Kalmthoutse Heide

Infinite enjoyment, that is what [Grenspark Kalmthoutse Heide](#) represents! This diverse and dynamic nature reserve is situated on both sides of the Belgian-Dutch border and consists of heathlands, fens, forests and land dunes.

The enormous diversity of this nature reserve is of considerable ecological and cultural-historical value. Here, vast and unspoilt landscapes alternate with heathlands, fens, land dunes, forests, meadows and polders. The reserve is also an irreplaceable breathing space for many people whether visited on foot, by bicycle or on horseback. Rare plants and animals experience peace and quiet here. In short, the reserve offers peace and fertile ground for survival. It is therefore not surprising that Grenspark Kalmthoutse Heide is part of the Natura 2000 network, meant to establish a European network for the sustainable protection of the most important natural areas throughout Europe.

Grenspark Kalmthoutse Heide is officially a 'Silence Area'. The Province of Noord-Brabant (2010) on the Dutch side and the Province of Antwerp on the Flemish side (2015) carried out extensive noise measurements to establish this. The Border Park is now officially a cross-border area of silence; an achievement to be proud of.

How to get there / Transport ??

The Kalmthoutse Heide is an easy 20 minutes train ride from Antwerp Central Railway Station. Take the train to Heide, Kalmthout or Kijkuit.

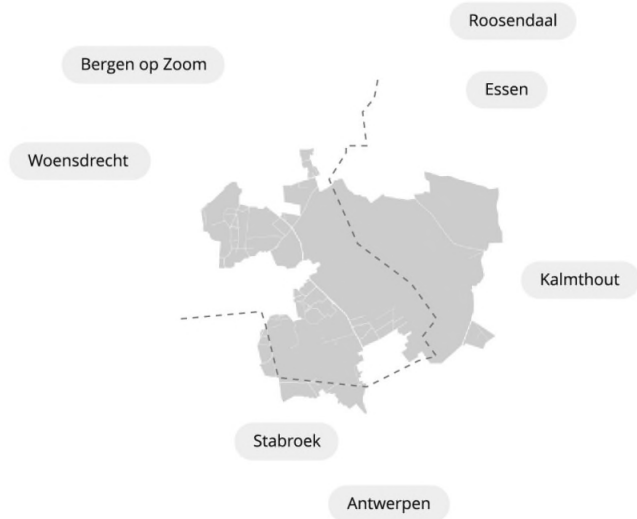
From there, it is a short walk to the nature area or rent a bike to get there even faster. Blue bikes are available for rental at the railway station or rent your bike [here](#).

Along the railway, you can cycle on the cycle highway. They are high-quality cycling routes, simple and straightforward. A backbone to which other cycle routes connect.

From Antwerp City Center, it is a 28km cycling route on the cycling highway F14 Antwerp – Roosendaal.

The Grenspark Kalmthoutse Heide can be accessed by one of the four official entry gates:

1. Volksabdij – Ossendrecht (NL)
2. Hemelrijk – Essen (B)
3. De Vroente – Kalmthout (B)
4. Ravenhof – Putte / Stabroek (NL/B)

Grenspark Kalmthoutse Heide is freely accessible between sunrise and sunset and can best be accessed by one of the four official entry gates.

Choose from no less than 25 [trails](#), Varying from a mere 1.7 km (for your lunch break) to a challenging 24 km day hike. The different trails each show different aspects of the park, so you can explore and discover the nature reserve, over and over again. You can for example connect various trails and create your own day tour!

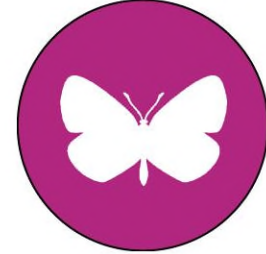
All waymarked trails in the park are freely accessible between sunrise and sunset.

Some hiking inspiration

Hiking trail Butterfly: This trail is rather unique: it is a trail created for the visually impaired. With the app Vlinderpad ('Butterfly trail') the blind and visually impaired can follow the trail and enjoy expert information about nature and history. You are not visually impaired but you are curious about how the blind or visually impaired experience nature and this trail? Then go to visitor center De Vroente and borrow simulation glasses and white canes to experience the trail yourself.

Hiking trail Caterpillar: Even with a physical disability it is possible to enjoy the silence and beauty of the heathland and moorland. The Caterpillar trail is accessible with a special electric off-road wheelchair or 'Cadweazle' which you can borrow free of charge upon reservation at De Vroente. Enjoy the tranquility and the shimmering water. The trail takes you through the heathland and comes by the fire watchtower.

