FORWARD

The attached Declaration of Principles and Plan to Implement the Restoration of Democracy and the Rule of Law in Haiti will be signed by the President of the Haitian Senate, the President of the Haitian Chamber of Deputies, and representatives of the Haitian military, of various church groups and of the private sector in Haiti. After the Declaration and Plan have been signed, the documents will be sent to the Organization of American States and released to the public.

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES

We, the undersigned citizens of Haiti, acknowledge and accept the result of Haiti's presidential elections.

We accept the return of Jean-Bertrand Aristede of Haiti to perform his constitutionally prescribed functions as President of the Republic of Haiti.

Mr. Aristede's return, however, must occur in accordance with the following conditions and in accordance with the attached Plan to Implement the Restoration of Democracy and Rule of Law in Haiti:

1. The Prime Minister will be selected through a process of negotiations among the duly constituted representatives of Haitian society, such negotiations to occur in a neutral site -- in Washington, D.C. -- under the auspices of the OAS.

2. Participants in those negotiations will include, in accordance with the Constitution of Haiti, representatives of the Haitian Senate, representatives of the Haitian Chamber of Deputies, Mr. Aristede and other parties involved in the crisis.

3. In addition to identifying the new Prime Minister of Haiti, the negotiation process will produce mutually agreed upon guarantees and safeguards and will identify third party guarantors to assist in the implementation of Haiti's return to democracy and respect for the rule of law.

PLAN TO IMPLEMENT RESTORATION OF
DEMOCRACY AND THE RULE OF LAW IN HAITI

We, the undersigned, agree to take the following steps aimed at restoring democracy and the rule of law in Haiti:

STEP 1: The duly constituted representatives of Haitian society -- including Mr. Aristede, the President of the Senate, the President of the Chamber of Deputies and other parties involved in the crisis -- will meet as a Committee to Restore Democracy in Haiti.

STEP 2: The Committee will identify a mutually agreeable individual to serve as Prime Minister of Haiti in accordance with the requirements and provisions of the Haitian Constitution.

STEP 3: The Committee will establish mutually agreed upon guarantees and safeguards.

STEP 4: The Committee will identify third party guarantors to ensure respect for the guarantees and safeguards, to monitor implementation of this Plan, and to assist in the restoration of democracy and the rule of law in Haiti.

STEP 5: The Prime Minister will consult with various sectors of Haitian society, including the members of the Haitian Parliament, the political parties, the church groups, and the military and appoint a Government of National Reconciliation.

STEP 6: Under the leadership of the Prime Minister, the new Government of National Reconciliation will take office

and begin to exercise authority and responsibility -- as the Government of Haiti -- for the governance of the country.

STEP 7: The OAS will establish a team of international observers for the purpose of guaranteeing the safeguards and commitments negotiated pursuant to Step 3, and will report to the international community on a regular basis as to progress in the effort to restore democracy and the rule of law in Haiti.

STEP 8: Mr. Aristede will return to Haiti to perform the constitutional functions of President.
