This is in response to the July 29, 1987 letter that our firm received from Mr. Joseph E. Clarkson requesting certain supplemental information regarding the six month supplemental registration statement filed by Berman, Bergner & Boyette for the period ending March 20, 1987. This letter asked a number of questions regarding reports on activities this firm engaged in on behalf of different foreign clients. We have reviewed our records and will answer, in this letter, the questions you posed in your July 29th letter to us. We will answer these questions in the order in which they were asked. Please feel free to call me personally if you require any further information or documentation.

1. Your July 29th letter notes that our firm ceased to represent the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in December, 1986. Our prior supplemental statement for the period ending September 20, 1986 referred to the planning of a possible Congressional staff trip to Saudi Arabia. The supplemental statement for the period ending March 20, 1987 contains no reference to the trip because the client informed us at some time in late October or early November of 1986 that the trip would have to be postponed. After we were told this, we ceased all planning activity regarding the trip and to our knowledge this trip did not occur.
2. Your second question relates to item 15 of the March 20, 1987 report which asks the identity of the persons present at the luncheon and dinner meetings under item 15 and apparently listed under Attachment C of our filing. These lunch and dinner meetings are more completely summarized on the amendment to registration statement form (OMB #1105-00004) filed as an attachment to this letter.

3. With respect to the Government of Korea, you noted that our firm had attempted to set up meetings between Korean officials and U.S. Senators and asked follow up questions as to whether the meetings occurred and who attended. Most of the meetings related to the visit to the U.S. of Mr. David Pong of Korea who is Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee (or its Korean equivalent) of the Korean legislative body. The Korean Embassy asked us to assist in scheduling meetings with designated members of the U.S. Congress on behalf of Mr. Pong. The expressed purpose of these meetings was for Mr. Pong to brief Senators and Congressmen on current political developments in Korea. The following meetings occurred as a result of the scheduling attempts we made as disclosed in our March 20, 1987 report.
- a. Senator Richard Lugar met with Mr. Pong on February 5, 1987. No one from Berman, Bergner & Boyette was present, and as result we are unable to disclose firsthand the matters discussed.
 - b. On February 3, 1987 Mr. Pong met with Senator Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island. Jeff Bergner was present at this meeting which was a brief courtesy call. Mr. Pong discussed the current political situation in Korea with Senator Pell.
 - c. On February 4, 1987 Mr. Pong met with Senator Robert Dole. No one from Berman, Bergner & Boyette was present, and as a result we are unable to disclose firsthand the matters discussed.
 - d. On February 4, 1987 Mr. Pong met with Senator Alfonse D'Amato. Wayne Berman of Berman, Bergner & Boyette was present as Senator D'Amato and Mr Pong discussed the current political situation in Korea as well as Korea's balance of payments with the U.S.
 - e. On or about January 13, 1987 Ambassador Kim of S. Korea met with Senator John Kerry to discuss human rights matters of interest to Senator Kerry. No one from Berman, Bergner & Boyette was present at this meeting, however, we did assist in arranging the meeting as noted in items 5 and 6 of Attachment B.

In all other cases where Berman, Bergner & Boyette attempted to arrange meetings on behalf of the Government of Korea, scheduling difficulties and conflicts precluded these meetings from occurring.

4. Your letter notes that Jeff Bergner met with Tim Roemer of Senator DeConcini's staff to discuss a congressional

resolution on Korea. There were approximately four draft Senate resolutions on Korea that were circulating at that particular time. Two resolutions were being floated by Senator Murkowski, one by Senator Cranston and one by Senator DeConcini. Each of these draft resolutions was designed to express the sense of the Congress regarding political events that were unfolding in Korea at the time. With respect to our firm's advocacy of or against these resolutions, our role should be explained a bit more fully. We were attempting to convey the current political situation in Korea as it existed at the time and to counsel against excessive public denunciations of the Korean government. We attempted to explain that the Korean government was working to liberalize internally and that use of excessive language by the U.S. Congress might have a counterproductive effect. A modified version of the Cranston resolution was attached to the State Department Authorization Bill which, as of this writing, has not been considered by the full Senate.