Hiking trail Squirrel: Do you like to combine woods and open spaces? Then you will love this trail. The trail first takes you through forests that grow on sand dunes. You'll find both old and young forest and you'll immediately experience why you're walking through the so-called 'Stoppelbergen'. The 'stubbles' ('stoppels') or sloping dunes have an altitude difference of up to 5 to 10 meters in some places and are typical of the Brabantse Wal, a striking elevation in the landscape. If you would like to hike longer, you can combine the Squirrel trail with the Woodpecker trail (4.3 km).

Kalmthout Fire Tower

This new [fire tower](#) has been inaugurated at the beginning of April 2022. This tower is 42 meters high and it will enable volunteer rangers to keep an eye on the Heathland.

Visitors can also go up to enjoy the breathtaking 360° view of the Kalmthoutse Heide.

RivierPark Maasvallei

Untamed river landscapes in the heart of Belgian and Dutch Limburg -

The Meuse is an impressive river mainly supplied by rainwater. This river forms the border between Belgium and the Netherlands for a 40 km stretch from Maastricht in the Netherlands to Kessenich in Belgium. [RivierPark Maasvallei](#) has a varied landscape with a tangle of old distributaries, levees, channels, and gravel banks, connected to a few well-demarcated residential areas. This is a unique area with several important historic places. Come and experience nature and culture at RivierPark Maasvallei.

RivierPark Maasvallei is known for its 'strolling nature'. There, you can leave the paths and discover nature in its full glory.

Large grazers, like Konik horses and Galloway cattle, play a key role in the development of these new wild nature reserves. Together, these grazers ensure that the area is not overgrown with willows in the winter. The combination of using horses and cattle for grazing creates an ever-changing patchwork landscape of open grasslands, wild thickets, and bushes.

Hiking

The Meuse Valley is the perfect place to relax and take a long walk. Six walking routes have been laid out on the Belgian side of the Meuse and one on the Dutch side of the river. Together these walking routes stretch out for more than 200 km and take you along the most beautiful locations in RivierPark Maasvallei.

All the walking routes on the Belgian side of the river have been signposted with wooden route markers that display the coloured symbols that identify each of the routes. If you follow a particular symbol you will walk the route and eventually make your way back to the starting point.

If you would like to combine two or more of the walking routes then take note of the route changers. These route changers mark the locations where walking routes connect. These junctions are numbered and marked on the route markers and on the maps. If you want to walk to another route changer, select the colored symbol for that route changer and follow it in the direction that you wish to go to reach the next route changer. The maps of the walking routes clearly indicate how and where you can change your route. This creates many different route combinations in one extensive network that crosses the borders of different walking areas.

Long distance walking route

The Long Distance Walk has been developed especially for lovers of multi-day hikes. This cross-border tour of 137 km connects the 11 municipalities in the RivierPark Maasvallei and takes you past the most beautiful landscapes and charming villages. The walk was elected in April 2021 as 'Best walking route in the Benelux'.

- The Long Distance Walk is signposted over its full length and in both directions with hexagonal, green plates with the RivierPark Maasvallei logo (see image under)
- In wet periods some areas may not be accessible. It is best to follow the adapted signage (hexagonal, green plates with a white top edge)
- From a few starting places (including Maastricht Station and Sittard Station) you first have to follow a short approach route that takes you to the fixed route of the Long Distance Walk. These approach routes are indicated by a hexagonal, white plate with the RivierPark Maasvallei logo on it.
- Shortening the route is always possible via the ferries and bridges over the Meuse. Follow the adjusted signage (hexagonal, white plates with 'inkorten' on them)

Cycling

Experience the uniqueness and charm of our region by taking a cycling trip through the RivierPark Maasvallei. The car-free winter dikes allow you to cycle undisturbed for kilometers on end and fully enjoy the views. Did you know that the Meuse Valley is the number one region for cyclists in Belgium?



The starting points are located in villages with good access to the RivierPark Maasvallei. There is ample parking at the starting points and you can collect a map of the cycle routes or get more information about the region at one of the local tourist information offices. You can find charging stations for electric bicycles near the starting points.

International Meuse Cycle route

From the Langres plateau to the Hook of Holland, you can discover the Meuse like you've never seen it before. Go on, cycle through three countries (France, Belgium and the Netherlands) covering 30 stages 1152 km of signposted roads, with dozens of cities, towns and villages dotted along the route. It will also take you through the RivierPark Maasvallei. Unique to this part of the route is that in the RivierPark you can choose which bank of the river you cycle on thanks to the ferry boats.

The Meuse Route through the RivierPark Maasvallei

A 63 km-long route along a series of historic villages and endless banks and shores. On the dyke there is not a car in sight, only quaint villages with places to stop, such as the market square of Maaseik and the jewel in the crown of Flemish villages: Oud-Rekem. The River Meuse dominates here with its powerful flow, an energy that few can navigate through! Enjoy [the Meuse Route](#).

