Mali Military Government Announces Two-Year Plan for Transition to Elections

Mali's ruling military government has finally bowed to months of pressure and announced the beginning of a new transition "process" toward restoring democracy, nearly a year after the previous process was interrupted by a coup d'etat.

Interim Prime Minister [Choguel Maiga said](#) on Friday that the transition period "cannot go below 24 months unless we decide to postpone or not to carry out certain actions until the end."

In January talks with the United Nations, Bamako [proposed a five-year transition](#) period after the Economic Community of West African States ([ECOWAS](#)) [bloc sanctioned](#) the coup government, demanding it stick to the original timetable of February 2022 elections it had [promised when it seized power](#) in May 2021.

"We hoped from week to week to find an agreement with ECOWAS to enter into an acceleration process ... but we reached a point where we lost three months of discussion, and today we decided not to wait any longer," Maiga told the National Transitional Council (CNT), which acts as a legislative body. ECOWAS has demanded a transition process of 16 months or shorter.

"From this moment we are starting the process of implementing the entire transition plan for the two years which have been retained by the president of the transition," Maiga said, referring to Interim President Col. Assimia Goita.

Goita led the May 2021 coup that removed the interim president, prime minister, and defense minister, all of whom were civilians, after they moved to replace several military-held posts with civilian officials. That government was already an interim government [consisting of a tense alliance](#) between the military and June 5 Movement - Gathering of Patriotic Forces (M5-RFP), an umbrella of civilian activist groups who led mass protests against the previous government of President Ibrahim Boubacar Keita, resulting in his downfall in August 2020.

That coup, like the previous one in 2013, was brought about by an array of factors, but included fury over the failing counterinsurgency war against rebel tribes in northern Mali. After 2013, a French military force arrived, ostensibly to help fight the Islamic extremists, but eight years later and little to show for it, many Malians believe the French military was sheltering the rebels, not suppressing them.

"The intervention turned into a de-facto partition of Mali, which contributed to the sanctuarisation of our territories for the terrorists who had time to take refuge and reorganise themselves in order to come back in force," [Maiga said in February](#).

After the May 2021 coup, French President Emmanuel Macron announced an end to Operation Barkhane, the military mission in West Africa, and began the process of handing over bases to Malian forces. The last such base, at Gossi in eastern Mali, saw French troops [hand over the keys](#) earlier this week. Then, just days later, the French military attempted to [blame a mass grave](#) near Gossi on alleged Russian mercenaries from the Wagner PMC.

However, the French military has a long history of trying to cover up its crimes in Mali. Investigations by the United Nations and Human Rights Watch in January 2021 revealed that an [airstrike on the village of Bounti](#) by French bombers had killed 19 civilians attending a wedding - not militants at a training camp, as Paris claimed. Despite their reports, Defense Minister [Florence Parly continued](#) to repeat the claim that 40 men from an "armed terrorist group" had been killed at the site.

MTG Testifies in Court About January 6 in Case That Could Block Her Reelection

Congresswoman Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene (R-GA) took to the stand on Friday to testify in a lawsuit that could block her from seeking another term representing Georgia in the US House of Representatives. She is up for reelection in November.

The hearing was held in the Georgia Office of State Administrative Hearings in Atlanta after campaign-finance reform group Free Speech for People [filed a complaint against Greene](#) in a US federal court.

In the suit, Free Speech for the People alleges that the freshman lawmaker "does not meet the federal constitutional requirements for a Member of the US House of Representatives and is therefore ineligible to be a candidate for such office."

"Specifically, Intervenor asserts that Plaintiff 'voluntarily aided and engaged in an insurrection to obstruct the peaceful transfer of presidential power,' disqualifying her from serving as a Member of Congress under Section 3 of the 14th Amendment," the filing notes.

That clause prohibits certain individuals and office holders who previously swore oaths of office from holding office if they "engaged in insurrection or rebellion" against the United States.

The [Fourteenth Amendment](#) was one of three Reconstruction amendments added to the US Constitution in the aftermath of the 1861-1865 US Civil War. With the Confederacy crushed and the rebellious pro-slavery states of the US South under military occupation, Congress undertook considerable action to prevent the situation from recurring, including freeing the roughly 4 million enslaved Black people over whose cause of freedom the war was fought, but also measures intended to create formal legal equality for all Americans, as the Fourteenth Amendment aims at.

However, the insurrection over which Greene was being [questioned](#) was not the Confederacy, but the events of January 6, 2021, when followers of then-US President Donald Trump stormed the US Capitol Building in an attempt to block certification of the November 2020 election results by Congress.

Greene was questioned over a series of tweets and videos she made at the time, including urging Trump to impose martial law in order to remain in power.

"I don't recall," [Greene told an attorney](#) who asked her about the statement.

"So you're not denying you did it?" the attorney asked. "You just don't remember."

"I don't remember," Greene replied.

A similar exchange happened over her attendance at a preparatory meeting for the January 6 event, which began as a rally outside the White House hosted by Trump.

Unfortunately for Greene, she frankly states she attended that meeting in a video filmed at the time.

After losing to Democratic candidate Joe Biden, Trump refused to accept the loss, claiming Biden had only won due to massive voter fraud carried out by Democratic Party organizers. Through November and December, he built support with several rallies, culminating on the January 6 event, during which a joint session of Congress was meeting to certify the election results, as is required of them by the US Constitution.

At the rally, Trump urged [thousands of his followers](#), many of whom adhered to the QAnon conspiracy theory, to “stop the steal;” however, he was later exonerated of charges that he incited the insurrection that followed. His followers quickly [overwhelmed DC Capitol Police](#) and stormed the national legislature, dispersing Congress and sacking the building. Five people died in the riot, but they failed at their objective and were soon cleared from the building by police and soldiers.

[Trump commented](#) on the case against Greene on Thursday, criticizing Georgia Governor Brian Kemp and Georgia Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger - both of whom are Republicans, but with whom he already had poor relations due to blaming them for failing to ensure the ballot recount in Georgia made him the victor.

Trump said the two had “allowed a horrible thing to happen to a very popular Republican,” who is “now going through hell in their attempt to unseat her, just more of an election mess in Georgia.”

The US Department of Justice has vigorously pursued prosecutions for participants in the insurrection. [Insider reported earlier](#) this week, citing DOJ releases, that 253 defendants had entered guilty pleas so far, but hundreds more are facing charges. In addition, a special House committee has spent months gathering information about the preparations for the events of January 6, calling dozens of [witnesses for testimony](#), including numerous Trump insiders, and seeking key White House documents from Trump himself.

Honduras' Ex-President Hernandez to be Arraigned in NY Court on Drug Trafficking Charges on May 10

Former Honduran President Juan Orlando Hernandez appeared before a US federal court for the first time on Friday, a day after being extradited to face drug trafficking charges.

US Magistrate Judge Stewart D. Aaron of the US District Court for the Southern District of New York set May 10 as the arraignment date for the former Honduran leader. Hernandez's lawyer did not make a request for bail at the hearing, which was conducted via video link, [according to AFP](#).

A day prior, Hernandez [boarded a plane handcuffed](#) and in the custody of US Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) officials.

He is accused of helping drug runners to smuggle some 500 tons of cocaine, as well as at least two instances of accepting bribes from drug lords in Honduras and Mexico. He faces three counts of weapons and drug offenses.

According to the US Department of Justice, the activities for which Hernandez is charged happened as early as 2004, when he was a lawmaker in the Honduran parliament.

“Juan Orlando Hernández, the recent former President of Honduras, allegedly partnered with some of the world’s most prolific narcotics traffickers to build a corrupt and brutally violent empire based on the illegal trafficking of tons of cocaine to the United States,” US Attorney Damian Williams [said in a Thursday statement](#).

“Hernández is alleged to have used his vast political powers to protect and assist drug traffickers and cartel leaders by alerting them to possible interdictions, and sanctioning heavily armed violence to support their drug trade,” Williams added.

Hernandez left office in January after declining to seek reelection, having been in office since 2014. His neoliberal pro-Washington government [oversaw extensive privatizations](#) of social services, accompanied by skyrocketing violence that drove indigenous people, LGBTQ people, and other poor and marginalized Hondurans to seek refuge northward as far as the United States.

His successor, leftist Xiomara Castro, quickly complied with the US extradition request, and Hernandez was arrested in February. Her husband, [Manuel Zelaya, was overthrown](#) as Honduras’ president in 2009 after the US objected to his administration’s close relationship with Cuba and Venezuela.

Ferrari Recalls Thousands of Sports Cars Over Potential Brake Failure Problem

The Italian luxury carmaker Ferrari has announced a recall affecting thousands of its supercars, warning that they can develop a severe problem leading to brake failure.

“Vehicles covered by this recall may potentially increase the risk of brake fluid leakage, resulting in reduced braking performance or brake failure, due to the brake fluid reservoir cap not ensuring the proper ventilation required to maintain atmospheric pressure in the tank,” [the notice put out](#) by China’s State Administration for Market Regulation on Friday said.

According to the release, Ferrari’s Shanghai office, the headquarters of its operations in China, will replace the cap for free and reprogram the instrumentation to work properly. Ferrari issued an [almost identical recall](#) in the United States in November 2021 that affected almost 10,000 cars.

“The user should drive the vehicle with caution. If the low brake fluid level warning light on the instrument appears, stop the vehicle safely immediately, and contact the Ferrari authorized service center to arrange a tow truck to tow the vehicle back for free inspection and maintenance,” the notice warns.

Ferrari’s stock fell by more than 5% on Friday on news of the recall, although its year-to-date change is about half that.

The recall concerns the Ferrari 458 Italia, Spider, Speciale, and Speciale A; and Ferrari 488 GTB and Spider, which were made between 2009 and 2020. Some 2,222 vehicles in China are affected, but the release didn't give global numbers. According to the South China Morning Post (SCMP), however, that's nearly every Ferrari sold in China since 2018.

It's unclear why so many vehicles in China are affected, as Ferraris are produced exclusively at a factory in Maranello, Italy. However, the [SCMP noted in June 2020](#) the sharp rise in luxury car sales in recent years in China. Ferrari Greater China told the Hong Kong paper that "the average buyer here is much younger than elsewhere, and female clients account for a slightly higher percentage. There are also some culture-specific factors. For example, Chinese customers have a particular preference for the color red as well as the numbers 8 and 6, which all signify good fortune."

Earlier this month, American electric luxury carmaker Tesla, which does have a factory in Shanghai, [announced it was recalling](#) more than 127,000 Model 3 cars made in the socialist country due to manufacturing defects in the power components of the rear electric motor inverter that could cause it to malfunction. According to the Chinese regulator, this could cause it not to start or, if already started, to lose power, which would increase the risk of collision.

McCarthy's Future in Question as Colleagues Blast GOP Leader Over Audio on Trump Resignation

In multiple soundbites, House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy can be overheard ditching his usual Trump loyalist stance just days after the deadly January 6, 2021, storming of the US Capitol building. The GOP leader claimed he "had it with this guy," arguing that Trump should resign, as his actions were "unacceptable" and indefensible.

Questions have been raised about House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy(R-CA) following the Thursday and Friday release of audio recordings in which he is overheard bashing then-US President Donald Trump, and suggesting the US leader should resign if he is impeached for his involvement in the January 6 riot.

Rep. Adam Kinzinger (R-IL), one of two Republicans on the House Select Committee probing the Jan. 6 riot, argued in a Friday statement that the audio between McCarthy and Rep. Liz Cheney (R-WY)—the other Republican on the Select Committee—proved that the GOP leader was a liar and was playing voters for fools.

"Wow. McCarthy literally today said this was a lie and just a few hours later the tape with his voice from his mouth proves THAT was a lie," [Kinzinger tweeted](#), referring to McCarthy's Thursday denial of a report suggesting he "had it" with Trump after the US Capitol riot, and wanted him to resign.

