As Lord Owen and others in the international community push for a "global" strategy in dealing with the situation in the former Yugoslavia, we ask you to consider the following points:

- The Government of Croatia is not adverse to serious negotiations with any responsible organization, state, or group of states if a true and lasting peace in the former Yugoslavia can be obtained as a result of those negotiations.
- The Government of Croatia remains steadfast in its goals, ambitions and strategies to prosper as an independent, sovereign democracy with a free-market economy closely aligned and related to Western Europe, the United States and other mature or developing countries which recognize, respect, and honor Croatia's values, desires, and right to independence.
- The Government of Croatia has significant concerns with the current concepts surrounding a "global" approach to issues concerning the former Yugoslavia because:
 - The tendency of a global approach to the former Yugoslavia to lump possible solutions to the myriad of issues facing the peoples of the region into a "unified" package is simply unrealistic. The cultures, religions, customs and dreams of the Croatian people are not the same as the peoples of Serbia, Macedonia, Kosovo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Slovenia, or Montenegro. The same could be said of each of the other republics of the former Yugoslavia in relation to each other, maybe to a lesser extent than regards Croatia, nevertheless, there are enough differences--nuances--to make a "unified" approach to solving the problems of the region extremely difficult and maybe more dangerous in the longer term than the current situation, as trying as it may be.
 - Croatia believes that its recent negotiations, compromises, and resulting agreements within the United Nations structure, while not perfect, address directly the best short and long-term interests of the Republic of Croatia. The Croatian government wishes to pursue--and has the right to pursue--the fulfillment of that series of events without diluting whatever potential effectiveness they may hold with a broad, necessarily less-focused, probably un-enforceable "Balkans superplan."
 - The central sticking point to peace in the former Yugoslavia is continued Serbian aggression. Any negotiations, however nobly named, which do not address that fact directly and resolutely are founded on unrealistic, non-pragmatic premises which pose a serious danger, not only for Croatia, but for all of the former Yugoslavia and for Europe as a whole.

- The preceding statements do not mean that Croatia will not participate in a "global" Balkans conference; they do, however, summarize the Government of Croatia's concerns about such a conference and its ultimate ability to achieve its mission as is currently being discussed.
- The Government of Croatia wants a true and lasting peace and a normalization of relations with all countries in the former Yugoslavia and has made significant efforts to achieve it through a host of compromises--some, possibly, it would have rather avoided. The Office of the Presidency of the Republic of Croatia will continue to do what it takes, within reason, to cooperate with realistic attempts to reach a peaceful formula which recognizes and considers seriously Croatia's rights as a sovereign, independent democracy and to secure a diplomatic normalization of the situation in Croatia itself.

STATEMENT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC

In connection with commentaries on the crimes in Stupni Do, which have been made both by international media and by individual political representatives, the Office of the President of the Republic makes the following statement:

The President of the Republic of Croatia, Dr. Franjo Tudjman, responded vigorously already on September 6 to cases of atrocities, forwarding to the President of the Croatian Republic of Herceg-Bosna, Mate Boban, and all the governmental bodies, the 'strongest appeal' for 'respect of human rights and values and strict observance of international military and humanitarian law'. At the same time, President Tudjman condemned all violations of military and humanitarian law, calling on the authorities of Herceg-Bosna to 'guarantee in its detention centers humane treatment in compliance with international humanitarian law and the Geneva convention', as well as the unimpeded delivery of humanitarian aid to 'all those in need'.

After reports on the crimes in Stupni Do, President Tudjman exerted all his influence in order that an immediate and detailed investigation leading to the punishment of the perpetrators take place. In his statement of October 28, the Vice President of the government and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Mate Granic, reiterated the President's position, asking that the authorities of Herceg-Bosna, in cooperation with UNPROFOR, uncover the circumstances in which this crime took place and determine the identity of the perpetrators. Dr. Granic stated that the crimes were committed in a Croatian enclave which has been under continual siege by Muslim forces; that is, an area with which communication has been difficult to maintain, especially during the period of Muslim offensives, which had been taking place during the time of the massacre in Stupni Do.