Water paradise

Lakes of the Meuse

The residents of Central Limburg and regular visitors to the [lakes around the Meuse](#) will tell you that the wide variety of activities on offer in this region is fairly unique. Here you can swim, surf, sail, dive, row, canoe, and waterski. You can enjoy many modern marinas, beautiful recreational beaches, and excellent fishing spots. It is a real paradise for water sports. The different boat tours are an absolute must if you want to see and experience the beauty and scope of the Meuse, its lakes, and the other waters of Central Limburg.

Ferries

To really explore the RivierPark Maasvallei across borders, you can use the [pedestrian and bicycle ferries](#). This way, you can make nice connections between the various Meuse ferries. There are four ferries in the riverpark: one large ferry that is also accessible for car traffic and three pedestrian and bicycle ferries.

Important remark: The Meuse is a capricious rain river which results in a regularly changing water level. During high and low water (drought), the ferries sometimes cannot sail. Annoying for your visit, but a great natural phenomenon to see in the RivierPark. Check their [Facebook page](#) for updates.

Kayaking

Rent a [kayak or a canoe](#) and enjoy the view of the beautiful natural surroundings from the water. You can choose one of the routes ranging from 9 km to 21 km each with different departure and arrival points.

Fishing

Enjoy endless hours of [fishing](#) in RivierPark Maasvallei on the banks of the Meuse, next to the gravel lakes, and at one of the many fish ponds. The fish stock in the Meuse has markedly increased in the last few years. Currently, more than thirty species of fish including the common carp, common roach, perch, pike, common barbel, and eel can be found here.

Several guidelines and rules regulate fishing in the Meuse for the protection of these species. Each area has its own rules and can be requested from the local municipalities. You can check the fishing places [here](#).

Electric sloops

If you want to experience the beauty of RivierPark Maasvallei in peace and tranquillity then take a tour on one of the [electric sloops](#). These electrically powered sloops from Botel Ophoven in Belgium are quiet, easy to operate, and you do not need a navigation license. A sloop can carry a maximum of eight passengers.

Silent electric sloops

In Dilsen-Stokkem in Belgium you can hire a [silent electric boat](#) for a delightful tour over the Old Meuse and its connecting lakes. This boat tour can be combined with an off-trail walk along the Meuse. You can book a silent electric boat from April to the end of October.



Bird watching

The Meuse Valley is part of important bird migration routes. You can spot special species here, especially during the spring and autumn migration. Some breed here, other come to winter here. But there are also plenty of species that you will notice all year round. You really don't have to be an expert to spot birds in the Meuse valley. Certainly not with the bird card at hand. It will introduce you to some common or special bird species in the RivierPark Maasvallei.

Guided tours with a Meuse Explorer (Maasverkennen)

You can explore the RivierPark Maasvallei with a [Meuse Explorer](#) in a very special and interesting way. Meuse Explorers are guides who know the RivierPark Maasvallei like the back of their hand. These guides will tell you more about the Meuse, its history and the inhabitants in and along the water. A number of excursions have been developed to enable you to fully experience the RivierPark. Meuse Explorers offer activities for all ages and target groups.

Discover the villages along the Meuse

On the Belgian side of RivierPark Maasvallei five [villages](#) with access to the park were designated as starting points. From north to south, these five villages are: Kessenich, Aldeneik, Stokkem, Leut, and Oud-Rekem. These villages are the best points of departure from which to explore the area. The starting points, signposted from the N78, all have parking available and have their own information boards. These information boards show information about the area and the walking routes.

Art on the Meuse

With [Art on the Meuse](#) Z33 and RLKM will bring art to the Meuse Valley in Limburg. Between 2022 and 2024, five artworks will appear in Dilsen-Stokkem, Kinrooi, Lanaken, Maaseik and Maasmechelen.

In the period from 2020 to 2024, Z33 – House for Contemporary Art, Design & Architecture (Hasselt) and the Regional Landscape Kempen and Maasland (RLKM) will work together on a large-scale art project in the Meuse valley: Art on the Meuse.

Art on the Meuse aims to show how the landscape in the Meuse valley has been shaped by human and natural forces. The Meuse river plays an important role in this, but the border with the Netherlands, gravel extraction and location-specific stories and myths are also possible themes on which both national and international artists can work. Some works will be temporary, others (semi-)permanent. The artworks are created in close collaboration between the artist, the project partners and the local network.