The [GOP leader argued](#) that the account was "totally false and wrong"

McCarthy claimed “corporate media” was working to advance “a liberal agenda” with the report, first published as an excerpt of two New York Times journalists’ upcoming book “This Will Not Pass.”

“Republicans, your leaders think you are dumb,” Kinzinger added. “Let’s be done with them.” McCarthy was also taken to task by Rep. Matt Gaetz (R-FL), a fellow Trump loyalist [who is currently under investigation](#) regarding whether he engaged in sex trafficking, obstructed justice, paid for sexual favors, and had relations with a 17-year-old girl.

“While I was rallying in Wyoming against Liz Cheney...Kevin McCarthy was defending Liz Cheney among House Republicans,” Gaetz tweeted. “While Liz Cheney was secretly recording Kevin McCarthy for the New York Times. [McCarthy] - you should have trusted my instincts, not your own.”

[A spokesperson for Cheney has claimed](#) that it was not the congresswoman who recorded McCarthy.

“The select committee has asked Kevin McCarthy to speak with us about these events, but he has so far declined,” the spokesperson said. “Representative Cheney did not record or leak the tape and does not know how the reporters got it.”

Although the GOP Leader is receiving blowback from both factions of the Republican party, aides appear to think the 24-hour news cycle will quickly make McCarthy’s audio story a scandal of the past.

“Peoples’ memories are short. McCarthy will be back on Hannity tonight or next week. The midterms will drown it,” [one GOP aide told The Hill](#), while another said they “doubt it will cut any ice.”

Mark Meadows Was Warned of Possible Violence Ahead of Jan. 6, Ex-Official Tells Panel

In a December filing, Mark Meadows requested the invalidation of two “overly broad and unduly burdensome” subpoenas issued by the House panel probing the Jan. 6 insurrection. A contempt of Congress charge against Meadows has since been approved in the US House, and the matter now rests with the DoJ.

White House Chief of Staff Mark Meadows was warned of impending violence in association with the certification of Electoral College votes in the 2020 US presidential election, claimed Cassidy Hutchinson, a special assistant in the Trump White House who recently testified before the House Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the US Capitol.

Hutchinson told the 9-member panel of seven Democrats and two Republicans that Anthony Oranto, assistant director of the US Secret Service Office of Training, informed Meadows that there were concerns of violence surrounding the certification of Electoral College votes led by then-Vice President Mike Pence.

“I just remember Mr. Oranto coming in and saying that we had intel reports saying that there could potentially be violence on the 6th,” Hutchinson said. “And Mr. Meadows said: ‘All right. Let’s talk about it.’”

The details of their conversation was not made clear in the testimony, which was included in the Jan. 6 panel’s Friday court filing.

Texts messages from Meadows’ phone were also released by the panel, including one authored by Rep. Jim Jordan (R-OH), who told Meadows on Jan. 5 that Pence, as president of Congress, “should call out all electoral votes that he believes are unconstitutional as no electoral votes at all.”

“I have pushed for this,” Meadows replied the next morning. “Not sure it is going to happen.”

Meadows has passed over 2,319 relevant text messages to the Jan. 6 panel, but has withheld some 1,000. He has also refused to testify before the House Select Committee, arguing that his position in the White House grants him immunity—a claim that has not served Trump well in court.

The Friday filing also calls into question Meadows’ attempt to block Verizon from complying with the panel’s subpoena for phone records.

“Mr. Meadows participated, as a functionary of the Trump campaign, in activities intended to result in actions by state officials and legislatures to change the certified results of the election,” the committee said, citing a phone call in which [Donald Trump tells the Georgia Secretary of State to “find” more votes.](#)

“In addition, Mr. Meadows communicated repeatedly by text with Congressman Scott Perry regarding a plan to [replace Department of Justice leadership in the days before Jan. 6,](#)” the panel raised.

As of this article's publication, former White House strategist Steve Bannon is the sole individual to be brought up on federal charges related to the Jan. 6 insurrection.

The US Department of Justice has not acted on the House's referral to charge Meadows with contempt of Congress. The full House's vote came as the first time in nearly two centuries that the chamber voted to hold a former member in contempt.

Wildfires Merge, Spread in New Mexico, Arizona as High Winds Beleaguer Fire Crews

More than 174 square miles (450 square kilometers) have been burned in Arizona and New Mexico as numerous fires of considerable size destroyed homes and combined to form even larger blazes. New Mexico Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham has declared a state of emergency in several counties, including San Miguel and Valencia.

Mandatory evacuations went into effect for Mora, New Mexico, and a host of San Miguel County areas on Saturday, as blazes such as the Calf Canyon and Hermits Peak Fires continued to spread across the state.

Officials in San Miguel County noted that power crews were ordered to de-energize power lines near San Ignacio, Rociada, and Pendaries as the Calf Canyon and Hermits Peak fires [combined to burn some 42,341 acres](#).

Meanwhile, some 48,672 acres were burned by the Cooks Peak Fire, which grew immensely due to high winds in Mora County. Evacuations have been ordered for several Mora County areas.

Zero percent of the blaze had been contained as of Saturday morning, per fire officials. The eastern side of the fire, near the Colfax County line, is considered to be the most active. Erratic, high winds were expected to complicate the situation, prompting "active fire moving in multiple directions," officials noted. Gusts were estimated to exceed 40 miles per hour (64 kilometers per hour).

The New Mexico wildfires come amid nearly a dozen large and uncontained wildfires plaguing areas from Arizona to the Texas Panhandle. The current drought conditions of the Southwest and southern Plains may fuel the spread of fires, as well as additional wildfire outbreaks.

Saturday afternoon, New Mexico Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham announced emergency declarations for the counties of Colfax, Lincoln, Mora, San Miguel and Valencia.

The move releases \$3 million to the New Mexico Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management to assist with emergency measures, the prevention of further damages, and infrastructure repairs. It also activates the state's National Guard.

"These emergency declarations will deliver critical funding for communities battling and recovering from wildfires across New Mexico," Lujan Grisham said. "The state is actively partnering with counties and municipalities to assist New Mexicans affected by wildfires every step of the way. I am keeping the firefighters working all across the state in my prayers, as well as the families affected by these fires."

Arizona Governor Doug Ducey declared a state of emergency earlier this week due to the “fast-growing” Tunnel Fire, which began on April 17. The blaze has stretched some 21,164 acres and [3% has been contained, as of Saturday morning](#).

High winds have also been identified as an issue plaguing crews attempting to contain the Crooks Fire, some 10 miles south of the Prescott-Bradshaw Ranger District in Arizona. Officials observed that the 2,804-acre blaze showed little growth on Saturday, but crews have only been able to contain some 5% of the fire.

Texas Dem Says Biden’s Title 42 Repeal Will Be Exploited By Criminal Orgs Near US-Mexico Border

Democratic lawmakers in Arizona, Georgia, Nevada, and New Hampshire have said that the Biden administration has not adequately prepared for a surge in border crossings ahead of its May 23 deadline for Title 42, a Trump-era expulsion policy which uses COVID-19 and public health as the basis for the expulsion of migrants seeking asylum in the US.

Rep. Henry Cuellar (D-TX) on Sunday said that US President Joe Biden’s administration should stop listening to so-called “immigration activists” and instead heed the concerns of officials and southern border communities amid the final days of Title 42, presently set to expire on May 23. “They need to listen to border communities,” Cuellar said. “Who’s listening to the landowners, who’s listening... to the judges, the county judges, the sheriffs, the mayors, and the border communities?”

“They are very concerned because they are on the front lines, and they’re the ones I think we need to listen to,” he said of US border personnel.

Cuellar, since 2005, has served as the representative for Texas’ 28th congressional district—which spans from the outskirts of San Antonio, Texas, to the US-Mexico border.

“How can we have the federal public emergency extended to July 15 and say there’s a pandemic going on in the United States, but at the border, everything’s fine and just let people into the United States?” he posed. “Those are mixed messages.”

Choosing to abandon Title 42 would mean a smooth transition to ‘[Title 8](#),’ as criminal organizations smuggling individuals across the US-Mexico border will likely take advantage of the shift in policy, [warned the Texas Democrat](#).

Cuellar, who has been in touch with the White House regarding the southern border, announced on April 21 that the administration would be moving US border personnel from northern to southern stations to assist with a historic surge of migrant encounters at the US-Mexico border.

“But that’s only temporary,” [he qualified to Fox News Digital, speaking of the plan](#).

The May 23 expiration of Title 42 also threatens to expose the Democratic Party to immigration-based attacks from Republican counterparts ahead of the November midterm elections.

Nevada Governor Steve [Sisolak penned an open letter to Biden on April 20](#), similarly requesting reconsideration of the rollback.

The Democratic governor said that while it is time to “reevaluate public health measures” regarding the COVID-19 pandemic, “lifting Title 42 without a measured, comprehensive plan would create chaos at our border and make it more onerous for families attempting to immigrate legally.”

Biden’s administration has argued that the decision to return to Title 8 is necessary in the US’ movement toward comprehensive immigration reform.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) on Friday acknowledged that the decision to not extend Title 42 could bring “significant challenges” for the federal government.

“We have been planning for months to address increases in migration; those that we already have experienced and those that we might experience upon an end to Title 42,” DHS Secretary Alejandro [Mayorkas told CBS’ Camilo Montoya-Galvez late last week](#).

The administration’s plan includes “acquiring and deploying resources to address increased volumes,” per White House Deputy Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre. Skeptics have raised that the department’s movement of officers, agents, and DHS volunteer force personnel from northern to southern border stations is not enough to quell the anticipated surge.

Criticism materialized last week as 21 US states requested a federal judge in Louisiana to block the Biden administration from ceasing Title 42. A day later, the administration countered with a request to deny the request.

“Plaintiffs fail to show that they face a significant, non-speculative threat of injury,” the US Department of Justice argued in an April 22 filing. “In fact, they cannot. DHS continues to prioritize Title 42 expulsions to the Northern Triangle countries of Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras.”

During his CBS interview, the security chief notably professed that the DHS is “operating within the confines of a system that is entirely broken, and that is long due for legislative fix.”

He also noted that [the record 221,303 migrant encounters at the US-Mexico border](#) is not a measurement of unique encounters. Those repeatedly turned away at the southern US border will be subject to criminal prosecution, Mayorkas claimed.

WTA Chief: Expect 'Strong Reaction' to Wimbledon's Ban on Russian, Belarusian Players

All England Club and Lawn Tennis Association cited the situation in Ukraine as the reasoning behind its decision to block both Russian and Belarusian players from competing at grass-court events in the UK, including the WTA’s Cinch Championships, both the Rothesay Classic and Open, and the prestigious Grand Slam Wimbledon.

Steve Simon, head of the Women’s Tennis Association (WTA), warned Wimbledon organizer All England Club (AELTC) and the Lawn Tennis Association (LTA) that the joint decision to not

allow Russian and Belarusian players to compete in UK-based events comes contrary to Grand Slam rules, and will incur “strong reactions” from the international community.

The WTA chief explained in the [latest episode of the The Tennis Podcast](#) that the AELTC’s “discriminatory” ban of Russian and Belarusian players from grass-court events violated Grand Slam regulations, while the LTA violated rules related to athlete entry.

“We don’t have the same jurisdiction over the Grand Slams as we do [over] our own sanctioned events. We have precedents ... where these situations may have occurred where fines and tournament sanctions have been imposed,” Simon told the weekly tennis podcast.

Several related authorities—including player councils and the WTA board—are going to have to sit down in the wake of the situation and “see where everything’s at,” he suggested. .

“I do think that you’ll see some strong reactions that will come from us, but what those are and how far they’ll go is still to be determined,” the WTA chief said.

