Re: U.S. Voter Public Opinion Survey on Energy Security & Economic Partnership

Later this week, Canada and the United States will hold a series of bilateral meetings while President Joe Biden makes his first visit to Canada as president to meet Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

Recently, the Province of Alberta conducted a survey of U.S. voters to understand how they viewed America's relationship with Canada and the Province. The survey also explored how Americans viewed a number of issues relating to the trading relationship between the two nations.

POLLING METHODOLOGY:

- Field Dates: 2-14-23 to 2-20-23 / Sample: U.S. National online; self-verified voters / Sample Size: 1000 participants; n = 300 Opinion elite oversample / Margin of Error: +/-3.1%
- Our voter sampling took care to mirror nationwide ideological and geographic distribution, as well
 as proportional representation along key demographics such as age, income, education,
 ethnicity, gender, and community type.

KEY DATA INSIGHTS:


- Energy security matters for Americans.
- Canada, and Alberta specifically, are seen as a trusted trade partners that provide the U.S. with reliable energy and critical minerals in an environmentally friendly way that does not undermine national security.
- American voters would prefer to import energy from Canada than from any other country.

DETAILED FINDINGS:

Americans care where their energy is sourced. Bipartisan majorities view Canada as the
most environmentally friendly source of energy and critical mineral imports. Americans also
agree that energy imports from Canada maintain American national security more than imports
from any other country.

Consider that Americans overwhelmingly agree with the following statements:

- a. "It matters which country we import energy from."
 (92% 2023 agreement, up 4% from 2022; including 92% of Republicans and 97% of Democrats)
- b. "It matters to me which countries we import critical minerals from for batteries." (91% 2023 agreement; including 91% of Republicans and 93% of Democrats)
- c. "I would prefer America to import energy from Canada rather than from other countries." (95% 2023 agreement; including 98% of Republicans and 95% of Democrats)
- d. "America can still be energy independent while importing oil from Canada." (Two-thirds 2023 agreement; including 57% of Republicans and 76% of Democrats)



2. Canada – and specifically Alberta's vast energy resources – are seen as an answer to current geopolitical instability in the energy market due to Russia's war on Ukraine. There is near-unanimous bipartisan agreement that due to "Russia's war in Ukraine raising energy costs and threatening the global energy supply, it's more important than ever to have safe, stable, secure and reliable energy trading partners like Canada."

In fact, 91% of respondents including extremely strong bipartisan majorities agree that increased trade with Canada supports American energy security in a time of global energy scarcity.

3. Americans choose Canada as a source of environmentally friendly energy that supports U.S. national security. Two-thirds of respondents choose Canada as the top country which the United States can import energy from, while retaining a high degree of national security. The next highest response is Mexico with less than half as many votes.

Roughly half of respondents choose Canada as the country which the United States can import energy from in the most environmentally-responsible manner. In fact, Canada is statistically tied with the United States when it comes to perceptions of having the best record on protecting the environment. Opinion Elite audiences (more educated, politically active, and informed) are much more likely to view Canada as having the very best record on protecting the environment when compared to any other country, including the United States.

4. Americans see clear benefits of increased energy trade with Canada. Canadian energy imports and trade represent economic and environmental benefits. Voters believe that Canada is a trusted and valuable partner in North American energy security.








QUANTITATIVE: NATIONAL VOTER SAMPLE BREAKDOWN: N=1000

INSIGHT



Energy security is an important issue for voters. 81% of voters will consider energy security in their votes for the 2024 election, and 92% believe that energy trade relationships with Canada are critical to establishing energy security due to worldwide events.



U.S. voters would prefer to import energy from Canada than any other country. Canadian imports are best for national security, energy security and environmental reasons.



Becoming energy independent is important for many voters. Two-thirds of voters believe that America can still be energy independent if importing oil from Canada.





SOME IMPROVEMENT ON ENERGY SUPPLY BUT STILL MORE TO DO.


Perception of how much the U.S. is doing to secure a stable energy supply has improved since last year.














CANADIAN IMPORTS KEEP AMERICA SECURE.

Canada has risen in preference on energy imports that allow the U.S. to maintain a high level of national security by 18 points since 2022.












Over the next two years, which of the following issues do you think is most important for the President & Congress to address? (Top 3 choices combined)