5. Your July 29th letter asks follow up questions regarding activity reported on behalf of the Government of Bermuda. Berman, Bergner & Boyette was originally engaged by the Government of Bermuda to support ratification of the U.S.-Bermuda Double Taxation Treaty that had previously been negotiated by representatives of the U.S. Treasury Department and the Government of Bermuda. As a result, we favored prompt treaty ratification. Very shortly after we were engaged, we were contacted by a representative of the government of Bermuda and instructed to cease all efforts. To this date we are unclear why this occurred. The treaty remains unratified to date.
6. Your July 29th letter requests further information on issues that this firm was making on behalf of the Government of Taiwan. With respect to the January 26, 1987 meeting with Senator John Breaux and Dr. Fred Chien, the parties discussed ways to increase Taiwan's investment in the U.S. and a possible trip to Taiwan by Senator Breaux. Such a trip has not been scheduled to date. The 2/19/87 meeting attended by Van Boyette, Dr. Lyushun Shen and Jeff Lang was held to brief Jeff Lang on ongoing Taiwan efforts to reduce the existing trade surplus with the U.S. Discussion centered on the exchange rate of the new Taiwanese dollar and Taiwan's compliance with GATT trading rules. Mr. Bergner's conversations with Bill Triplett on 3/12/87, 2/17/87 and 3/13/87 (John Ritch) dealt with the Biden/Levine bill which would require Congressional approval for any arms sales over a certain amount. Jeff Bergner's conversations with these individuals were preliminary efforts to determine whether this bill would be seriously pressed forward. No follow up was required, as this bill has not advanced through the legislative process.

With respect to the 3/4/87 lunch between Jeff Bergner and Andy McLeod of Congressman Leach's staff, this expenditure was not reported under item 15(a) because it was billed to another domestic client of Berman, Bergner & Boyette (Salomon Brothers, Inc.) for whom we did banking work. Subjects discussed at the lunch included:

- a) Congratulations to Andy McLeod on his recent new job with Congressman Leach (Mr. McLeod was a former employee of Senator Weicker and a friend of Jeff Bergner's).
- b). Discussion of House Banking Committee issues.
- c) A mention of the fact that Jeff Bergner would like to meet Congressman Leach because of his interest in Taiwan. There has been no follow-up on a meeting with Congressman Leach.


The lunch was billed to Salomon Brothers, Inc. rather than Taiwan because discussion of non-Taiwan issues predominated. Accordingly, it does not appear necessary to make an amendment to the registration forms in this respect because the lunch was incorrectly characterized as being billed to Taiwan initially.

7. You correctly note that Miss Pam Richardson is listed in two separate places as making a contact on behalf of a foreign principal. Miss Richardson is listed as having telephoned Ms. Cooper with Senator Stennis on 1/27/87 in an attempt to set up an appointment for Mr. Pong and again with Ms. Nante with Senator Lugar on 1/28/87. Miss Richardson is employed by Berman, Bergner & Boyette in an office manager/secretarial capacity. She is correctly listed in our March 20th report as having made the two calls referred to. Miss Richardson does no lobbying or is in no position to make representation on behalf of our firm for foreign clients. In these two instances she did attempt to assist us in setting up appointments for Mr. Pong and, according to the regulations we probably should have registered her with your office. Accordingly we are submitting a short form registration statement for Pam Richardson with this letter for the period ending March 20, 1987. However, for purposes of future reporting you may consider this short form registration statement revoked as of the close of the prior reporting period because we have made it very clear that Miss Richardson is not to engage in the future, nor has she engaged since March 20, 1987 in any activities on behalf of our foreign principals.

Finally, the second set of amendment forms regarding item 15 (a) of the supplemental statement for the period ending September 20, 1987 are also enclosed with the supplemental information requested.