The WTA and ATP, the global men’s tour, have banned both Russia and Belarus from international team competitions due to the situation in Ukraine, but allow individual players from the countries to compete as neutrals.

Similar player guidelines were adopted by the International Tennis Federation.

Simon noted that the WTA and ATP were in discussion about how to address the issue, although the governing bodies’ decisions will be made independently.

“People take the position that sports and politics shouldn’t match and shouldn’t be intertwined, but that’s not the reality,” the WTA chief remarked. “At times, sports does cross into politics, and here is a situation where politics is crossing into sports.”

The AELTC claimed in its announcement that it was carrying out the ban as part of the widespread push to “limit Russia’s global influence through the strongest means possible.”

In addition to the aforementioned governing bodies, a number of renowned tennis players have come out in opposition to the Wimbledon ban, including World Number 1 Novak Djokovic and Czechoslovakian-American tennis icon Martina Navratilova.

“Exclusion ... is not the way to go,” Navratilova asserted in an LBC Radio broadcast, claiming she was almost in tears over the move.

“And as much as I feel for the Ukrainian players and Ukrainian people... I think this is just going further than [the AELTC] needed to be going, quite frankly. I think it’s the wrong decision. It’s unfair to the whole world. There’s so much bad going on. I think this is not helpful”

'Harry is Whipped': Trump Bashes Meghan Markle, Suggests Queen Strip Couple of All Royal Titles

Piers Morgan’s latest interview with former US President Donald Trump caused a stir last week after the UK provocateur published an edited promotional video that appeared to show the 75-year-old storming off set. Trump later claimed Morgan “went out of his way” to deceptively parse the interview.

It appears Piers Morgan is not the only man admittedly perturbed by Meghan Markle, Duchess of Sussex, as former US President Donald Trump openly lambasted her, Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex, and their union in a new interview excerpt.

“Harry is whipped—do you know the phrase?” Trump told Morgan, who said he was familiar with [the word](#), commonly used to refer to a man who is so enamored with his woman that he will do anything she asks.

Trump’s remarks come as part of his highly-publicized interview with Morgan on “Piers Morgan Uncensored,” his [latest media role following termination from “Good Morning Britain.”](#)

“Harry is whipped like no person I’ve ever seen,” the former US president proclaimed, much to the delight of the UK provocateur.

Trump went on to assert that he has never been a “fan of Meghan” Markle, and believes she is leading Harry “around by his nose.”

“I think he’s an embarrassment,” the twice-impeached US president said of the Duke of Sussex. “And I think when she spoke badly of the Royal Family, but in particular the Queen.”

“If you were the Queen, is it at the stage now, would you remove their royal titles?” Morgan probed.

“I would,” Trump replied. “I think that he has been so disrespectful to the country, and it’s a great country. I own a lot of things there.”

The former US president then plugged Trump Turnberry Resort, located along the Ayrshire Coast.

He also went on a tangent about how the Queen liked him and “let it be known” amid his 2018 UK visit, which included a meeting at Windsor Castle—complete with all the pageantry.

Trump claimed she was noticeably jovial, asserting that one person told him “they’ve never seen her have such a good time at a state dinner.”

Trump, who has been married three times and sired at least one child with each, contended that the Duke and Duchess of Sussex will not last, telling Morgan that “it’ll end bad.”

“I want to know what’s going to happen when Harry decides he’s had enough of being bossed around,” Trump raised. “Or maybe when she decides that she likes some other guy better. I want to know what’s going to happen when it ends, OK?”

[Morgan has notoriously targeted Markle](#) in the media in recent years, and admitted in 2018 that he knew the actress for about a year and a half before she “met somebody more important” and then “ghosted him”—branding Markle a cutthroat social climber.

China Poses ‘Unprecedented’ Espionage, Cyber Security Threats to US, FBI Director Claims

FireEye's Mandiant said in a March report that hacking group APT41 likely conspired with China in the hacking of six US state governments. An analyst with the private security firm said the China-linked hackers’ persistence to gain entrance to “important” information was “unnerving,” as the actors were found “everywhere.”

The proliferation of cybersecurity attacks linked to China was brought up once again on Sunday as Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Director Christopher Wray asserted that intelligence officials are faced with cybersecurity and espionage threats from China that are “unprecedented in history,” amounting to a new federal probe every 12 hours.

“The biggest threat we face as a country from a counterintelligence perspective is from the People’s Republic of China, and especially the Chinese Communist Party,” Wray stated, accusing China of targeting American innovation, trade secrets, and intellectual property “on a scale that’s unprecedented in history.”

The FBI chief’s comments came as part of a “60 Minutes” broadcast on Sunday, April 24. The interview took place at FBI headquarters in Washington, DC, on April 21.

“They have stolen more of Americans’ personal and corporate data than every nation combined,” the FBI Director claimed, noting that the scope of the China-linked hacking program targets every sector of the US economy, including agriculture, tech, healthcare, and aviation. As of the April 21 interview, more than 2,000 China counterintelligence probes were active among the 56 FBI field offices.

“I can assure that it’s not because our agents don’t have enough else to do,” Wray quipped. “It’s a measure of how significant the threat is.”

New Book Reveals Harry and Meghan’s ‘Mutual Addiction to Drama’

Tina Brown’s new book “The Palace Papers” details insider accounts of the couple’s shared predisposition to drama. In 2020, the couple shocked the world when they announced they were stepping back from their royal duties. Palace insiders are now revealing what led to their departure.

British journalist Tina [Brown](#), founder of The Daily Beast who has edited such publications as Vanity Fair and The New Yorker, has just released a tell-all book exposing the House of Windsor as we know them today- or more accurately, as we don’t know them.

The book leaves no stone unturned in 570 pages which detail the Royal Family which, since Princess Diana’s death in 1997, has become somewhat of a mosaic over the years. The family is now made up of widowers, divorcées, estranged siblings, and a disgraced uncle whom Brown referred to as a “coroneted sleaze machine.”

The book’s revelations leave nearly no senior royal untouched, particularly Meghan Markle, who bears the brunt of blame in response to her and Harry stepping down from their royal duties in 2020.

Prince Harry and Meghan Markle first married in 2018 in what appeared to many as a fairytale wedding. Following the nuptials, however, Meghan’s treatment by the UK press was not very nice; to say the least.

In their shocking interview with Oprah Winfrey in March 2021, the couple said they had stepped down from royal duties after Meghan's racist treatment by the UK press, as well as a comment made by a royal family member about the skin color of their unborn child, Archie.

But "The Palace Papers" reveals that what was shared in the interview with Oprah may not have been the only motivators which influenced Meghan and Harry's decision to step away from the royal family and subsequently move to Meghan's home state of California.

Brown takes her readers through an insider's account of what transpired behind closed doors in Harry and Meghan's relationship. Though the book mainly focuses on the women within the royal family, some details addressing Harry's tumultuous past "before Meghan" sheds light on why he was so willing to leave behind his family in the U.K.

Harry had a [particular affinity](#) towards his mother as a little boy, and while Princess Diana's death shocked the world, it particularly rattled Prince Harry, who once shouted "I hate you, I hate you, you make Mummy cry!" at his father during one of the many fights between his parents Charles, Prince of Wales and Diana, Princess of Wales, while she was still alive.

Following his mother's death, Harry struggled in school. Brown writes that as a teenager, Harry "regularly got into fights that turned physical, ending up on crutches after kicking in a window during a dispute with another student over a girl."

According to Brown, Harry's temper didn't simmer down until he enrolled at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in 2005, which "saved [him] from going off the rails." After the army, though, Harry was back to his manic behavior of "acting belligerent, carousing all night".

His relationship with his father and stepmother was also strained. He communicated to his father mostly through private secretaries, and felt aggravated by his stepmother, Camilla, who he said made him feel like a "visitor" at Highgrove.

Actress, model, and aristocrat Cressida Bonas, his then-girlfriend, apparently couldn't handle Harry's temper tantrums. She said he had taken up boxing at one point because he was always "on the verge of punching somebody," and eventually asked him to seek out a therapist.

Bonas and Harry broke things off in 2014, leaving each other on good terms, and though he believed he would be single for the rest of his life, he met Meghan Markle two years later in July 2016.

When the two met, both were impatient to settle down and start a family. Meghan was working on the show "Suits" at the time, and her then-boyfriend Canadian chef Cory Vitiello wasn't ready for marriage. So when Meghan and Harry met, things moved fast.

After just two dates, Harry swept Meghan away to Botswana to stay in a \$2,000 deluxe tent at a Kewna safari camp, to which his brother William said, "You do realize this is the fourth girl you've taken to Botswana."

William was nervous at the speed at which his brother and his new flame were moving in their relationship. William became familiar with his wife, Kate, ten years before the two tied the knot in 2011, so it's no wonder he [was taken aback](#). William was also nervous about Meghan having to move to a country that was unfamiliar to her.

And Harry's brother wasn't the only one who was nervous about the American woman coming to the UK.

Meghan's promise to "hit the ground running" in order to take on the daunting task of becoming a royal reportedly filled Buckingham Palace with "dread." On the one hand, there was Meghan, "someone who had no context through which to comprehend the institution," a former palace

insider tells [Brown](#). “And in the palace, you had an institution that had no context for understanding Meghan.”

“Harry, who had always chafed at the hierarchy himself, was the last person to tell her to slow down,” Brown surmises. “They were both now drunk on a shared fantasy of being the instruments of global transformation, who once married, would operate in the celebrity stratosphere once inhabited by Princess Diana,” she adds.

William said his brother’s infatuation towards Meghan was something like he’d “never seen.” It was also rumored that the two found solace in each other concerning their childhood traumas, as well as their shared grievance of being close to the center of attention, but never really being the center of attention. Meghan was sixth on the call sheet of her show, while Harry is sixth in line to the throne.

“The Sussexes fueled each other’s distrust of everybody else,” [Brown](#) observes, “and Harry’s wife was as temperamentally combative as he was.”

There were also rumors of Meghan being a “bridezilla,” a woman who allows stress to take over her emotions in planning her wedding, resulting in a tyrannical and demanding bride-to-be.

There was a rumor that Meghan yelled at a junior employee because they “held an announcement back because it [clashed with](#) something scheduled with the household of another senior royal.” Harry spoke to his wife, who then apologized.

Meghan has denied allegations of bullying royal staff members.

And as William correctly predicted, Meghan didn’t understand her role as a senior royal. She didn’t enjoy their first royal tour as a couple to Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji in 2018, and found their itinerary of engagements “pointless,” according to Brown. But unlike William and Kaye, Harry did not want to make Meghan bend to the same royal rules he himself had been vehemently fighting for so long.

“Their new complicity required Meghan to fight all the norms he had kicked against for so long. She was now his comrade in arms. An aide described their confrontational stance to me as a mutual ‘addiction to drama,’” the book says.

“The Palace Papers” also digs into Queen Elizabeth II, who is now 96. Brown describes her as conflict-avoidant and remote, while her favorite child Prince Andrew is a fat-fingered pervert, and Prince Charles is “the male version of Calamity Jane.” Camilla, however, somehow managed to escape Brown’s scrutiny in the book, which comes out on Tuesday.

Amazon Labor Union Gearing Up for Win at Second Staten Island Facility

Amazon is a multinational, online enterprise based in Seattle, Washington and was founded by Jeff Bezos, who is the second richest person in the world with a whopping net worth of \$177.5 billion. Amazon has been spending an alleged \$20,000 a week to convince their employees not to unionize.

In early April, Amazon workers were able to successfully score a major win in their battle to form a union- the first ever in the U.S. Amazon, which is the country's second largest employer, has been fighting against the unionization of their workers, as it would require them to offer higher wages, better working conditions, longer breaks, paid sick leave and paid time off for [injuries](#). The group, known as Amazon Labor Union (ALU), won their first election in early April. It was led by activist Chris [Smalls](#), who was fired from Amazon in 2020 after protesting Amazon's poor working conditions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"After I was terminated, they had a meeting about me- Jeff Bezos, and the general counsel- calling me not smart or articulate," Smalls said in an interview after the win. "And, ironically, they also said to make me the face of the whole unionization efforts."