The Republic of Croatia strongly condemns all crimes, regardless of the perpetrators; however, the international media must certainly acknowledge that atrocities against Croats have not been afforded comparable media attention nor concern from political circles, in contrast with instances in which Muslims have died. By way of example, many of the renowned newspapers and TV stations which are now condemning the Bosnian Croats - among them CNN, ARD, New York Times, Washington Post, Süddeutsche Zeitung, Der Standard and others, devoted virtually no media attention to the atrocities committed against 35 Croatian civilians by Muslim forces in the village of Uzdol, nor to the 42 in the village of Dolan, nor to the 24 in Trusini, as well as to those in Zepce, Maljini, and Rastovci. Neither was there attention devoted to the instances of many other atrocities against Bosnian Croats in Travnik, Bugojno, Konjic and other areas. Now it is even being emphasized that UNPROFOR has not been given access for three days to Stupni Do, yet all are silent to the fact that UNPROFOR has for months been refused access to some areas in Bosnia-Herzegovina (Konjic, Jablanica, Nova Bila) in which Bosnian Croats are being held captive and mistreated, and that other Croatian enclaves under Muslim siege have not been able to receive even the most basic humanitarian and medical assistance, for example, in Nova Bila.

It is reasonable to conclude from all this that there is a double standard at work here when Croatian, that is, Muslim victims are concerned. This is unacceptable. And such an

approach in establishing the guilt of separate sides involved in the conflict serves only as an obstacle to the establishment of a just peace on the territory of Bosnia-Herzegovina.

The Republic of Croatia sincerely wishes to cooperate with the international community in bringing a halt to the hostilities in Bosnia-Herzegovina and in punishing all the perpetrators of such atrocities. At the same time, Croatia also expects Serbs and Muslims to offer such cooperation in order to prevent further atrocities. Croatia also expects the international community and the International Court to continue investigations of war crimes and other crimes committed upon the territory of the Republic of Croatia during the period of Serbian aggression - from Vukovar to Skabrnja to Dubrovnik - where still today the fate of thousands of missing Croatian civilians remains unresolved.

One must point out that all the efforts and condemnations of the international community will be insufficient if it does not undertake more decisive steps to halt the ethnic and religious conflicts which, everywhere and always, are the cause of bloodletting, as we can see today in Azerbaijan, Northern Ireland and other areas in Europe and the world.

Please consider the following peace initiative offered by Croatian President Dr. Franjo Tudman. We are reporting the verbatim translation from the Office of the Presidency in Zagreb:

"Deeply concerned by the impasse at the Geneva Conference on the former Yugoslavia, and by the failure of all other attempts made to stop the war and military conflicts in the area of the Republic of Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina, I consider it my statesman's duty to suggest to the international community, in particular to all the relevant global factors, a peace initiative which would stop the war and all the associated horrors, and open up the path to peace and understanding, and to a resolution of political and economic problems in the area of the former Yugoslavia.

I. Proposal for the Implementation of the Peace Plan in United Nations Protected Areas (UNPAs) in Croatia

In order to achieve the speediest implementation of Security Council Resolution 871 (and all other resolutions referred to in this Resolution), the Republic of Croatia proposes as follows:

1. The Croatian Government is prepared to conclude within 15 days an agreement on the cessation of all hostilities with the representatives of the local Serbs, guaranteeing their local and cultural autonomy.
2. To this end, we propose at the same time the renewal of the work of the Joint Commissions in order to resolve all issues enumerated in the Vance Plan, and the implementation of the provisions of Security Council Resolution 871, with the participation of the representatives of UNPROFOR and of the European Community.
3. We propose the immediate normalization of overall social and economic life in the UNPAs through the following:
 - 3.1 The immediate opening of all road and rail communications throughout the Republic of Croatia, and particularly along the routes Zagreb-Knin-Split; Zagreb-Slavonski Bros-Zupanja; Novska-Okucani-Pakrac-Daruvar; Sisak-Glina-Bosanski Novi; Osijek-Beli Manastir-Hungarian border; Osijek-Vukovar; Osijek-Vinkovci-Ilok; etc.;
 - 3.2 The opening of the Adriatic Oil Pipeline and the repair and beginning of regular operation of facilities for oil transport, and power and water supply throughout Croatia;
 - 3.3 The immediate return, without further delay, of all displaced persons to their homes under the supervision and with the efficient assistance of UNPROFOR and the authorities of the Republic of Croatia;