Leut

The history of the Meuse village Leut is closely linked to the history of the castle Vilain XIII, which dominates the village center. As early as the Middle Ages, the castle (then a fortress) was inhabited by the 'noblemen of Leut'. Over the centuries, the medieval moated castle with two moats and a drawbridge evolved into an open residential building with a fixed bridge over the remaining canal, surrounded by a grand park in English landscape style.

Since October 2021, VisitFlanders is the official owner of the castle domain Vilain XIII in Leut. In the coming years, VisitFlanders will work on the expansion and revival of this site. This in cooperation with residents, entrepreneurs and visitors.

Hiking

The Zwin hiking route

The Zwin route introduces you to the great diversity of natural values and landscapes in and around the Zwin Nature Park. You stroll through the Zwin dunes and polders and explore the Hazegraspolder. Old seawall dikes bear witness to the struggle against the sea. You walk through the Koningsbos, over club paths and between Scottish highland cattle. You will be instructed with a magnificent view over the Zwin plain.

The visitor center with its large windows is the ideal place for birdwatching and the perfect start to your small trip along the beautiful coastal nature. Here you will also find out exactly what the different aspects of nature conservation entail. The building is nicely embedded in the landscape, the visitor center is equipped with interactive screens.

Damse Vaart Route

Welcome to the city gates of Bruges. Here in the Brugse Ommeland, the region around Bruges, you will find many hidden treasures, historic landscapes and romantic forests. We have listed three Highlights for you: some cultural landscape, a bit of heritage and a pinch of nature.

Although the Highlights are not so clearly categorized, they often fall under several categories. The Damse Vaart exudes history, culture and nature, just like Oostkerke Castle and the Verbrand Fort. The proximity to Bruges with its many chocolatiers and brasseries, local breweries and cozy hotels is perfect. The city is also easily accessible by train, from there you can continue by bus.

Cycling

Costal Route



If you are looking for the perfect combination of nature, maritime history and culture, the [Costal Route](#) will satisfy your hunger for new horizons. Tour along the beach with a view of the sea, cycle through dunes and woods and check out the sweeping, flat polder landscapes. On the way, you will encounter the rich history of coastal life.

The Lost Zwin ports

Bruges and Flanders expanded during the middle ages as a result of its connection to the sea via the Zwin channel. A network of outer ports established along the channel: a unique system that allowed goods, people and ideas to enter and leave Flanders. Unfortunately, the Zwin channel silted up and the outer ports disappeared. At least, on the surface...

Based on the innovative archaeological research, conducted by the University of Ghent, the ports of the Zwin channel are virtually brought back to life in 2021 by means of an [exhibition](#) and a cycling route. This is the international story of a trading metropolis and the surrounding area, under the influence of water and sand.

We go back in time to the heydays of Bruges and the Zwin in the 14th and 15th century, when international trading ships entered the Zwin channel via the North Sea. They passed the ports of Sluis, Muide (Sint-Anna-ter Muiden), Hoeke and Monnikerede, until they reached Damme. There they transhipped into smaller boats their goods to be transported to Bruges.

- Distance: 60 km (or 44 km or 31 km), in various stages.
- Starting: Zwin Nature Park, Sluis, Damme or Bruges.
- Signage: there are indicators along the entire route.
- Including: practical information, location VR-viewers and stops along the way.

- [De Zoete Polder](#): farm with cherries, plums and apples. Try their homemade jams, juices, beer...
- [Hoeve Hazegras](#): guesthouse but also delicious ice cream. As partner in the Lost Zwin ports, they have created ice cream with medieval herbs.
- [Kers & bes](#): cherry vending machine.
- [Strawberries Depestel](#): strawberries vending machine.
- [Steffi Fruit](#): vending machine with apples, pears and juices.
- [Hoorns Geitenkaasje](#): goat cheese (farm with more than 50 breeds of goats).
- [Beukenhoeve](#): farm picknicks, ice cream and dairy products from the farm.
- [Bryggia brewery](#): microbrewery in Moerkerke.
- [Siphon brewery](#): a small Belgian brewery that started on the grounds of a four-generation-old family restaurant in the West Flemish town of Damme.
- [Viven](#) brewery: Krystle, one of the few female brewers in Belgium, is responsible for the taste of the different beers in the range. She composes the recipes and brews the first test batches in the kettles in Damme. When a new beer is tasted and approved by Krystle, the production moves to the Proefbrouwerij in Lochristi to be able to brew higher volumes

You can enjoy teas that they make themselves, finished with honey from the bees that live next to the farm. Finish with pizzas topped with vegetables from the garden.
In the heart of the Ryckveldebos, in the shadow of a picturesque historic castle and shrub, you will find a few unique [tree houses](#). From June to September they are the ideal place to escape the hustle and bustle of everyday life.