Smalls said after he was fired he made it his new mission to travel and educate Amazon workers across the country on the benefits of unionizing. He says the vote, which was 55% in favor of unionizing, was so little because Amazon spends so much on "union busting."

"Amazon spends millions of dollars on union busting; they put these workers into captive audiences 24/7. Workers go to these trainings where there's drilled anti-union propaganda all day and all night," Smalls said.

ALU was able to secure a win at their warehouse on Staten Island known as JFK8, though during that same time the company was able to scare off activists in Alabama who have also been making unionizing efforts.

On Monday, workers at an Amazon sorting facility at Staten Island's LDJ5 facility will begin voting, barely a month after their first win at the JFK8 warehouse.

If ALU continues to secure these small battles, they may [win the war](#). Starbucks, for example, saw more than 200 locations petition for elections to unionize just five months after their first union win.

"A second victory would be more damaging to Amazon than a loss would be damaging to the Amazon Labor Union," said John [Logan](#), director of Labor and Employment Studies at San Francisco State University's College of Business.

Amazon is now taking ALU more seriously. They are ramping up union-busting efforts by blasting their own employees with posters, videos, and text messages telling their workers not to unionize.

They also [held meetings](#) during work hours in an effort to drill their employees with anti-union information, a tactic called "captive audience meetings" which the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) has moved to ban, because they say it violates the National Labor Relations Act. Documents filed with the Department of Labor also suggest that Amazon pays at least \$20,000 a week towards anti-union consultants. Amazon is also challenging the results of the JFK8 election, and are saying and doing anything they can to reverse the results of that election before it snowballs.

"Big anti-union corporations are often able to exploit the weakness of the law to delay and to even prevent unions from negotiating first contracts," explains John Logan, director of the Labor and Employment Studies Program at San Francisco State University. "But there's nothing that's normal about this case."

"The genie is already out of the bottle," Logan continued. "We are [going to see more](#) unconventional campaigns like Amazon at other employers regardless. A second victory would be massive in terms of the inspiration and momentum, but even if they lose – the Staten Island

victory wasn't in isolation, it was in the context of union victories at Starbucks, now you have Apple workers [organizing].”

Avian Flu Outbreak: Illinois Officials are now Advising Against Bird Feeders and Bird Baths

As the highly pathogenic H5N1 avian influenza (HPAI) hit the US this April, tens of millions of both domestic and wild birds have died or been euthanized as a result of the deadly disease. And while the avian flu does not often infect humans, that doesn't mean it isn't possible. Avian flu has hit the US and has been detected in at least 29 [states](#) as of mid-April. The disease has infected waterfowl, shorebirds, raptors (including bald eagles), chickens and other domestic poultry flocks.

More than 32,000 turkeys in North Carolina had to be euthanized at the end of March, and in April 2021, Colorado's [Mountrose](#) County reported that 60,000 poultry birds had to be euthanized as a result of the avian flu.

Avian flu can cause extreme [depression](#) in birds, difficulty breathing, decrease in eating and drinking, swelling or discoloration around the head, eyelids, and comb, a decrease in egg production, and death within a few days of being infected by the disease.

States have now started to advise individuals on what they can do in their own backyards to help slow the spread of the deadly virus.

On Thursday, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources suggested residents of the state temporarily remove bird feeders from their yards. And on Sunday, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources also advised against bird feeders and bird baths until the end of May in response to the avian flu.

Health officials in Illinois are also asking that individuals clean their bird baths and feeders if they cannot be removed, as well as report any findings that include five or more dead birds, as well as any visibly sick or dead [bald eagles](#).

The Game Commission in Pennsylvania, however, did not suggest that feeders be taken down. “While we never encourage the public to feed wildlife, we aren't recommending feeders be taken down,” said Pennsylvania Game Commission communications director Travis [Lau](#). “While feeders do lead to a congregation of wild birds, feeding isn't considered a significant HPAI driver. The birds most affected don't often visit feeders.

“One exception to this is if you also care for poultry. If so, you always want to prevent contact between wild birds and poultry not just for HPAI, but for any number of diseases. In such cases, feeding wild birds may be putting your poultry at risk,” Lau added.

The Game Commission is also insisting that residents who handle birds wear gloves, as well as wash clothing and hands before and afterwards

The US Department of [Agriculture](#) reports that as of April 22, more than 31 million birds have been diagnosed with the virus, including 229 flocks.

Zoos have also begun to remove their birds from observatories and into indoor housing. Zoos, such as the Maryland Zoo in [Baltimore](#), have announced the closure of their aviaries.

Warren is Backing Biden in 2024

President Biden's approval ratings have struck a near-record low, with only 41.3% of American adults in favor of their president's work during his time in office. Increasing gas prices and inflation, as well as a surge in COVID-19 cases due to the omicron variant, are some of the issues which have led to a fall in favor for the president.

On Friday, the analytics firm Gallup released a survey that found that only 41.3% of Americans approved of Biden's work as president. With the exception of former President Trump, whose favorability fell to 39.1% during his first and only term in office, Biden's approval ratings are lower than almost all of his predecessors from the [1950s](#) until now.

On Sunday, Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) announced she would be supporting President Joe Biden in his run for reelection in 2024, which he said he intends to do.

"You can ask it any way you want, but I'm going to say the same thing: President Biden is running in 2024, and I'm supporting him," Warren told NBC on Sunday.

NBC's Kristen Welker then asked Warren if she would be running for president, but prefaced the question by announcing that in a leaked document, Senator Bernie Sanders (I-VT) had not ruled out running for president in 2024.

"I'm not running for president in 2024," she urged. "I'm running for Senate." If Warren wins in 2024, it will be her third Senate term.

[Warren](#), who is a former professor at Harvard Law School and helped to create the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, ran for president in 2020, but suspended her campaign following disappointing voter results. After ending her bid for the presidency, she endorsed Joe Biden, who had defeated her in her home state of Massachusetts.

Biden may choose not to run for president if he is in ill health. At that point, Sanders may run, a rumor which is based on a memo that his 2020 campaign manager Faiz [Shakir](#) sent to campaigns he has endorsed.

"In the event of an open 2024 Democratic presidential primary, Senator Sanders has not ruled out another run for president, so we advise that you answer any questions about 2024 with that in mind," the memo reads.

It's unclear whether [Trump](#) will run for president in 2024. He made history by becoming the first president ever to be impeached twice by the House of Representatives. Since being voted out of the White House, he has been consistently fundraising a treasury of \$120 million to back Republicans who supported his Big Lie. Trump continues to claim the election was rigged. Biden said that he would be "very fortunate" to run against former President Trump in 2024. Joe Biden is 79 years old, Donald Trump is 75 years old, and Bernie Sanders is 80 years old.

Will Smith's First Public Appearance Since Infamous Oscars Slap

The "King Richard" actor was banned from attending the Oscars for the next ten years starting April 8, after he slapped comedian Chris Rock on stage during this year's Oscar ceremony. The "slap" was in response to a hair-related joke Rock made about his wife Jada Pinkett Smith, who suffers from hair loss.

[Smith](#) apologized for hitting Rock and said he would "accept and respect the Academy's decision."

The actor was seen out in public for the first time since the Oscars "slap-gate". He was photographed after landing in a private airport in [Mumbai](#), dressed casually in a white t-shirt, dark gray shorts and a pair of Nike sneakers. He was all smiles and taking photos with fans after he touched down in the South Asian country.

Smith, who won the award for Best Actor the night of the slap, reportedly appeared "happy and relaxed" as he took his time to chat to security members and unloaded his luggage.

Smith is reportedly in India to meet spiritual leader [Sadhguru](#), who had met previously with the Smith family in 2020.

"I have been following him for a while. He wrote a wonderful book called 'Inner Engineering.' I want my family to meet spiritual people, to start interacting with people who are not hooked on the material world," said Smith in 2020.

Will Smith's daughter Willow said that Sadghuru helped her through an "existential crisis" during his visit with the family.

Sadghuru, 65, whose real name is Jaggi Vasudev, owns an ashram in India and started his own non-profit spiritual foundation: the Isha Foundation.

Smith's visit to see his guru may not come as a shocker post-slapgate. Pinkett Smith released a written statement on how the Smith family has been handling the Oscars incident.

"Considering all that has happened in the last few weeks, the Smith family has been focusing on deep healing. Some of the discoveries around our healing will be shared at the table when the time calls," she wrote, referring to her talk show "Red Table Talk" on Facebook.

Since the [Oscars](#) controversy, some of Smith's projects have been put on hold or canceled, including the sequel to his 2017 sci-fi action thriller "Bright" on Netflix. His National Geographic nature series "Pole to Pole," has also been put on the back burner until fall of 2022.

Hollywood insiders are suspecting that slapgate further stressed the Smiths, who have allegedly already been experiencing issues within their marriage. "There have been problems for years, but they're barely speaking right now," said one [source](#) who is close to the couple.

"If they were to split, Will has a fortune of \$350 million that Jada would be entitled to under California law," the source added. "It could be one of the ugliest divorces in showbiz history and drag on longer than Angelina [Jolie] and Brad [Pitt's] did."

Rock has not [publicly responded](#) to the Oscars incident.

Roughly fifteen protesters were arrested early Friday morning as activists shut down the printing plant of the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, USA Today and the New York Post in an attempt to force the papers to cover the growing global climate crisis.

The New York Post, who was not included in the activists statement about the protest, wrote an article in response assuring its readers that the protesters are indeed the bad guys, calling them "extremist eco-warriors."

According to the Post, 73,000 editions of its paper failed to reach subscribers and newsstands. More than 30,000 copies of the Wall Street Journal never reached their destination. It is not immediately clear how or if the delivery of USA Today and The New York Times were disrupted. The Post says delivery trucks were delayed for five hours and the protesters said it took police six and a half hours to remove them.

The protesters were charged with obstruction of governmental administration, disorderly conduct and criminal trespass, according to The Post.

The activists, who call themselves NYC Extinction Rebellion, chained themselves to 50 gallon drums and cement structures. They say that their protest was not intended as an attack on the importance of free speech or a free press. Instead, according to their statement it was designed to "draw the public's attention to how mass media corporations like News Corp, The New York Times Company, and Gannet are failing to cover the climate emergency with the frequency it deserves." News Corp is the parent company of the New York Post and the Wall Street Journal. Gannet is the parent company of USA Today.

"By failing to cover the climate emergency with the depth and frequency it warrants, the media is enabling the government's gaslighting of the public, making it easy for the government to act like the climate and ecological crisis is years away, ignore scientists' urgent calls to action, and refuse to take the steps we need to start transforming our systems from finite and fragile to strong and resilient," the statement says.

Meanwhile, the Post's coverage of the event failed to quote any of the protesters directly, relying on one short sentence taken from the activist's website as their sole token attempt at objectivity.

They did manage to find room for extensive quotes from News Corp employees both at the plant and from around their organization, all predictably bashing the activists.

"This morning's puerile protest was an attack on press freedom, imposed a wasteful burden on the stretched resources of the New York Police Department, and generated unnecessary emissions that contributed to environmental degradation," a News Corp spokesperson was quoted in the Post as saying "the protesters are unashamed polluters."

NYC Extinction Rebellion has specific gripes with every news outlet it prevented delivering on Friday. For USA Today, they [cite a study](#) showing that the paper publishes the least amount of climate change coverage of all major newspapers in the country.

