developed and provided liaison with non-governmental groups and organizations interested in U.S. foreign policy.

Provided liaison with Congressional staff groups concerned with U.S. foreign policy.

Provided information to Congressional offices on events in South Africa; such information included copies of articles from newspapers and magazines; issues on denial of foreign tax credits; cited terrorist acts by the ANC and their connection with other terrorist groups around the world through quotes from various sources

Analyzed articles in newspapers, magazines and other printed matter, and programs on television and radio pertaining to South Africa; advised on relevant rebuttal or clarification of same when it was thought needed.

Provided information to civic organizations, groups, media, and educational organizations on events in South Africa; such information included magazine and newspaper articles; research on release of security prisoners, South Africa's role in Angola, summary of budget reconciliation measure.

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Consulted with Ambassador and Embassy personnel on relations with American media, particularly in regard to how to increase attention for reforms taking place in South Africa in such areas as the government's commitment to political participation by all parts of South African society, the government's program of negotiation with all groups that seek change through peaceful means, the government's commitment to a system of equal rights with no political domination by any one group, and the negative impact of sanctions by the United States for peaceful change.

Arranged meetings between Ambassador Koornhof and Members of Congress.

Discussed potential Congressional Committee actions and actions of Congress that would harm relations between the U.S. and South Africa and would harm the cause of peaceful change and reform in South Africa with Members of Congress and their staff and other governmental officials.

Arranged meetings among Congressional staff, Ambassador Koornhof, and Embassy personnel.

Arranged a guest commentary by Ambassador Koornhof on Radio America.

Consulted and regularly met with other consultants and law firms that serve as registered foreign agents for the Republic of South Africa as well as Embassy personnel and other South African officials.

Consulted with officials of South African consulates in U.S. on relations between U.S. and South Africa.

Assisted in planning for receptions, dinners and other meetings at Embassy including updating invitation lists.

Suggested possible appointments to Embassy for South African education experts who were planning to visit the U.S. to study the U.S. education system.

Provided Embassy with research on U.S. Constitutional development and other issues as requested by Embassy.