II. Proposal for the Cessation of War and the Establishment of Peace in Bosnia and Herzegovina

In this fateful moment when there appears to be no escape from the tragic sequence of events in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and where the orientation to the convening of new, time-consuming international conferences is not likely to produce results, I propose that international factors revive the work of the Geneva Conference on the basis of the thus far achieved agreements concerning the constitutional arrangements of Bosnia and Herzegovina as a Union of Republics.

In order to make such a revived conference as efficient as possible, I suggest the participation, along with the Co-Chairmen of the ICFY, of representatives of States which may have the most effective influence on the resolution of the crisis in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and in the former Yugoslavia, i.e.: France, Germany, the Russian Federation, the United States of America, Turkey and the United Kingdom.

1. Thus convened anew, the Geneva Peace Conference should prevail upon all three parties in conflict, under threat of sanctions and within 14 days, to:
 - 1.1 sign an agreement on the immediate cessation of hostilities and all military actions, should they fail to do so, the U.N. Security Council should be requested to pass a resolution ordering such cessation under the threat of armed enforcement;
 - 1.2 sign a declaration on the acceptance of the Constitutional Arrangement and the Union of Republics of Bosnia and Herzegovina and of the annexed agreements.
2. I propose that the controversial issues of delimitation between the Republics of the Union of Bosnia and Herzegovina be resolved through bilateral negotiations and if no agreement can be reached, to entrust the final decision to a special (arbitration) body to be nominated by the Co-Chairmen of the ICFY and other Conference participants.
3. I propose that all the parties in conflict should undertake to immediately:
 - 3.1 assure and guarantee free and unhindered passage of humanitarian aid to all parties in all areas where it is required;
 - 3.2 exchange all detainees and disband all detention centres, and bear full responsibility for their treatment of detainees in accordance with the rules of international humanitarian law;
 - 3.3 permit international supervision and freedom of movement to representatives of international agencies who will supervise the implementation of these steps.
4. The peace plan can be implemented by using NATO forces (in the role thus far played by UNPROFOR), with the authority to use force, air strikes included, against all those who violate the agreement on the cessation of hostilities or frustrate the delivery of humanitarian aid and international supervision of the implementation of the achieved agreements.

III. Proposed Steps for the Permanent Consolidation of Peace

If the peace, once achieved, is to be sustained permanently and consolidated, I propose that all the states in the area of the former Yugoslavia should proceed--within the framework of the Peace Conference and under the auspices of the U.S. Secretary General and Security Council--as follows:

1. sign a solemn declaration on the reciprocal recognition of the independence and sovereignty of all newly-emerged states within their internationally-recognized borders;
2. sign within three (3) months an agreement on the succession to rights and obligations of all successor states of the former Yugoslavia pursuant to the decision of the Arbitration Commission;
3. start negotiating, within the scope of European integration processes, treaties between themselves and with other European states, concerning the regulation and promotion of economic and traffic links and trade, and other matters of interest for relations among sovereign and independent states wishing to establish good neighbourly relations, and also of interest for the stability of the international order in this part of the world;
4. sign, within the framework of the Conference, a solemn declaration on the observance of the rights of national minorities and ethnic communities in accordance with international standards and conventions, with internationally-controlled implementation of such an agreement;
5. immediately begin negotiating an agreement on the regional security of countries in the area of the former Yugoslavia, within the scope of the general CSCE conventional armaments limitation system;
6. I believe that the U.N. Security Council sanctions enforced in respect to certain states in the area of the former Yugoslavia should remain in force until all the results of the proposed peace process are achieved. As soon as the peace plan is achieved, the sanctions ought to be lifted forthwith.