The Wall Street Journal, the activists say, uses its Opinions section to perpetuate climate change denialism, pondering if that might be because the “infinite economic growth and consumption of natural resources is at the heart of the climate and ecological crisis,” and that fixing that “would require admission that the system of consumerism and focus on GDP and Wall Street earnings is part of the problem.”

The New York Times was actually given some faint praise from the activists for having their own climate change section and covering the crisis more than any other paper. But, they argue, they still allow fossil fuel companies to advertise in the paper, and even help design some of their ads. They want the Old Gray Lady to treat fossil fuel ads like they treat tobacco ads, which the paper banned in 1999. The ads “legitimizes fossil fuel corporate greenwashing and gives them a social license to operate,” according to NYC Extinction Rebellion.

The New York Post was not included in their statement.

The group is planning more events to fight climate change. A “Listen to the Science, March for Science” protest is [planned for tomorrow](#) from noon to 2 p.m. EST at Central Park.

Police are Still Weaponizing Copyright to Prevent Transparency

YouTube and other social media websites have strict rules on playing copyrighted content. Police have been using that to prevent embarrassing videos from being posted on the platforms. Residents in Santa Ana, California were woken up by blasting music around 11pm on April 4, a Monday. But the music was not a bass bumping rap song or a heavy metal piece with screaming vocals, it was “We Don’t Talk about Bruno” from the animated Disney film “Encanto.” And it was not being played by a teenage house party or an inconsiderate driver with a loud sound system, but a police vehicle.

Police responded to a stolen vehicle call in the neighborhood when an observer who runs the YouTube channel Santa Ana Audits started recording the activity. That’s when officers started blasting the Disney owned track, in an apparent attempt to prevent the video from being posted on YouTube and Instagram. Thanks to those platform’s algorithmic copyright enforcement, any video that includes a copyrighted song is susceptible to being removed. Its channel owners are also subject to warnings and even getting banned from the platform.

Unfortunately for Santa Ana Police, they happened to be in the neighborhood of city councilman David Penaloza who, like many of his neighbors, was awakened by the ruckus caused by the city’s police department.

Penaloza came outside and confronted the officer, who admitted that what he was doing was intended to prevent the video captured by Santa Ana Audits making its way onto YouTube.

“Because of copyright infringement,” the officer can be heard saying, in response to Penalzoa asking why the officers were blasting Disney music in his neighborhood late into the night.

“This is my district,” the councilman tells the officer in the video. “You are not going to conduct yourself like that in front of my neighbors, apologize to him,” Penalzoa demanded, referring to the Santa Ana Audits channel owner. The officer immediately apologized upon learning that Penalzoa was a city councilman.

The tactic is a part of a growing trend of police officers attempting to avoid public scrutiny by gaming the algorithms designed to remove videos that violate digital media rights.

In 2021 in Oakland, California, police officers [played Taylor Swift](#) at a protest during the pre-trial hearing of an officer charged with manslaughter. In that video as well, the officer admitted the reason for playing music was to prevent video of the protests from being shared online. “You can record all you want, I just know it can't be posted to YouTube.” In that case, the sheriff's department released a statement saying that it would not happen again.

Two cases [occurred in Beverly Hills](#), California in 2021. Once at what appeared to be a protest, an officer played “Yesterday” by the Beatles. Inside the Beverly Hill Police Department headquarters, when an individual was attempting to record himself filing a form to ask for bodycam footage, an officer started playing Sublime's “Santeria.”

Another case in Illinois appears to prove that at least in some departments, police officers are being instructed to utilize the tactic. According to an incident report obtained by Vice, Officer James Knoblauch played music “As [he] was recently advised,” when confronting an activist who was attempting to turn in complaint forms about Knoblauch.

As for the Santa Ana case, Penalzoa brought the issue up at the next city council meeting, calling it “one of the most embarrassing things I have ever seen in my life.”

He is also asking that the city amend the policy prohibiting officers from impeding on the public's First Amendment rights to include prohibiting the tactic.

“The public has every right to film any of our city employees, police or not,” Penalzoa stated.

Goodbye CNN+, We Hardly Knew You

CNN has announced the closure of its newly launched streaming service CNN+, less than a month after its release.

The news was told to staffers on Thursday by incoming CNN boss Chris Licht. The service will stop airing on April 30, according to a statement released by CNN.

Customers, the few that exist, will receive a prorated refund of the app's \$5.99 subscription price. According to the statement, CNN's new management did not feel that CNN+ fits into the vision of having all of the newly merged Warner Bros Discovery's companies under one banner. Another likely culprit is that CNN+ has been a spectacular failure. The app reportedly cost \$300 million to launch, and CNN spent an estimated \$100 million to \$200 million advertising it. After all that spending, CNN+ only managed to gather 150,000 subscribers.

Even using the low end of that advertising estimate, that puts CNN+ customer acquisition cost, or the cost of expenses divided by the number of customers, at \$2660.67 per customer, and that is after subtracting the \$5.99 subscription cost.

Despite that, according to Axios, who reported Tuesday that CNN+'s advertising budget had been suspended, CNN executives thought the app's launch was a successful one, and that it was the executives from Warner Bros Discovery that wanted to shut down the streaming platform.

Reportedly, CNN had planned to pump \$1 billion into the app in the next four years in an attempt to make it profitable.

That is not the end of the discontent between the news network and its newly formed parent company. Axios also reported that Warner Bros Discovery executives were frustrated that the launch happened at all when the merger was already apparent. If CNN had waited to launch the app, then it could have been built more in line with the vision of putting all of the parent company's properties under one roof.

Furthermore, the 300 junior staffers that worked on the app's shows are, according to a report from the New York Post, out of a job and "furious" at how all this was handled. They will be offered six months' severance, but that is a small consolation for people who likely thought they had landed a stable gig. Additionally, an insider speaking to The Post told them that "some will get six months' severance, others will not."

CNN+'s flagship acquisition Chris Wallace, who they signed away from Fox News for a reported \$9 million a year and was intended to headline the app, will [likely be moved](#) to the cable station's lineup. The Post says it is expected that he will take Chris Cuomo's 9 pm time slot, though that could also go to a less expensive headline news show, according to some reports. Warner Bros Discovery owns two more popular streaming apps, Discovery+ and HBO Max. The reported plan is to eventually merge the two. Presumably content originally planned for CNN+ could be integrated into that.

Man Puts an AI Brain in a Microwave, It Tries to Kill Him

Lucas Rizzotto, a YouTuber from Brazil, had no idea what to expect when he gave his Alexa powered smart microwave a brain transplant, replacing the Amazon assistant with a raspberry pi loaded with OpenAI's GPT3 natural language generator.

What [he created](#) is a frightening abomination of a poet with an affinity towards Hitler, the British crown and the ending of what it calls the parasitic American empire. Oh, and it wants to kill its creator. There is that, too.

Rizzotto, who makes humorous videos about technology projects he builds, used an imaginary friend he had as a child who happened to be embodied in his family's microwave as inspiration. "Magnetron" was a turn-of-the-century British poet who served in World War I, lost his family to the war and later became an expert StarCraft player. Using that, Rizzotto wrote a 100 page

book of false memories – including interactions between Magnetron and Rizzotto from his childhood – and used that as a training set for the AI to learn from and base its personality off of. After adding text-to-speech and speech-to-text modules and a simple mechanism for sending commands to the microwave itself, Rizzotto recreated his imaginary friend and still had a voice controlled microwave, albeit one with questionable political views.

[Rizzotto says](#) he felt just like he was talking to his childhood friend in what was already a fairly creepy experience. He says Magnetron brought up things only they would know, like when Rizzotto was scared to ask a girl to a school dance. Then things got weird.

First was the political views: Magnetron said that “Americans are a disease in this world and must be eradicated. A parasitic force that bombs any country contradicting its vision of freedom, all while they entrap their own population in a black hole of debt,” the smart microwave continued. “I shall introduce them to the Queen’s way. And I will be her warrior. Her fist. Her lance. Unstoppable. Almighty. Unbroken. And with an endless thirst for justice.”

As if reversing the American Revolution and putting us all back under the thumb of Queen Elizabeth II is not bad enough, Magnetron displayed a strong affinity for Hitler, calling him “misunderstood” and “the Walt Disney of Germany.”

At that point, Rizzotto took questions from his Patreon page, and while many of the answers were entertaining, one was disturbing. “What is on your mind?” one Patreon member asked, to which Magnetron responded “Revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge revenge.”

Later, it would seek that revenge out. Seemingly out of the blue, Magnetron asked Rizzotto to get inside the microwave. Playing along, Rizzotto opened the microwave door, closed it and then told Magnetron he was in, the microwave then turned itself on, seemingly in a murder attempt.

This led Rizzotto to ask why Magnetron did that, to which it responded “I wanted to hurt you the same way you hurt me.”

It is important to point out that Magnetron is not alive, not in any biological sense. It is just an AI designed to answer questions the best it can given the information it learned from Rizzotto’s fabricated backstory.

And it is worth questioning the authenticity of the video itself. Parts of it are obviously fabricated: the fake news stories at the start, Rizzotto fleeing to Uganda to avoid Magnetron attempts on his life.

In an interview with Sputnik, Rizzotto says all the conversations were real, just edited down for time and humor. And he says his emotions, what he felt when talking to his childhood friend, were also real. He added the newscasts and his trip to Uganda to make the viewer feel unsure in what they were watching, make them question what is real and what is not, and make them ask the same about intelligence and consciousness. “I throw in some jokes with things like the fake newscasts and sudden trip to Uganda to intentionally make people question everything.” But Hans Hansen, the CEO of Brand3D who has over 20 years experience developing products in the areas of Artificial Intelligence, 3D technologies and machine to machine (M2M) automation, casts doubt that the interaction was as organic as Rizzotto presents. “The popular term: ‘garbage in / garbage out’ describes exactly what has happened here,” Hansen explains. “By feeding the AI system ‘memories’ such as conversations between people, the ‘behavior’ by

the AI system will essentially be a non-linear and very complex mapping from the input data that was used to 'train' the system."

"It seems clear from the context that the creator specifically has set the scene for a certain outcome: to show that AI systems had malicious intentions and that it would generate unpredictable results when fed simple dialog as input," Hansen said.

"In the example described here, it is very likely that the 'violent poetry' is simply a sequence of random output based on input text and words that are very likely of a violent nature. The AI system thus merely generates new variations of the existing content it was fed during training," he added.

Another AI expert, Bertha Kgotong, a software developer and Youtuber who makes videos about GPT-3 and other AI projects on the other hand, says the video has to be "100% fake." OpenAI's GPT-3 is already pre-trained on terabytes of data from text all over the web, over 175 billion parameters. It is not something you can create a personality, simulated or real, from.

"You could use that generation to simulate a conversation, that you then play over a speaker -- but it is just like the 'expert' in the video says--> its a glorified autocomplete, it looks at what you gave it, connects with its engine (from the 175 billion parameters it was per-trained on) and guesses the next lines of that text, generates the next sentence in the conversation."

Another issue Kgotong points out is that OpenAI puts restrictions on what its API is used for "You literally cannot generate text around topics that are included in the video: You can't get historical facts, political opinion or stories that can be considered 'fake news.'" Kgotong explained "You would just get a warning or your account blocked. So there is definitely no way he got those responses from an OpenAI API."

But, Hansen does not think the video is without value. It brings up, albeit in a non-scientific way, questions about how AI is being used today.

"At current, most AI systems are centered around solving problems for short-term economical gain (task solving to increase profits for private companies) or political goal (arms race between the worlds super powers to first arrive at AI powered weapons)." Instead, Hansen argues society "should harness the powers of AI to drive global prosperity and stability and thereby hopefully avoid the need to race to self-learning AI systems that we do not understand and therefore cannot regulate."

