I have continued to represent the NPL before the North Pacific Fishery Management Council in their request for foreign fishing allocations (talff). My representation also included representing the NPL before the administrative bodies responsible for release of the talff - the National Marine Fisheries Service (NOAA) and the United States State Department. I have been in contact with the various agency personnel on issues of talff, fish releases and other issues affecting our request for foreign fishing rights. I also worked with various officials from the State of Alaska in our continuing joint venture fishing projects and in our cooperative research project with the Northwest Alaska Fisheries Center in Seattle.



Dear Mr. Takaoka:

Thank you for your letter inquiring about the potential for continuing the U.S.-Japan cooperative longline survey into 1989. In 1987, we initiated a similar survey using a U.S. vessel from our domestic fleet. This U.S. survey has been limited to the Gulf of Alaska. We have been able to coordinate the U.S. domestic survey with your cooperative survey for the last two summers. Based on the results of the 1987 survey comparison, we modified the longline method for the U.S. vessel. The preliminary comparison of the results from the 1988 survey indicated a similar pattern in the catch rates between the two vessels. A repeat of the two surveys in 1989 would be useful comparison for correlating and merging the 10-year time series with the new U.S. survey data results.

Your survey also provides useful data on the distribution and relative abundance of outer shelf and upper slope regions of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Island regions. Your longline survey along the shelf edge would be the only source of survey data on sablefish distribution and relative abundance for these two management areas in 1989.

For these two reasons, the results from a Japanese longline survey in 1989 would be very beneficial to the data base for



assessing sablefish and other species associated with the upper slope and outer shelf areas.



Today I received from Japan the information you requested regarding Mr. Tatsuo Yoshiba, the Japanese scientist who will coordinate the last leg of the cruise.

Mr. Yoshiba was born in 1939 and has worked for Nichiro Gyogyo, Co., a major fishing company in Japan, from 1959 through 1988. He is licensed as a navigator and a fisheries specialist. At Nichiro Gyogyo, he engaged in fisheries resource surveys and supervised fishing technology development in Central and South America and Africa. From 1967 through 1989, he worked as a fisheries specialist with the Overseas Fisheries Cooperative Foundation and the Japan International Cooperative Agency.



Very successful our joint longline surveys, which had been conducted for the past ten years, came to be followed by the NPLGA in 1989. I understand the proper party to conduct the survey is the North Pacific Cooperative Fisheries of Japan (NPCFJ). I believe that continuation of this survey is very worthwhile and must contribute greatly to analyze stock condition of the important groundfish resources in your waters.

Mr. Kiyoshi Fujii, who will go on board a research vessel (Tsune maru No. 31) as chief scientist, had worked for long time at the Hokkaido Regional Fisheries Research Laboratory of Fisheries Agency of Japan. After retired he now belongs to the NPCFJ. I know there is objective evaluation that he is a very faithful and an enthusiast for works. 

Dear Mr. Takaoka:

We welcome the Japanese research vessel Tsune Maru No. 31 as a cooperative research vessel with the Alaska Fisheries Center during the agreed-upon sablefish longline study. The Tsune Maru No. 31 will fish sablefish longline gear in the Bering Sea, Aleutian Islands, and Gulf of Alaska from May 10 to September 10, 1989. The vessel should pursue the objectives of the agreed-upon joint research plan only from the U.S. 12-mile territorial limit seaward. Please note this is a change from the former three-mile limit.

The above-named vessel will operate as a research vessel and is not subject to restrictions placed upon commercial vessels while conducting bona fide research as outlined in the agreed-upon research plan; therefore, the vessel may enter into commercial fishing sanctuaries. However, in these areas and throughout coastal waters where U.S. vessels may be operating or where U.S. fixed fishing gear is sighted, the research vessel will use utmost caution to avoid interference. If the research vessel should accidentally contact or interfere with U.S. fishing gear, the matter should be fully documented and reported.

It is understood that this vessel may collect scientific data within the Magnuson Fishery Conservation and Management Act Zone, using longline and other typical fishery and oceanographic data gathering gear. Research longline sets should be of short duration and limited to only that necessary to characterize the sample site.



We propose to place U.S. participating investigators aboard the vessel. U.S. scientists will discuss plans to expedite personnel transfers with their Japanese counterparts. However, our first investigator expects to travel to Japan to join the vessel.