I urge all international factors to consider these proposals and to take resolute measures to bring a halt to the conflict, and all steps required to bring peace and create the prerequisites for the establishment of a stable international order in the area, for the benefit of all the states in this part of Europe and the world.

The following is a summary of a meeting held in Sarajevo on November 12 between Croatian Foreign Affairs Minister, Dr. Mate Granic and Bosnian Prime Minister Harris Silajdzic. Also participating in the meeting was Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Turkey, H.E. Hikmet Cetin. The agreement reached by these three gentlemen is a verbatim translation, according to a statement issued by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Croatia.

According to the statement, the three discussed recent fighting between the Army of Bosnia-Herzegovina and HVO (Croatian Defense Council) forces in Bosnia, particularly that in Central Bosnia. The three agreed that the fighting must stop immediately and discussed the need to "revive the peace process in order to bring about an immediate, comprehensive and durable solution to the crisis in Bosnia and Herzegovina and the region," particularly "in light of the tragic deterioration of humanitarian conditions."

It was also agreed that, based on agreements previously signed by Presidents Tudman and Izetbegovic and based on the principles of other agreements signed in Geneva and in Vienna, there is the basis for a political solution to the situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina. In this regard, the meeting participants agreed that "every political effort must be exerted on bilateral and multilateral levels to end further deterioration of relations between the Bosnian Croats and Bosniacs in order to create a positive framework for the restoration of the peace process."

Dr. Granic and Dr. Silajdzic agreed to the following:

- "1. To prepare and organize an urgent meeting of the highest political and military leadership of the Army of Bosnia-Herzegovina and HVO, not later than within 5-7 days, in order to reach a comprehensive agreement on all military issues relating to the establishment of a cease fire and final cessation of all hostilities and military activities. It was agreed that during the preparations for this meeting, both sides will strictly refrain from all military activities.
2. The immediate assurances and guarantees for free and unhindered passage of humanitarian aid convoys to all parties and areas shall be given by the respective highest authorities. For the purposes of the realization of the above mentioned, the parties have agreed to the following:
 - (a) to jointly appeal to the UN Security Council, European Community and NATO to provide for the free passage of humanitarian convoys by all means, including the use of force.
 - (b) to open immediately a humanitarian aid corridor on the route Ploce-Metkovic-Capljina-Mostar-Jablanica-Tarcin-Kiseljak-Visoko.

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- (c) to use the Kamensko-Tomislavgrad-Gornji Vakuj-Novi Travnik-Travnik-Zenica corridor until the above-mentioned corridor is available.
 - (d) to organize immediately two convoys for the Central Bosnia area, i.e., one for Nova Bila and the other for Maglaj.
 - (e) to establish a Joint Commission with the mandate to coordinate all activities relating to humanitarian convoys and to cooperate with UNPROFOR, UNMCF and other humanitarian organizations.
 - (f) to coordinate their activities in order to provide for the reparation of energy supply systems.
3. To continue to revive the activities of previously-established Joint Working Groups for the release of all detainees, in cooperation with ICRC and other international agencies.
 4. All other remaining controversial political, military, territorial and other issues between the Bosnian Croats and Bosniacs shall be resolved only through political means and without use of force and a special mechanism for the coordination of all activities regarding the protection of rights and interests of the two peoples shall be established with the good offices of Turkey and other countries.
 5. The sides shall continue their working dialogue on the ministerial and other levels on all open questions with the view toward bringing about a solution to Croat-Bosniac relations and preparations for the reactivation of the peace process."

The agreement is dated November 12, 1993 in Sarajevo and signed by Dr. Silajdzic and Dr. Granic, and it is witnessed by H.E. Hikmet Cetin. Both Dr. Silajdzic and Dr. Granic express appreciation and gratitude to Minister Cetin, thanking him for continued political assistance and humanitarian support to both the Republic of Croatia and the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina.