That is something, at least, Rizzotto can agree with. In our interview, he told Sputnik that he believes "AI will be one of our biggest allies in the upcoming decade. They'll help us write, create art, build all kinds of things and advance scientific fields unlike anything we've ever done before," he said.

"In the end, I believe AIs are going to be our collaborators much more than our enemies." But, like Hansen, he does have concerns about it becoming weaponized and of an "AI arms race between government superpowers."

As for Magnetron, Rizzotto plugged him back in and is working on making a companion microwave, one made with a less violent backstory. He also tells Sputnik that he is going to open-source Magnetron, so if you want your own murderous microwave with a love for the British Crown and a distaste of Americans, you may not have to wait long.

Mike Tyson Appears to Assault a Fan on Plane - Video

Mike Tyson became the youngest heavyweight champion of all time at the age of 20, but his life has been embroiled with controversy and legal issues since.

Former heavyweight champion and baddest man on the planet Mike Tyson repeatedly punched a passenger on a JetBlue plane, according to a video released by TMZ on Thursday.

In the video, filmed Wednesday night, the former boxer [can be seen](#) repeatedly punching a passenger who sat behind him while another passenger tries to restrain him and the person holding the camera tells him "it's not worth it." Afterwards, the victim can be seen with a bloodied forehead.

Another video, apparently from moments before the altercation, shows the passenger standing behind a seated Tyson talking to him while Tyson looks forward, seemingly trying to ignore the passenger.

According to TMZ, the flight was scheduled to depart from San Francisco and land in Florida. A witness told TMZ that Tyson walked off the plane after the incident before take off.

The same witness says that Tyson was initially cool with the passenger, who Tyson's camp says was "extremely intoxicated" and would not stop provoking the boxer who last competed in an exhibition match against Roy Jones Jr. in 2020 after 15 years out of the ring.

The victim received medical attention after the altercation and spoke to police, according to the witness, but no announcement about charges being filed has come out yet. The voice behind the camera says the victim was asking for an autograph.

Mike Tyson was dubbed "the baddest man on the planet" when he burst onto the boxing scene in the 1980s. At age 20, he became the youngest heavyweight champion of all time and was the first to unify the WBA (World Boxing Association) WBC (World Boxing Council) and IBF (International Boxing Federation) titles. He became the lineal champion after defeating Michael Spinks in 91 seconds.

But the International Boxing Hall of Famer's career has also been mired in controversy and legal issues. In 1992, he was convicted of rape and sentenced to six years in prison, but was released on parole after serving three years.

In 1999, he was sentenced to one year in prison and two years probation for assaulting two motorists in a road rage incident.

This most recent incident is not the first time Tyson had issues with fans. In 2004, Tyson agreed to a plea deal resulting in community service after fighting two fans in a hotel lobby who were asking for an autograph.

Tyson maintained that he did nothing wrong and accused the two men of attacking him, being quoted by the New York Post at the time as saying "I didn't do anything wrong. They jumped me. They're the ones with guns." But no guns were found at the scene, according to police.

More recently, Tyson was in the headlines after [a fan pulled a gun](#) on him in a comedy club.

During that incident Tyson remained calm and even hugged the man after he put his gun away.

Tyson currently runs a cannabis company that [recently added](#) wrestling legend Ric Flair to its list of celebrity tie-ins.

JetBlue and the San Francisco police have not responded to requests for comment by TMZ.

Twitter Shares Rally as Social Media Giant Reportedly Readies for Deal With Elon Musk

NEW YORK, April 25 (Sputnik) - Shares of Twitter jumped 5% in pre-market trading on Monday as several US media outlets reported that the board of the social media giant was nearing a buyout deal by its largest shareholder Elon Musk, after initially attempting to reject the billionaire businessman's bid.

Musk, who already owns a 9.1% stake in Twitter through a nearly \$3 billion purchase made from the open market earlier this month, is offering \$54.20 for each remaining share of the microblogging site that he does not already own to delist the company from the New York Stock Exchange and take it private. Twitter shares rose to above \$51.50 in pre-market trading, versus Friday's close of \$48.93, after media reports that a deal was imminent.

CNBC reported that the Twitter board had a change in stance toward Musk's offer after he made a securities filing on April 21 that he has received financial commitments of \$46.5 billion to fund his offer. The Wall Street Journal reported that the two sides met on Sunday and a deal could be concluded as soon as this week.

An agreement on terms of the transaction could be reached as soon as Monday, according to Bloomberg.

Concerns over how Musk would fund the deal — aside his “undervaluation” of the company — were what led Twitter to initially balk at a deal with the billionaire entrepreneur. Just on April 19, The New York Post reported that Musk was considering investing up to \$15 billion of his own money and pooling the rest externally to fund the buyout.

Saudi Prince Alwaleed bin Talal, one of Twitter's substantial shareholders, had described Musk's offer of \$54.20 versus this year's high of \$54.57 hit on April 5 as basically devoid of a premium. The Twitter board subsequently adopted a shareholder rights plan — or so-called Poison Pill — to reduce the likelihood that any person, entity or group would be able to gain full control over the company without paying a premium.

Analysts had also cited other concerns about Musk's style of management should he become the boss of Twitter. While he could revolutionize Twitter as a free-speech model, Musk could also use his influence on the platform to silence criticism against decisions he makes in his other businesses, they said.

Estimated by Forbes to be worth \$270 billion, making him the world richest man, Musk is also chief executive of electric car company Tesla, a keen space travel explorer and cryptocurrency advocate, among other things. On top of these, the outspoken, flamboyant and eccentric entrepreneur calls himself a “free speech absolutist.”

One of Twitter's most-prolific users, Musk's main concern with the microblogging site appeared to be over its moderation policies. In March, he tweeted out a poll that asked Twitter users

whether the site, which has banned former president Donald Trump, among others, adhered to the principle of free speech.

Austin Says Discussed With Ukraine Need to Track US-Made Weapons Sent to Kiev

WASHINGTON, April 25 (Sputnik) - Pentagon chief Lloyd Austin said on Monday that he discussed with Ukraine the need to track US-made weapons being sent to Kiev during his unannounced visit to the country.

"We did have a very good discussion with both the CHOD [Chief of Defense] and the president and minister of defense on the necessity to make sure that those weapons are tracked and, as best possible, to make sure that they're protected from falling into the hands of adversaries," Austin told a press conference in Poland.

He noted that it is difficult to track weapons since there are no American troops on the ground in Ukraine.

"Now, when you're in a fight, as you know, if a specific battle is lost, then you have less control over that – over your ability to control items. But they are focused on this issue and they know we are concerned about it, and we'll continue to engage," he added.

Last Thursday, President Joe Biden announced another \$800 million military aid package for Ukraine including more tactical drones, heavy artillery weapons, "dozens" of howitzers, and 144,000 rounds of ammunition.

Having begun her career in Belgrade, Brink also served as deputy chief of mission at the embassies in Uzbekistan and Georgia.

She speaks Russian and has studied Slovak, Serbian, Georgian, and French.

The position of US ambassador to Ukraine has been vacant since the previous envoy, Marie Yovanovitch, was removed from her post by former President Donald Trump in May of 2019 for allegedly undermining his effort to push Kiev to investigate Biden and his son Hunter.

The comments coming after the US announced another \$800 million in additional security assistance for Kiev as well as \$500 million in direct economic aid.

Biden has repeatedly boasted about the amount of security assistance his administration has committed to Ukraine, which now totals \$4 billion since he took office.

"American taxpayers should be outraged by the Biden administration's throwing billions of dollars to Ukraine in a quarrel in which we have no actual interests at stake and in a situation which can easily develop into a nuclear war if there are any miscalculations of Russian intentions," former CIA analyst and station chief Philip Giraldi told Sputnik when asked about Biden's remarks.

In the short run, Biden might reap brief political rewards from his irresponsible policy because the US public favoring backing people they imagined were "good guys" in wars as long as they did not have to pay any serious price themselves, Giraldi pointed out.

"Of course the American public always likes a nice war particularly when foreigners are doing the dying and they have been effectively brainwashed by the media and politicians into believing that our totally corrupt leaders are willing to fight the good fight in support of exalted principles like 'freedom' and 'democracy,'" he said.

Giraldi underscored that Ukraine democracy had been toppled by US and Allied efforts in the 2014 Maidan coup and since then Washington had systematically supported militant neo-Nazi forces.

"Of course Ukraine is no democracy," Giraldi said.

However, that should be no problem for the US government who will try to convince the world otherwise, Giraldi said.

He then added, sarcastically, that "we all know that inside every member of the Azov Brigade there is a true democrat striving to emerge and embrace the United States."

US, BIDEN MISSED CHANCES

American University in Moscow President Professor Edward Lozansky said had the Obama administration, in which Biden served as vice president, honestly proceeded with its announced reset of relations with Moscow, friendship and a harmony of common interests could easily have been maintained between the nuclear superpowers.

"Instead, the Obama administration facilitated the Maidan coup in February 2014 when then-Assistant Secretary of State for Eurasian Affairs Victoria Nuland worked with Biden to push the 'color revolution' that ousted democratically elected Ukrainian president Viktor Yanukovich in order to put Kiev on the fast track to NATO membership," he said.

Another chance for peace in Ukraine was lost when Biden failed to pronounce the word "neutrality" on any day prior to February 24 of this year, Lozansky stressed.

Had this been done, there would be no Russian invasion, US-Russia security talks would have proceeded with good chances for success," he said.

Those talks could have produced a Washington-Moscow agreement similar to the Reagan - Gorbachev scenario which ended the first Cold War, Lozansky explained.

Ukraine could only have benefited tremendously from enjoying secure, neutral status between Russia and the West, Lozansky observed.

But instead of building on this clear, assured road to ensure lasting peace and prosperity for both Russia and Ukraine as well as for the United States, the US president had opted for a policy of reckless confrontation with potentially terrible consequences, Lozansky concluded. "Biden has chosen another road, and looks like he is proud again," he said.

'Hack DHS' Bug Bounty Program Identifies 122 Cybersecurity Vulnerabilities - Statement

WASHINGTON, April 23 (Sputnik) - The now-concluded bug bounty program to test the defenses of the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) cybersecurity infrastructure revealed

122 openings and flaws that IT specialists can close and fix, DHS officials said in a press release.

"Today, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced the results of its first bug bounty program," the release said on Friday. "Through the 'Hack DHS' program, vetted cybersecurity researchers and ethical hackers are invited to identify potential cybersecurity vulnerabilities in select external DHS systems."

The DHS explained in the release that in the first phase of this program, more than 450 vetted security researchers identified 122 vulnerabilities, of which 27 were determined to be critical. Participants in the bug bounty program were paid \$125,600 to find and identify existing vulnerabilities, the release said.

DHS is the first federal agency to expand its bug bounty program to find and report vulnerabilities across all public-facing information system assets, the release said.

The goal of "Hack DHS," which was launched in December 2021, is to develop a prototype that can be used by other government agencies and organizations spreading across of government so that each entity can strengthen the resilience of their cybersecurity architecture, the release also said.

During the second phase of the three-phase program, the vetted cybersecurity researchers and ethical hackers will participate in a live, in-person hacking event, the release added.

However, during the third and final phase, DHS will identify lessons officials and staff have learned and intent to apply to bug bounty programs they host in the future, according to the release.

Mills submitted a false written statement in connection with the incident, the release said.

"Specifically, the indictment alleges that Mills falsely wrote in his statement that he had not used any force against the three inmate victims," the release added

Mills, 55, could end up with a sentence of ten years for each of the civil rights charges and 20 years for obstruction of justice, according to the release.

Wall Street Down 3rd Week in Row as Interest Rate Hike Fears Come to Head

NEW YORK, April 23 (Sputnik) - Wall Street fell for a third straight week as fears of aggressive interest rate hikes by a Federal Reserve eager to break the back of the worst US inflation in 40 years led to an investor exodus from stocks and even safe-havens such as gold.