The vessel may process and retain research catches except for certain prohibited species, including salmon, halibut, and crab. Small samples of rare or unusual species of scientific value may be retained for return to Japanese museums or fishery laboratories. Each sample must be clearly marked as to its destination and expected purpose.



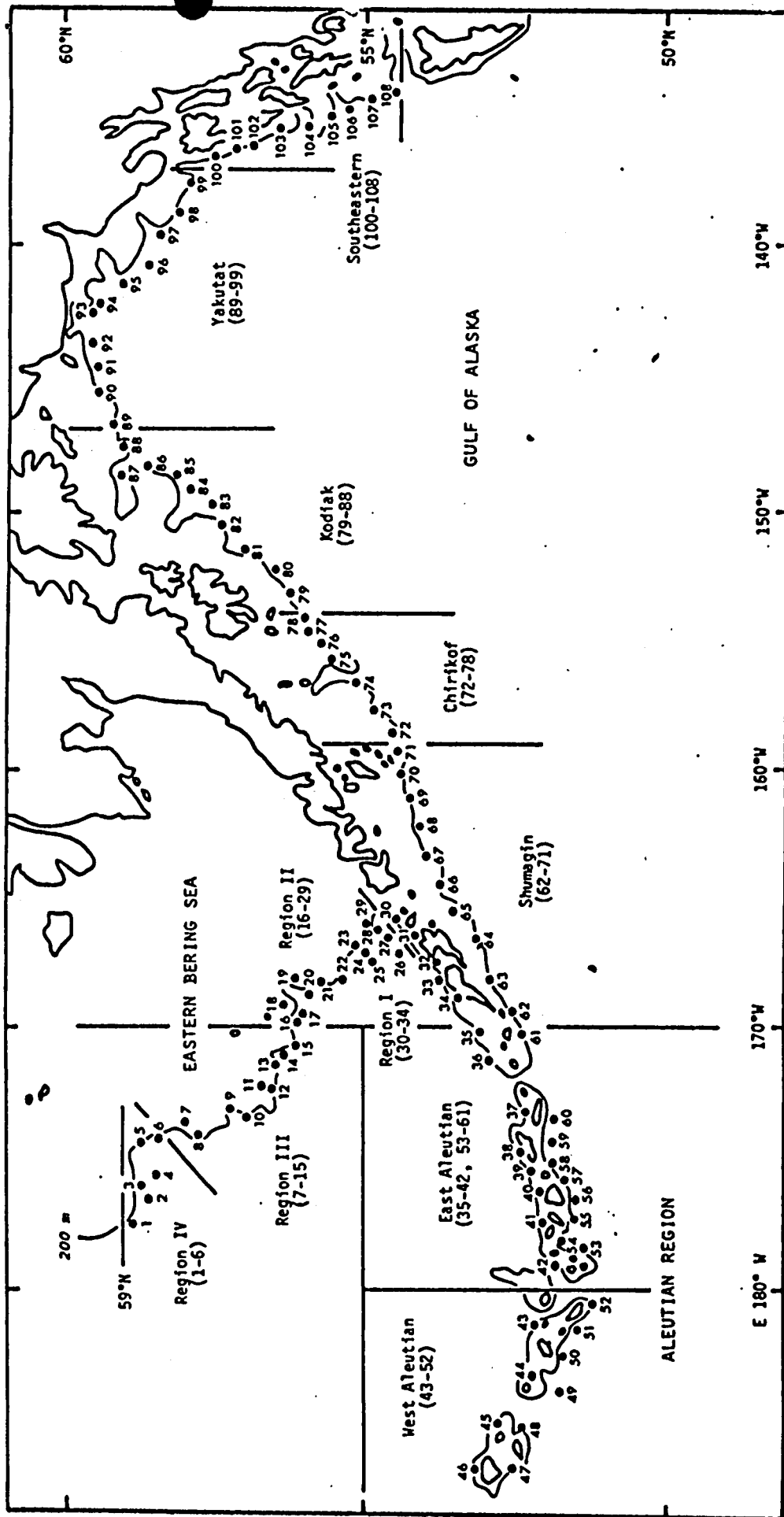


Figure 1. Location of stations in Japan-U.S. joint longline survey in the eastern Bering Sea, Aleutian Islands Region, and Gulf of Alaska, 1989.