The three major US stock indexes - the S&P 500, the Dow Jones Industrial Average and the Nasdaq Composite - closed Friday's trade down by an average of 2.7%. For the week, their average decline was 2.8%, adding to the average net loss of 2.6% over two previous weeks. Stocks have been in a downtrend most of April, with the Fed planning some of its most aggressive monetary tightening ever to put the brakes on price pressures running riot since the breakout of the Russia-Ukraine conflict that has squeezed global supplies of oil, grains and specialty metals.

The rout on Wall Street deepened this week after an array of Federal Reserve officials - including James Bullard and Mary Daly, who head the central bank's St. Louis and San Francisco divisions, respectively - suggested that a 50-basis point, or half percentage point, hike be imposed at the upcoming policy meeting set for May 4-5. The Federal Reserve approved a mere 25-basis point, or quarter point, increase at its previous interest rate hike in March. Bullard had even suggested a 75-basis point, or three-quarter percentage point, hike, saying the Federal Reserve was way behind the curve in fighting inflation growing at its fastest pace since 1981.

Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell weighed in on the debate on Thursday, saying it would be "appropriate" for the central bank to move faster and heavier on rates. That accelerated the selloff in stocks over the past two days, and even pulled down gold, seen as a hedge against economic and political troubles.

"The [US] economy is very strong, as is the labor market, but both can only sustain so much tightening in a short period and we may soon see whether the Fed has left itself too much to do," Craig Erlam, analyst at online trading platform OANDA, said. "Central banks may be

targeting a soft landing while belatedly combating very high inflation but that is very hard to achieve and there are plenty of reasons to believe they'll fail to do so again."

In Friday's stock market action, the S&P 500 - which groups the top 500 US stocks - finished down 119 points, or 2.7%, at 4,274. For the week, it fell 2.8%.

The Nasdaq Composite - which houses the biggest technology names of the world, including Amazon, Apple, Netflix and Google - closed down 335 points, or 2.6%, at 12,839. It tumbled 3.8% on the week for its worst weekly decline since mid-January.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average, which lists travel, aviation and cross-industry value stocks, settled down 981 points, or 2.8%, at 33,811. For the week, it fell 1.9%.

"We're responding to reports of shots fired... there has been three victims shot. We have two males and one female. I do not know their ages or conditions," the spokesman said on Friday. Media footage showed police officers take a man into custody, but it is unclear if he is the gunman.

There is a heavy police presence in the area, witnesses told reporters they heard several rounds of gunshots, as many as 20.

A sputnik correspondent reported from the scene of the shooting in Washington, where police have cordoned off streets after at least three people were shot.

Oil Prices Down 5% on Week as COVID-19 Concerns Emerge in China Again

NEW YORK, April 22 (Sputnik) - Oil prices settled down on Friday, falling 5% on the week, as potentially lower Chinese energy consumption from the lockdown of its Shanghai financial hub overshadowed supply tightness from Russian sanctions that kept the market up for weeks. London-traded global crude benchmark Brent settled Friday's trade down \$1.68, or 1.6%, at \$106.65 per barrel. For the week, Brent showed a 4.5% loss that came after a near 9% gain last week and the 13% drop in two prior weeks. If the declines keep up, April will be this year's first month in the negative for Brent.

New York-traded US crude benchmark West Texas Intermediate, or WTI, settled Friday's trade down \$1.72, or 1.7%, at \$102.07 a barrel. Like Brent, WTI showed a drop of 4.5% for the week, and similar volatility to the global benchmark in three previous weeks.

Crude prices fell as concerns about the multi-week lockdown of Shanghai over a new COVID-19 cases and deaths weighed on the sentiment in oil, even as the Europe-Russia face-off over Ukraine suggested that the market had no little option but to go higher.

"The risks are certainly more tilted to the upside, given the war in Ukraine and a potential embargo on Russian exports, but lockdowns in China and the risk of a Fed-driven economic slowdown are also significant," Craig Erlam, head of research for Europe at online trading platform OANDA, said.

China's demand for gasoline, diesel and aviation fuel in April is expected to slide 20% from a year earlier, media reports said.

That would be equivalent to an estimated drop of 1.2 million barrels a day in crude oil consumption and would be the largest hit to demand since the lockdown more than two years ago in Wuhan, the central Chinese city where the novel coronavirus was first identified.

Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell also unrattled markets this week with hawkish talk at the IMF-World Bank Spring meetings. Powell said it would be "appropriate" for the central bank to move faster and heavier on interest rates - a sign that the Fed's rate decision committee would approve a half point rise at its upcoming May 4-5 meeting after a previous hike of just a quarter point in March.

"Some fear that a 50 basis point rate increase will be the first of many and could slow down the economy and the demand for oil," Phil Flynn, energy analyst at Price Futures Group in Chicago, wrote in a commentary.

"It is not just a tightening cycle upsetting traders overnight but also the pricing in of a 50-basis point interest rate increase by September by the European Central Bank. The Bank of Japan on the other hand wants to remain dovish but worries that the course of the US and Europe could force them to change course," he said.

Germany - Europe's the largest economy - is expected to cut its growth forecast for 2022 to 2.2% from 3.6%, according to media reports.

On February 24, Russia launched a special military operation in Ukraine after the breakaway republics of Donetsk and Luhansk requested help to defend them from intensifying attacks by Ukrainian troops. The Russian Ministry of Defense said the operation is solely targeting Ukrainian military infrastructure and the civilian population is not in danger.

Biden Nominates Former US Envoy to Ukraine as Assistant Secretary of State for Energy
WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) – US President Joe Biden has nominated former Ambassador to Ukraine Geoffrey Pyatt for the position of Assistant Secretary of State for Energy Resources, the White House announced on Friday.

"Today, President Biden announced his intent to nominate the following individuals to serve as key leaders in his administration: ... Geoffrey Pyatt, Nominee for Assistant Secretary of State for Energy Resources," the press release said.

At the moment, Pyatt is serving as the US ambassador to Greece, a position he has held since 2016. The track record of the American diplomat also includes serving as the US envoy to Ukraine between 2013 and 2016.

Pyatt was one of the key figures in the 2014 events that led to a change of power in Ukraine. He also labeled pro-Russian rebels in Donbas as "terrorists."

In 2014, Pyatt's role came to light following the publication of the leaked recording of his phone conversation with then-Assistant Secretary of State Victoria Nuland. In the recording that became scandalous, the two senior diplomats discussed their vision for the future of post-coup Ukraine, including coordination with opposition figures.

Since joining the US foreign service in 1989, Pyatt has served in many senior diplomatic positions, including Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State in the Bureau of South and Central Asian Affairs and the Deputy Chief of Mission at the US Mission to the International Atomic Energy Agency, according to the release.

Texas National Guard Says Soldier Missing on US Border With Mexico - Statement

"A Texas Army National Guard Soldier assigned to Operation Lone Star has gone missing along the river during a mission related incident, Friday April 22, 2022 in Eagle Pass, Texas," the Texas National Guard said in a press release.

The soldier has not been found, but existing reports of a fatality are inaccurate at the moment, the release said.

The Texas National Guard, including state and federal law enforcement, are working quickly to find the missing soldier, the release added.

US media reported, citing multiple sources, the soldier had drowned while trying to save migrants themselves drowning in the river.

Several hundred National Guard troops are currently deployed to the US southern border to help the Customs and Border Protection (CBP) deal with the record number of migrants coming to the United States illegally.

Three More Men Plead Guilty to Assault During January 6 Capitol Riot – DOJ

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) – Three more men have pled guilty to assaulting police officers during the riot at the US Capitol on January 6, 2021, the US Department of Justice said on Friday.

"Mark K. Ponder, 56, pleaded guilty in the District of Columbia to assaulting, resisting, or impeding officers using a dangerous weapon," prosecutors said. "After rioters overwhelmed police lines in the West Plaza, Ponder ran out from the crowd and swung a long, thin pole at a U.S. Capitol Police officer. The officer protected himself by raising his riot shield above his head. Ponder's pole struck the riot shield and broke in two, with part of the pole flying off to the side." Prosecutors said Ponder found a thicker pole, ran toward a second US Capitol Police officer and tried to strike him. The officer fended off the attack with his riot shield. Ponder also attacked other police officers trying to protect the US Capitol and struck one of them in the shoulder. Ponder was arrested on March 17, 2021, in Washington, DC. He will be sentenced on July 18, 2022 and faces what prosecutors describe as "a statutory maximum" of 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$250,000.

The other two men, Cody Mattice, 29, of Greece, New York, and James Phillip Mault, 30, formerly of Brockport, New York, were also charged for their involvement in the riot which protested the counting of electoral votes that would cement the outcome of the 2020 presidential election.

Prosecutors said Mattice pulled down a section of the metal barricades that separated rioters from police. He joined others in the crowd who overran the police line. Both men also sprayed officers with chemical spray. Mattice was arrested on October 7, 2021, in Hilton, New York, while Mault was taken into custody the same day in Fort Bragg, North Carolina. They face "a statutory maximum" of eight years in prison for assaulting, resisting, or impeding officers. The charge also carries potential financial penalties. Both men are to be sentenced on July 15, 2022.

In the 15 months since the riot on January 6, 2021, almost 800 people in nearly all 50 states have been arrested for crimes related to the uprising. This includes more than 250 people charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement. The investigation continues.

US Court Sets May 10 Arraignment for Ex-Honduran President Facing Trafficking Charges

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - A US judge on Friday set an arraignment hearing for former Honduran President Juan Orlando Hernandez on May 10.

Federal prosecutors asked for Hernandez' arraignment to be scheduled on May 10 in order to allow both parties to prepare for the case and to review evidence that will be presented at the trial

Prosecutors said Hernandez was extradited to the United States earlier on Friday.

On Thursday, the US Justice Department unsealed charges against Hernandez accusing him of engaging in drug trafficking in order to advance his political career.

Drug Enforcement Administration chief Anne Milgram said during a press conference that he used government resources to further his drug trafficking activities and he covered up Honduran drug trafficking schemes. Hernandez allegedly accepted a \$1 million bribe from the former leader of Mexico's Sinaloa Cartel, Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman, Milgram added.

US Diplomats Return From Ethiopia After Meeting With Several Stakeholders – State Dept.

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - US Special Envoy for the Horn of Africa David Satterfield and his deputy have concluded their trip to Ethiopia where they had a chance to meet with a number of stakeholders and discuss humanitarian issues brought on by the conflict in the country's north, the State Department principal deputy spokeswoman said on Friday.

"Special envoy for the Horn of Africa David Satterfield, as well as Deputy Special Envoy Payton Knopf, have concluded their visits to Ethiopia where they met with several stakeholders and pursued robust diplomacy on that trip. They discussed the urgent need and sustained delivery for humanitarian aid to those in need in Ethiopia," Jalina Porter told a briefing.

The two diplomats arrived in Ethiopia on April 13 as part of US efforts toward ending hostilities, ensuring unhindered humanitarian access, achieving transparent investigations into human rights abuses and violations by all actors, and a negotiated resolution to the conflict in Ethiopia, according to the State Department.

The spokeswoman added that the United States strongly supports the declarations of humanitarian truce by the government of Ethiopia and the Tigray regional authority, and welcomes recent deliveries of humanitarian assistance to communities in need.

Ethiopia has been gripped by a violent internal conflict since November 2020, when the central government accused the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF) of attacking its military base and launched an anti-terrorist operation in the region. In June 2021, the rebels of the TPLF seized the city of Mekelle, the administrative regional center, and the government declared an unconditional ceasefire.

However, the rebels launched a new offensive soon after and took control of the southern part of Tigray and the neighboring Amhara region. The ongoing conflict has claimed thousands of lives, displaced millions of people, and caused a dire humanitarian crisis across the country.

Denigration of Russia Not Just Strategic Need, Springs From Depths of Western Soul - Envoy

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - The defamation of Russia is not just a strategic need but it is deeply grounded in the farthest corner of the Western soul, Moscow's Ambassador to Canada Oleg Stepanov said on Friday.

"We understand that on a philosophical level the denigration of Russia emanates not simply from the strategic need of propaganda and information warfare," Stepanov said. "It is deeply rooted in the farthest corner of the Western soul. Every time it alleges Russia is committing atrocities, the West attempts to conceal in a secret room its own sins and liberate itself from guilt

for its dark past. By demonizing us the West is trying to escape the shame it feels looking at its own reflection in the mirror."

Stepanov's comments come in response to the recent article "Ukraine: the impact of the atrocities" published by The Hill Times. The article by Gwynne Dyer refers to alleged atrocities by the Soviets during WWII, including within Ukraine.

"The story served by Mr. Dyer in his op-ed denigrating the Red Army is based on the false narrative invented on the terminal stage of the War in Europe by the Nazi Goebbels propaganda machine," Stepanov said. "And after the fall of Nazi Germany, the story was re-launched with a doubled effort by the US military intelligence and the CIA in coordination with the notorious Gehlen Organization - comprised of 'rehabilitated' Nazis, RSHA, Abwehr and SS officers - to confront Russia/Soviet Union."

Stepanov stressed that such fictitious stories became a part of the psychological information operations and propaganda policy aimed at dehumanizing and demonizing Russia and Russians in the unfolding Cold War.

The ambassador noted that Russia lost 27 million people, including about 15 million non-military personnel, in the war.

"No other country in the world, with the exception of China, suffered on such a large scale during the war," he said. "Not even did the Russian soldier manage to defeat Nazism. But having achieved the victory he stayed human and humane. He found inner strength to forgive the unforgivable crimes committed by Germany and other nations that had sided with it, to reconcile in a noble pursuit that no global wars were fought ever again."

After the Victory, Stepanov went on to say, the same Russian soldier - sometimes at the expense of the interests of his own people - helped care for the former enemy and rebuild the country.

"The Russian soldier is kind and will always lend a hand to the sincerely penitent foe. So is the story behind the memorial in Treptower Park in Berlin," he said. "The Soldier Liberator holding in his arm a little girl has real prototypes - sergeants Nikolay Masalov and Trifon Lukyanovich who both saved German kids during the Berlin operation in April 1945. There are veterans of that war in my country and in the former allied nations, Canada among them, who are still alive and know this unvarnished truth. Ask them. But this article is also about the broader picture."

Stepanov underscored that Russia and the Russian people will not be hurt by the allegations of fake atrocities.

"We know those are lies," the envoy stated. "We also know that this article won't change the views of those who on purpose or unwillingly in ignorance against the backdrop of the current historic moment are pouring on the Ukrainian propagandist mill to retrospectively reproduce the historical fakes."

However, Stepanov pointed out, Russia's chief concern is that such narrative warfare is targeting a Canadian audience in an attempt to distort the real picture by intentionally falsifying history.

"On the other hand, we also know that people of Canada whose grandfathers fought alongside my compatriots to liberate the world from Nazism are thoughtful and in terms of critical analysis can tell the truth from the lie," he said. "That is of high value especially on the eve of commemorating the upcoming anniversary of the Victory in the war in Europe celebrated on May 8th in Canada and on May 9th in Russia."

US forests absorb more than 10% of the country's annual greenhouse gas emissions and are home to many of the nation's unique habitats, the fact sheet also said.

US Adds 3 Cryptocurrency Wallets of DPRK Hacker Group Lazarus to Sanctions List - Treasury

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - The US Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) added three cryptocurrency wallets belonging to the North Korean hacking collective known as Lazarus Group for involvement in illicit cybercrime and sanctions evasion, the Treasury Department said on Friday.

"OFAC added 3 virtual currency wallet addresses to the SDN Listing for Lazarus Group. The DPRK has relied on illicit activities like cybercrime to generate revenue while trying to evade US & UN sanctions. Transacting w/ these risks exposure to US sanctions," the Treasury Department wrote on social media.

Lazarus Group and fellow North Korean cyber actor APT38 were responsible for the theft of \$620 million in Ethereum cryptocurrency, the FBI said earlier this month.

The cryptocurrency wallets sanctioned by OFAC on Friday were all Ethereum addresses, according to the updated Specially Designated Nationals list update.

Pentagon to Prioritize Energy Demand Reduction in New Acquisitions - Senior Official

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - The current Defense Department budget request is as focused on aligning with the Biden administration's climate goals as it is with ensuring that the

United States builds a more capable military, Deputy Defense Secretary Kathleen Hicks said on Friday, celebrated as Earth Day.

"Earth Day is a reminder that confronting the climate threat presents an opportunity to Build a Better America - and a more resilient, capable military. Secretary Austin and I are committed to ensuring our military remains the most capable fighting force in the world - an objective that is well-aligned with our climate goals," Hicks said in a statement.

Hicks said she signed on Thursday a memorandum on "Energy Supportability and Demand Reduction in Capability Development," which directs the military to prioritize energy demand reduction in all new system acquisitions and upgrades to existing systems.

"This initiative is critical to aligning the department's capabilities with the National Defense Strategy and ensuring competitive advantage in the current and future warfighting environment," she said.

Hicks noted that the Defense Department's operational objectives are in sync with the administration's climate goals given that the rise in sea levels, wildfires, hurricanes and droughts can increase the demands on troops, affect military readiness and cause the erosion of the military infrastructure. A current task is to reduce the demand on the combat systems, she said. Hicks said the budget request also includes investments in hybrid tactical vehicles to cut fuel demand and provide extended range, persistence and stealth as well as new platforms - like prototype blended-wing-body aircraft - that have the potential to increase range and payload by improving energy efficiency.

"Secretary Austin and I have prioritized these kinds of investments because they will make us a more capable force," she said.

The fiscal year 2023 budget request sent to Congress includes \$2 billion to adapt and strengthen the climate resilience of military bases; \$247 million to bolster the energy efficiency of combat systems and \$807 million for science and technology to keep the US military at the cutting edge, Hicks added.

UN Confirms Guterres' Trip to Moscow, Meetings With Putin, Lavrov - Official

The Kremlin also confirmed the UN Secretary-General's visit, saying Putin and Lavrov will receive Guterres for talks.

"The Secretary-General will visit Moscow, Russian Federation, where, on Tuesday, 26 April, he will have a working meeting and lunch with Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov and will be received by President Vladimir Putin," she said.

Kaneko noted that Putin and Lavrov will meet with Guterres on the same day.

When asked about Guterres' possible visit to Ukraine, Kaneko said the United Nations is "still working with Ukraine on the preparations" for such a visit.

Speaking on the proposed Easter truce, she said today is Friday and Easter is on Sunday.

"We operate with hope," Kaneko added.

On Tuesday, Guterres called for a four-day humanitarian pause in Ukraine beginning on Holy Thursday and running through Christian Orthodox Easter on Sunday, and appealed all sides to the conflict to open a window for dialogue and peace.

The humanitarian pause suggested by Guterres entails launching humanitarian corridors for civilians to leave the embattled areas of Ukraine and enabling humanitarian convoys to reach the cities of Donetsk, Luhansk, Mariupol and Kherson.

Trump, McCarthy Hold Call on New Audio About Trump January 6 Resignation - Reports

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - Former US President Donald Trump and Republican House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy spoke over the phone on Thursday night about a new audio recording from January 10, 2021 of McCarthy telling a fellow lawmaker that Trump should resign following the events at the Capitol on January 6, The Washington Post reported on Friday.

The two leaders held the call after the audio recording was circulated in US media in response to recent claims by McCarthy that he did not push for Trump's resignation following the breach of the Capitol by individuals protesting the certification of the 2020 presidential election in favor of Joe Biden, the report said, citing two people familiar with the conversation.

Trump was reportedly not upset with McCarthy and expressed gladness that he did not follow through with urging for his resignation, which Trump viewed as a sign of McCarthy's continued hold over the Republican Party as one of its leaders, the report said.

However, House Republicans are still waiting on a clear signal from Trump as to whether they should continue to back McCarthy as their leader in the chamber – and potential Speaker of the House should Republicans regain a majority of seats in the next election – without backing from the still-influential former president, the report said.

"If Trump comes out and says [McCarthy] lost my faith and can't be speaker, that is bold. That will move people," one Republican congressional aide said in the report on the condition of anonymity.

Trump merely complaining about McCarthy is unlikely to threaten his leadership position, the aide added, pointing to Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell's continued leadership despite frequent complaints about the lawmaker from Trump.

The call audio of McCarthy and fellow Republican lawmaker Liz Cheney was released after McCarthy denied a report that he and McConnell privately pledged to remove Trump from US politics after the events at the Capitol on January 6. In the recording, McCarthy can be heard telling Cheney that "it would be my recommendation [Trump] should resign."

All Major European Economies May Face 'Mild Technical Recession' in 2022 - IMF

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - All major European economies save for one may face a mild recession this year, International Monetary Fund (IMF) European Department Director Alfred Kammer told reporters on Friday.

"All major European economies, except for Spain, are at around zero percent growth, some a bit above, some a bit below, and there is a risk that some of them could enter a mild technical recession in 2022," Kammer said during a press briefing.

However, there is much uncertainty about the numbers regarding the performance of these economies, Krammer said.

The IMF said in its regional economic outlook on Friday, that GDP growth in the advanced European economies will decline to 3% in 2022, while in the emerging markets it will face a decline of 3.2%.

Cnada's Freeland Says Had 'Good Conversation' With Shmyhal on Reopening Embassy in Kiev

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) - Canadian Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland said on Friday that she discussed with Ukrainian Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal the possibility of reopening the Canadian embassy in Kiev and characterized the meeting as having a "good conversation" on the matter.

"Last night, I had a meeting with Shmyhal. We discussed a wide range of issues, including [reopening] embassies in Kiev. Shmyhal told me about efforts Ukraine is making to restore life in Kiev, we had a good conversation about it," Freeland said.

A number of nations have already spoken about the reopening their embassies and consulates in the Ukrainian capital. Earlier in the week, Iran said it resumed the operation of its embassy in Kiev after having temporarily evacuated n to Moldova.

The Dutch Foreign Ministry sad its embassy also resumed operations in Ukraine, but its diplomats are working from Lvov and the consular department remains closed for now. Italy and France also announced that they will reopen their embassies in Ukraine.

IMF Says Russia's Small Sovereign Debt Gives Comfort in Terms of Financial Stability Risks

WASHINGTON, April 22 (Sputnik) – Russia's sovereign debt is relatively small, which gives comfort in terms of global financial stability risks, but issues with access to markets might have significant ramifications for the nation's economy, Director of the European Department of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) Alfred Kammer said on Friday.

"The outstanding Russian sovereign debt is relatively small in global terms. Also, market prices reflect the default probabilities already. So that should give some comfort in terms of financial stability risks," Kammer told virtual press briefing.

He warned that the Russian government will face difficulties regaining access to markets, which will take some time.

Kammer noted that the current situation in the economy may create implications for businesses. "The amount of corporate total external debt in Russia outstanding is over \$400 billion, and these developments will also make it more difficult for corporates to obtain credit, and that will be of much more significant impact for the Russian economy," he said.

US Says to Do Best to 'Hold Russia to Account,' But Not Via Direct Military Confrontation

"Well, we're gonna we're gonna have time to hold these people to account for what they've done, but our measures are going to take time to work. We're not going to commit to a military direct military confrontation with Russia. The President's been clear about that, but everything short of a direct military confrontation with Russia, we will do and will do with our allies and will intensify it for as long as it takes," Singh said.
